SLATON'S FESTIVE AND LONG-PLANNED GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION WILL KICK OFF NEXT THURSDAY, JUNE 8TH, WITH THE FIRST OF THE MANY SCHEDULED ACTIVITIES TO FILL THE THREE-DAY COMMEMORATION.

The first event slated will be a women's Barbecue Luncheon, served on the City Hall lawn on Thursday, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Tickets are \$1.50 each and will be attended by club, professional and business women. The luncheon will be "Gay Nineties," and women may come dressed as such, or as they choose.

Friday night, June 9th, the first of the two-day rodeo will take place in the Football Stadium, beginning at 8 p.m. Tickets are available from Ray Belt, Truitt Bownds, Phil Brewer, Bob Clodfelter, Barry Ford, Bob Huser, Wayne Kenney, "Hack" Lasater, George Lemon, Clark Self Jr., John Schmidt, Bill Smith, R. Immediately after the rodeo the Slaton Jaycees will sponsor a dance in the V. F. W. Hall. A dance will also follow the Saturday evening rodeo performance.

The rodeo show will feature six events, with all entries to go as prize money. Entries will be taken from Thursday morning, June 8th, until Friday noon, June 9th. Stock will be furnished by Ratjen Rodeo Company of Happy, Tex.

Saturday, June 10th, will feature the registration of pioneers from 9 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. Pioneers would be those residing here any time from 1898 to 1926. Registration will be at the City Hall.

At 11:30 a.m., a Pioneer Picnic will be held on the City Hall lawn, lasting until 2 p.m.

Beginning at 2 p.m., the parade will take place, lasting until approximately 3:15 p.m. It will feature horse, floats, pioneers and beauties, with a band including all those interested in marching in the parade who have ever played in the Slaton High School Tiger Band.

At 3:30 p.m., a welcome address will be given by Mayor L. O. Lemon, along with the acceptance of a donated monument commemorating the 50th birthday of the community. The monument was given by Searcy O. Henry of West Texas Monuments Company. It will be a granite stone in the shape of the State of Texas with a star located where Slaton would be and including an inscription concerning the anniversary.

Beards will be judged at 4 p.m., and prizes will be given for the best in the categories of "Best All-Around," \$10; "Most Unusual," \$10; "Longest," \$5; "Shaggiest," \$5; "Youngest," \$2.50; "Oldest," \$2.50; a charge of \$1.00 will be made to enter the contest and contestants may enter the event right up to judging time. R. D. Shelton, guest speaker of the day, will give an address at 4:15 p.m., and any necessary announcements will be made at that time.

Go-Kart races are then scheduled from 5 until 6:30 p.m., and the Saturday night rodeo will get underway at 8 p.m., and will conclude all presently scheduled events with the exception of various reunions of groups.

### Slaton Gives Nod To Blakey

One of three voting boxes gave a slight nod to the successful Republican John Tower in Saturday's runoff election for the U. S. Senate. Although all three local boxes were close, Democratic Bill Blakey carried by the city by a total of 374 to 347.

Northwest Slaton gave 100 votes to Blakey and 90 to Tower; East Slaton carried Blakey by 125 to 101; and Southwest Slaton went for Tower by 156 to 149.

Tower, the first Republican ever sent to the Senate by Texas voters carried the election over the state by a thin 8,000 vote margin.

#### PRE-SCHOOL COURSE TO BEGIN HERE MONDAY

#### MOBIL OIL BURGLARY NETS THIEVES OVER \$1,200.00 IN MERCHANDISE OF WAREHOUSE

A burglary in Slaton amounting to \$1,200.00 in merchandise occurred on the night of 24th. In the Mobil Oil Warehouse, according to Gene Martin, Chief of Police.

Merchandise stolen included tires, sparks etc. Also taken

was a 12 gauge shotgun, and two .22 calibre rifles.

The theft was similar to a series of like cases that have happened in the area recently, and it is believed to be work of seasoned professionals. More than \$3000.00 worth of like items were stolen in Spring Lake, and Tahoka

also had a brake-in resembling the one here.

Martin stated that the Texas Rangers were working on the case, and although part of the stolen items had been recovered, there was not definite proof for any arrest.

