## Public Works Plan Outlined

The fate of a \$350,000 Slaton capital improvements program hinges on the outcome of a bond election here Tuesday when voters go to the polls to decide whether or not the community moves forward with vital water, sewer and street projects.

Absentee voting had been light early this week, and officials doubt if half of the 1,200 eligible voters turn out for the important balloting.

Purpose of the election is to vote on the issuance of \$350,000 in general obligation bonds with more than half of that amount tabbed for water improvements. The public works proposal includes about \$200,000 for the water department, \$120,000 for the street department and \$30,000 for the sewer department. Voting will be in City Hall from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Deadline on absentee voting is 5 p.m. Friday in the city secretary's office.

Proponents of the city improvements are optimistic about the bond election, since a charter amendment to raise the tax rate was recently approved by a 2.6 to 1 margin. They point out that issuance of the bonds will not alter the tax rate as it will be \$25 voted earlier.

Officials call the project a "must" for the city if it is to have adequate water reserves, ample sewerage facilities, and maintenance of streets.

Passage of the charter amendment to raise the tax rate provided the city with more paying ability, thus making it possible to obtain capital financing. Officials point out that the issuance of bonds is least expensive for the taxpayer, compared to issuing refundable warrants at higher interest.

The \$200,000 in waterworks improvements would provide for additional wells and pipe lines, updating the distribution system, and building a new pump station. (See VOTE, Page 6)

# School Bells Ring Monday

It's "back to the salt mines" for Slaton youngsters Monday when school bells ring again for more than 2,000 students in the Railway City.

All students will report to school at 9:00 a.m. Monday for enrollment, books will be issued and regular classroom work will follow throughout the day. First-grade students will be dismissed at noon during the first two weeks

of school. Cafeterias at junior high, West Ward and Evans will be open for business on the first day of school and buses will make their regular routes.

Teachers will start to school today, attending a pre-school workshop Saturday. Emphasis in the workshops will be on teaching machines and their uses.

Dr. Lee Vardy, veteran Slaton superintendent, said general organization of the schools will also be perfected in the workshops.

School insurance will be available for students again this year, costing \$6 for coverage during school hours and \$12 for full coverage. All beginning pupils are required to present birth certificates and proof of smallpox vaccinations. Immunization is also recommended for whooping cough, tetanus, diphtheria and polio.

Dr. Vardy explained the early start of school was made necessary because of a "late" Labor Day. Students will receive a holiday Sept. 7 for Labor Day.

The superintendent released a faculty list of some 89 teachers this week. Aiding in administration are Mrs. Ruth Smoot, supervisor; Mrs. Grace Dodson, school nurse; and Susan Antrobus speech therapist.

# Wilson Schools Open Monday

Registration for Wilson High School students will be held Friday, and classes for all students begin Monday. It has been announced by Supt. Leroy Scott.

Wilson schools will be integrated this term, also. The school board decided last week. Negro students had previously been served by bus from the Slaton Independent School District. Seven Negroes are expected to attend the Wilson schools.

One of the principal immediate reasons for the integration action was reported to be the fact that Slaton would not accept the transfer of Negro students this year. Signing of the Civil Rights bill and threat of discontinued Federal aid on lunchroom and vocational programs were also mentioned.

The Friday registration schedule includes seniors from 8 to 10 a.m., juniors from 10 until noon, sophomores from 1 to 2:30 p.m., and freshmen from 2:30 to 4. Elementary and junior high students will register the first day of school.

A faculty meeting scheduled today at 9 a.m. School will start at 8:40 a.m. Monday and dismiss at 2:30. Buses will make their routes the opening day and lunch will be served at the school cafeteria.

First-grade students will be dismissed at 2 p.m. during the first six weeks of school, then they will stay until 3 p.m.

## 7th Annual Barbecue Set

Slaton's seventh annual Farmer-Merchant Barbecue has been set for Sept. 8 beginning at 7 p.m. in Little League Park. It was announced this week by Jay Gray, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce barbecue arrangements committee.

Presentations of cotton harvest awards are to be made at the barbecue—\$150 for the first bale, \$100 for the second and \$50 for the third. Door prizes, selected by the C of C from Slaton merchants, are also to be given farmers attending the event.

