

## ABSENTEE VOTE TOTAL AT 87 IN SLATON

# Election Day Is Tuesday



A total of 85 absentee ballots for the general election, believed to be a record, had been cast in Slaton Wednesday by 3 p.m. Deadline for absentee voting, being held at Kertan Studio, is 5 p.m. Friday.

The heavy turnout in absentee voting appeared to be setting a trend for a record or unusually large vote total in Lubbock County for the Nov. 3 election.

Three boxes will be open here Tuesday for the regular

balloting. They are: Box 36, Community Clubhouse, J.C. Smith Jr., election judge; Box 37, West Ward cafeteria, Wayne Liles, judge, and Box 38, Stephen F. Austin school, C.H. Whalen, judge. Voting is from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The political races which appear to draw the most comment are the Presidential race between President Lyndon B. Johnson and GOP candidate Barry Goldwater, and the U.S. Senatorial race between Ralph Yarborough and George Bush.

Election judges and officials representing both major parties have been cautioning voters to mark their ballots correctly this year. Many incorrectly marked or mutilated ballots were tossed out in the last general election.

Three parties are listed on the ballot, along with a space for write-ins. Voters must scratch or mark out all other names in other columns when they vote for a candidate.

If he votes a "Straight" party ticket, the voter must

mark out all candidates in the other two columns. If he votes a "split" ticket, he must be sure all other candidates for that office are scratched. A voter cannot split his vote on the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of two parties.

Three Constitutional Amendments are to be voted upon.

No. 1 proposes elimination of authority to transfer up to one percent of the Permanent School Fund of Texas to help

# Board To Study Housing Program



Discussion of a bell and the possibility of a public housing project highlighted a regular meeting of the Slaton City Commission Monday night.

The matter of the bell was introduced into the session when R.J. Clark, Ross Pierce and Henry Fondy appeared at the meeting to present a petition protesting the commission's action in presenting the bell from Engine 1809 to Slaton High School.

On request from citizens and school students, the commission agreed to give the bell to the school in action taken at their last meeting. The school wanted to use the bell as a "victory bell" for football games and other school activities.

The bell came off of the engine which was presented to the city a number of years ago by Santa Fe. The engine is fenced in and stands as a memorial on Railroad Avenue.

The commission agreed, after a short discussion, to replace the bell if another one could be obtained from the railroad company. A special meeting of the commission was later called for Wednesday afternoon,

apparently for further discussion, according to Mayor Jonas Cain.

The petition presented to the commission read: "We the undersigned wish to protest the presentation of the bell from Engine 1809 to the School of Slaton. It is our understanding this engine was given to the City of Slaton as a memorial, and we do not feel it should be dismantled." It was signed by 56 persons.

Two representatives from an architectural firm appeared at the meeting to explain how the city can qualify for a Public Housing Administration program. Private money would be used with payment guaranteed by the federal government. Housing would be for specified low income groups.

After a lengthy discussion, Mayor Cain appointed a committee to study Slaton's need for such a project and report back within 30 days.

Named to the special committee were Tommy Wallace, Ellis Schmid, Harold Tucker, T.A. Worley and Bruce Pember.

A discussion on the possibility of the city purchasing water from a nearby farm well was held, but the commission decided the offer would not be agreeable to the city. A special board is studying Slaton's water needs and make recommendations to the commission.

In other action, the commission authorized overtime pay in the police department, approved the traffic control ordinance on third and final reading, and heard a report from County Commissioner George Green on the paving of Division Street.

The police chief explained that the overtime pay was for filling in during vacation time. Commissioners agreed that pay for vacation help would be the only type of overtime paid.

## Prevention Experts Meet Slaton Wednesday

Slaton was filled with a Wednesday morning, with a parade, clowns in colorful jackets, the "Town Inspection" a serious purpose. Inspectors from Texas Fieldman's are to town to conduct an inspection aimed at the dangers to the business district.

The search by the "inspectors" was sponsored by the City of Slaton and the Fire Department, and it was a voluntary professional businessmen, prevention experts including, placing tags and making recommendations.

