Coach Chastain pronounced his team is in fine physical shape Wednesday and reported a good, hard-hitting workout Tuesday afternoon. The starting offensive and defensive units will be about the same as last week with a few possible exceptions.

The Tigers coach indicated that full back John Henry Johnson had been promoted from the B-Team and was showing up good in practice. He could be an offensive starter or see lots of action. End Larry Luman may be another new offensive starter.

Big Roger Buxkemper, a converted fullback, is battling for a starting berth as an offensive guard. Mike Ball and Larry Bownds, along with Danny Scott, have been holding down the two posts. Phil Goad will probably man a defensive halfback spot this week along with Johnny Henington.

Chastain said Henington, after two weeks of stand-out gaining, continued to look good in workouts. Billy Gass will get the call at quarterback again tomorrow night.

The Tigers started slow this season, losing to Petersburg and Idalou by 18-0 and 32-0 straight victories while allowing only one touch-down. Slaton has scored only five touch-downs, and three came in last week's win over O'Donnell.

Lockney got a rest last week after posting a 3-1 win-loss mark in four outings. The Longhorns defeated Hale Center by 15-14, Kress by 27-0, then lost to Petersburg by 44-20 in a game closer than the score indicated. The Horns then came back to down a strong Rams team by 20-17.

Coach Doc Mize has 15 Lockney returning letterman including about five starters from last year. The Horns boast speed and good scoring potential and, if they have a weak point, it could be defense.

Comparative scores are no help for the upcoming contest. Petersburg beat Slaton by 11 points and beat Lockney by 24. On the other hand, Slaton beat Crosbyton in a close game and Ralls (7-20 loser to Lockney) stomped Crosbyton by 50-8.

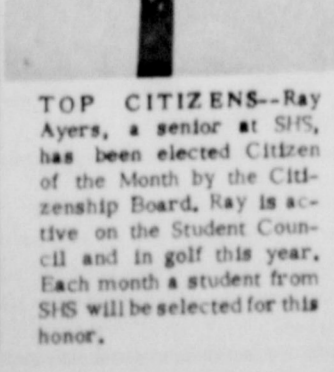
## City Officials At Conference

Farmers around the Slaton area are hoping for dry and windy weather, preferably a their cotton and get it ready.

Production estimates in the South Plains area dipped a little, according to October reports, but farm observers still are The Lubbock County estimate dropped from 260,000 bales in the September release to 250,000 the first of the month.

The estimates are provided by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange. The Lynn County estimat, which takes in Wilson and other neighboring communities to the south, remained at 100,000 bales. It took a big dip last month.

Some of the irrigated cotton is opening, but there is a wide variety around. Continued dry weather could spur the use of defoliant, observers say, to prepare the crops for mechanical stripping and earlier harvesting.

Most farmers feel that recent cool, damp weather has resulted in no significant damage to the cotton, although maturity has been slowed somewhat.

The USDA classing office in Lubbock reported Saturday that only 4, 473 bales of the 1964 crop had been classed. Approximately 100 bales had been produced by three local gins this week.

Hartman, who has managed the store here since January, 1963, announced that all of the same sales force has been retained.

