

City Budget Approved

Proposed city budget for the fiscal year 1964-65 was approved by the City Commission after a public hearing and a brief session of the commission.

The commission approved a budget of \$2,000,000 for the fiscal year 1964-65, which is an increase of \$200,000 over last year.

The hearing on the budget was about the only business on the agenda Monday night. In the only other action, commissioners approved the appointment of an engineering firm to represent the city on the Canadian River project.

Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Inc., will serve as consulting and design engineers, representing the city from an engineering standpoint only in working with the Bureau of Reclamation on the design of the CRMWA conduit system and facilities to deliver and meter water to the city.

A look at the budget shows the general fund, of course, takes the largest share with \$1,621,110 tabbed for expenses. A total of \$128,252 is scheduled for the water and sewer fund, \$67,270 for interest and sinking fund, and \$17,725 for the cemetery fund.

General fund revenues show an increase of only \$5,210 excluding transfers from the water and sewer fund. These were due primarily to the increase in the tax rate and newly-annexed property and buildings completed in 1963 and now being added to the tax roll for the first time.

The general fund total expenditures are due to salary raises, additional employees in police department, street repair of fire station and higher insurance rates.

The water and sewer appropriations exclude the \$54,945 to be transferred to the Water Construction Reserve Account and includes the \$40,000 transfer to the general fund. Overall expenses are down \$37,721 because of a reduction in the Interfund transfers and reduction in capital outlay.

Increases in the departmental expenses are due to an extra employee, added now because of the public works project coming up. Increase water sales is the primary result of a \$10,284 rise in total revenue.

The annual principal and interest requirement of the city's outstanding debt shows an increase from \$54,268 to \$67,270. The reason for this increase comes with the payment on the \$300,000 general obligation bonds voted recently and payment on the time warrant for a new fire truck.

The increase of \$7,523 in the cemetery operating expense includes capital outlay to develop the new cemetery, insurance on two pickups, and the salary of the cemetery superintendent. The increase of \$8,832 anticipated in revenue is due to lot sales in the new cemetery and revenue from additional services offered by the department.

Improvements program, centered around a \$300,000 bond issue, is planned for the next fiscal year.

This program includes: \$120,000 for street repairs, new paving, and curb and gutter for Division Street; \$30,000 for collection lines and lift station in sewer system; and \$150,000 for supply and distribution lines in water system.

A \$10,000 outlay for other-water system improvements has been budgeted to be paid out of the water improvement fund. The remainder of the capital expenditures will be paid out of current funds.

HEAVY RAINFALL ENDS LONG DRY SPELL

Downpour Soaks Slaton

Cool, Damp Weather No Help For Area Farmers

★★★★
A cloudburst dropped more than three inches of rain on Slaton and the area Wednesday afternoon, sending water running from curb to curb as the water came down heavy in a short span of time.

The Slaton area had received slight amounts of moisture during cool, damp weather the past few weeks, but the downpour ended, without a doubt, a dry spell that had lasted for months.

At least one city rain gauge had recorded 3.75 inches by 2:30 p.m. Wednesday with the rain still coming down.

extended cool, damp spell could be disastrous—especially if an early frost was experienced. The grain harvest in the area is nearing completion.

Lack of subsoil moisture and a summer dry spell took a heavy toll of dryland crops, while heavy irrigation is making the total crop remain only slightly below last year's huge harvest.

The last estimate of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., set the expected production in the 23-county PCG area at 1,961,000 bales. This was the Sept. 1 forecast which was up slightly over the Aug. 1 prediction.

Crop estimated for nearby Lynn and Dawson counties have been slashed the most. Both were decreased by 15,000 bales in the latest estimates. Not too much production is expected from the approximate 600,000 acres of dryland cotton in the area.

Farmers with adequate irrigation, however, are reporting good crops. Some dryland farmers doubt if they make a bale off of each 5 to 15 acres.

A crop of the size predicted for the South Plains would fall only 129,683 bales short of last year, however, if the production comes up with the estimate, it will be the fifth largest ever harvested across the area.

County-by-county estimates for Sept. 1, as compared with Aug. 1, include:

Overcast skies and intermittent showers kept Slaton and the area cool and damp this week, but the moisture came too late to be of much benefit to this year's crops.

Moisture reports were small from around the area, but agricultural observers were fearful that a prolonged period of cool and damp weather could delay and damage the irrigated cotton harvest.

The moisture apparently has had no harmful effects on irrigated cotton as yet, but an

Petitions On Paving Should Be Filed Soon

Property owners interested in having city streets paved should pick up petitions at City Hall and return them with the necessary signatures as soon as possible, City Secretary Robert Sokoll reported this week.

The city commission hopes to let bids on the street paving program the last week in October. All paving petitions should be returned by Oct. 23.

The petitions are made to the city with the understanding the City of Slaton will pay not less than 20 percent of the total cost of the project. Property owners will be offered customary contracts or mechanics liens. A majority of property owners in any given block should sign the petitions in order for the paving to be scheduled.

In a recent bond election, voters approved \$120,000 for street improvements. A portion of this will go for new paving, while other funds are to be spent on other street improvements.

The first step of this public works program—the widening of Division Street—was recently launched. Bids are to be let on curb and gutter work on Division Street Friday at 3 p.m. The work is from 9th to 20th streets.