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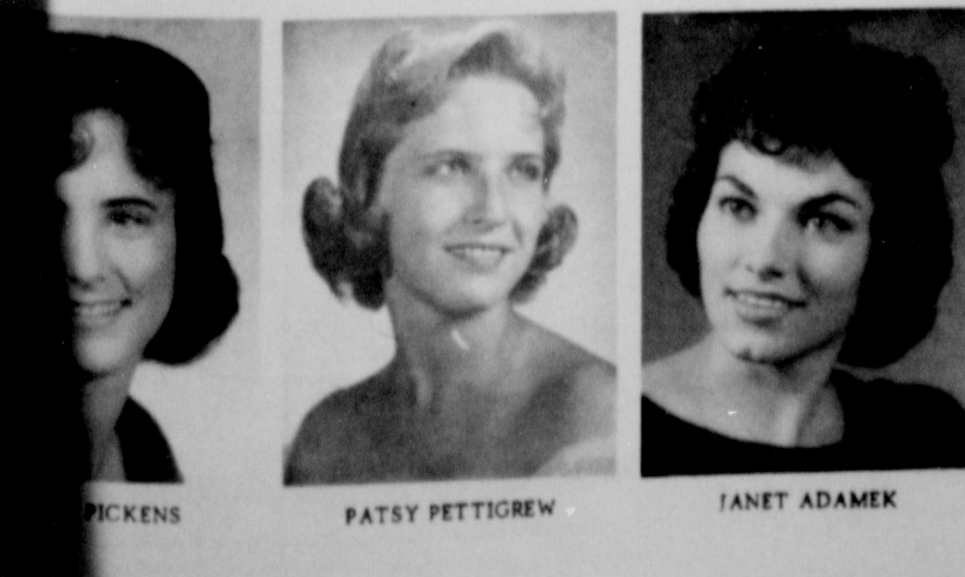

**POLICE BULLETIN**

The motor vehicle has become a virtual necessity in our society. It contributes to the strength of America, but it also has a sinister side... It is one of our greatest killers. In the last five years alone, it has killed more than 190,000 men, women, and children and seriously injured countless millions. While the development of the automobile has advanced with fantastic speed, traffic safety regulations in many respects are still in the horse and buggy stage. Two of the greatest dangers on our roads are the drunken and reckless drivers. Why should anyone feel compassion for them? Their actions show as much disregard for law and order as do the acts of a burglar who follows a carefully laid plan to steal in the night.

Also, in many instances, they are a far greater threat to human safety. Not only do drunken and reckless drivers not involved in accidents frequently "get off" with little more than a slap on the wrist, but those who have killed through stonily violate the basic rules of traffic safety.

their criminal deeds often receive minor punishment. In a Midwestern state, a drunken driver who killed seven persons, in effect, was sentenced to but one year in prison for each life taken. This man reportedly had been arrested on 22 prior traffic violations. A similar situation was recorded in a Western state where a drunken driver, speeding along a superhighway, crossed into the wrong lane. His car smashed into two others, killing a college student and an entire family of five. Brought to trial on six counts of felony manslaughter, the jury reduced the charges to manslaughter misdemeanor, and he, too, was sentenced to serve but one year for life taken.

Just as through research and positive action we have isolated and conquered the germs which cause many dread diseases, so can we remove the slaughterers who litter our highways with broken and battered bodies. But it cannot be done by showing pity or offering excuses for those who wa-

**Cleaning Metal Spoons**  
Metal spoons should be cleaned at home with non-abrasive cleansers. But if you should need to polish a spoon while fishing, do this: Shred a cigarette and wet the tobacco. Rub the wet tobacco on the spoon with your fingers, and soon the bright shine will return.

**Keep Tackle Box In Shade**  
Keep your tackle box in the shade on extremely hot days. Prolonged exposure to heat can cause a plastic tackle box to warp. The interior of a metal tackle box can get extremely hot, and plastic lures stored within often will warp enough to spoil their action.

**Scale and File Cut Bait**  
When using cut bait, scale and file it so your hook will pierce it easily. When the bait is "tenderized" in this manner, the flesh is soft enough so the hook will break through quickly and sink into the fish.

**Restoring Bucktails**  
Bucktails that are discolored and matted can be restored to almost "like new" condition by holding them in a jet of steam or over a pot of vigorously boiling water.

**Carry Tiny Screwdriver**  
A small screwdriver, such as the type used by optometrists, is mighty handy when it comes to changing hooks on a plug.

**Clean Hooks After Use**  
Clean and dry your fish hooks after use. Scraps of bait that may stick and harden on the hook make it difficult to bed the hook in a fish. A bait-clogged barb often will result in the hook failing to catch.

**Bright Hooks Attract Fish**  
You can increase your catches by using bright hooks—both on lures and with natural baits. In murky water the shiny hooks will attract fish.

**Keep Oil Off Hooks**  
Never use oil on hooks or store hooks in containers with oily rags. The oil is hard to clean from the hook, and an oily hook will cause live-bait to die quickly.

**Polish Protects Hooks**  
You can protect hooks against rust by coating them with clear, fast-drying nail polish. Paint the entire hook with the exception of the point and barb, as paint on either will slow the hook's penetration into the flesh of the fish.

**Use Dull Colored Sinkers**  
New sinkers fresh out of the tackle store often have a shine or glitter. Put them out in the weather a few days so the shine will be lost. A shiny sinker can lead to a fish striking at the sinker rather than the bait or lure.

**Freshening Up Plugs**  
In a round of particularly fast fishing with fish that have sharp teeth, your plugs may become quite battle-scarred. Carry along small bottles of model-airplane paint to touch them up. The paint will dry in a matter of seconds.

