Reserved seat tickets are priced at \$3 and \$4. General admission tickets are \$2.50 for adults and \$1.75 for stu-

dents. Children 12 years and younger will be admitted for \$1.25.

Charles Perry, ABC rodeo chairman, said Wilbur Plaugher, actor and rodeo performer, would return as clown.

A parade, slated at 4 p.m. on opening day, officially will launch the 27th annual event.

Proceeds from ABC rodeos are used to support youth activities in Lubbock.

Kathy Crowe, former Texas Teen Queen and currently one of the nation's top feminine trick riders, will join actor Fess Parker in the spotlight at the 27th annual ABC Rodeo in Lubbock March 19-22.

Inez Kimberlin is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at City Hall within said City and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said

place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

That said election shall be held in accordance with the Election Code of this State and only resident qualified voters of said city shall be eligible to vote at said election.

That the City Secretary shall give notice of said election by posting a copy of this order in each of the election precincts of said city, which posting shall be done not less than 30 days prior to date fixed for said election.

The City Secretary shall also cause a notice by publication of this election to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in this city, which publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before said election.

That immediately after said election is held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Mayor of this city as required by the Election Code of this State.

There will be an election of two directors, the terms of A. R. Ryals and Preston Reeves expiring.

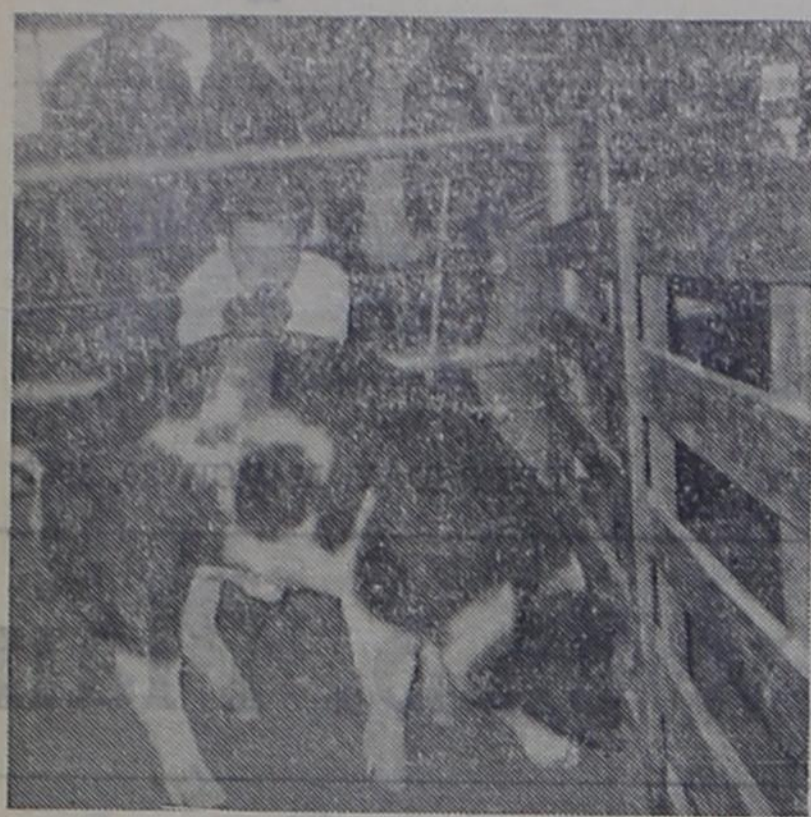