'CRIPPLED' SLATON SEEKS SECOND WIN IN ROW

Tigers Tackle Crosbyton

With the sweet smell of success still lingering after last week's first grid triumph of the season, Slaton's Tigers will be clawing for two in a row tomorrow night when the Crosbyton Chiefs come to town.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. for the non-district encounter against the District 4-A visitors.

Slaton's victory over Tahoka did not come easy, however, and the Tigers may be without the services of two key back-

field men Friday night. For the third game in a row, Slaton may have a new starting quarterback.

Coach Neal Chastain reported Wednesday that Bobby Brake, quarterback and wingback, was sure to miss action this week due to a knee injury. Larry Gamble, quarterback and halfback, is a doubtful starter after hurting an ankle in the Tahoka tilt.

Brake started the first two games at the signal-calling post, then switched to wingback when Gamble took over the field general duties last week. Both wound up working at the important man-under position.

The Tiger coach moved halfback Billy Gass to quarterback in Monday's practice, and the tough 155-pound junior responded with a good showing early this week.

In fact, Gass moved into the post so well that Chastain was

bemoaning the loss of Brake and Gamble as defensive ends more than as offensive backs. Both Brake and Gamble have been standouts on defense this season.

Should Gass get the starting call at quarterback, he'll probably be joined by fullback Sparky Stephens, wingback Oscar Henderson, and halfback Phil Goad or Johnny Hennington.

Goad also bruised a leg in the Tahoka game and was favoring it a little this week. He'll probably be ready to go tomorrow night, however.

The offensive line appears about the same with Larry Smith and Steve Harlan at ends, Mike Hunter and Leonard Hurst at tackles, Mike Ball at one guard with Danny Scott and Larry Bownds alternating at the other, and Doug Williams at center.

Hunter probably gets the starting nod at one of the tackle slots after a fine performance last week. Guard Joe Olague was cited for good work this week, too, and has seen plenty of defensive action.

Chastain announced that two

backs were pulled up from the "B" team this week in case the ranks get thinner. They are quarterback Allen Miles and halfback John Henry Johnson.

Slaton fans may see a little change in the Tiger offense this week, as Chastain has installed some "I" formation plays. A good blocking back helps in this type formation, and Henderson could supply the needed factor.

The Chiefs are 2-1 for the season, suffering their first setback last week at the hands of Morton, 26-8. Previously the Crosbyton team knocked off Tahoka, 32-12, and O'Donnell, 28-6.

By comparative scores, the chiefs will be favored over Slaton, but the Tigers may have other ideas after a taste of victory.

The Chiefs had a fine 8-1-1 won-lost-tied mark last season, finishing second to state-champ Petersburg in district and tying the mighty Buffs in loop play. Crosbyton lost eight starters from the team, however, and Coach Dean Wright has had some rebuilding to do.

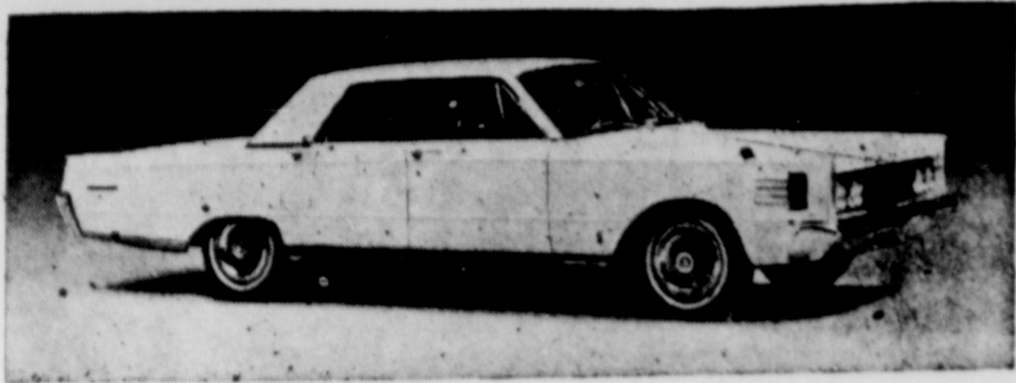

There were 46 traffic deaths in Lubbock County during 1963 as compared to the past three year average of 48 deaths, according to Sgt. O. C. Guthrie of the Texas Highway Patrol for this area.

Record Crowd Expected For Tech-Texas Tilt

Lubbock—Texas Tech's Red Raiders, surprisingly over a major hurdle, take on last year's No. 1 team, the University of Texas, in Jones Stadium here at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Largest crowd ever to see a Texas football game west of Fort Worth is forecast. The turnout is expected to exceed the record crowd of 42,000 that saw the Longhorns beat Tech by a 34-0 score here two years ago. Tech's capacity is 41,500, but special bleachers have been erected behind the north end zone.

Although Texas is considered just about as strong as the team that won by a 49-7 score in Austin last year, Red Raider fans gained hope by Tech's 21-7 win over Mississippi State as 38,000 watched last week. The Bulldogs ranked tenth in the nation last year.

Texas meanwhile continued to roll with a 31-0 win over Tulane, like Mississippi State, also a Southeastern Conference member.

Following the Texas game Coach J. T. King's Raiders go on the road for three Southwest Conference contests before returning for a game with Southern Methodist here Oct. 24.
