Candidates Aplenty In Two Elections

In April 4th City Election For 2 Commissioners and Mayor

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Four men seek the office of Commissioner from Ward One, S. Walker, Jr., W. L. Roche, E. "Bill" Moseley, and L. R. story. Four also seek the Ward Three Commissioner post, B. A. Hanna, J. E. Eckert, Hoyt Meador and Bo Becker. Two will vie for the office of Mayor, L. O. Lemon and B. H. Mayor Clark Self, who has served one term, did not choose re-election. Lemon currently is the Commissioner from Ward One, having served one term. He is a barber. Bollinger is retired railroader.

Hanna is the incumbent in Ward Three, having served two terms, has J. E. Eckert, Meador is in auto body repair business, Becker is dealer for Reda. The election will be held Tuesday, April 4 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Qualified voters are those persons residing within the City Limits for at least six months who have paid their poll tax or hold exemption. Judges will be Wayne Liles in Ward One, Phil Brewer in Ward Two, Jonas Cain in Ward Three, John D. Webb in Ward Four, and One voting box will be in the Secretary's office, Ward Two will be in the Retail Merchants office, Ward Three in City Judge's office and Ward Four in the Chamber of Commerce office. A confusing day for voters quite possibly is in store as there will be four separate elections held in City Hall that day. The others will be a charter amendment election, which will be held in the same places as the City Election; Senatorial Election and a Road and Election, both of which will be held in the halls of the structure. Subsequent issues of the Slatonite will attempt to clarify to vote in what elections.

Absentee voting will start in the City Election on Monday, March 27, and end March 31st in the Secretary's office in City Hall. Absentee voting in the Senatorial Election will start April 15th in the County Clerk's office in Slaton and an absentee box will be located in the Chamber of Commerce office here March 27 through 31st, in the election.

Five Will Vie For Three Spots In April 1 School Board Election

Five candidates will vie for votes in the election of three trustees for the Slaton Independent Consolidated School District.

The five are J. W. "Curly" Martindale, Dr. Don Hatchett, Max Arrants, Mrs. George Privett and James Thomas Jr. Three others, Dr. John C. Locke, Milton Davis and Willie Heinrich, have withdrawn from the election.

Three spots are to be filled on the school board. This is the second year that a block of voters including Negro and Latin American residents of the community have had a candidate in the school board race. Last year their Latin American candidate was defeated but the group did elect their candidate, Rev. L. L. Dixon, to the City Commission. Martindale is employed at Self Service Station, Dr. Hatchett is a local dentist, Arrants has a locker plant, and Mrs. Privett is a housewife, the wife of a Santa Fe employee.

The seven-man board as the terms of Dr. Hatchett, Davis and J. C. Smith, Jr. expire.

The election will be held Saturday, April 1, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the Chamber of Commerce office in City Hall. Last year the election was held in the school business office but the room was too small to properly handle the election, officials said, hence the move to City Hall.

Charlie Whalen will be election judge and qualified voters are those persons residing within the school district who have paid their current poll taxes, or have an exemption and who have resided in the district six months or more.

To Be Open To All Persons

Tigerettes Down Winters; Lose To Spearman In Regional tourney

Slaton's Tigerettes bounded to a victory Saturday morning over Winters, 57-52, in their first regional tournament game, but were edged from the title by a slim three points in the night session through a questionable loss to Spearman, 54-55.

Versatile Elaine Pickens, who saw action in the tourney at both guard and forward scored 15 points against the Lynx, dropping seven field goals and one free throw. Both Glenda Bownds and Judie Bishop hit seven points each.

Carrying the bulk of the load in a splendid defensive effort were guards Jeanette Price, Pat Pettigrew, Elaine Pickens, and Fonda Patterson. As seeing stints at the guard posts were Ronda Pettigrew, Ray Nelda and Carol Self.

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Slaton outscored its opponents from the field by 21-13, but fell back in the bonus department, being outscored by 26-15.

