Highway Patrol Investigates Four Wrecks in Hockley County

The Highway Patrol investigated 4 rural accidents in Hockley County during the month of June, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,925.00.

The rural traffic accident summary of Hockley County from January through June of 1962 shows a total of 34 crashes. As a result of these crashes there was 1 person killed and 20 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$20,091.00. This compares with the first six months of 1961's total of 36 rural crashes killing no persons, injuring 19 persons and causing an estimated property damage of \$18,650. In a statewide comparison the total number of traffic fatalities are practically the same as they were this time last year.

The current SLOW DOWN AND LIVE summer campaign has played an important role during the last several years in acquainting motorists, especially vacationists, with the danger of speed and the ever present hazards of the highways during the crowded summer months. Many vacationists from other states will be in Texas for the first time this summer. Some of them will be unfamiliar with the roads and road signs. Many of them have only a smattering of knowledge of traffic laws of their own state, and little or no information about those of other states where they will travel. Commercial drivers and motorists who travel the highways day after day have little difficulty in distinguishing the stranger, even before seeing his license tag. Unless motorists show courtesy and consideration to the vacationing driver and try to help him, they may discover that their own speed will cause an accident involving the tourist who may suddenly slow down to make an unexpected turn or to get his bearings. Those who live and drive in Texas must re-

member that we would be just as bewildered in another state as this motorist is in our own state. It is under such circumstances that we must do some thinking for him, we must drive defensively.

The Sergeant stated the out-of-state traveler, however, is not so much a threat to our safety as the native selfish motorist who drives dangerously and discourteously with no regard for traffic laws, signs or signals.

Throughout prior years accident statistics prove that more accidents occur in the last six months of the year than in the first six months. With this thought in mind the veteran patrol supervisor cautioned all motorists to exercise due care while traveling on the streets and highways. "Drive unto others as you would have them drive unto you," he said. The Sergeant stated that this GOLDEN RULE is a CHALLENGE for the motorists of Texas to reverse the trend shown in prior years for the last six months of the year.

As he entered the office George Duet, of the Southwestern Public Service Co., entered the office and he and Bob were talking when Mike rushed up to the door screaming: "Tammy has been shot with my gun!"

They found the little girl laying in the front seat wounded. She was immediately rushed to Reese Air Base Hospital, and Tuesday morning she was reported doing fine.

The gun had been placed in the glove compartment by Bob several days ago and he had forgotten about it. It is evident that the children played the pocket and were playing with the gun when it discharged.

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The rain Tuesday afternoon, which left a trace in spots and two and a half inches in other places, also brought with it a hail storm which fell in a limited area, doing heavy damage to growing cotton.

The rain came from the southeast and moved across the Ropes territory. In Ropes almost an inch of moisture fell in a matter of minutes. While it was raining in Ropes there was no rain at the Tom Price place, 11 miles west. Later it did rain there, but not as much as other places.

East of Ropes the rain was evidently very light, and Mrs. Bob Thomas, 2 miles east, told us there was no rain at their place. At the J. R. Smith place, about three miles north of Ropes, Mrs. Smith said they only had a sprinkle.

At the Foster Store, four miles west of Ropes, Bill Foster reported a heavy rain, with no hail. Charley Ward reported a good rain, and Abb Russell, some three miles northwest of Ropes, reported a good rain. It was while we were talking with Abb that we learned of the hail.

Abb told us that Dalton Redman had been hailed out. A little later another report came in that S. E. Whitener had suffered heavy damage from hail. To actually see what had happened we went out over the country with Tyree Martin. The first signs we saw of the hail was at the Julius Blair place. The cotton had taken quite a beating. Just a little farther on we came to the place worked by Dalton Redman. It appeared that the cotton on this place was a complete loss. Seemingly, the hail storm was not very wide, as we found no damage at the Emory Hobbs place, nor at the place worked by Ben Stephens.

About five miles out the rain was not as heavy as it was in the immediate vicinity of Ropes. We went on to the Bradshaw place and on to the Tom Price place where the rain was light, but hail had fallen.

Turning back north we came down by the Mrs. W. H. Still place, then turned up by the Ferguson, Whitener and Tipps places. Again we saw evidence of heavy hail on the Tipps crop and on the Whitener crop, as well as the Buck Moreland crop.

E. N. Exum, also, suffered some hail damage.

Mrs. Whitener told us that it rained two and a half inches at their place, and the hail covered the ground as a white sheet.

The wind was so high that the water of the lake did not make whitecaps, but seemingly was as smooth as ice." It happened at about the time the tornado hit Haskell.
