


Change To Be Made In Charge


### Rev. Townsend To Lead **Revival Here**



### **Farm Facts**

According to Francis E. Clark, U. S. Department of Agriculture microbiologist, earthworms are to be considered an indication of good soil fertility rather than its

Sharp differences of opinion exist, he says, concerning the relationship of earthworms to soil fertility. Some people insist that earthworms almost singlehandedly are re-sponsible for good fertility. Clark notes in the USDA's Yearbook of Agriculture that such a viewpoint has little basis in fact. He says organic residues ejected by earth-worms are poorer in nutrients than the original residues in-

The beneficial effects of earthworms on plant growth are largely those associated with improved aeration and improved tilth. They are im-

THE SLATON SLATONITE

City Government has many facets and many responsibilitie one of which is the collection and disposal of trash and garage. For many years the city tried to pick up trash and garhage in an old flat bed truck. Of course, this was inadequate do the job right so a packer type truck was bought at a ost of \$5,901.86 in September of 1948. This was a welcome ddition to the sanitation department and enabled them to eally take care of the situation for the first time. The cost f this equipment and the added cost of personnel was taken are of by taxes until June of 1956 when the first ordinance vas passed placing a \$1.00 per month charge on this service.

Professional men, business men, housewives, in fact almost very one realizes the problem that exists today in keeping ncome abreast of ever rising costs. The expense budget for he sanitation department this year is \$23,746.95. The \$1.00 er month service charge will bring in approximately \$20,-00.00 this year. In addition to this the commission has found hemselves faced with the problem of putting on an additional ruck to take care of the expanded needs of the city. This truck was purchased for \$6,470.00 and will call for additional personnel of at least two men. This truck will be used pronarily in the downtown area and to pick up larger pieces

of scrap or junk that is placed in the residential alleys.

It has been the practice of the department to make one bick-up each week in the residential area and from one to six pick-ups per week in the downtown area. Of course when weather nterfered or in case of equipment failures this schedule could ot be religiously followed. In the beginning or some five years o when our sanitary ordinance was first passed the \$1.00 month charge was adequate to take care of the expense the department thereby releiving the tax department of this ditional burden. As each year passed it was found that the ost was increasing with the increase of population and ded demand for service. Being aware of this situation e commission has run three different surveys on cost f collection, particularly in the downtown area where serice is required each day. The first survey was made in December of 1958 and the other in November of 1960 and ugust 1961. In the majority of cases it was found that the 1.00 per month charge was inadequate to take care of the ost of services to businesses. In fact in some cases the cost on some businesses ran from \$3.50 to just under \$60.00 ber month. These surveys were made only on cost of picking up trash and rubbish and not including the trip to the camyon

Taking all of the foregoing into consideration the commission has decided to increase the minimum charge to businesses to \$1.50 per month and where the survey shows the costs to be considerably higher than this to make an additional charge in accordance with approximate costs. 





### First Attempt --

It was agreed by mutual consent to keep the City Hall rest noon and Sunday to acommodate transient workers.

Mr. L. R. Gregory, Civil Defense Director, appeared before safe construction.

Chief Martin was present and the Commission advised him that they had had some complaints from citizens regarding the riding of bicycles on the sidewalks and suggested that he publicize the fact that there is an ordinance against riding

The Commission had studied surveys made on collection of trash and rubbish in the downtown area at two previous meetings and came to the following conclusions - that the \$1.00 per month sanitation charge was inadequate in the downtown area and that it would be necessary to raise the minimum charge to \$1.50 per month and where the survey showed the cost to be greater to charge in accordance to costs, to mail a letter of explanation to each of the businessmen that were charged more than the minimum of \$1.50 per month, and to have amendment to the sanitary ordinance prepared for the next meeting of the Commission.





A group of housewives in a small town in Ohio started a movement several years ago that currently is still causing ripples across the nation.

The housewives, like mothers everywhere, had given countless hours of valuable time to work as volunteers in ringing doorbells for charity drives. Finally, they decided they had had enough. They called a halt to the 41 separate drives held each year in their community.

They staged one health drive, took the proceeds and offered the funds to national health organizations, All but one, the

Fund-raising for health purposes in these United States is mighty big business . . . last year 40 of the big independent national health organizations ... with the Red Cross.,raised well over \$200,000,000 ... figure that cannot be pinpointed exactly because one agency, the National Foundation, does not reveal

And many of the big organizations have plush operations. In a report last March, Look magazine reported that the National Foundation does not pay its head man, Basil O'Connor, a salary but in one year his personal traveling expenses account amounted to \$72,000.

The same outfit also paid \$25,000 to a public relations firm in New York for putting on one dinner. It also sent a man to Europe, as well as all around this country, to find especially photogenic young victims of paralysis to ride in the polio float in a Rose Bowl parade.

United Fund in Andrews or any other community in the nation for fear that "it would lose its inherent educational value."

Of the \$200,000,000 raised by the big national health organizations, do you know how much money went into research for cancer, polio, birth defects, arthritis, and all the other special ills of the human race? A total of \$35 million!

And at the same time, the federal government's expenditures in health research, incidentally, totaled \$30,000, 000. And the funds went to research in heart, cancer, mental disease and other fields which are the specialties of the 40 national volunteer health organizations.

This is not to say that many of the nation's health organizations do not have a vital, necessary place in providing funds to meet the many and varied needs of charitable institutions.

But it does point up the need for some means by which the work of the organizations and their needs can be carefully scrutinized and studied.

And in Andrews, we believe the most effective outfit for such a task is the United Fund organization.

Goals or quotas established by the various agencies are carefully studied for actual need and comparisons are made with other communities of like size and quality.

And above all, a one-drivefor-all curtails the valuable loss of time--and dollars-inherent in multiple drives for funds.

For example, here in Andrews, 87 per cent of the funds received by the United Fund comes from two sources: businessmen and their employee, and from school personnel.

For them, the biggest backers of local charity...the most efficient, orderly, non-timeconsuming method of dealing with charity and health organizations is through the United

And the people who foot the bill should be able to call the tune; and if they want to give and donate their time once-through the United Fund-- and that's all, then that's the way the ball should be bounced.

in the food industries. University experiment stations and food agencies have checked teenagers' eating habits, Different investigations have

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


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