Tickets are to be distributed by 15 participating gins. The Chamber of Commerce stressed this week that financial support of ticket sales is still needed from some local merchants.

Albert Artison and a crew of about 50 youngsters pulled the cotton, starting Tuesday morning. It took about four hours.

Wayne Banks is co-chairman of this year's arrangement committee. In case of bad weather, the barbecue will be changed to Sept. 15, Gray announced.

Davis planted the DeKalb 302 cotton April 17. He used 80-80-40 fertilizer and is now watering the cotton for the fifth time. The gin ticket showed 2,040 pounds of seed cotton when Davis weighed in, Ralph Mires is gin manager at McClung Gin.

## Suspect Held In Shooting

Charges were expected to be filed Wednesday in connection with the shooting early Sunday morning of Arnold Aguirre, 20, of Slaton.

Aguirre, according to police investigation, was shot following an argument over a pool game. In response to a call, the victim was found on the ground near Mercy Hospital about 4 a.m. Sunday. He was rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock with a wound in the right side of his chest.

The shooting victim remained hospitalized Wednesday. A suspect will be held here, and Police Chief Robert Bredelove said charges would probably be filed Wednesday.

In another shooting incident, Willie Franklin of Slaton told officers a woman shot at him while he was driving down Geneva Street Sunday night. A bullet pierced the door on the driver's side of the car. Officers investigated the incident but no charges were filed when a complaint was not signed.