The Sounding Board

Editor's Note: Fred C. Latham Jr., publisher of the Beeville Bee-Picayune, has some pretty intense feelings concerning a bill currently before the Texas Legislature. It might interest you.)
HOUSE AND SENATE BILLS COULD MEAN END OF PRIVATE POWER COMPANIES!
What is wrong with federally-owned power? This in a sense is the question being discussed today in Austin. The second bill on the agenda for the House of Representatives, sponsored by Jamison, Carraker, Townsend, et al, is to amend Article 1528b V.C.S. to authorize electric cooperatives to serve an area which was a rural area when the corporation first undertook service.

Senate Bill 7, introduced by Krueger, is identical. The hearing before the House Committee is set for February 20 and the hearing before the Senate Committee will be held on February 22.

This at first glance appears innocent enough. Why shouldn't REA continue to serve the rural district? The reason is that for a city to grow it must take in more land. For a privately owned company which pays federal and county and city taxes, a company owned by tax-paying stockholders there would be no chance for growth. This private company

could not expand into this territory.

RE A like taxes, like anything in which the federal government has entered, needs to be carefully studied. Those areas which have served their usefulness should be sold to private concerns. Those areas which need to be expanded should be expanded, but a blanket rule for all is about as appropriate as a blanket rule that all men must wear size 12 shoes. It may fit some, but to others it will mean just plain misery.

The worst aspect of this bill is the stifling of private enterprise. No company can compete against a government organization. True, RE A will insist that they pay taxes, but they do not on a par with a private concern. They do not pay federal taxes; they pay an especially low state franchise tax, and they do not pay county taxes the same rate as private power companies. If you are worried about your taxes today, go to the courthouse, city hall and school tax office, and see what added burden you would have if there were no private utilities paying taxes in your community.

Granted, RE A has performed a wonderful service to our rural areas, but let us leave their re-

If we listen to the television or read the newspapers just a little, one is convinced that everyone will soon be out of work, that bread will be a dollar a loaf and not a bit better than it should be and that thousands of men are refusing to work be-

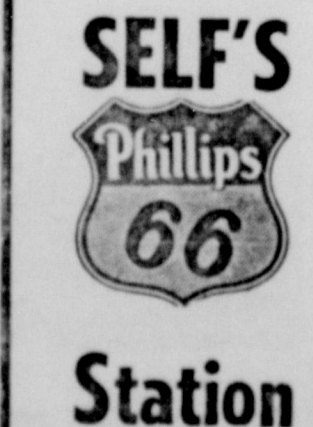

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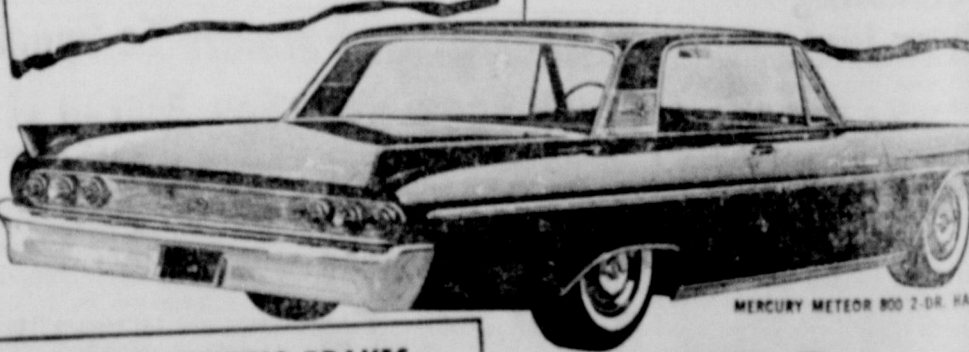

Purtell Does It!...
Fertilizer added: "It is easy to convert your planter to handle LIQUID FERTILIZER at the time you do your planting. You use the usual 'spinning' gloves on the planter feet, plus a 3/8" fertilizer knife—4" to the right of the foot, as shown on the left. Weld a pipe on the back of the knife—connect the fertilizer tube to. The fertilizer is put down about 1" deeper than the seed. With this set-up I have cut out one complete farming operation, plus reducing the amount of pneumatic packing of my farm land. 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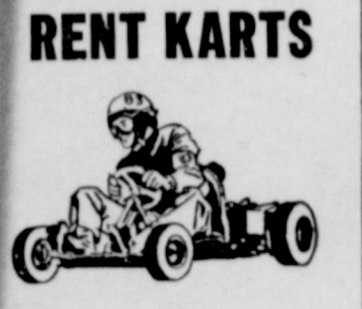

Mrs. Gentry Is Discharged From Gonzales Center

Mrs. Anna Belle Gentry, Rt. 1, Slaton, was discharged February 17 from the Texas Rehabilitation Center, Gonzales, Wash. Springs Foundation.

