

The Texas Highway Department has announced recently from Austin the first step in setting up a 1959 and 1960 Federal Aid Secondary Program for Texas.

TEXAS HIGHWAY

DEPARTMENT NEWS

Mr. O. L. Crain, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Lubbock has stated that the following farm-to-market roads in this area are scheduled for work under this program:

In Hockley County: From State Highway 51, 5.0 miles north of Levelland, east to end of FM Road 2395, a distance of approximately 5.3 miles; from FM Road 2395 east to FM Road 2130, 6.0 miles south of Roundup, a distance of approximately 4.0 miles; from FM 2130, 5.0 miles south of Roundup, east to Lubbock County line, a distance of approximately 1.2 miles.

From the end of FM Road 1632, south to FM Road 41, 1.0 mile west of Ropesville, a distance of approximately 2.4 miles. All at an estimated cost of \$131,000.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects just as soon as final planning is completed and right of way secured. Resident Engineer, Herbert E. DeShazo, will be in charge of the work in this area. ---000---

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



Protection against the menace of radioactive fallout is now possi-

ble, and within the means of many American families.

FOR FAMILIES who cannot afford such an elaborate shelter, OCDM has designed other less expensive shelters which would be built in basements-some of them by "do-it-yourselfers." They would not offer as complete fallout protection as the underground shelter,

but would be adequate in all but the more dangerous fallout zones. The shelter designs are a key part of the President's new fiveoint civil defense fallout shelter policy announced by OCDM Director Leo A. Hoegh:


 Provide the public with the facts on fallout effects. This includes information on how people can protect themselves by building shelters and decontaminating anything exposed to fallout, and how they can protect supplies of food and water from radiation.

· Survey existing structures for fallout shelter, such as mines, subways, tunnels and basements.

· Speed up fallout shelter research to develop new designs adaptable to many situations.

 Build a number of new "demonstrator" shelter facilities in places such as underground parking garages, subways, schools, hospitals, factories and apartment buildings.

· Incorporate fallout shelters in new Federal buildings.

Built for only about 25 per cent more than surface construction costs, they provide up to 20,000 persons per shelter with protection from radioactive fallout, and also the blast from all but a nearby nuclear hit.