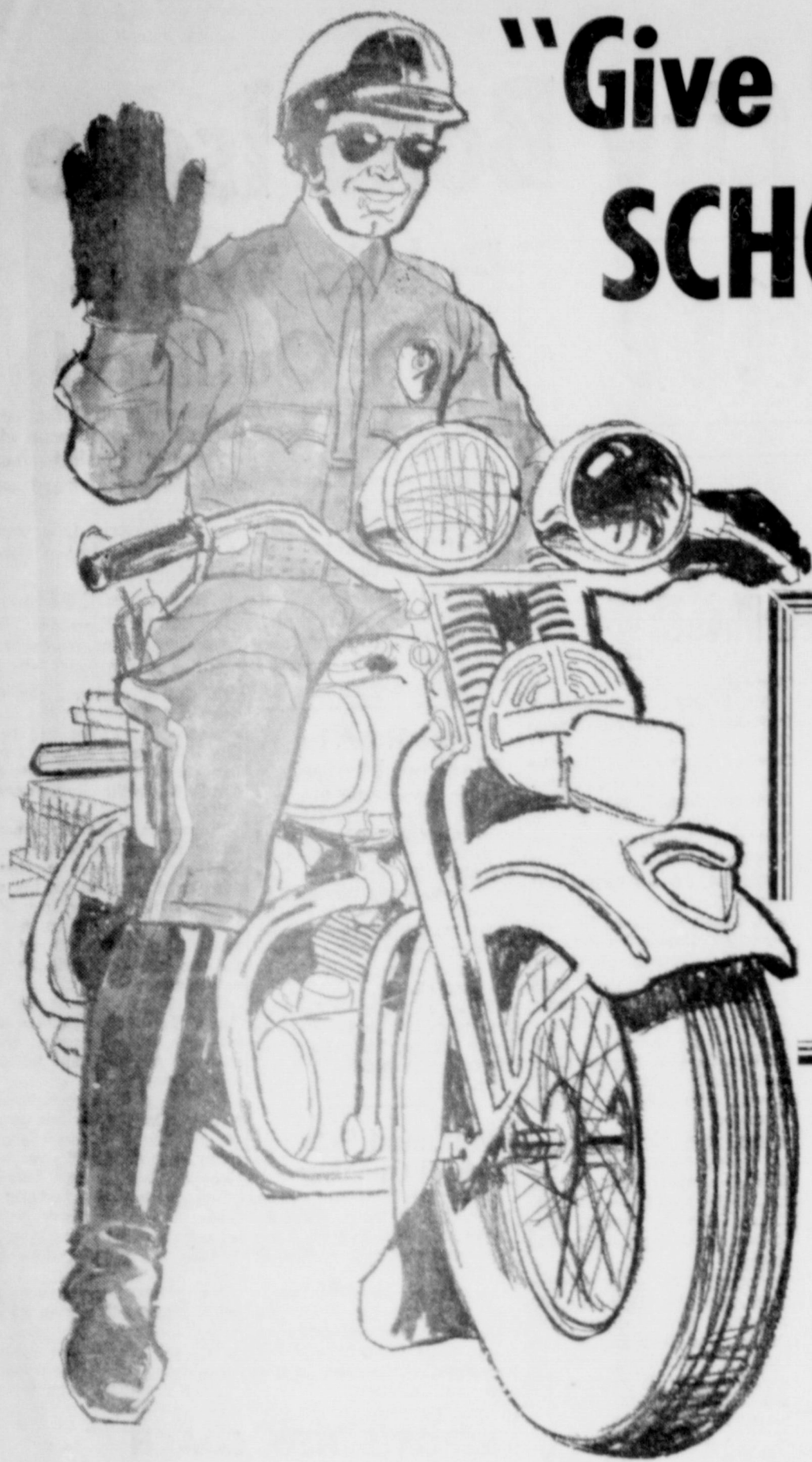

### Schmid Is Speaker Rotary Meeting

Edis P. Schmid, retired Army major, spoke from actual experiences while stationed in the far East. He thinks the written language of the country is a drawback to the economy.

He explained that the Japanese have some 18,000 characters in their "alphabet." This makes correspondence very difficult, and much of it is handwritten. Japanese typewriters are large, complicated machines due to the large number of characters used.

The low income group of the country makes an average wage of about \$12 to \$20 a month. Schmid said there is hardly a middle income group — most citizens are either poor or rich.

American troops served as a big boost to the economy immediately after World War II. Schmid said some communist groups came out with "Yankee Go Home" signs on occasions, but the Japanese businessmen and most of the people did not share this feeling.

The Shinto religious sect is the leader in Japan, but in recent years the people have shown less interest and many are changing to Buddhism or Christianity.

Railways are the primary mode of transportation in Japan. Until recently there were few autos and few roads. Gasoline has been very expensive. Most of the trains are electric, while many have ve-

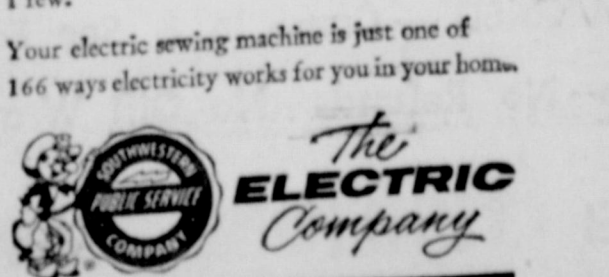

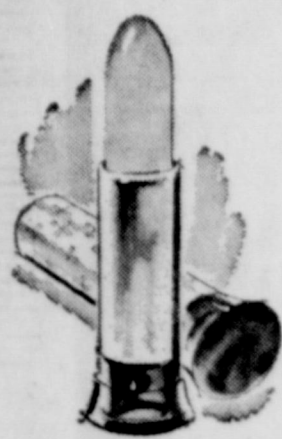

Cam Jordan, cemetery chief, reported that 1,400,000 gallons of water had been used in the original (East Englewood) cemetery the past month.

for better water pressure.

The city is not scheduled to receive Canadian water until 1967 or 1968, and officials say more wells are needed to avoid a shortage next summer. Too, the maximum load from the Canadian River is not expected to supply peak summer needs.

The estimated \$30,000 for the sewer department would provide additional collection lines and a lift station which are needed in the southeastern section of Slaton.

The city has an investment of more than \$500,000 in streets, and many of them are now in need of repair. The \$120,000 proposed for street improvements would include \$40,000 for repairs, \$10,000 for improving Division Street — a main artery in the system, and \$70,000 for paving new streets.

The cost to the city in re-working Division Street would be only for new curbs and gutters. The county is to pay the cost of paving on the street, which is one of the main access roads to the highway by-pass to FM 41.

Eligible voters are any residents of Slaton who have rendered property on the current approved City tax roll, who have lived in Texas one year and Lubbock County six months prior to the election, who live in the City of Slaton on the day of the election, and who have poll tax receipts or exemptions.

"If dilatory tactics continue, closure will be forthcoming."

**Police Chief Urges Curfew Cooperation**

Slaton Police Chief Robert Breedlove this week appealed to parents of sub-minors for their co-operation in the enforcement of the city's new curfew ordinance.