She was now member of the Former Patients Association, made up of the more than 3,000 persons who have undergone rehabilitation treatment at the Center. This is the only such organization in the United States.

In comprehensive rehabilitation at TRC, a skilled medical staff seeks to treat the entire person. An individual program is prescribed for each patient, utilizing the types of therapy suited to his needs. The goal is maximum rehabilitation—physically, emotionally, and socially—so the person can live and work to the best of his abilities.

The Texas Rehabilitation Center depends mainly upon public contributions to maintain its program of treating persons left handicapped by such diseases and accidents as cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, polio, muscular dystrophy, spinal cord injuries, arthritis, and strokes.

Any Texan who can benefit from TRC's medical program is eligible for admission, regardless of age, race, beliefs, or ability to pay for treatment.

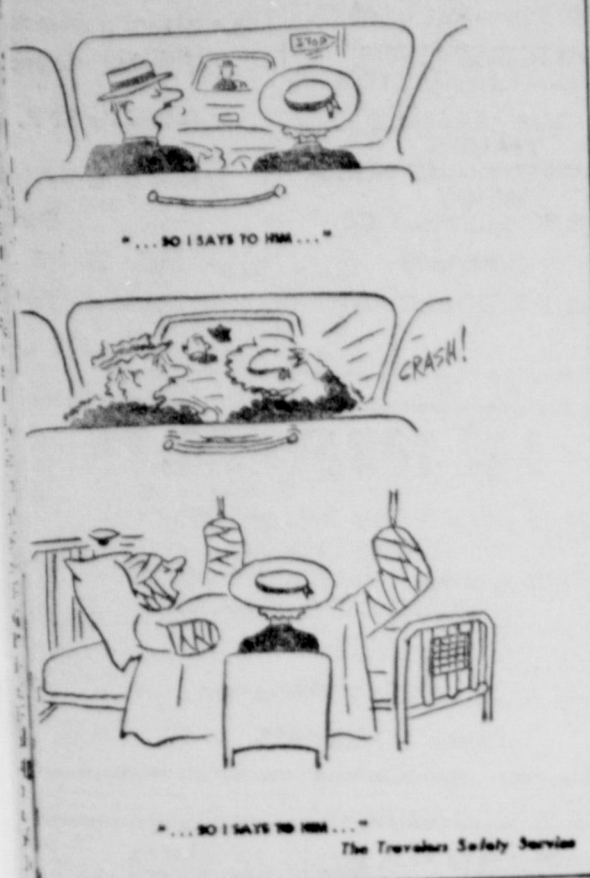

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THE Heripatetic VIEW

President Kennedy had his first major rhabarb with a member of the Democratic flock Sunday when he and House Democratic leader John W. McCormack (Massachusetts) differed on the

issue of federal aid to parochial and other private schools.

Kennedy voiced opposition to the federal government helping Catholic or other private schools, and his administration's bill presently calls for aid only to public schools. He says that to aid private schools is in clear opposition to the constitution.

McCormack, on the other hand says that "we're helping our educational system and certainly when we put through a bill to help public schools it has an unintentional effect upon the private school system."

The truly astounding element came when the Roman Catholic hierarchy in the United States de-

clined to oppose any school aid bill that did not help private schools.

Unless I totally misunderstand the basic purpose of the private school, to take federal aid would not only barter the principles of the school, but would be unjust and unconstitutional.

President Kennedy correctly

stated that aid to private schools was clearly unconstitutional. He should have extended this to include aid to all schools.

Consider two situations: How would a member of the Roman Catholic Church feel toward part of his federal tax return which was required of him by law) being used to instruct youngsters in the Jewish faith. Or, how would a member of the Church of Christ feel about his federal taxes being used for instruction in the Roman Catholic Faith.