**VIEWING:**

**Your City Government**  
by J. J. Maxey, City Secretary

Englewood Cemetery belongs to the City of Slaton and is operated by the City Secretary under the direction of a Cemetery Board appointed by the Mayor. This Board at the present time is composed of Judge C. Smith, Earl Reasoner and Carl A. Lewis.

I have never been able to find the original record of the first land that was used as a Cemetery but do have all of the records since 1935. In July of 1935, J. H. Keefe, agent for the land division of the railroad, deeded to the City of Slaton a tract of land containing 24.44 acres for a consideration of \$1,000.00. This land takes in the location of the Drive In Theatre and runs all the way up to the State Park at the intersection of U. S. Highway 84 and F. M. 400. In September of 1950, Erice Garland sold 16.81 acres of land directly West of the present Cemetery to the City for \$5,043.00. Mr. Garland is to be commended for his community interest in letting the City have this land adjacent to the Cemetery in order that the Cemetery can be kept in a single unit. The land acquired from Mr. Garland is across Twentieth Street directly west of the present Cemetery.

The Garland land has not been platted for use up to this time. It is expected that this will be necessary within the next four or five years. At present it is being farmed by Mr. Garland and has paid \$1,585.96 in farm rents since it was acquired.

The Cemetery is financed by the sale of lots, cemetery services performed and taxation. Sale of lots and services amounted to \$4,064.00 during the last fiscal year. As set out in our Charter, the Cemetery Association receives one half mill on each onedollar of tax valuation on the City tax rolls. This amounts to 3.33% of the total tax and amounted to \$3,192.17 for the past year. Other miscellaneous income such as farm rent, sign rental and donations amounted to \$363.64 which made the total income for the last fiscal year \$7,619.81. From this amount \$7,112.55 was spent for maintenance and improvements last year. For the past ten years there has been approximately ten acres of land leased as a Drive-In Theatre site for \$750.00 per year. One half of this money has been used for Cemetery operation purposes and one half has been applied to the purchase price which was taken from the General fund of the City.

We have kept one man employed constantly and use extra help when needed. At the present time we have three men employed. These men work on a regular schedule and try to give every part of the Cemetery the same care. We are mowing all of the grass at least once each week and do as much leveling, trimming, etc., as time will permit. The City just recently installed a six inch water line in Twentieth Street which has enabled us to do much more watering than was possible before. During the year 1960, 2,088,000 gallons of water was used and furnished by the City. If this amount of water had been bought at the regular rates it would have cost \$469.80. It is expected that we will use a much larger amount this year since the supply line has been increased in size.

Presently we are using two power mowers for grass cutting. We have ordered a much larger machine to use on the open areas and expect to have it in service within a week.

In the last two years we have been bothered considerably with vandals. Several hydrants have been broken off and left running or opened and left running which causes useless waste of water and endangers adjacent graves. We have also had five power machines worth approximately \$250.00 stolen. Very often we find results of drinking parties in the Cemetery with the area littered with broken bottles and empty beer cans. We would suggest to the people who care that they help us by observing any suspicious characters in the area and notify our police department.

We have always been of the opinion that our Cemetery should be the prettiest place in our community and it is our desire to do as much as possible to make it so.

