President Eisenhower paid him tribute yesterday as one of America's great patriots and public servants. Eisenhower told his news conference that was his answer to anyone who wants to talk about Marshall in derogatory terms.

The President's comment was requested by a reporter who recalled that Sen. Jenner (R-Ind) once called Marshall a front man for traitors and recently said he was standing by that statement.

Dean Suggests Meet Disputes Be Presented To Subcommittee

PANMUNJOM (U)—Arthur Dean, U.S. envoy, suggested today that top Allied and Communist diplomats abandon temporarily efforts to arrange a Korean peace conference and turn over to subcommittee disputes which have stalled the preliminary talks.

Director of the office of northeast Asian (Japan and Korea) affairs of the Department of State and Col. Stanton Babcock, a senior adviser, to represent him at lower level meetings if they are held. The Communists called an hour-long recess to mull over Dean's proposition. Their first reaction was definitely unfavorable, if not an outright rejection.

One Man Killed In Overturning Of Truck

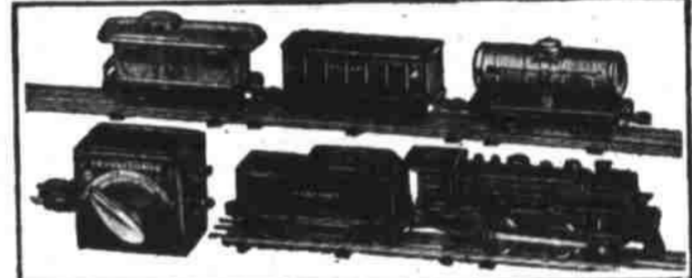
EDINBURG (U)—One man was killed yesterday and another injured when their truck overturned on U.S. Highway 83, 14 miles east of Rio Grande City.

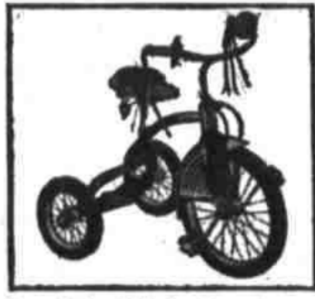

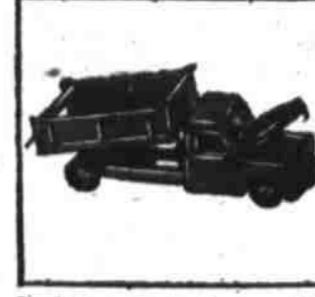

A young friend of mine was discussing a man she is seriously considering as a husband.

"He's wonderful," she said. "Thoughtful, generous and really kind. I just heard today of a lovely thing he did for someone in trouble, but..."

"I'd been waiting for that 'but,'" because Kay's pretty face was troubled, not radiant.

"You see, he does his level best to hide all his nice, warm side," she continued. "He talks tough—he acts suspicious, as if he thought everybody was a potential enemy trying to best him. He really did have a hard time getting started, and he's made his success pretty much by himself, I guess. But why must he scoff at all the things that I feel have some meaning? I tried hard in those days to pretend to be something that I wasn't.

As a result, I was often miserable and uncertain, wanting to be thought well of by those who seemed so much more exciting and brilliant than I, yet tortured by remorse if I flouted the still small voice.

Once I even had what the doctor called a near-nervous breakdown because I couldn't get the two halves of myself together. One of me wanted to be able to smoke a cigarette and down a Pink Lady with airy nonchalance, to laugh heartily at naughty stories—even tell one. The other me heard with great distinctness the southern voice of Brother Stuart, who baptized me, pointing out the terrors of the path of the transgressor.

Somewhere in this period, I was discovered by my two roommates in Greenwich Village busily washing the brandy from a jar of brandied peaches for which they had paid a scandalous sum.

I doubt if I could have written about my beliefs then, for I was never certain what they were. It's only in these late middle years that I have realized the futility of the false front. Now I am firm in my belief in God, justice, truth, the Golden Rule and their eventual triumph in the world. These are not "corn" and even those who appear to be the most cynical know they are not.

Kay's young man, with Kay to help him, will work through this pugnacious hard-boiled period. And I who know I am sentimental and now glory in it predict they will live happily ever after.

BAKED TUNA AND CABBAGE

Ingredients: 1 medium-size head of cabbage, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/4 cup flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, one 7-ounce can solid-pack tuna, 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese.

