

## Stiffling, Roaring Sand Storm Cuts Visibility to 0

GREAT, GREAT GRANDPAPPY OF SANDSTORMS MOVES SOIL, ROCK, GRAVEL

What was, perhaps, the most severe sandstorm in two years occurred Tuesday of this week.

Winds, hitting hurricane proportions in gusts, roared in from the southwest bringing clouds of dust so thick they could have been cut with a knife; clouds of dust which obscured the sun and turned midday into a darkness that almost equalled midnight.

Up until noon the storm was just ordinary, but from 11:00 to 2:00 o'clock saw the great grandpappy of all sandstorms in progress. So fierce was the wind that it picked gravel from the ground and shot it through the air with the force of a sling shot; with nimble, but dirty fingers, it picked at and lifted composition shingles from roofs, sent tin cans, tubs and other such things spinning merrily toward the northeast — took hold of the flag at the post office and ripped it to threads; swept the streets as clean as if a giant broom had moved over them; knocked down a telephone line in front of the school house.

The first utility to go was the telephones — they went out as a candle flame struck by a hurricane; next were the powers and lights — they flickered a few times and gave up the ghost — an

hour later the electricity was flowing, but as is usual with the telephones, they were still out but came on later — that is the way our telephone system works.

Along in the neighborhood of one-thirty p.m. (our electric clock had stopped) the sand seemingly gathered in one spot in the sky and hung suspended — the light of day faded and the darkness of night prevailed. For a moment the winds seemingly stood still, then they switched and came back in from the north. Visibility, which had been down to zero, suddenly stretched itself out and we could see across the street, see someone waving a flash light in the Ropes Food.

It was then we went to the depot and got Mr. Townsend to call the Southwestern Public Service Company in Lubbock and explain we had no lights or power — they were either already on the job, or we got some fast action, for it was no more than forty minutes before the electric globes commenced to glow. We can say this for the Southwestern Public Service Company, they give us service that is as near perfect as is humanly possible to make it.

So, as we write this on Tuesday afternoon at about three-fifteen, the wind is from the north and it is becoming touched with ice — it is blowing at forty miles an hour.

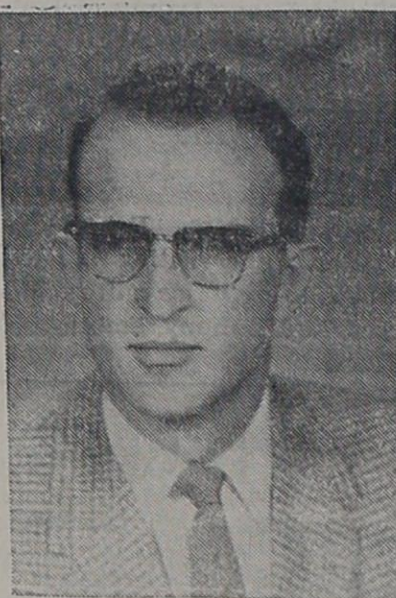

**D. E. Strickland  
Laid To Rest**

This past Monday afternoon, D. E. Strickland was laid to rest in the Ropes cemetery. The funeral service was conducted at 3:00 o'clock from the Ropes Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Allen Forbis, assisted by Rev. Dan Jones of the Ropes Church of the Nazarene.

Mr. Strickland had been ill for several weeks, but no one realized the seriousness of his condition until Friday of last week, when he was rushed to Phillips-Dupre Hospital in Levelland. He passed away Saturday morning about 5:10 o'clock.

In the funeral oration Rev. Forbis said:

"As Christians we do not come to the hour of death without hope, but we know that death is our doorway to eternity.

"What is the meaning of death? Too much modern life is given either to discounting the reality of death or escaping any facing up to the reality of death. This is a serious mistake, for death is a part of life. A grain of wheat is placed in the ground and dies so a new plant can develop and grow into new life—the grain that dies is the beginning of a new wheat crop.

"In the natural life of the human body many unhealthy cells die to be replaced by new, healthy cells. Probably both of these human experiences, as the parable,

help to explain the real meaning of death.

"However, our main concern today is to discover the basis Christian attitude toward Death."

Rev. Forbis went on to say, "As followers of Christ we do not come to this hour of death without hope, for in Christ death is not the end of your hopes," and then he continued:

"I know there are many things about Mr. Strickland's life that will comfort his wife, children and other members of the family today. He was a man who loved his family and stayed at home with them—several of the family have expressed their confidence that he was ready to go. Mrs. Strickland told me Saturday morning, 'I know he was prepared to go' . . . He was a good man . . . he had been a member of the Ropes Methodist Church since 1949 . . . I know that all these things bring a great deal of comfort to you. For followers of Christ death is not the end but the drawing into something higher, finer and better than anything this life has ever known.

"(Death) Is the beginning of everlasting life . . . Death is our doorway to

eternity . . . those who die in Christ shall be with Him through eternity."

These are but a part of the comforting words said by the minister of God to the family and friends as they paid their last tribute to this good man, whose life was above reproach, whose acts were those of a Christian. There is no doubt but that Jesus held his hand in those last moments as the spirit slipped from the mortal body to take on immortality. . .

Interment was in Ropesville Cemetery under the direction of George Price Funeral Home, Levelland.

He is survived by his wife, Bessie; six sons, Edgar Strickland, Brownfield; Bob Strickland, Denver City; R. V. Coy and Ray Coy, both of Burbank, Calif.; Marvin and Lonnie Coy, both of Lubbock; three daughters, Mrs. Virginia McKinney, Ft. Walton Beach, Fla.; Mrs. Inez Whittle, Hobbs, N. Mex.; Margie Strickland, Durant, Okla.; a brother, Marvin Strickland, Illinois; a sister, Mrs. Pallie Rice, Durant, Oga.; 15 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
