### Golf-ball retriever freed

A man who was sentenced to six months in jail for retrieving lost balls from English golf-course lakes had his prison term overturned, but a judge told him to avoid further clandestine diving expeditions.

Police caught John Collinson, 36, early on an August day equipped with a rubber diving suit at Whetstone Golf Course in Leicester, central England.

He and colleague Terry Rostron, 24, had fished 1,158 balls from Lily Pond - the bane of hundreds of golfers playing the difficult par-3 fifth hole.

The severity of the sentence against Collinson, imposed in April, provoked a public outcry, made the father of two a celebrity on daytime television and prompted lawmakers, celebrities and the British media to campaign for his release. He was freed on bail May 3.

### **Enron men lose shirts**

They've already lost their shirts to the Enron Corp. Now they're doing the same for Playgirl Magazine.

Five former Enron employees went before the cameras for a daylong photo shoot for an issue of the magazine due in stores in October.

The issue will feature profiles of the men and their experiences with the former energy giant, which filed for bankruptcy in December.

In return for the men's willingness to show off what normally stays under wraps, Playgirl offered "more money than they made on their stock options," magazine editor Michele Zipp said.

Playgirl's original offer came April 1, a week after Playboy Magazine invited current and former female workers to pose for a "Women of Enron" issue.

### Public input to be sought on grant application

The city of Muleshoe has scheduled a public hearing at 5:30 p.m. June 17 to allow citizens to discuss communitydevelopment issues.

The meeting will be in council chambers at city hall.

The city will be applying for a Texas Community Development Program grant, and officials will use the meeting to explain the amount of grant funding

available, the eligible activities for use of the grant money, and the ways past grant funds have been used.

City Manager David Brunson said Friday that one possible use for such a grant would be drilling more water wells for the city.

Council members met Monday to discuss their priorities for the city, and water wells topped the infrastructure list. Brunson told the council that the city used about 2 million gallons during the hot day of June 2, adding that there was very little additional capacity available from current wells.

"The city encourages citizens to participate in the development of this application and to make their views known at this public hearing," Brunson said in a statement issued Friday.

### Dryland workshop draws world scientists to area

CANYON — Even though reservations are required, Dr. B.A. Stewart never knows precisely how many participants to expect for the annual International on Sustainable Agroecosystems in Semiarid Regions of the United States.

The two-week workshop—including a tour of the Great Plains, from Temple, Texas, to Sterling, Colo. — is set for June

14-29 and is among the principal under-Dryland Agriculture Institute.





cluding 12 sponsored by the World Bank, nearly a dozen from China and at least one representing the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization, have made plans to study the Great Plains with Stewart, WT's world-renowned soil scientist and director of the Dryland Agriculture Institute.

The World Bank contingent will represent a variety of countries, including Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Palestine and Tunisia. Other countries with workshop reservations are India, Pakistan, Syria and Turkey. And José R. Benites of Rome will represent the U.N. agency.

"After 9-11, Dr. Stewart and I were not sure we should even have a workshop this year," said Dr. Clay Robinson, associate professor of soil science and workshop co-director. "Now seeing the list of people who have reserved spots on the tour makes my jaw drop just a bit.

The purpose of the workshop is to present information on sustainable dryland and irrigated agricultural systems in semi-arid regions, and to visit research facilities and farmers' fields in the southern and central U.S. Great Plains.

The group will meet on the WT campus the first



couple of days and see presentations about soil and water resources of the Great Plains and the history of agricultural development in the re-

The majority of the workshop will consist of two tours - first of the southern Plains and then of the central Plains.