Method: Quarter cabbage; cut into 1-inch slices; add salt and cayenne pepper to small quantity of rapidly boiling water. Gradually add cabbage so that water continues to boil; boil 5 minutes. Remove from heat and drain well. Melt butter in a heavy saucepan; blend in flour; add milk all at once and cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and smooth. Drain tuna and break into pieces with a fork; arrange alternate layers of cabbage and tuna in a greased 2-quart casserole. Pour white sauce over layers and sprinkle with cheese. Bake in moderate (350°F) oven 45 minutes. Makes 4 servings. This is a good main dish to serve with the menu below.

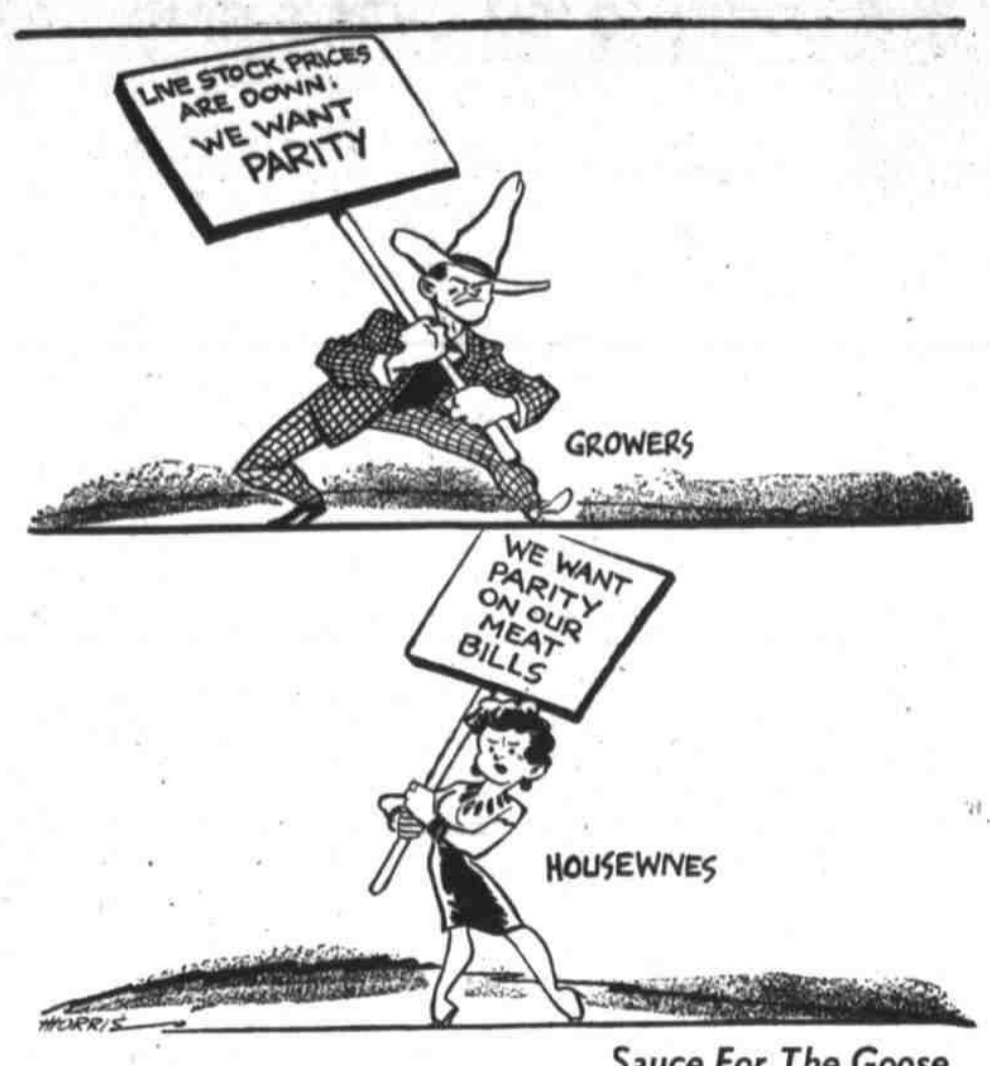

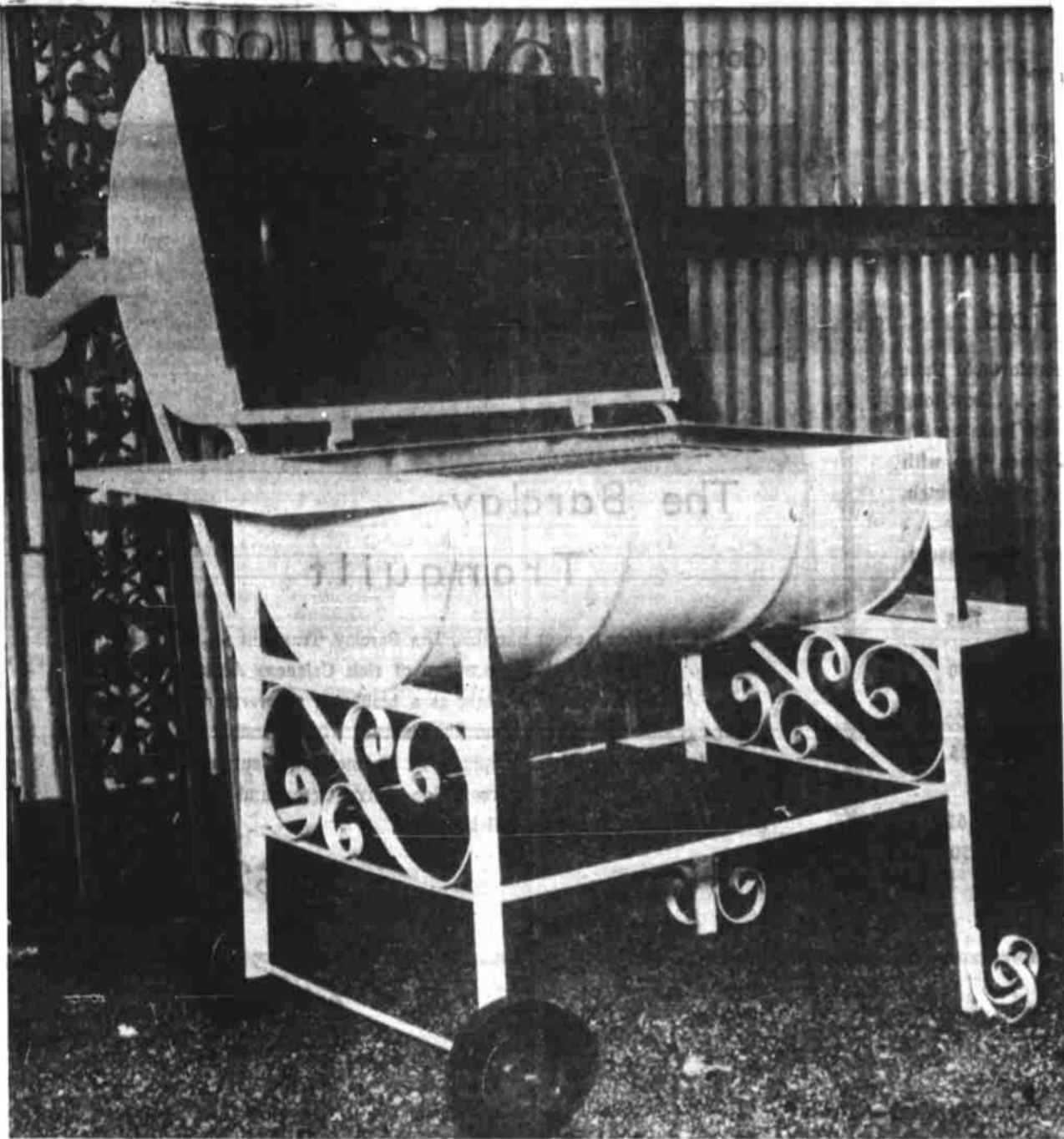

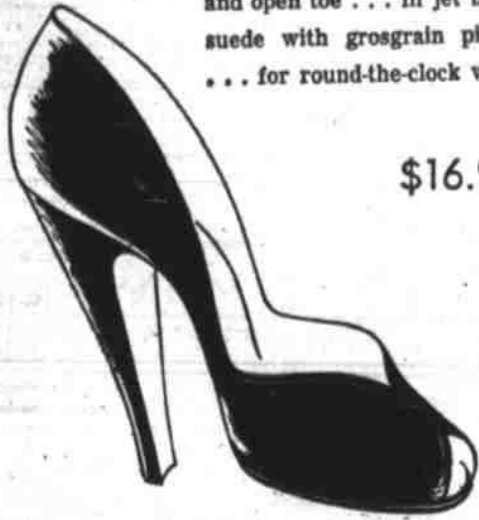

Oklaggies In
New Dairy
Experiment

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP)—Oklahoma A&M College researchers have mapped an experiment which, successful, could reverse a half-century trend in the dairy industry.

