

The estimates are provided by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc,. and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange. The Lynn County estimat, which takes in Wilson and other neighboring communities to the south, remained at 100,000 bales. It took a big dip last month. Some of the irrigated cotton

is opening, but there is a wide variety around. Continued dry weather could spur the use of defoliants, observers say, to prepare the crops for mechanical stripping and earlierharvesting.

Most farmers feel that recent cool, damp weather has resultedin no significant damage to the cotton, although maturity has been slowed somewhat.

The USDA classing office in Lubbock reported Saturday that only 4, 473 bales of the 1964 crop had been classed, Approxmately 100 bales had been produced by three local gins this week.
