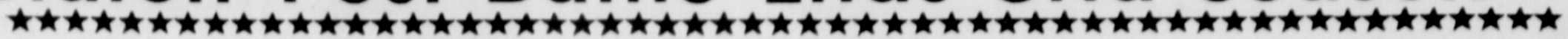

### COUNTY BALKS ON DIVISION STREET WORK

# Paving Project Halted

Lubbock County Commissioners, in a split vote Tuesday, issued a stop order on the paving of Division Street within the city limits of Slaton.

The action caught Slaton officials by surprise and left Division Street, an extension of F-M Road 41, in almost an impassable condition in places. Workmen were attempting to "smooth out" some spots Wednesday morning.

County commissioners became involved in a debate Tuesday over the paving policies within towns in the county, and the decision to cancel the street project in Slaton for the time being came on a split 2-2 vote with new County Judge Rod Shaw casting the deciding "no" vote.

Commissioners Alton Brazell and Arch Lamb contended that a policy of the court forbids the county from paving or maintaining streets within towns when the town has authorized curbs and gutters and has assessed abutting property owners for the cost.

The pair pointed out that although this may not be on the minutes of the court, it has been followed in respect to

similar projects in other towns in the county.

Commissioner George Green of Slaton contended that the work should be allowed to continue since a contract has already been let and construction started.

Brazell responded that the contract was let for a 20-foot strip without curbs and gutters and that if the City of Slaton wants curbs and gutters to make a fully developed street, the city should pay for it.

Commissioner Les Derrick proposed that Green be given time to discuss the construction with Slaton officials and attempt to work out a solution. However, Brazell urged immediate passage of a cancellation motion.

Brazell, seconded by Lamb, moved that the street project be cancelled for the time being and that the county judge be authorized to notify Lubbock Engineering Co., the contractor, and the City of Slaton of the stop order.

Brazell and Lamb voted for the motion, while Green and Derrick voted against. Shaw, sworn in as county judge before the session, cast the tie-breaking vote for the stop order on the Slaton project.

The Slatonite was unable to contact Green or any city officials Wednesday. Mayor Jonas Cain and other city officials were out of town Wednesday, attending a meeting at the Canadian River Dam Site, so they were also unavailable to comment.

Slaton citizens approved the street project, along with public works improvements, in a \$350,000 bond election Sept. 1. It was understood here, and

### Scouting Fund Drive Launched

A "dawn to dusk" Boy Scout finance campaign was held here Tuesday, and the drive was to continue this week as workers attempted to close out the project as soon as possible.

More than \$2,100 was solicited in the big push Tuesday. Officials hope the total climbs past the \$3,000 mark before the drive is complete.

A kickoff breakfast of volunteer workers launched the campaign Tuesday morning. About 60 men turned out for the early-morning meeting. Doug Galassini, community chairman, and Dr. Lee Vardy, general solicitations chairman, had charge of the meeting.

Also present were Dr. Bob Arnold, MacKenzie Trail district chairman, Merlin Doreberry, district financial chairman, both of Lubbock, and Leon Miller, district Boy Scout executive.

Five majors and 25 captains were appointed here to head up the campaign drive. Each captain had five lieutenants on his team to take prospect cards and solicit contributions.

### Monthly Police Report Given

The Slaton Police Department investigated 30 reported offenses, jailed 71 persons and issued 62 traffic violation tickets during the month of October, a report from Chief Robert Breedlove revealed this week.

Police also issued 79 traffic warnings and investigated five vehicle traffic accidents the past month. The two police units logged 5,489 miles in patrol duty, and also made five arrests for county or state officials.

Burglary and theft, with 9 and 8 cases reported, led the list of 30 offenses. A total of 7 offenses were cleared during the month. Drunkenness topped the jail arrests with 31 being listed.

Traffic arrests included 13 driving in a dangerous manner and 10 for driving without a license. Only 5 of the 62 arrests were for speeding.

Total fines collected on jail arrests were \$1,882. Fines paid for traffic tickets totaled \$305. Damage was estimated at \$1,933 in the five accidents logged in the city during October.