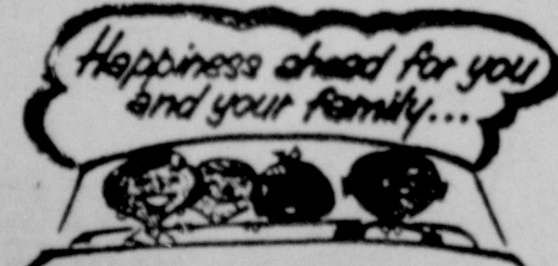

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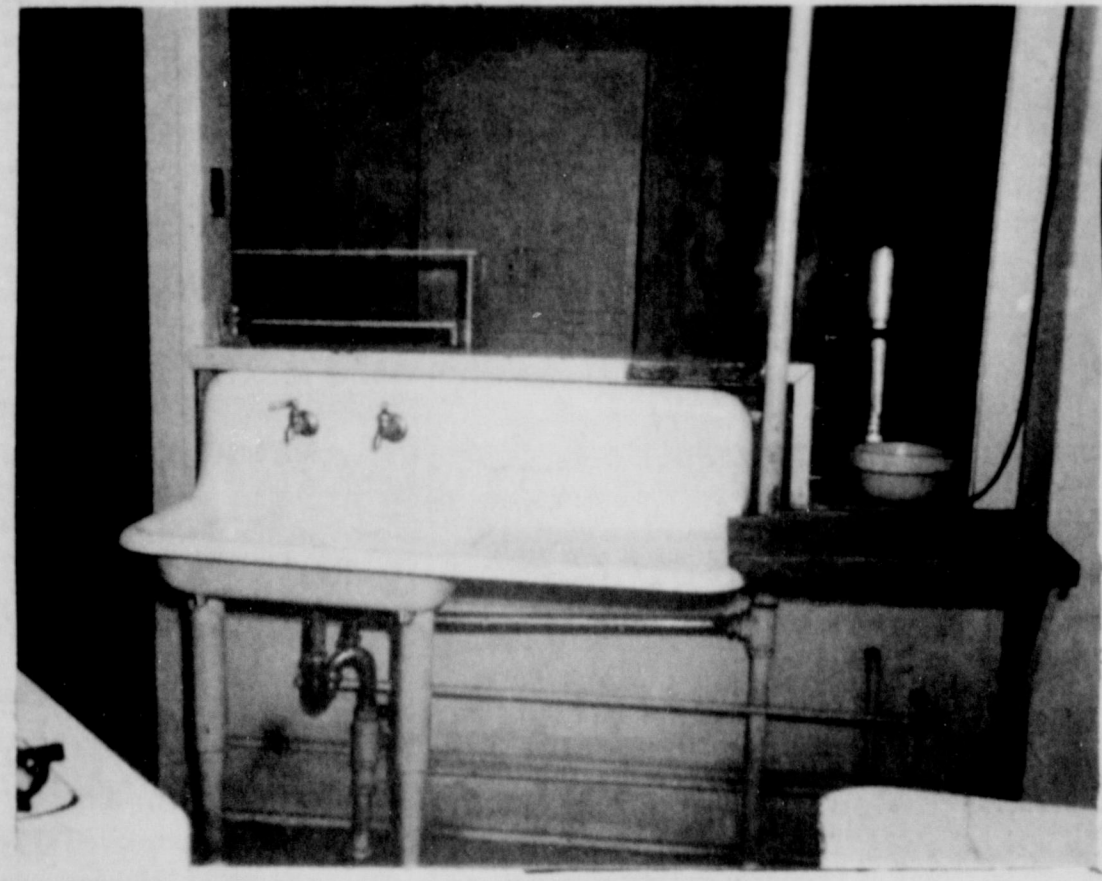
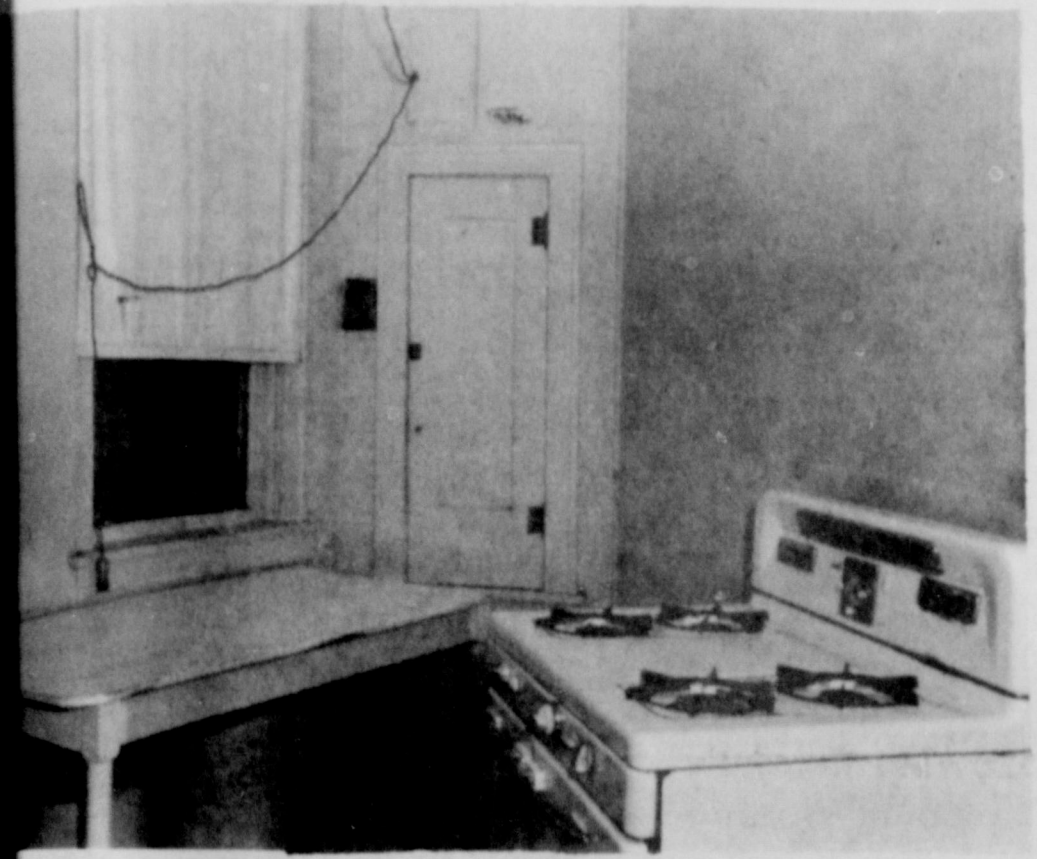

**COMMUNISM'S "MORALITY"**

In considering the question of what free men or free nations can gain by dealing with the communists, the communist concept of morality must be understood. Any person who does not understand this is totally unqualified to discuss the question. Certain words have an entirely different meaning to communists, and morality is one of these words.

