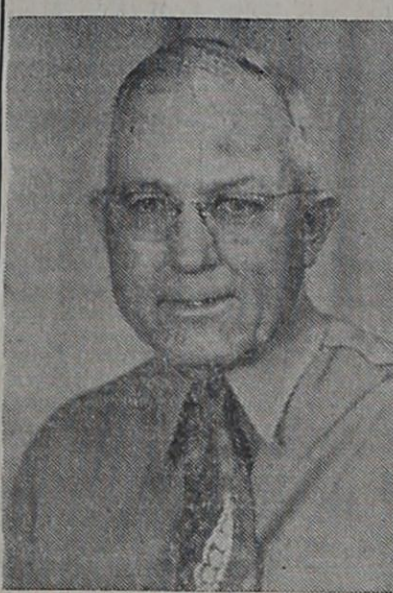

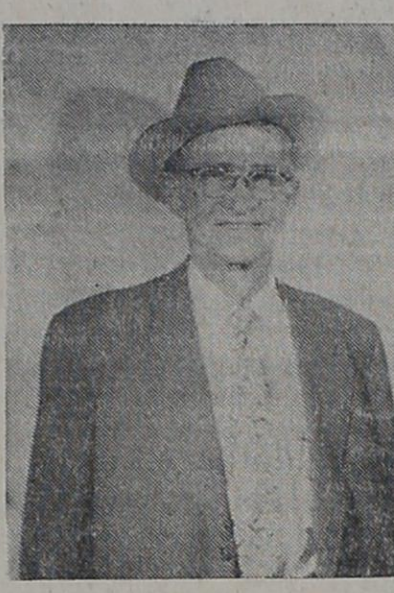

Second Primary to be Held Saturday, June 4

Saturday's election was full of surprises! Voters going to the polls for tax assessor and collector, Hulon Moreland lost to Myrl Brock in the race for Commissioner of Precinct 1. In a purely local race Jack Ogle, present constable, went into a run off with Bob Whitlock. In the race for State Representative Olen Petty defeated Bob Bowers.

Bettye Martin Candidate For Degree

Miss Bettye Martin, Ropesville, and Jackie King, formerly of Ropesville, are candidates for the B. A. and B. S. degrees, respectively, with the spring graduating class at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview. Commencement speakers for May 22 and 23 will be Paul Harvey, Chicago, and the Rev. Mori Hiratani, Pearl City, Hawaii, who will also have honorary degrees conferred on them.

Miss Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Martin, and King, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. King, now of Lubbock, will be honored guests of President and Mrs. A. Hope Owen at the President's Reception on Sunday afternoon, and of the Association of Former Students at dinner on May 20 in Slaughter Memorial Center. The 1966 class will give its final program at 10 o'clock chapel hour on May 23. At that time the class will present its gift to Dr. Owen.

A religious education major, Miss Martin serves as music chairman of her dormitory residence, make-up editor of the college newspaper and is active in speech and drama activities. She has also served as president of her dormitory hall. Planning to teach, she is a 1955 graduate of Ropes High School.

Majoring in psychology, King is also a 1955 graduate of Ropes High. Named as most handsome male on the campus in 1959, King has also served as a member of his dormitory court. Before entering Wayland where he has served as student assistant in psychology, he attended Howard Payne College.

Baccalaureate services will be held at 10:50 a.m., May 22, at First Baptist Church, with Mr. Hiratani delivering the sermon. He is a 1950 graduate of Wayland Baptist College and is serving his second term as president of the Hawaii Baptist Convention. He and Mrs. Hiratani will come from Miami Fla., where they will be the official messengers of the Hawaii Baptist Convention at the Southern Baptist Convention.

South Smyer: Petty 58, Bowers 41; Burnett 61, Stewart 44; Tollison 2, Lewis 14, Warren 10, Logsdon 9, Clem 71; Moreland 23, Brock 80; Ogle 38, Kinnison 18, Whitlock 40.

The first returns showed that Jack Ogle had won over both opponents by 5 votes. However the absentee vote had not been counted, which gave Whitlock 12, Ogle 8 and Kinnison 4, which makes a runoff by three votes.

The county totals were as follows: Burnett 2,744, Stewart 2,190; Brock 920 to Morelands 802; Clem 2,271, Warren 999, Logsdon 778, Lewis 759 and Tollison 151.

The second primary will be held on the 4th of June.

In the vote Saturday the Ropes box lacked something over a hundred votes of polling its strength—and such was the case in most boxes in the county.

Weir Clem set a record by carrying every box in the county, coming within 217 votes of defeating his four opponents without a runoff.

The stamping of the ballots with the word "Democrat" was said to have kept a number of people away from the polls because they thought it would obligate them to vote for a Democratic nominee for president; and others—another thing, was the fact that the primary was held "out of season."

City Water Rates Are Uped to Meet Rising Cost of Operation

The City Council and the Mayor have left town and Bob Whitlock, water supervisor, has gone into hiding. At a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night, the water rates were raised. The minimum for three thousand gallons has been upped to \$2.50, and the next 17000 gallons is 40c per thousand,

and all over that goes at the rate of 30c per thousand. This is the first raise in rates since the system was installed. A check of the income showed that the water system was selling water cheaper than it could pump it—a communication from the State Water Engineers declared that it cost 33c a

thousand gallons to pump water. Following is rates of other towns: Ropes: minimum, \$2.50 for 3,000 gal.; 3.30 for 5,000 gal.; 5.30 for 10,000 gal.; \$7.30 for 15,000 gal. Denver City: -2.50 for 2,000 gal. (min.); \$3.80 for 5,000 gal.; \$5.95 for 10,000 gal. lons.

O'Donnell: \$1.75 for 2,000 gal. (min.); \$3.30 for 5,000 gal.; \$5.30 for 10,000 gal.; \$7.80 for 15,000 gallons. Whiteface: \$2.50 for 2,000 gal. (min.); \$4.00 for 5,000 gal.; \$6.50 for 10,000 gal.; \$8.82 for 15,000 gallons. Stamford: \$3.00 for 3,000 gal. (min.); \$4.00 for 5,000 gal.; \$6.02 for 10,000 gal.; \$7.68 for 15,000 gallons. Plains: \$3.00 for 3,000 gal. (min.); \$4.10 for 5,000 gal.; \$6.85 for 10,000 gal.; \$8.85 for 15,000 gallons.

While this raise in rates had been under consideration for some time, no action was taken until Tuesday night when the new Council met in its first business session. Also, the books and tax rolls were ordered audited for a period of three years back.

In a discussion of the paved street in front of the school house, an order was passed to place speed zone signs at each end of the street calling for 15 mile speed limit, and that the speed limit be enforced.
