



OUR FAIR SHARE

Most Texans, we believe, are fair minded folks. They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect

for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception. Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can

occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved.

As we all know oil and gas don't pay any attention to fence lines.

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under the neighbors' land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair shareothers, less.

People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the cost and income. This system is known as

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oil men of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator or Representative at Austin to support House Bili 510-so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure the landowner his FAIR SHARE,