At the present time, milk quality is determined by the amount of butterfat content. The Aggie researchers are trying to determine the possibility of producing a new high protein milk through breeding that would do away with the butterfat grading system.

Milk from 45 Holstein cows will be used in the tests, expected to take two years. If the amount of protein in milk is found to be an inheritable characteristic in dairy cows, Dr. Stanley Musgrave, experiment director, said it will be a starting point for a new industry-wide breeding program.

Such a program would be the reverse of decades of work to produce cows giving milk high in butterfat.

With butterfat in oversupply, much discussion in the dairy industry has centered on finding a more realistic basis for setting milk prices. Dr. Musgrave said the amount of other nutrients in milk has been suggested as a possible substitute.

The project, only one of its kind in the United States, is the result of more than four years planning.

Previous studies of the protein characteristic have been conducted in Europe, Dr. Musgrave said, but none with the same purpose. The study here will cover the cow's complete lactation cycle, he said.

U. S. Warns Israel, Arabs To
Get Together On Refugee Issue

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The United States has warned Israel and neighboring Arab states that America cannot bear indefinitely the financial burdens imposed by their failure to agree on a settlement of the Palestine refugee question.

The warning was voiced yesterday by U. S. Delegate James P. Richards, a Democratic congressman from South Carolina.

He called on Israel to start thinking about compensating the refugees for their land or allowing them to return, asserting it would be in the best interests of both sides if something were done as soon as possible.

The refugees are now being supplied with necessities through a 200-million-dollar U. N. fund, designed to keep them going until mid-1955. The bulk of the money was contributed by the United States.

Richards said the United States gave full backing to a Jordan River development plan, drawn up by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

The 121-million-dollar project would water land for the refugees and supply power for industries in Israel, Jordan and Syria.

Although President Eisenhower has sent Eric Johnston, former

head of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, to the Middle East in an attempt to sell the idea, Arab reaction thus far has been negative. There has been no official Israeli reaction to the plan. The Israeli government, however, has temporarily suspended work in its own Jordan irrigation scheme while the U.N. Security Council debates Arab claims that the project disturbed Middle East peace.

Indian Delegate
Not So Certain Big
4 Meet Good Idea

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Current cold winds in the international climate have convinced India's delegate V. K. Krishna Menon, the time is not ripe for his idea of a U.N. Assembly of a top-level Big Four conference.

Menon told the Assembly last September he might propose a resolution in which the 60-nation organization would appeal to the chiefs of state of the United States, Russia, Britain and France to get together personally in an attempt to solve present world tensions.

Now, however, sources familiar with his views said today he has decided to wait for more favorable conditions.

The sources said he has no desire to push his suggestion in the face of the present U. S. opposition and the stand-off attitude of some other nations. The sources said Menon would prefer to be assured of unanimous passage of any such proposal in the Assembly.

Mexico City Makes
Road, Airport Pledge

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The Matamoros road and airport projects will be completed next year, the federal government says.

Gov. Horacio Teran said yesterday President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines has promised the projects would be on next year's list of constructions.

Matamoros is on the Texas frontier, across the river from Brownsville, Tex. The projects call for repaving of the roads from Matamoros to Ciudad Victoria and Reynosa, and the completion of the airport.

South's Publishers
Told Printers Don't
Deserve Wage Hike

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP)—The South's newspaper publishers were told today that "in the vast majority of cases, there is no apparent justification" for increasing wages of their printing department employees this year.

Tom Tanner, full-time labor commissioner for the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association, told the organization at its convention here that if a newspaper's wage scale last July was as much as 14.7 per cent above the three-year average of 1947-49, it had more than kept pace with the cost of living.

He said the rate was above that figure "in practically all cases" among Southern newspapers.

Another report revealed that 264 Southern newspapers now are served by teletypewriter equipment which brings telegraphed dispatches into the newspaper plant in the form of perforated paper tape which will automatically cast lead type when fed into typesetting machines.
