ADMIRATION

Ted Dotts

All our lives we are looking for people to admire and to copy. This is most pronounced in our early teens. Even in later years we still look for those persons that can strike the spark of admiration in our being. This is revealed in the reverence that all of us accord to various people—living or dead—with whom we are acquainted. For instance, many look to Abraham Lincoln, John F. Kennedy, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the Apostle Paul, etc. Or, many look to more current persons such as preachers, politicians, teachers, fathers, and leaders in every field.

There are probably many factors which lead to our admiration for particular people. Here at Ropesville I find that I admire many of the people of this community. And, in trying to discover what it is that leads to admiration, I have discovered in my own living that one feature about people I admire stands out more than others. I have named this one feature that causes my own admiration "trust".

The one thing I admire most in other people is that they live in trust toward their neighbor. It works in this manner. Suppose a friend comes to you and says "Mr. — said a harmful thing about you." Now a trustworthy person does not believe the worst about any one until he knows it to be a certain truth. Even if he hears in a roundabout manner that someone has spoken harmfully about himself or about a friend of his, he continues to trust until he knows for certain the true facts of the case.

Oh, what a relief to have a friend like this. A friend who will stay with you and not desert you until he has given you ample opportunity to clear yourself with him.

That which strikes the spark of admiration in our being is to discover a person we think would not desert us even if we should make a mistake. This is the grand glory of the Christian religion. Here is proclaimed a God who does not desert the man who makes a mistake in his living. Here is a God who continues to search out the sinner and the lost. Here is a God who sent His only Son to help those who were in the very mud and mire of mistaken, sinful existence.

At the end of the day when I sit with my head in my hands bemoaning my countless mistakes and sins, I recall again and again the words from Matthew:

Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. Go and learn what this saying means: 'I desire mercy and not sacrifice.' For I came not to call the righteous, but sinners. (9:12-13)

How I admire the man who does not condemn me for my mistakes, but who trusts me to do better tomorrow.

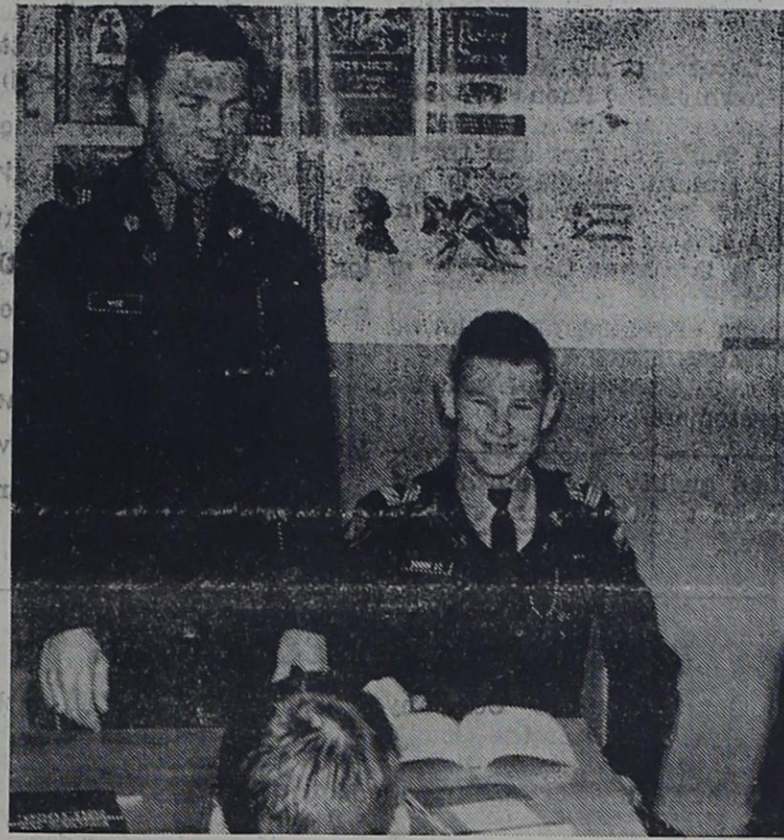