Lenin wrote the following regarding morality: "In what sense do we repudiate ethics and morality? In the sense that they were preached by the bourgeoisie who declared that ethics were God's Commandments. We, of course, say that we do not believe in God... We repudiate all such morality... We say that our morality is entirely subordinated to the interests of the class struggle... Our morality is derived from the interests of the class struggle... And what is this class struggle? It is... overthrowing the capitalists, destroying the capitalist class... We subordinate our Communist morality to this task. We say: 'Morality is that which serves to destroy the old exploiting society and to unite all the toilers around the proletariat, which is creating a new Communist society.'" (From Volume XVII of Lenin's Selected Works, pp. 321-23).

In other words, the communist conspirators consider that which helps bring about Communism to be moral. It includes

lying, stealing, and murdering. It is all moral if it helps bring communist slavery to the world which the communist conspirators claim will be a peaceful Utopia. In an earlier column I explained that to the communists the only hope for "peace" is the establishment of a worldwide communist dictatorship. This is what they are working for when they agree to negotiate for peace, and they are guided by the standard of morality explained by Lenin when they negotiate with gullible leaders from non-communist nations. Communists in the Kremlin, and throughout the world openly admit that Lenin is their ideal, and that their thinking is based entirely on the principles of Marxism-Leninism.

This peculiar communist concept of morality justifies in the hardened communist mind such inhuman atrocities as: the planned starvation of four million Ukrainian peasants, the slow murder of forty million slaves in Siberian labor camps, the massacre of fifteen thousand Polish officers in Katyn Forest, the rape of women in communist enslaved nations, the slaughter of Hungarian patriots, and their endless purges, lies, frame-ups, and inhuman tortures. That is Communism, and no thinking person can trust its leaders.

*The American Way*

Regular readers of this column will know that from time to time, we have exulted over the great friendship that has existed between the Canadian and American peoples. Orators from both countries have waxed eloquent regarding that boundary of several thousand miles which lies between us, on which no guns have been mounted for almost a century and a half.

This long-time uninterrupted friendship has been held up as an example of how two bordering nations can live in peace and amity; of how nations can talk out—not battle out—the inevitable differences that may arise. During that century and a half, there have been many times when Canadians and Americans have had bills of complaint against each other, but conferees of both have sat down together, and arrived at mutually amicable agreements.

Right now there are certain matters on which our two peoples do not see exactly eye-to-eye. Extremists in both countries, as has been and always will be the case, have magnified mole-hills into mountains. Anyone paying heed to these critics might be led to believe that there is no chance of ironing out these differences by discussion of these problems, as has so happily been the case with so many issues over a period of some years.

Percy C. Hill, writing in the Milwaukee Journal, has analyzed perfectly, in our way of thinking, the growing spirit of nationalism in the Dominion and its impact on the harmonious relations between Canada and the United States. We take pleasure in quoting some of Mr. Hill's comments: "The realization that Canada has a mind of its own has come to many Americans rather tardily. But, accurately speaking, that mind is not anti-American. The Canadian psyche is complex, with deep roots in history and geography. Because our two countries are indispensable to each other and because closeness generates friction, that psyche needs to be understood in the United States. "In a way Canada might have been more fortunate if it had come to nationhood all at once with a clean cut revolution, like the United States. Instead, it has

## OF PROGRESS AND SHORT-TIME NEWSPAPERS

The Old...

Onrush of achievements in mechanical and scientific is evident in almost every phase of life. New developments, processes, and machinery have revolutionized methods of accomplishing things. They make it easier to do the same thing that in years past demanded manpower, time, and equipment.

Such is now the case with newspapers. During the past years much printing equipment has been engineered to make it possible to publish many newspapers easier consolidated plant.

With advent of such consolidated plants, persons began trying who attempt to take advantage of local, long-established newspapers, utilizing equipment far removed from the locale of the actual distribution.

It was realized that in any town there were certain persons happy with the local newspaper. This is a universal condition. The "scavengers" then began finding these people, buying their ads, and then having a paper produced at one of the consolidated plants. These papers are all short-time editions. After the "revenge" ads have been gathered in, then the "publisher" moves on to other towns to other irate people.

Unfortunately one of the largest and most elaborate plants in the section of the state refuses to do business with these persons who move in on the established publishers that are striving to maintain their own equipment and other details.

Other plants, however, do accept the business. The Slatonite is not opposed to progress. We have utilized printing recently and will continue to do so until a plant is capable of again handling the load weekly.

The Slatonite believes that it is a person's privilege to do business where he wishes, and how he wishes, so long as it is legal and does not infringe on the rights of others.

The Slatonite has taken stands on issues in the past, and will continue to do so in the future. Naturally, it has made enemies. This was expected. And we undoubtedly will make enemies in the future when we take stands on problems that will arise in years to come. We do not believe that a paper can be forgiven for lack of wisdom, or for lack of courage.

