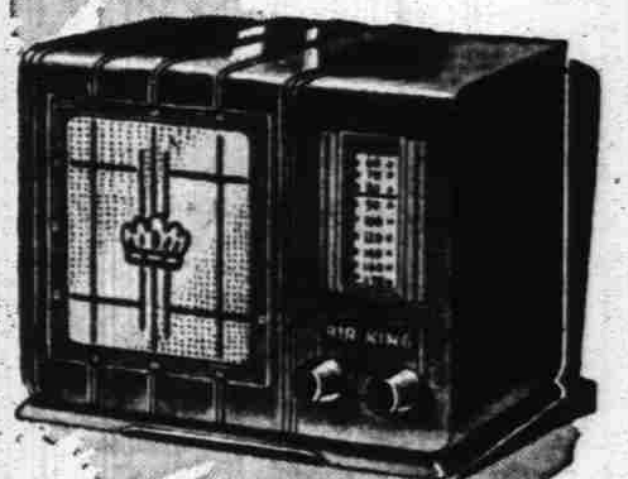

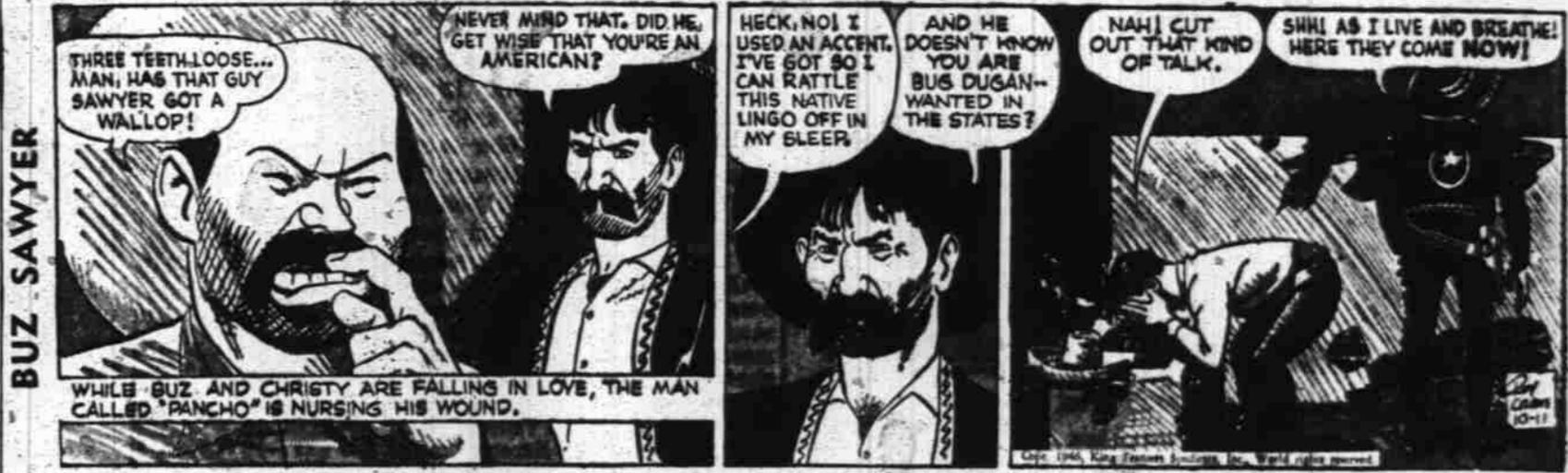

**Enlistment Suspended Above Grade Three**

Effective Oct. 30, no person will be enlisted in any rating above grade three (staff sergeant) in the US Army, the local recruiting station announced this morning upon receipt of orders from the War Department.

In addition, all promotions to the grades of master sergeant, first sergeant and technical sergeant have been suspended as of today.

It is contemplated that promotions will be resumed in approximately 90 days. Volunteers who formerly maintained commissions or appointments as warrant officers are still eligible to enlist in the first grade (master sergeant). S-Sgt. Oliver Goodman of the local station said.

**US Leads Fight For Free Danube**

PARIS, Oct. 11. (AP)—The United States and Britain joined forces today in calling upon the Soviet Union and the Slav states to remove a barrier between the east and the west with positive peace conference action on opening the Danube to free commerce. US Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg R-Mich. led off the plenary session's deliberations on the Romanian peace treaty draft by declaring a "free Danube is indispensable to the economic health and peace of central Europe" and that failure to open Europe's most important inland waterway would be a "tragic, reactionary mistake." Vandenberg's plea brought a prompt rejoinder from Yugoslav Deputy Premier Edvard Kardelj, who attacked the majority report of the Balkans commission on two articles in the draft dealing with the Danube. He held that the conference was not "competent to deal with the Danube question" and said Yugoslavia deserved a greater Danubian role because "50 percent of its course is through Yugoslav territory."

**Farmers Scolded In Bashore Talk**

OMAHA, Oct. 11. (AP)—The nation's farmers got a scolding today from one of their best friends, former Bureau of Reclamation Commissioner Harry W. Bashore.

The farmer is too persistent an optimist, Bashore said in an address prepared for the National Reclamation Association convention. "Farmers located in subhumid areas hesitate to make the expenditures necessary to provide irrigation," Bashore stated. "Why? Because the farmer is traditionally an optimist. He remembers the good years, or series of good years, when water was plentiful and he hopes that next year will be better than the present."

His optimism will trip up the farmer even when he has an irrigation system installed, Bashore said. "Not knowing when or whether he will need to irrigate, the farmer is prone to neglect the maintenance of his irrigation works. Thus when he needs to irrigate, the ditches are weed choked and the irrigation facilities are not in repair."

**Red Cross Agent Visits Local Chapter**

Mrs. Freda Kennedy, general field representative, visited the Howard - Glasscock county chapter of the American Red Cross Tuesday and Wednesday and assisted local officials in arranging for a Red Cross conference which will be held here October 25. Mrs. Moore Sawtelle, executive secretary for the local chapter, announced Thursday that the conference will be held at the Settles hotel with chairman and executive secretaries attending from 18 counties.

While here, Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. Sawtelle met with E. C. Dodd, president of the Howard County Junior college, and made arrangements for a Red Cross college unit at the school. The representative also conferred with A. V. Kärcher, chapter chairman for this county.

Satisfactory tests have been carried out in Sydney, Australia, of a radar-plotting screen for air traffic control in all weathers.

**City Fire Losses Low In September, Report Indicates**

Fire losses during September were held to \$178.20, the report of City Fire Marshal F. W. Bettles shows.

There were nine alarms, four arising out of defective wiring, one each for cleaning clothes with gasoline, rubbish accumulation, smoking, clothes too near water heater, and a false alarm. Loss to buildings was \$26 and to contents \$152.

In other departmental reports, the police showed a total of 198 arrests, 152 of them for drunkenness in which fines from \$5 to \$25 were assessed. In addition 12 cases were transferred to the county for driving while intoxicated, the bulk of the 22 cases transferred to the county, and other agencies. Of the 13 released, nine were booked for unlawful train riding.

Two patrol cars traveled about 8,500 miles during the month and the police radio handled 1,791 calls, 1,140 of them to local units from KACM (the police station). Fines assessed plus delinquents stood at \$1,320, those assessed plus delinquents at \$1,900. A total of 5640 fines were laid out in jail.

Traffic tickets issued totaled 269, on which 58 were paid. There were 31 local cases pending, 95 out-of-town ones pending, and 86 excused. There were 31 speeding tickets issued, 14 paid, four pending and 13 dismissed.
