### Always A Crusader

Recently Tom Anderson, editor of Farm & Ranch Magazine, visited in Canyon. The following is from Troy Martin's column, "From the Canyon Rim."

We enjoyed our association last week end with Tom Anderson and Frank McGhee. Both of them are straight talkers. Both are forceful. Both are men of purpose.

Tom Anderson points out that Sweden has the lowest morals and the highest suicide rate in the so called civilized world today. Yet, Sweden has reached a "sublime" state of socialism. Responsibility is lifted from the shoulders of the individual and placed upon the state. The individual loses a part of his reason for being. He commits suicide.

Anderson, who has visited in Sweden, says church membership is like belonging to a trade union. Church dues are assessed in much the same manner as union dues are assessed in this country.

"Churches are considered good for christenings and funerals," Anderson declares.

Frank McGhee is the young man from Dallas who started the National Indignation Council. Frank says it was spontaneous. He became disgusted over the fact that Communist Yugoslavian jet pilots are being trained in this country.

Frank, a part owner of a modest garage business, rented a hall for \$300 and called the newspapers to announce a meeting. Frank says he expected about 30 and 800 showed up. As the meeting went on one man came to the front and turned his pockets wrong side out. Before long cash began to fly as folks began expressing their indignation in a material form.

When things cleared up some \$1500 had been anted up for the movement.

Primary motive of the National Indignation Council is to express indignation over such things as training communist pilots here and otherwise giving aid and comfort to the Reds.

Well, that sanctimonious old hypocrite, Pandit Nehru has finally wrecked the United Na-

# HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

## From The State Capitol

Sanford Street Association... Operation... which began Saturday and ends at... Day, is the... business of the... office today. Daniel has writ-

ten every Texas sheriff and chief of police, asking each law officer in Texas to help make the State's streets and highways safer for Texas drivers during the 10-day holiday season. Governor Daniel said the anticipated toll of 88 holiday

traffic deaths is the lowest estimate ever made, and stated "it pinpoints the progress of recent years in reducing Texas traffic tragedies during the year-end holiday. However, even more lives can be saved this year if the people obey the laws and drive safely."

Newspaper publishers, the Texas Press Association, broadcasters and billboard owners are cooperating in the campaign, urging Texans to take individual responsibility for traffic safety, and asking drivers to keep headlights burning during daylight hours as a reminder that safe and legal driving is the best way to avoid holiday crashes. **BANKS STILL BALK**-- Most Texas banks balked at the Legislative committee's request that they make their dormant accounts public.

Five of the 38 banks subpoenaed to appear before the committee filled out questionnaires by deadline time. Twenty-two banks were represented at the hearing. Eleven failed to show up.

Houston's City National Bank attorney Raybourne Thompson, speaking on behalf of all 22 banks present, and two others, requested that the committee get an opinion from the Attorney General as to whether it has the power to force testimony "that would destroy banker-depositors' confidences."

Thompson said if the committee refused, the banks would testify "under protest."

Committee had sent questionnaires to 469 national banks in Texas. Only 66 gave some or all information about the number of dormant accounts they hold and the amounts in these accounts.

Out of the 536 state banks queried by the committee, only 100 furnished the information.

Prime reason for the specially called session by Gov. Price Daniel is the enactment of laws to force banks to locate the owners or heirs of unclaimed depositories.

Governor Daniel feels that little effort is being made by the banks to find the rightful owners. He says that more than \$3,000,000 is being held unlawfully by the financial institutions. Some banks are even levying charges against the accounts even though the accounts are inactive, he reports.

Few, if any of the banks, have ever advertised to find the rightful owner.

Governor Daniel feels that the banks should exert every effort possible to locate the owners, including advertising, or turn the funds over to the state for the protection of the depositors. Such steps have been taken in a number of other states.

**HOPEFUL SIGN**-- Texas Commission on Alcoholism reports good results in its six-year-old

program of rehabilitation for alcoholics in state hospitals, and progress with prison system inmates. But it is still concerned about the estimated 250,000 drinkers in Texas who need treatment.

Commission says 2,334 patients were treated for alcoholism in six state hospitals during fiscal 1961.

Improvement after six months from date of discharge was reported by about 500 out of 1,600 patients released last year.

In less than 18 months, the number of alcoholics participating in prison rehabilitation programs has grown from 800 to 3,000.