The Fire Department plans to conduct a follow-up inspection within 30 days to determine what corrections have been made. Property owners are not required to make the corrections, but of course will be urged to cooperate.

A parade at 8:45 a.m. started the day's project, signaling the start of activities and introducing the red-jacketed inspectors. The Slaton High School Band and school children participated in the parade, and safety programs were conducted for school children.

The inspectors are special agents for capital stock fire insurance companies and provide the fire safety programs as a public service.

Don Kendrick, fire chief and marshal, served as coordinator of the project on the local level. Dick Thompson of Lubbock is chairman of the Fieldman's organization.

## Church Youth In Halloween CROP Project

The Slaton Ministerial Alliance has announced the appointment of Rev. Lowell Bell, First Nazarene Church pastor, as general chairman of the local annual CROP Halloween project.

Uniting in the project will be the youth groups of nine or ten churches in the community, and it is expected that more than 50 young people--of junior high age or older--will take part Saturday night.

CROP is the Community Resources Appeal of Church World Service which collects farm commodities and cash, through volunteer workers, for the overseas relief and rehabilitation program of the churches. Gifts to CROP are put to use under church supervision strictly on the basis of need.

Since 1948, Halloween has become a time for many church youth to go from house to house seeking contributions for overseas relief instead of the customary "trick or treat" routine. These youth, in Texas alone, collected more than \$57,000 for CROP in 1963.

Texas Tech pulled its season record to 4-2 and its SMU rivalry mark to 6-6 by knocking off the Mustangs 12-0 here last week. Veteran observers said it was the first time a Southwest Conference football game had ever been interrupted by weather conditions.

Officials, players, coaches, and some 36,000 fans scurried for cover as hail joined heavy rain in making conditions im-

possible. After 12 minute action was resumed. Sporadic showers continued to plague the teams.

A staunch Tech defense and the elements combined to hold the Mustangs to minus three yards rushing and 40 passing, while Tech picked up 189 yards, all along the ground and in the mud.

Texas Tech winds up its schedule with three consecutive games at home, beginning Nov. 7 with West Texas State. Then comes Washington State and University of Arkansas.

