MERCURY DROPS TO NEW LOW PAST WEEK

Since Tuesday of last week the entire South Plains has been in the grip of Winter's icy grasp-the storm actually started on Tuesday and continued to get colder until Thursday morning when the mercury dropped within one degree of the record for the Plains, 8 degrees below zero. The only time it has been lower was in 1948 when it dropped to 9 below.

Snow, which fell Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, covered the ground to a depth of from 2 to 6 inches and in places there were drifts two and three feet deep. Then it started to get cold.

Wednesday afternoon the sun broke through the cloud cover and brought the mercury up to around 50 degrees and we thought for a time the worst was over. However, Wednesday night, with a slow north wind and clearing skies, it commenced to feel as if we were in a deep-freeze. By 8:30 p.m. the temperature had dropped to 4 below zero.

This unusual cold spell brought with it frozen water pipes, busted water pipes, frozen up automobiles, and turned the highways roads to an icy mass.

We saw one car stick on main street-just set and spin its wheels on the frozen pavement. For the first time this year men appeared in five-buckle overshoes, which are usually used in irrigation, but became necessary on account of the low temperature and the deep snow.
