would be an Atomic war. In tion on the part of Russia, ventional war capability. The prospects of avoiding war are excellent. A continuation of disturbing developments in many areas of the world seems inevitable.

> FALLOUT SHELTERS - If the Cold War continues, we must have a shelter program in which the Federal, State and local governments and individuals participate. Requirements are not yet sufficiently well defined and people should not rush into a program of shelter construction. Russia does not have a large stockpile of operational intercontinental ballistic missiles as yet, and this is not the time of greatest danger. There is time for deliberate planning as the greater danger period approaches. Much better information will be available in the near future.

> FARM LABOR - A crisis in farm labor is upon us as a result of the new bracero law which restricts tractor driving by braceros. In the House we were able to pass a simple extension of the law, but crippling amendments added in the Senate and which could not be wholly eliminated have made the new law intolerable. A further threat is posed by the unsympathetic administration of the law by officials of the Labor Department.