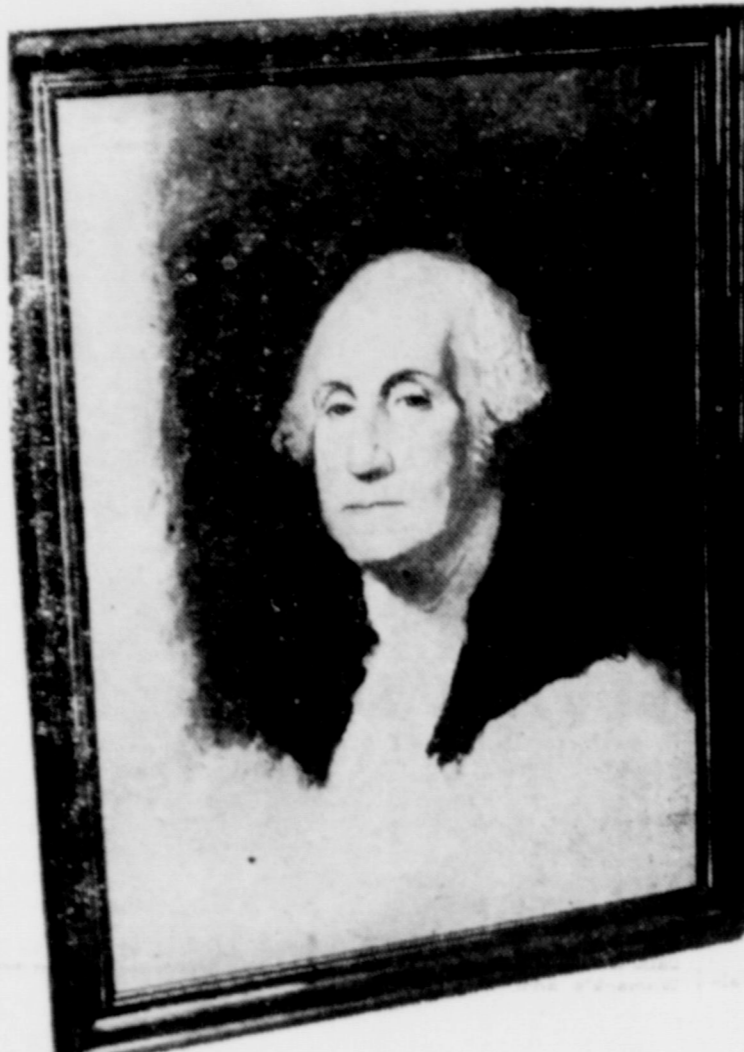

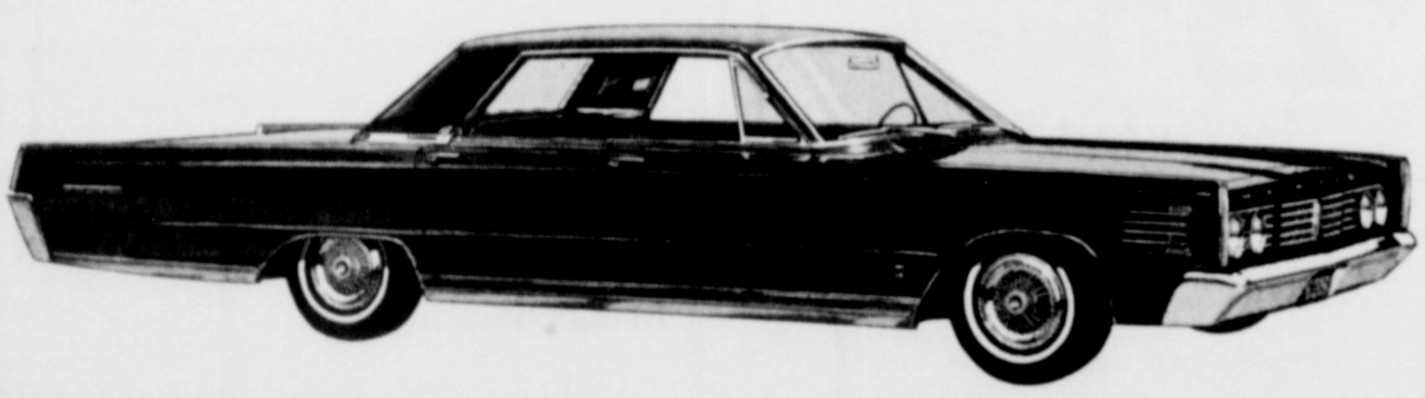

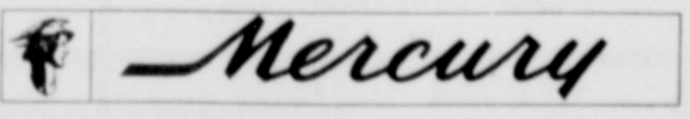

# Tigers Trim O'Donnell For 3rd Win

Slaton's Tigers captured their third straight victory of the 1964 grid season here Friday night, coming back strong in the second half to nail down a 20 to 0 thumping of the O'Donnell Eagles.

The triumph gave the Tigers a 3-2 won-lost record and assured Slaton High its best grid season in several years. The win equaled the victory output of the past two years, since Slaton won only two in 1963

and one in 1962. The Tigers won three in 1961.

The Tigers, fast gaining the reputation of a "second-half" club, finished strong to take the measure of the Class A Eagles. And it was Johnny Hennington who again sparked the ground attack as he romped for a bright spot in the offensive attack by the throwing of quarterback Billy Gass, a converted fullback, who hit 3 of 7 passes for 63 yards-- including a 38 yard scoring toss and a key 16 yarder that set up the final tally.

O'Donnell rallied for another serious scoring threat, driving to the Tiger 6-yard line before Slaton stiffened and held on. Slaton's offensive blocking did not appear as sharp as in the previous two games, but the Tigers still rolled up 185 yards

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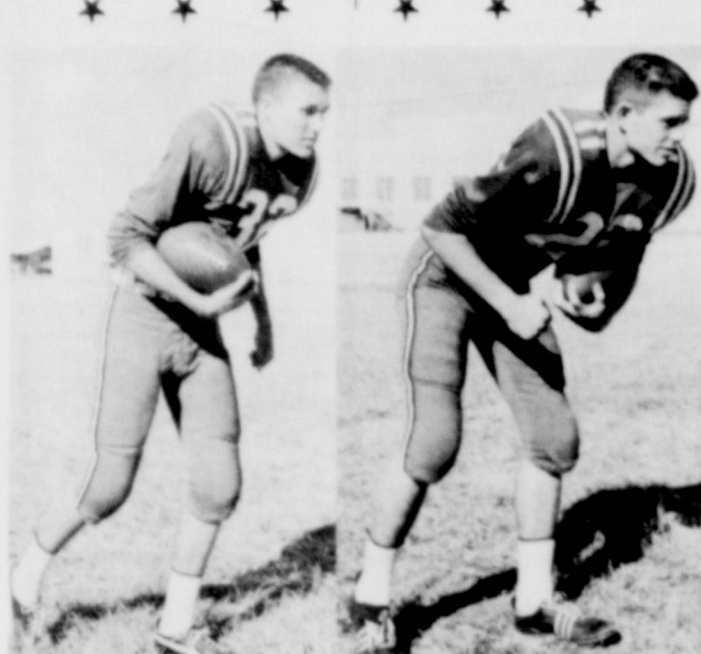