### Commission Approves Financial Statement

Slaton City Commission approved a six-month financial statement, discussed a rewiring job for the fire station, and heard a report from the special water board during a regular meeting Monday night at City Hall.

The financial statement, prepared by CPA John P. Haggard of Morton, covered the period from April through September. Revenue totaled \$90,527 while expenditures reflected a total of \$87,947.

Charges for current services totaled \$78,069 with the police street and sanitation departments accounting for more than \$53,000 of that amount. The accountant cited an improvement in the bookkeeping system and said some improvement was noted in the system of internal control.

Tommie Wallace made a report from the water study group, announcing that discussions had been held with two landowners concerning the testing of wells on their property. Negotiations may be discussed if the tests prove adequate for a municipal water supply.

Fire Chief Don Kendrick reported on two estimates for a rewiring job at the fire station, terming the work a necessity for the future. The current budget provides for the work. After a brief discussion, Kendrick was authorized to check further

into the cost.

The commission approved new street lights for 4th and Division and for 1st and Geneva and also approved monthly bills. Two inter-department transfers were approved as requested by City Secretary Bobby Sokoll.

### Traffic Survey Given By Chief

Slaton has logged 99 accidents in the city through October, it was reported this week by Police Chief Robert Breedlove.

The traffic survey released by the chief also showed the two major causes of accidents were following too close and failing to yield right-of-way.

The report listed 38 of the 90 accidents as occurring on 9th St. The immediate downtown area was tabbed for 30 percent of the wrecks.

Breedlove said speed was a contributing factor in most all accidents-- "not necessarily exceeding the speed limit but driving too fast for existing conditions."

The city has two traffic fatalities this year, and a total of 28 persons have been injured. Breedlove urged motorists to "think defensively; drive defensively."

## Fire Hazards Found In Town Inspection Here

A total of 175 potential fire hazards were uncovered in Slaton during the Town Inspection program conducted Oct. 29, it was revealed this week by Don Kendrick, local coordinator.

"Any one of these hazards could mean disaster to Slaton unless checked," it was pointed out by R.S. Thompson of Lubbock, Town Inspection chairman of the West Texas division of the Texas Insurance Fieldman's Association. And further, he pointed out that it is to each building owner's and tenant's advantage to see that the fire dangers on his premises are corrected, since fire records kept by other Texas communities which have been inspected and followed up these

inspections, show substantially reduced fire losses.

A study of the effectiveness of 72 town inspections showed the average fire loss ratio decreased 8 percent during the 3-year period following the inspection.

One community reported that fire losses hit a 30-year low. Ennis switched from a five per cent fire insurance rate penalty to a twenty per cent credit after its inspection and follow-up. Wichita Falls received a similar credit the following year, saving its business community more than \$100,000 in insurance bills.

Texas' biggest drop in net fire losses following an inspection was registered at Brown. (See FIRE on Page 11)

All but the latter three have been regulars this season, and Luman has started at times. Smith has been a standout and on offense and defense along with other double-duty performers like Stephens, Henington, Hurst, Hunter, Brake and Gamble. Ball has been an offensive guard stalwart all season.

The Slaton-Post grid rivalry started in 1924 with a 13-2 Tiger victory. Slaton has won 16 of the 30 games played between the schools. There have been three ties in the series, but Slaton claimed victories by penetrations in all three of these games.

## Texas Schools Get More In Lunch Funds For '64

Texas schools will get a larger share than last year of national school lunch funds allotted to the states by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The increase amounts to \$214,264, which runs the total state allotment for the current school year to \$6,645,427, according to John J. Slaughter, southwest area, food distribution division, Agricultural Marketing Service, Dallas.

The USDA office works with the school lunch division, Texas Education Agency, in handling the school lunch program. The increase in the Texas allotment reflects the \$9 million increase in national funds which total nearly \$130 million for the current school year, explains Mr. Slaughter.

