## THE EXTREMIST

—Ted Dotts, Jr.

That most difficult term—ethics—is involved in the present-day controversy over extremism. What does ethics mean? I would define ethics by saying it is the foundation for man's actions. Thus, if a man approaches me and asks, "What is your ethic?" I would answer and say, "I try to make my ethic the increase of the love of God and of neighbor." (terms of the late H. Richard Niebuhr).

I would seek to judge the value of all my actions in terms of whether or not such actions increased the love of God and of neighbor. If my actions do not live up to this ethic (and more often they do not), then I turn to Almighty God and beg His forgiveness.

Now, what is extremism? I would define extremism as the willingness to go to the most drastic, excessive end in order to obtain certain goals. Thus, for the Extremist, the end is always the most important thing. It does not matter what means, what tools, what steps, the Extremist uses in accomplishing his ends so long as he does accomplish them.

How does my ethic differ from that of extremism? My ethic, the increase of the love of God and of neighbor, requires that whatever I do I must first ask, "Am I loving God and my neighbor?" I can do nothing without first checking to see whether or not I am denying God or hurting one of his children.

The extremist ethic never takes into account the neighbor in the immediate situation. The Extremist may say, "Oh well, so what if I hurt a few people in obtaining my goal. Once I get the goal it will help all people."

It is frightening to think that someone in great power would have the extremist ethic as the guide for his life. He could sacrifice me, my family, my flock, and my community without batting an eye. We would only be stepping stones.

Oh, how much I prefer a leader who would ask before he took action, "Will this decision harm THAT man, THAT family, THAT flock, THAT community?"

## NEWS OF VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE TEACHER ASSOCIATION OF TEXAS

Austin, Texas - C. T. McCormick Vocational Agriculture Teacher in the Ropes High School, will participate in the Statewide In-Service Education Workshop for Teachers of Vocational, Aug. 4-7, 1964, according to Geo. Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture. The four-day meeting will be in Houston as a part of the program in Vocational Agriculture to further improve the professional competency of the state's teachers.

Vocational Agriculture Teachers will have the first general session on Tuesday morning August 4th with an address by Dr. Earl L. Butz Dean of Agriculture at Purdue University. Dr. Butz has served in a number of educational and governmental capacities and has visited 27 foreign countries, he will be speaking on the subject, "Our Daily Bread".

Thursday morning general session will have a presentation by M. A. Browning, Assistant Commissioner for Vocational Education, Texas Education Agency. He will discuss the 1963 Vocational Education Acts and their implications for Vocational Agriculture.

Vocational Agriculture Teachers, School Administrators, Legislators, News Media Personnel and others will receive awards and recognitions at the annual Awards Breakfast on Wednesday morning. The Awards Breakfast is a regular activity of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association.

## Spotted Rain Helps Crops In Territory

Tuesday night the Ropes territory was blessed by a "spotted" rain, with as high as two inches and a half falling in some places and as little as one-tenth of an inch in others, while five miles south, at Meadow, Roland Evans told the Plainsman, there was only a trace of moisture.

The clouds formed in the east and north and came in on wings of sand moving between forty and fifty miles an hour. This brought a sprinkle, then the wind died. It was quiet for a few minutes, Then came the thunder and lightning, an electrical display which with fiery fingers traced fantastic awe inspiring patterns across the face of the blue black sky. The earth trembled under bombardment of the heavenly artillery.

There was one peculiar feature of the storm we had never before noted in a similar display: The lightning when it flashed sent a sizzling sound through the air, which ended in a boom.

Mrs. R. M. Mayfield reported two and half inches of rain at their place about three miles north of Ropes;

Abb Russell, about four miles northwest, reported two and one-tenth inches; James L. Means, about two miles west, two and a half inches; Richard Arant, about a mile west, reported more than two inches; Foster's Store four miles west, a scant eight tenths; Ben Stephens about three miles west, one inch and from there to the Center Gin, about nine miles west, half an inch; Kelly Teaff, about five miles west, half an inch; Ray Martin south of Foster's Store, eight-tenths; Ronnie Jones, about six miles northwest, one-tenth; Luther Wilson, about four miles north west, six-tenths; V. L. Wallace, north Foster's Store, half an inch; Maurice Cain, between Ropes and Meadow, one inch.

North of Ropes Herman Timmons, about five miles out, received an inch and nine-tenths; J. R. Smith, two miles north, an inch and one fourth.

East of Ropes F. L. Lowrie reported an inch and one-tenth. It is reported D. Strickland, north east of Ropes received about two inches.

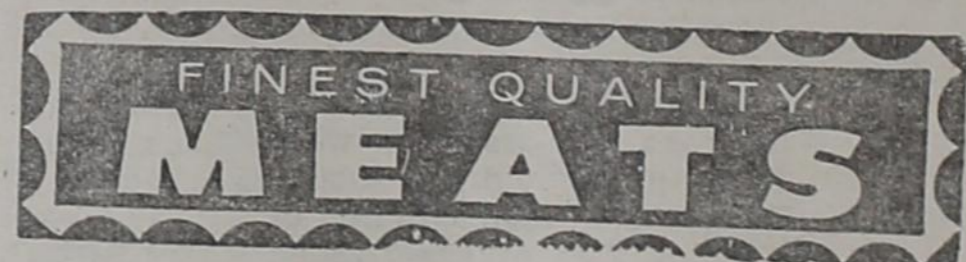

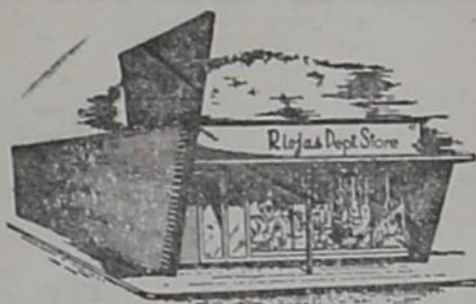