And how will the religious lead-

ers of any parochial school feel when the federal government dictates the amount of religious courses that may be taught and the content of these etc. DON'T say this isn't possible, because when the federal government becomes a benefactor, it CAN do what it wishes and do it **WHATEVER** it wishes.

We've seen centralization and regimentation of many phases of so-called constitutional life in America during the past two decades, but when it enters the schools,

then every dedicated teacher of any subject in any school (public or private) should become more concerned for the future of his profession.

When the first government-aid dollar goes into the fund of a private school, then the school is no longer private. And when federal dollars go into the budget of public schools, then the state, county, and city citizens and officials are through with all save to-ken authority. And children will at-

tend schools in the future with whom the federal government deems fit; under all the standards the federal government deems fit.

With federal aid to schools, another seemingly intelligent and capable group says to the central power, "We take your help, as

we are no longer able to job ourselves."

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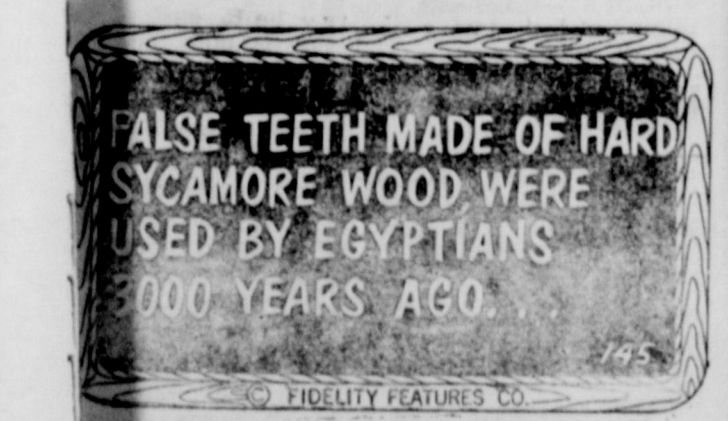
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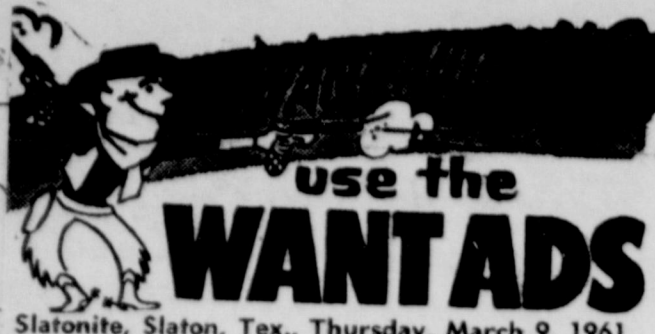

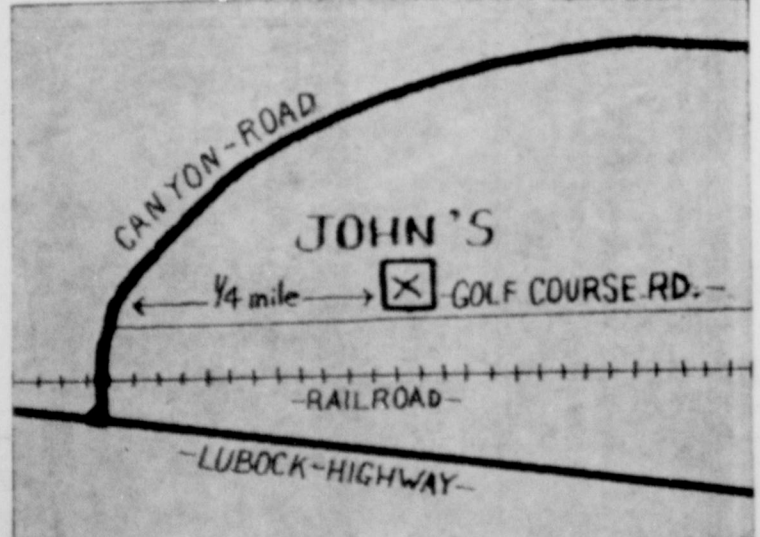