Commission now lists counsels on alcoholism in 29 Tex-

as cities, working to educate the public to recognize alcoholism as a disease. Their attempts are aimed at the 250,000 ailing alcoholics and their families--as well as the 4,000,000 Texans who use alcohol. **CHAIRMAN CHALLENGED**-- Gubernatorial candidate Will Wilson has charged State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman J. Ed Connally with reserving the committee's mailing list of 20,000 Democrats for incumbent governors, "to the exclusion of other Democrats outside the Executive Committee itself."

Wilson contended that the list is the property of all Texas Democrats. He asked the committee to adopt a resolution making the mailing list

available to all Democratic candidates, for use in party primaries.

Wilson has accepted an invitation to face opponent John Connally in a debate.

Weslaco attorney Jon Dee Lawrence extended the invitation to both gubernatorial candidates on behalf of the Weslaco Jaycees, but Connally hasn't replied.

Principal issue of the debate would be: "Is the Governor of Texas To Be a Number One Chief Executive -- or somebody else's agent?"

**THE BUSINESS AT HAND**-- The Attorney General's assistants have been busy writing opinions on everything from a major gas company dispute to a matter of land willed to the

Baptist General Convention. The Attorney General intervened in a case in the 43rd District Court at Parker County, making a motion to set aside a default judgement void-

ing conveyance of 1,000 acres of land to the Baptist General Convention.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Stocks Sr. willed the land in Parker and

The wedding party stood before a prayer bench of white and gold wrought iron which was accented with pompon mums. White satin bows and greenery marked the pews.

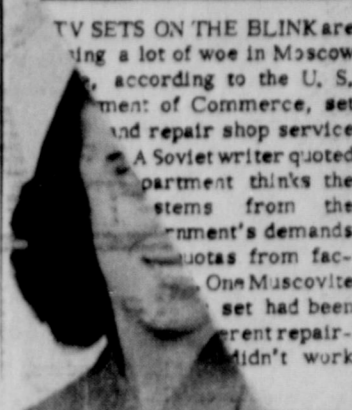
RECEPTION DECORATIONS

Scraps of leftover pie pastry and spoonfuls of jam are the ingredients needed, according to home economists for Lutz and Schramm. Whipped cream is optional.

To make these delicious bite-size pastries, roll dough out thin and cut into rounds. Sprinkle the rounds with granulated sugar and fit them into muffin tins. Bake at 375 degrees about 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove pastry shells from tins and fill centers with any flavor jam. Apple butter and raspberry preserves make good fillings, too. Serve each tart with a chic dab of whipped cream.

## Editors Look At Railroads

Does the nation's press think of the current railroad crisis--including its magnitude, and urgency? Here are a few examples, out of hundreds that could be cited--and they are typical, not exceptional.

Richmond, Virginia, News Leader: "In Washington, there must be a stop to talk--toward cutting through the regulation that now smother's the railroad industry." The Fort Worth Star-Telegram says: "The inactivity of the legislatures and Congress can no longer be ignored or excused." The Cleveland, Tennessee, News says: "Congress and state legislatures have for years played politics with the railroad. They have actually brought to the point of economic death the industry to correct legislation which is as slow as the horse and buggy..."

Wichita, Kansas, Tribune says: "If Congress does not act, the 220,000-mile network, so vital to every citizen, will suffer from within as great as could be expected by saboteurs from without the industry." The Camden, South Carolina, News says: "The railroad problem has probably been subjected to more study than any other national question. Congress has failed to act to build the railways into a healthy institution, for peace and an absolute necessity of war." The Johnson City, Tennessee, Press-Chronicle says: "A major part of business of the next session of Congress must be railroad rehabilitation. That is mandatory--whether the economy is cold or turns hot."

It goes. All of these considered observations have three points in common, either stated or implied--that legislators, state and national, have so far been inexcusably to free the railroads from the strangling chains of obsolete regulation; that the need for action is urgent; and that time is running out. Blame for the present intolerable situation rests on the shoulders of the law-

Hood Counties to the Baptists in 1955, but their son John Stocks alleges his parents were not legally competent at the time.

Wilson made his motion under a statute which said the Attorney General may be made a party to any suit to annul or impair any instrument creating or affecting a charitable trust.

As representative of the Texas Railroad Commission, the City of San Antonio, the City Public Service Board and Alamo Gas Supply Company, the Attorney General filed a motion with the Supreme Court asking it to compel 126th District Judge Jack Roberts of Austin to enter judgement in San Antonio's gas contract dispute.

Motion arises from a suit filed by United Gas, which is contracted to supply gas for San Antonio until April 1, when Alamo Gas is scheduled to take over.