The ordinance, which officially went into effect Aug. 19, prohibits children under 17 years of age from being in any public place or establishment between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m., except when accompanied by parents or on legitimate business. The curfew is extended to midnight on Saturdays.

Parents, or business operators, are subject to a fine not exceeding \$300 for permitting violations of the curfew law.

"We hope to administer this law with as few fines as possible," Breedlove stated. He explained that minors and their parents will be required to meet with the Slaton Youth Council board after second offenses. Violators can be fined if convicted after a second offense.

The Youth Council was recently formed as a voluntary community counseling board. It has no official power but will study each case presented and make recommendations. Chief Breedlove cited the board for its work, stating that one youth had al-

ready been saved from going to the state reformatory.

Under the new curfew ordinance, the chief explained that violators would simply be issued a ticket on first offense and would not be taken to police headquarters unless there are unusual circumstances.

The sub-minor will be given a ticket, and the police will keep a copy for their files. Parents will be notified the following morning. Issuance of tickets will not go in to permanent police records.

The provisions of the curfew law do not apply to any sub-minor accompanied by a parent, or to one who is on an errand or other legitimate business directed by the parent, or to any sub-minor who is lawfully employed during the curfew hours.

Chief Breedlove indicated the curfew ordinance is on file at police headquarters if any person desires to read the provisions.

SECTION 2: It shall be unlawful for any person to peep in windows, eavesdrop or pry into the affairs of others thus invading the privacy of homes; and such conduct is calculated to provoke breaches of the peace, and good order, assaults and batteries, fighting, quarreling, abusive, obscene, profane and insulting language and disorderly conduct. And whereas, it is desirable to prevent all such conduct to preserve the peace, and secure the inhabitants of this city in the peaceful possession and enjoyment of their homes and property.

