



AN INTERESTING TRIP

A very enjoyable and informative trip was made over the Easter weekend by Mr. and Mrs. Tyree Martin and boys, and daughter, Mrs. Jerry Bradley to Tennessee, known as the Volunteer State.

One of the most interesting places was Murfreesboro, a city of approximately 10,000 people, located 30 miles south east of Nashville, which is one of the more historic points in the south today.

A bloody battle known as the Battle of Stones River was fought here in the bitter cold of December 31, 1862, to

January 2, 1863.
Both of Tyree's great-grand fathers fought in this battle, only one of them survived. On the great monument erected in 1904 by Col. John Savage, on the Court House square, Tyree is ponting to the name of his great-grandfather, Marion Priest, who did not survive the battle, but went down on the great list of the honored dead.