Each state receives school lunch funds on the basis of the number of USDA Type A lunches served during the 1963-64 school year and adjusted by the state per capita income.

This federal money helps elementary and high school students get wholesome lunches at the lowest possible cost, for it is used to pay the school a certain sum for every Type A lunch served a student.

Rate of payment for each lunch is determined by the state agency, but it usually represents 10 to 20 percent of the cost of the lunch to the student.

On the national average, federal assistance in cash, plus foods donated by USDA, make up slightly more than 20 percent of the cost of school lunches. Payments from children account for nearly 60 percent while state and local sources provide the remainder.

Only schools serving Type A lunches under the national school lunch program will share in this \$6,645,427 cash allotment to Texas.

## Recipe Of The Week

The past years being, mother, housewife, mender, patcher, sewer, "referee", dishwasher, ironer, and cooker.

As one of her many recipes a favorite of hers is:

**Potato Cake**  
 2 cups flour  
 2 Tablespoons cocoa  
 1 teaspoon baking powder  
 1 teaspoon soda  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 2 cups sugar  
 1/2 cup butter or oleo  
 1 cup warm mashed potatoes  
 1/2 cup sweet milk  
 1 cup nut meats chopped fine or ground  
 4 eggs: beaten separately

Mix together flour, cocoa, baking powder, and salt. Beat egg whites and set aside. Beat egg yolks and add to butter, sugar, and mashed potatoes. Mix well. Add milk and flour mixture alternately. Add nut meats and beat well. Fold in egg whites. Bake in three large layer cake pans at 350 degrees, 25 to 30 minutes until done.

**FILLING**  
 1 cup cream or evaporated milk  
 1 cup nuts  
 1 cup sugar  
 3 egg yolks  
 1 box coconut  
 lump of butter size of small egg

Cook mixture together until thick, stirring slowly and constantly. Beat well and put between layers and on top and sides of cake. To grind the nuts and coconut makes a smoother and moister filling.