Unfortunately, there are city ordinances prohibiting a person from pulling up across the street from a furniture store and selling furniture for a day or two. There is a city ordinance prohibiting a truck full of groceries from parking on the street from a local grocer and selling goods. There is an ordinance prohibiting a barber from setting up a box on the sidewalk and cutting hair for a pittance. There is no ordinance applying to persons who would sell papers under the same circumstances.

It is clear that we fear no competition. We grant the right under free enterprise to do business.

Just as we considered it our privilege to expound our views on other issues, so do we claim the right to expound our views when the situation touches our own interests.

We are not, and will never be, shy about telling the full truth about "Short-time Newspapers."

### "Yes.... We Take Our Freedom For Granted"

Some forty residents of the Bula Community attended the last rites of their friend and neighbor, Wasilij Martinow, Friday evening in Littlefield.

No relatives of Wasilij attended the funeral, in fact Wasilij actually didn't know whether or not any members of his immediate family were alive, before he took his own life last Tuesday.

Wasilij was born in Russia 60 years ago. He had established a home, and was a Christian who attended a Russian Presbyterian church.

When Stalin came to power, wooden churches were burned, stone churches dynamited.

In 1932, Russian troopers knocked on Wasilij's door one night. When he opened the door he was seized and taken to a Siberian labor camp where he remained for eight years.

When World II came along, he and others in the labor camp were conscripted into the Russian army to fight the Germans. Feeling that life in a German camp could be no worse than life in Russia, Wasilij and his fellow soldiers surrendered to the German Army.

When World War II was over, British soldiers liberated him from the German prison camp and he worked in Germany for a few years.

A great opportunity came to Wasilij about ten years ago when he was allowed to come to America under the displaced persons' program and he became a worker on the Paul Bros. ranch north of Bula.

Wasilij remarked to his friend Richard Black a short time after coming to Bula, "already I have so many good things, I have a suit, a bicycle, a car,

