Optimism of this kind would seem at first to be a worthwhile attitude, but too often it is accompanied by a miserable sigh. What we really mean to say is, "Today, I'm throughly unhappy." Whatever we kay about tomorrow reveals how we feel about today, and usually tomorrow is more like today than our false expectations would have us believe. Happiness is never tomorrow. It is either in making the most of today, or it is never.

Second, the illusion that our problems will soon be over, "Tomorrow, everything will be okay." How often we use this rationalization as an excuse for not doing anything about our problems today. once knew a man who suffered from chest pains that grew worse and worse each day. Yet he refused to see a doctor always insisting that the pains would go away tomorrow. The pains finally did go away and so did he, perman-

Third, the illusion that we have unlimited time, "Tomor_ row, there will still be time." All of us know at least one fifteen letter word: PRO-CRASTINATION. None of us likes to put things off, but to varying degrees we all do. Sometimes the consequences are not serious, but many times they are. Consider the heartache of the person who sends expensive flowers to the funeral of a friend or a loved one to make up for the deeds and words of kindness which he failed to give while there was still time. Time, given to us only in the present, is so fleeting that we can neither stop it nor expect to possess it tomorrow.