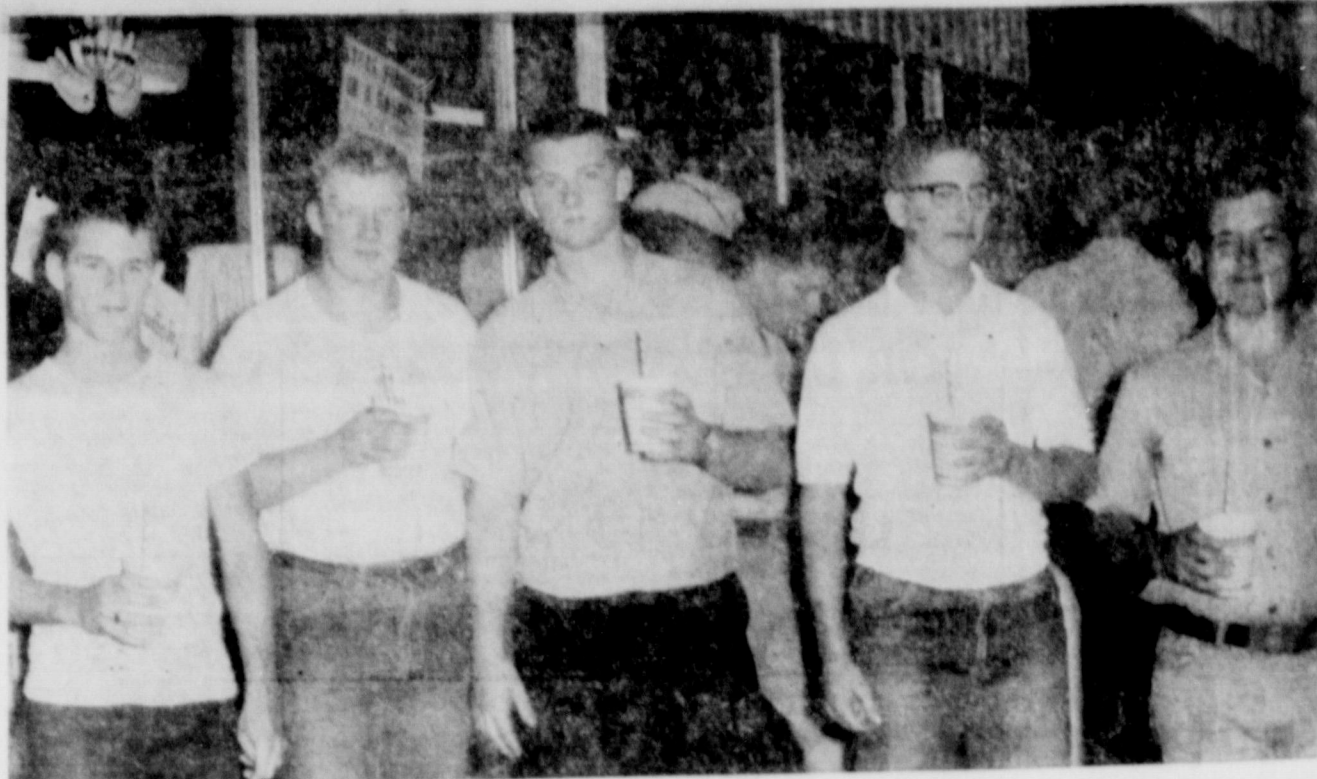

# HERE ARE THE ANSWERS TO SOME QUESTIONS

ABOUT THE COMING

## BOND ELECTION

Q: When will the election be held?

A: Tuesday, Sept. 1, 1964.

Q: When will the polls open and close?

A: Open at 8 a.m., close at 7 p.m.

Q: Where will the election be held?

A: At Slaton City Hall.

Q: Can a voter cast an absentee ballot?

A: Yes, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the city secretary's office in city hall. Deadline is 5 p.m. Friday, Aug. 28.

Q: What is the purpose of the election?

A: To vote on \$350,000 in general obligation bonds for water, sewer and street improvements.

Q: Who may vote in the election?

A: Any resident of the City of Slaton who has rendered his property on the current approved City tax roll; who has lived in Texas one year and Lubbock County six months prior to the election; who lives in the City of Slaton on the day of the election, and who has paid his or her poll tax or has an exemption.

Q: How will the bond funds be used?

A: (1) Water department proportion, \$200,000. Includes about \$75,000 for additional wells and pipe line to avoid water shortage prior to receiving Canadian River water. Estimated \$70,000 for improving distribution system in various parts of town, especially in eastern section, and \$55,000 for new pump station in southwest part of town.

(2) Sewer department proportion, \$30,000. For additional collection lines and a lift station in southeastern part of town.

(3) Street improvement proportion, \$120,000. This includes \$40,000 for repairs of existing streets, \$10,000 for replacing curbs and gutters on Division Street, and \$70,000 for new paving. Division Street is to be replaced, with the county paying for the paving, and the city

bearing only the cost of curbs and General Street, from 9th to Flint, paved under new paving and several streets should be paved.

Q: Why call for a bond election so soon election to amend the charter?

A: The charter amendment, which limits tax rate from \$1.50 to \$2, provided with paying ability. It did not, however, provide the immediate money needed for essential public works projects. It is for the City to obtain credit to fund projects, and it has two avenues of capital financing — issuance of bonds and warrants which can be refinanced.

Q: Why is it more realistic for the City bonds rather than warrants?

A: The issuance of bonds by the City requires consent of property owners; the warrants does not. The City chooses bonds for the same reason it chooses rate increase over revaluation — IT'S BETTER FOR YOU, THE TAXPAYER. Interest on bonds will be approximately less than interest on warrants for period of time.

Q: Can any of the funds from the bonds be used to pay current operating expenses or pay current debt?

A: Funds generated from the bond election will be used as outlined when issued.

Q: How much will these bonds increase taxes?

A: None, other than that increase which results from the charter amendment. Slaton approved the charter amendment which increased the rate from 2.6 to 1 margin. The bonds will not raise the new \$2 rate. The rate of the bond issue will not increase.

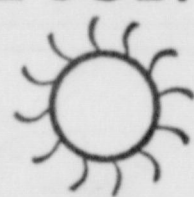

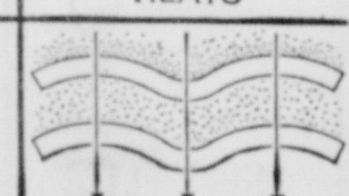

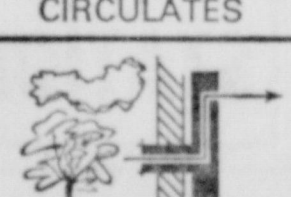