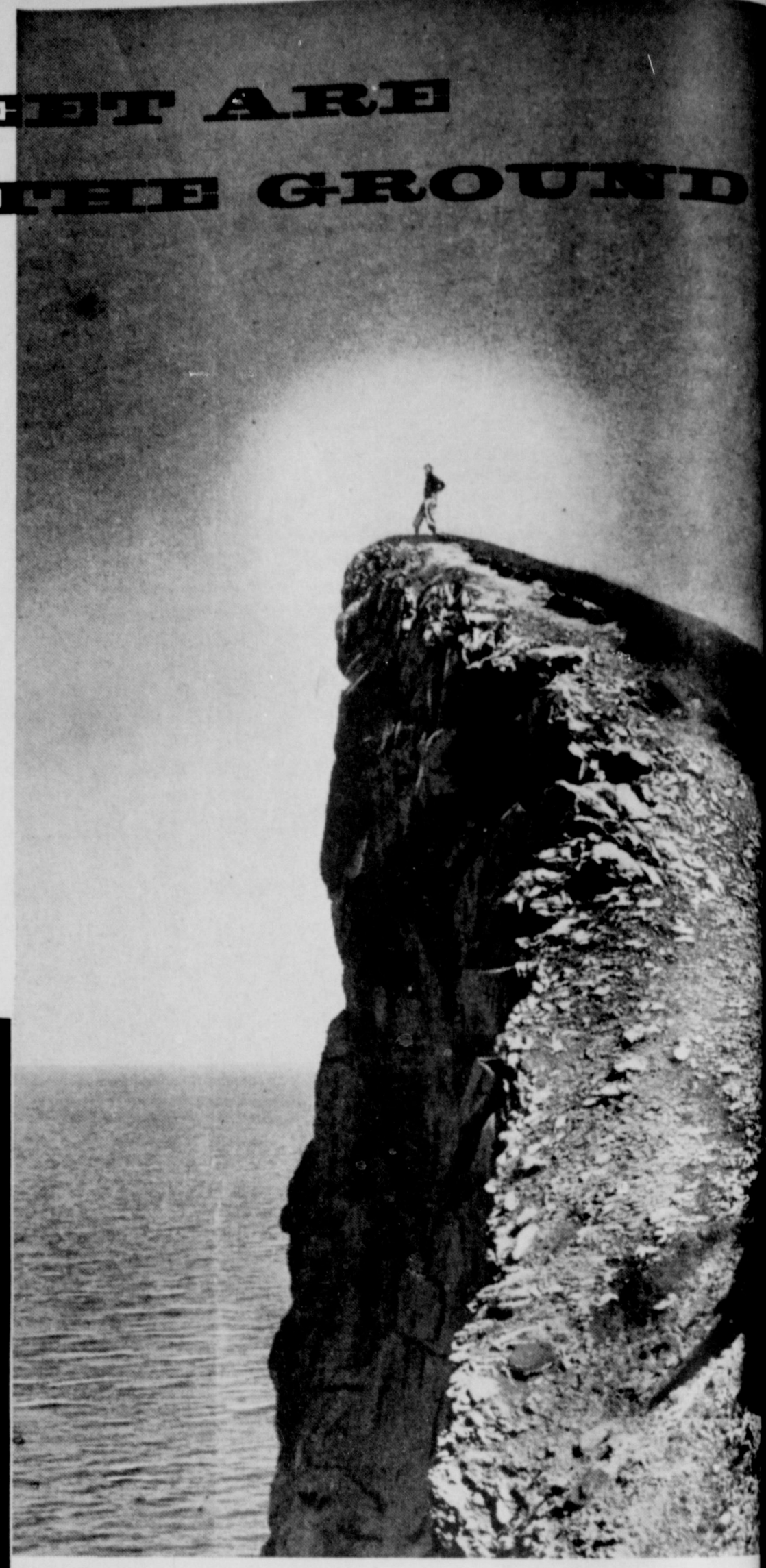

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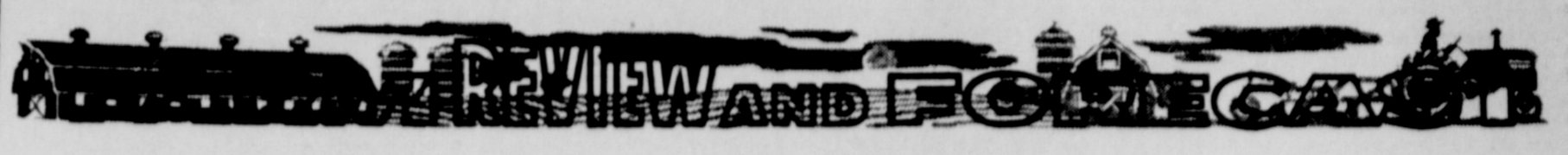

### TECH STUDENTS DEVELOP PROCESS FOR USE IN UNDER WATER RETRIEVING

Two Texas Tech students have completed a laboratory study to determine the practicability of extracting suspended solids from lake water by using gravel filters.

Delbert Smith, Roscoe, and D. B. Underwood, Winters, conducted the study under the direction of William Schwiesow of the Tech agricultural engineering department.

One of the major problems in artificially recharging the underground formation with surface runoff water results from suspended solids in muddy lake water.

Some authorities have expressed fear that the solids could clog the underground formation over a substantial period of recharging with muddy water.

**Aimed At Less Clogging**  
 The laboratory experiment was designed to show whether gravel filters could be used to extract a percentage of the suspended solids from the surface water before recharging.

A reduction in the solids, it was reported, would result in less clogging of the underground formation and consequently mean a longer life for the recharge well.

Materials necessary to build the laboratory experiment were furnished by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District here.

For a number of years the district has attempted by financial support to interest college students in doing research on water problems that concern the economic life of the High Plains.

**Equipment Described**  
 The laboratory structure for testing various filters consisted of a plywood tank that was 25 feet wide, 4 feet long and 8 feet in height.

A four-foot length of perforated 15-inch steel pipe was placed horizontally in the structure.

Gravel and sand of various sizes were placed in the plywood box around and above the perforated pipe to act as a filter.

The pipe was covered to a depth of three feet. This left room in the top of the plywood structure for 42 inches of water.

A submersible pump was used to pump water from a small pit to the filter box. Clay and silt particles, similar to those found in surface runoff water, were placed in the pit together with tap water.

The mixture was agitated in the pit by a compressed air jet.

**Determined Outflow**  
 A two-inch valve was connected to the discharge of the 15-inch perforated pipe to control the water flow through the filter, and a meter attached to the valve measured the outflow.

It was determined that "in order to keep the colloidal content of the outflow at a minimum, the flow rate through the filter should be in the range of one-fourth to one-half gallons per minute per square foot of filter."

This simply means that the results indicate that to do a good job and supply, say, 750 gallons of water per minute for recharge, the filter should be about 600 feet long by 2.5 feet wide by 3 feet deep.

The filter used in the test extracted about 85 per cent of the suspended solids from the water.

Further studies will be conducted by the Tech agricultural engineering department this summer. A complete report of the results is expected to be available late next fall.