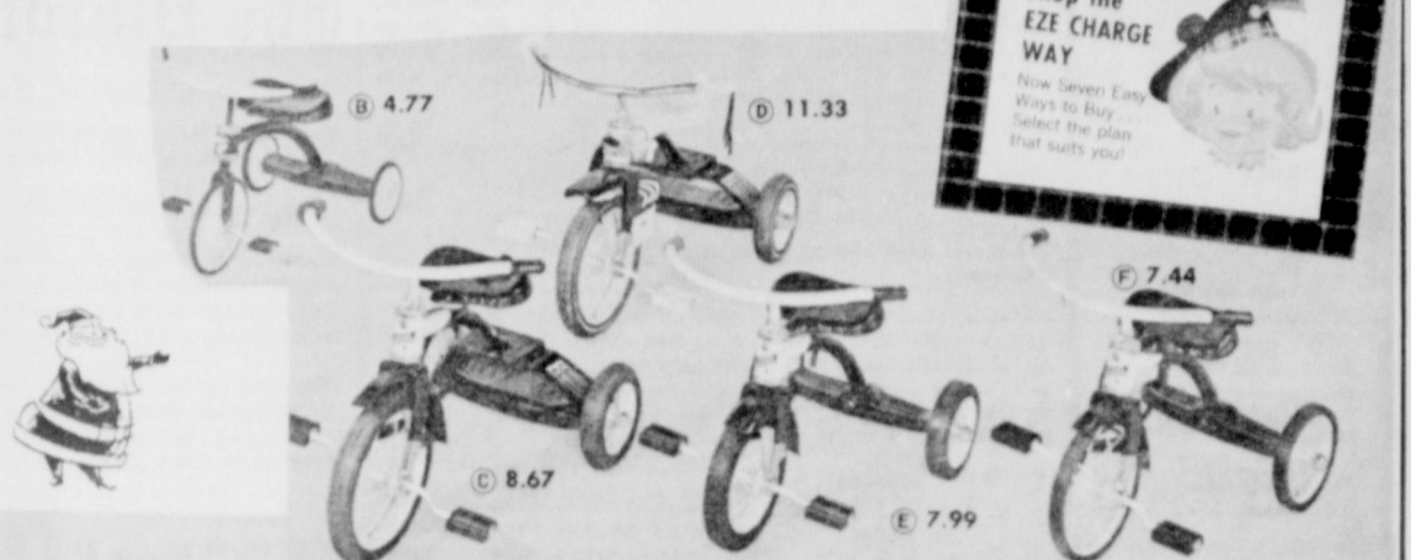





field, which was checked by the West Texas division of the Texas Insurance Fieldman's Association. Before the tour of inspection and follow-up in 1952, Brownfield had suffered a year's fire loss of more than \$173,000. During the following year it was cut to \$26,000.

Thompson said the Slaton Fire Department will conduct the follow-up examination which will be held about Nov. 30. Normally, such a follow-up check is executed 30 days following a fire hazard inspection by the Fieldman's Association. The West Texas division of the organization spent a complete day checking city, churches, schools and businesses last month.

Thompson, while defining a hazard as any material, equipment or situation which lends itself to the start and maintenance of fire, noted that the number of hazards found here was not uncommon for a town of this size.

At the time of the inspection, the visiting fire detectives tagged each potential hazard with a "fix-me" tag, and in addition gave building owners booklets listing the hazards along with suggestions for correcting them.

The largest number of red tags, as usual, was attached to faulty wiring and electrical connection. Thompson advised that building owners get qualified electricians to repair wiring rather than trying to do it themselves.

"It is now up to all of us to see that the follow-up is carried through as successfully as the inspection," said Goebel.

## Farm Bureau Chief Cites Drop In Realized Net Farm Income

HOUSTON—Texas Farm Bureau President C. H. DeVaney said Monday agriculture is faced with the "unhappy spectacle" of close to 20 percent of farmer's realized net income in 1964 being paid from the Federal Treasury.

In his address to the TFB's 31st annual meeting at the Rice Hotel, DeVaney told the county Farm Bureau leaders from 231 organized counties that the parity ratio in 1963 averaged the lowest since 1939.

"The current parity ratio is 75 percent and may average even lower for the entire year of 1964 than for 1963," DeVaney said. "It realized net farm income at \$2.5 billions

was down \$100 million in 1963 from 1962. The current USDA estimate is that realized net farm income will be down at least another \$200 million more in 1964."

He said that the USDA projection for 1964 is that \$2.1 billion will come from government payments to farmers.

"Thus, we are faced," he said, "with the unhappy spectacle of close to 20 percent of the realized net farm income being paid to farmers from the Federal Treasury."

The Texas farm leader pointed out that a long list of government programs will either expire in 1965 or will be up for review.

### Crew Leader For Census Named

Edward Max Richter of Lubbock has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture, it was announced recently by the U.S. of the Census at Dallas.

The new crew leader is one of about 1,825 persons throughout the U.S. to receive this appointment. He will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms and ranches in Lubbock County to collect official census questionnaires from farm operators.

"When Congress starts considering these programs, many important and controversial subject will be considered, such as multiple prices for farm commodities, use of certificates and CCC loans to depress market prices, Brannan-type payments to supplement depressed market prices, transfer of acreage allotments, the sale of acreage allotments to government or to other producers, land diversion on a year-to-year basis, the control of diverted acres, minimum allotments for small growers, minimum national allotments, price support policy, U.S. policy with respect to im-

ports of commodities that are subject to domestic control programs, and international commodity agreements.

He stressed that Farm Bureau members should develop definite positions on all of these programs and issues involved.

DeVaney said that both the state and national Farm Bureaus this year will institute a new approach to assure fullest understanding by Congress of Farm Bureau's policies before Congress convenes in January.

He said county Farm Bureau leaders would meet with their respective Congressmen immediately following adoption of national policies at the American Farm Bureau Federation convention in December in Philadelphia.

The TFB leader said that in other years some Congressmen had become committed to other programs before they had an opportunity to understand what the nation's largest farm organization proposes.
