## Danger Seen In Farm Bill

The following editorial was taken from the Lubbock Avalanche and should be studied carefully by all farmers. If you agree with this editorial, you'd better write your senator and representative. From where we sit it appears the federal government is making an effort to take full control of the farming industry. The editorial follows:

To those who have studied the controversial Omnibus Farm Bill with objectivity, it seems that the measure indeed would concentrate unprecedented power over the destiny of American farming in the hands of the Secretary of Agriculture and the executive branch of Government.

Many farm experts, regardless of political persuasion, agree that the bill would not give farmers the widely publicized opportunity to "write their own programs". Instead, the bill would vest absolute authority in the office of the Secretary of Agriculture, whoever the occupant might be.

Farmers would not elect the national Farmer Advisory committees proposed in the bill. The Secretary of Agriculture would appoint them, largely from nominees chosen by paid employees of the Department of Agriculture—men who have a vested interest in the perpetuation and expansion of the programs they administer.

Not only could the Secretary of Agriculture hand-pick the advisory committees; he would also be completely free to disregard their advice, or to amend their recommendations.

The Constitutional and historic roles of Congress and the Executive branch of government would be revised under the provision for Congressional review and veto of proposed supply-control programs.

There is nothing in the original bill which gives any assurance that the question of approving or disapproving, these programs would ever come to the floor of either the House or Senate for a vote. And mere inaction by Congress for 60 days would mean that a producer referendum would be called on a proposed program.

The bill provides that no program would go into effect until approved by two-thirds of the farmers voting in a referendum. But the Secretary of Agriculture would have great power to determine the outcome of the vote.

In addition to being able to make the alternative to a proposed program completely unacceptable to producers, the Secretary would have broad powers to grant exemptions and thereby limit eligibility to vote in referenda. The alternative to approval would be a support level of 50 per cent of parity.

Some argue that Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman is a sincere dedicated man who would not abuse power. Please Turn To Page 2

# EARTH SATURATED AS 3 INCHES RAIN FALLS OVER ROPES TRADE TERRITORY

The earth in the Ropes community is duly soaked — no longer is Mother Earth crying out to the heavens to quench her thirst — three inches of rain have fallen from Thursday of last week to Sunday night.

The first soaker, borne on the wings of a cool northeast wind, came on Wednesday and it rained and rained, depositing two inches of moisture. This rain and cool wind brought the afternoon temperature down to around 60 degrees, and the early morning in the low 40's. The old saying "We have winter in July and August" is proving true this year.

Thursday, June 15, rain continued into early morning, dropping the temperature to a chilly 52, and in the afternoon 62 degrees.

Friday, June 16, continued cloudy and cool and the high temperature was a low 60 — people are hunting out their winter blankets and putting them back on the beds.

Saturday, June 17, it rained again but the temperature in the afternoon peeped out of the high 70's.

Sunday, June 18, was what you might term a beautiful day, but in the late afternoon a thunder shower wheeled in from the northwest and dumped a half inch of rain on the community. A report from the Highway Patrol stated two tornadoes had been sighted near Tokio causing a little stir.

Monday, June 19, was a beautiful day with some cloudiness and the temperature might be said it was a cotton growing day.

As this is written Tuesday morning, clouds are drifting across the sky and we're supposed to have thunder showers in the afternoon.

The thing about these rains we are having now, they are general all over the state, many sections reporting nine and ten inches — a tornado crashed across Houston and one hit Freeport. Several were sighted in this section, but all damage was done to farm buildings and no towns were hit.

## James Means Jr. Not Injured in Plane Crash

We failed to state that James Means Jr. was in a plane crash near Jacksboro two weeks ago, but he walked away uninjured.

Mrs. James L. Means, Sr. told the Plainsman that the plane had just been filled with gasoline and had a heavy load of poison, and

In coming down, the plane struck a pickup on a road-way, tearing the wings off and demolishing the pickup, but the driver was uninjured.

James Jr. is back at work, flying another plane, poisoning timber.

the powers granted in the bill. Regardless of whether this is true, or not true, however, nobody knows how long Mr. Freeman will occupy that post, politics being what they are. And the power granted in the Omnibus bill would remain with a successor who is unknown today. It seems inconceivable that Congress would vote to abdicate its responsibilities in such an important segment of our economy, and that is what it would be doing if the Omnibus bill were adopted in its original form.

It is possible, we suppose, that the bill may be sufficiently changed in House and-or Senate committees to make it acceptable to the rank-and-file of the farmers and to the public, as well. If not, we hope a majority in Congress will display sufficient good judgment not to enact the bill, in anything like its present form, into a law of the land.

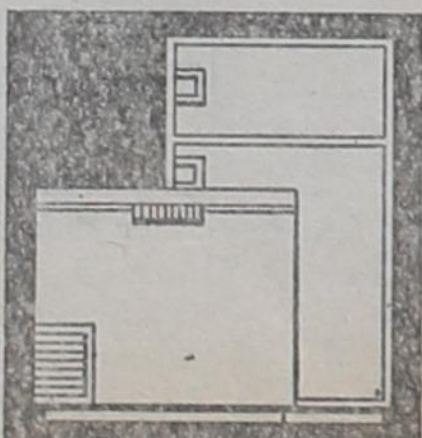

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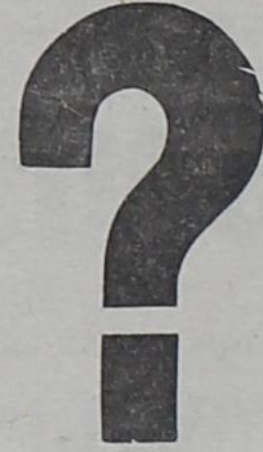