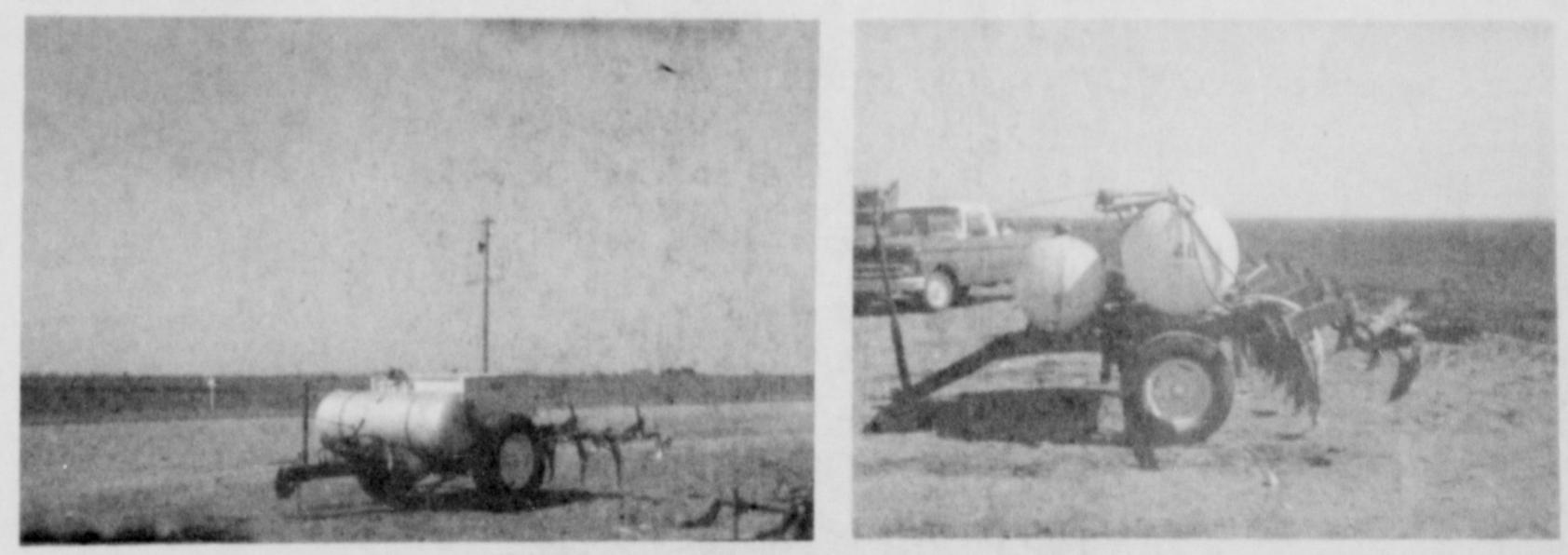

two radios and a little money in the bank . . . I could live a hundred years under Stalin and had nothing".

Because he was a hard worker, because he was thrifty, he was able to purchase 20 acres of land near Bula after working on the ranch five years and he lived another five years, working his own land.

Bula folks found him to be friendly, a good neighbor, a good farmer and although he could speak very little English he enjoyed church fellowship. One year he hosted a Coke party at the Bula grocery to celebrate an anniversary of his coming to "Free America".

He shared of his means to send CARE packages and helped another Russian family to come to America. They lived near him at Bula for a few years.

Wasilij was highly intelligent, nice looking, and likeable . . . yet he had one very great fear. He felt that the Russian government was still looking for him and wanted to take him back and enslave him.

This obsession became more real to him as he learned that Khrushchev was visiting in the U. S.

He was as sure that the Russians were after him as most people were sure that the sun would rise.

Wasilij decided to visit his Russian friends, who had moved to Chicago. While traveling through Missouri on a train he became suspicious that someone was shadowing him. He pulled a gun on the conductor, had him stop the train, and he got off. The conductor called local authorities and they chased Wasilij. Wasilij was slightly wounded by an officer's bullet, and it can only be surmised that he thought the farmers, highway patrolmen and others who joined in the chase were the Russians which he had feared for many years were after him. Consequently he turned the gun upon himself and took his life.

Wasilij was a God fearing man . . . he told his neighbors that Americans were too lenient with the Russians . . . he said that Christianity was losing out . . . he read his Bible daily.

Because he knew how important freedom was . . . he certainly knew, because he had lost it many years, he tried to impress upon his friends in his poor English how thankful they should be for this wonderful freedom, that they took for granted.

We can all learn a lesson from his life that was lived in this locality . . . we can be thankful for our American heritage, for our homes . . . for the many freedoms we enjoy . . . and let's not take them for granted . . . the day could certainly come when we too, would know the fear that Wasilij experienced in slavery and jeopardy of life and country.

## TEXAS COTTON ARRIVES IN HONG KONG

Early this year 15,151 pounds of cotton, contributed to CROP from growers in West Texas, arrived in Hong Kong to be used for blankets. In a recent report from Hong Kong Church World Service, Elbert E. Gates, director of the office said, "Our program is rolling along in wonderful style. I am simply amazed at all we are getting done. The cotton arrived. You will be interested to know that we were able to produce 1,555 blankets from the shipment. In addition, this furnished work for large numbers of refugees whom we employed to make the cotton quilts. This is a marvelous gift which is appreciated almost beyond measure."

### Beans Distributed

Other information received from the Hong Kong office described the new cottages being constructed for recently arrived refugees. The CROP shipment of beans exported in February (124,530 pounds) is being distributed through the food lines and to welfare institutions.

The situation in Hong Kong is still very critical. The tiny island off the China mainland is a colony of an estimated 3,500,000 people jammed into an area where in 1946 only 600,000 people lived. With 90,000 more births than deaths annually and twice that many entering Hong Kong illegally, living conditions do not improve even though there has been
