Quilliam To Seek Re-Election

Reed Quilliam, Lubbock attorney, announced his candidacy today for re-election to the office of State Representative, Place 1.

The 32-year-old lawmaker, who defeated three opponents to win his first term in the Texas House of Representatives, stated that he was preparing to wage a vigorous campaign for re-election to a second

Quilliam was graduated from Beaumont High School in 1945, where he was co-editor of the high school newspaper and participated in football, basketball and track. He then attended Lamar Junior College for one year, where he won a basketball leter on the state junior college runners-up. He completed his education at the University of Texas, earning degrees in government, business administration and law. While at the University, he served on the Student Assembly, and the faculty-student cabinet, and was president of his law class and of the upperclassmen's campus service honorary.

Following graduation from law school, Quilliam spent two years on active duty with the Navy. Some 14 months of his tour was spent in the Western

He came to Lubbock upon his release from active duty, first as a professor of finance, teaching business law at Texas Tech, and subsequently as a practicing atorney, since 1956. He has been active in civic clubs and community affairs.

Quilliam is married to the former Myrna Simmons of Ponca City, Okla., and the couple has three children, Corinne, 7; Kathryn, 6; and Reed

In announcing his candidacy for re-election, Quilliam issued

Original Plans Of Committee Study To Be Carried Out

The U.S. Labor Department, in a letter from Tracy C. Murrell, regional director, Dallas, rescinded an earlier order to Slaton officials telling them to integrate the municipal swimming pool or be refused the use of Mexican national bracero labor.

Slaton's Commission has earlier asked to be granted until March to have a five-man committee study the sutuation and make a recommendation. This will now be the procedure.

Murrell's letter started the furor on Nov. 30 when he gave the ultimatum. His letter indicates that the secretary of labor decided to go against the initial

A letter to Congressman

George Mahon, Lubbock from the acting Secretary of Labor. was mailed as follows: U. S. Department of Labor

Dear Congressman Mahon:

This is in response to your telegram of December 8, 1961 concerning the problem arising out of the policy to prohibit the use of the Slaton City swimming pool by persons of Mexican ex-

As you probably know, from the inception of the Mexican labor program in 1942 until 1949 the Mexican Government steadfastly refused to permit the employment, under the various United States-Mexico Migrant Labor Agreements, of its nationals in the State of Texas because of their feeling that there was widespread discrimination in Texas against persons of Mexican descent. During this period the United

fully attempted to persuade the Mexican Government that the employment of Mexican nationals in Texas would generate a better understanding and a better acceptance of Mexican nationals by Texas citizens, and at the same time improve the relationship between Mexico and the State of Texas.

In 1949, however, through the assiduous efforts of the Department of Labor, for the first time the Mexican Government permitted the employment of Mexican nationals in agricultural activities in the State of Texas. The agreement was reached on the basis of a special commitment by the Department of Labor that it would very closely watch any evidence of discrimination by any community against persons of Mexican extraction and assurances taken by the Department to seek the elimination of such discrimination or withhold Mexican workers from any such community where its efforts were in this respect unsuccessful. Since that time there have been many sensitive situations which have developed.

Because these situations are so sensitive the Department has endeavored to take action before any formal request is made by the Mexican Government for joint action under Article 8 of the present Migrant Labor Agreement. It has been demonstrated time and again that unless prompt action is taken the initiation by the Mexican Government of any demands for investigation and action under Article 8 seriously complicates the situation and makes it much more difficult to resolve the matter expeditiously. For example, the Mexican Government has frequently demanded in the past that workers be withheld or withdrawn from entire counties because of discriminatory acts in one community within that county. This has been a repeated source of friction and irritation and has on a number of occasions resulted in unilateral action by the Mexican Government in withholding workers from entire counties.

There appears to be some misconception of the intent of Article 8 of the Migrant Labor Agreement with respect to the responsibilities of the Department of Labor. The first sentence of Article 8 provides as follows: "Mexican workers shall not be assigned to work in localities in which Mexicans are discriminated against because of their nationality or ancestry."

This does not comtemplate that the Department of Labor will assign Mexican workers to work in localities in which it has been demonstrated that

BANKS STILL BALK -- Most Texas banks balked at the Legislative committee's request that they make their. dormant accounts public.

Five of the 38 banks subpoensed to appear before the committee filled out questionnaires by deadline time. Twenty - two banks were represented at the hearing. Eleven failed to show up.

Houston's City National Bank attorney Raybourne Thompson, speaking on behalf of all 22 banks present, and two others, requested that the committee get an opinion from the Attorney General as to whether it has the power to force testimony "that would destroy banker-depositors confidences."

Thompson said if the committee refused, the banks would testify "under protest."

Committee had sent questionnaires to 469 national banks in Texas. Only 66 gave some or all information about the number of dormant accounts they hold and the amounts in these accounts.

Out of the 536 state banks queried by the committee, only 100 furnished the information. Prime reason for the

specially called session by Gov. Price Daniel is the enactment of laws to force banks to locate the owners or heirs of unclaimed depositories.

Governor Daniel feels that little effort is being made by the banks to find the rightful owners. He says that more than \$3,000,000 is being held unlawfully by the financial institutions. Some banks are even levying charges against the accounts even though the accounts are inactive, he reports. Few, if any of the banks,

have ever advertised to find the rightful owner.

I wish to assure you that it is not the objective of the Department of Labor to withdraw the Mexican workers from Slaton. We would prefer that Slaton, like many other communities which were faced with similar problems, eliminate through community action the discriminatory policy which has given rise to the present situation. I might point out that this is the manner in which the great majority of cases have been resolved and in such cases the communities continue to obtain Mexican nationals under the Migrant Labor Agreement to the extent that there is a demonstrated need for their services.