Judge Roberts has said the case was out of his court's jurisdiction. Railroad Commission ruled that it has no jurisdiction in the dispute.

The Attorney General also has ruled that:

1. Failure to possess a valid poll tax does not disqualify a juror in any criminal case.
2. It's unconstitutional for a court to authorize a sheriff to destroy property seized from arrested persons in county jail, even if property is unclaimed for 90 days.
3. State Education Commission has the right to audit state funds in county administration and school transportation funds.

**SHORT SHORT SNORTS**  
Speaker James A. Turman says the "staggering costs of government" could be reduced if qualified voters would take an active interest.

He estimates spending in local, state and national government has risen 156 per cent since 1950, and points to the fact that recently two state representatives were elected by less than six per cent of the qualified voters in their areas.

Capitol hostess Mrs. J. W. Beck will resign on February 1. The senator's widow, who has talked to hundreds of thousands of tourists in her 14 years at the Capitol, is staying

through the special session at the Governor's request.

State Securities Commission issued permits to sell more than \$49,000,000 worth of securities during November.

Welfare Commissioner John H. Winters says the Aid to Dependent Children program is "charged with aiding immorality," but that only 20 per cent of the 59,809 Texas children receiving ADC are illegitimate.

On the other hand, there are

131,133 illegitimate children in the eligible age bracket (under 14) in Texas today, he states.

U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough called on Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to act immediately to establish a price support program on some 10,000 tons of peanuts damaged in a freeze in Texas.

Yarborough, in his Austin office, also asked Freeman to support the use of cotton wrapping for cotton bales.

TV SETS ON THE BLINK are causing a lot of woe in Moscow where, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce, set quality and repair shop service are poor. A Soviet writer quoted by the Department thinks the difficulty stems from the Russian government's demands for too-high quotas from factories and shops. One Muscovite reported that his set had been serviced by 25 different repairmen -- and still didn't work right.

 nation was practiced. The man-  
 ager of the swimming pool ac-  
 knowledged that it was "op-  
 erated for whites only." On

September 14, 1960 Mr. Clark  
 Self, then Mayor of Slaton, as-  
 sured us in a statement that the  
 problem had "been worked  
 out." The Mexican Consul was  
 advised of the results of the  
 investigation. He indicated that  
 he was satisfied with the as-  
 surance received and did not  
 consider that the situation at  
 that time required action under  
 Article 8 of the Agreement.  
 Because of our discussions in  
 the fall of 1960 with the Mayor  
 of Slaton and other interested  
 parties, we were led to the con-

clusion that the problem of dis-  
 crimination had been settled and  
 would not recur. However, last  
 summer complaints were again  
 received concerning discrimi-  
 nation in Slaton, Texas. This  
 time, again the acts of discrimi-  
 nation were focused primarily  
 around the operation of the city  
 swimming pool.  
 In your telegram you re-  
 quested that the city of Slaton  
 have until March, 1962 to re-  
 solve this problem. I believe  
 you will agree that the Depart-  
 ment has not acted pre-

cipitously in this matter. In  
 effect, we have been attempt-  
 ing to resolve the problem since  
 September, 1960, without any  
 apparent success. Notwith-  
 standing assurances received  
 in 1960, we find in 1961 the  
 same evidences of discrimi-  
 natory practices against per-  
 sons of Mexican ancestry. How-  
 ever, it is my desire to be as  
 cooperative as possible and I  
 know you would not have re-  
 quested additional time unless  
 there was good reason for it.  
 I respect your judgment in this  
 matter and therefore, at your  
 request, extend the time al-  
 lowed to the City of Slaton,  
 to March 1, 1962. I am sure  
 you will understand, however,  
 the necessity of having their  
 decision at that time.  
 I wish to assure you that it  
 is not the objective of the De-  
 partment of Labor to withdraw  
 the Mexican workers from  
 Slaton. We would prefer that  
 Slaton, like many other com-  
 munities which were faced with  
 similar problems, eliminate  
 through community action the  
 discriminatory policy which has  
 given rise to the present situa-  
 tion. I might point out that this  
 is the manner in which the great  
 majority of cases have been  
 resolved and in such cases the  
 communities continue to ob-  
 tain Mexican nationals under the  
 Migrant Labor Agreement to the  
 extent that there is a demon-  
 strated need for their services.  
 If you have any further ques-  
 tion concerning this matter,  
 please do not hesitate to com-  
 municate with me.
