Today, 450 years later, the atmosphere of the world has changed much since Luther's time including the climate within the Church. Yesterday, Martin Luther was forced to protest against his church and finally to accept separation from it in order to protect the conscience and conviction of his faith, The Roman Catholic Church brand ed him and his followers as "heretics", those who held to beliefs false to the truth of the church. Today, Roman Catholics will join with Protestants to celebrate the faith of Martin Luther and to observe Reformation Day.