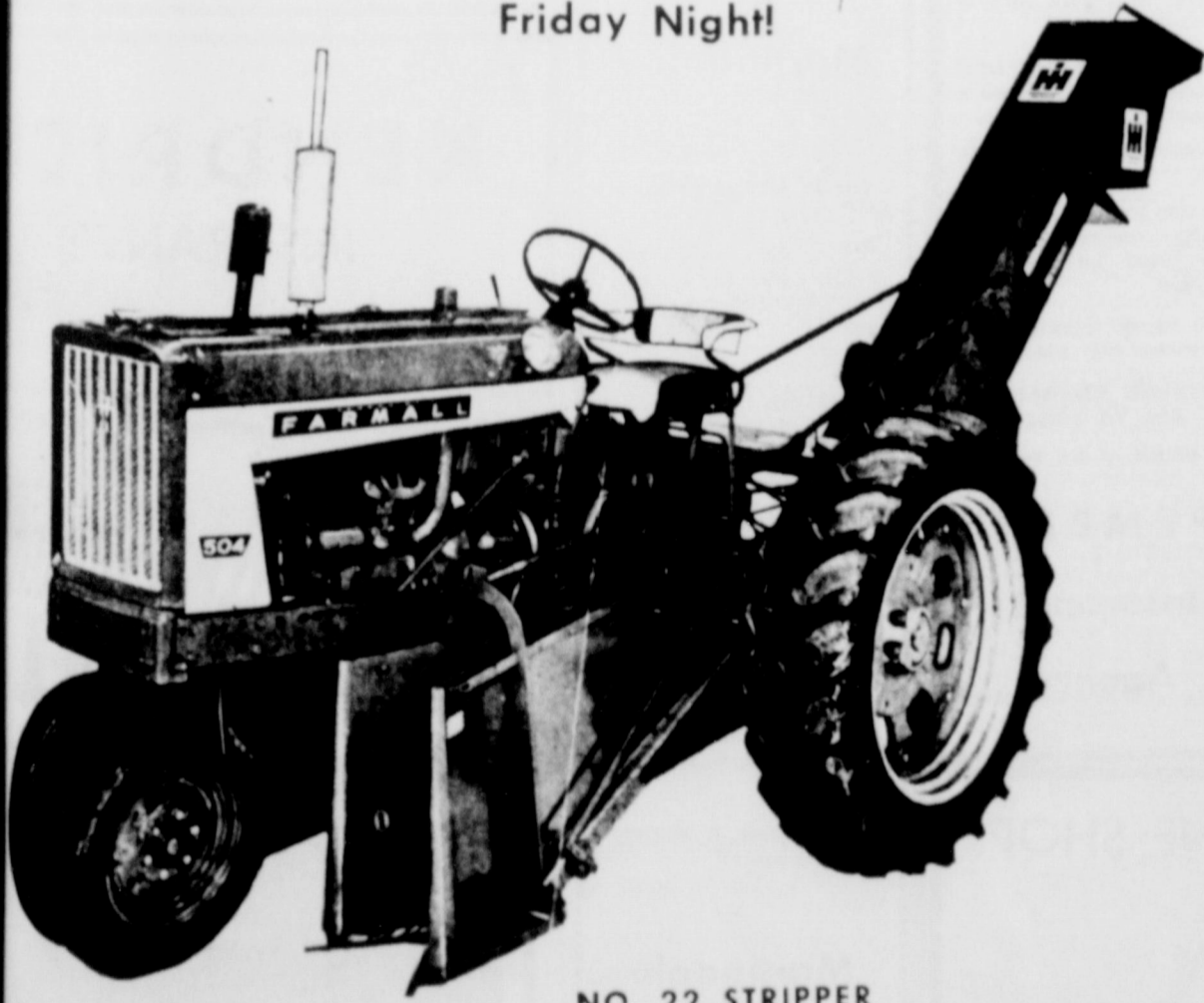

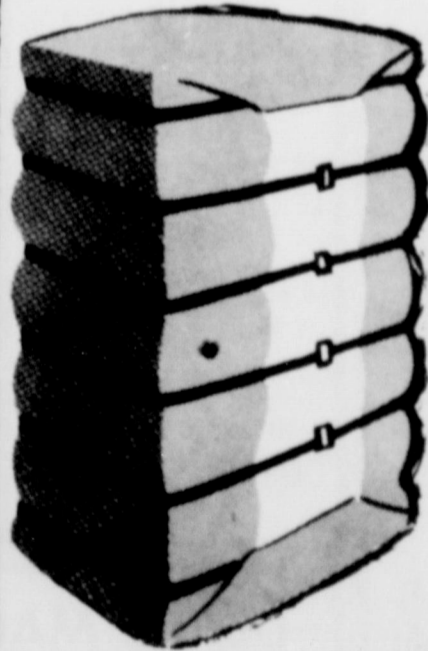

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas:

SECTION 1. Whenever and wherever the congestion of traffic, the frequency of passage of vehicles or pedestrians, or both, the direction and volume of the flow of traffic are such that the Chief-of-Police finds it to be necessary for the free flow and the expeditious handling of traffic and the safety of persons and property for the installation or erection of traffic-control devices, signs, signals or markings, alteration of existing traffic-control devices, signs, signals or markings, the establishment of right-of-ways at intersections, streets, alleys or highways, or the removal or cancellation of existing traffic-control devices, signs, signals or markings, or right-of-ways, the Chief of Police shall submit in writing such findings to the City Commission, recording the specific location at which a traffic-control device, sign, signal or marking or right of way designation are needed, or in need of alteration or removal. Such written determination, designation, finding or conclusion shall be filed with the City Secretary by the Chief-of-Police and shall be considered by the City Commission at its next regular meeting. A finding by the City Commission that a part or all of the Chief-of-Police's written determination, designation, finding or conclusion is in the public need, and in compliance with State Statutes, the City Commission shall order the City Secretary to issue to the Chief-of-Police a written authorization to perform one or more of the following:

(a) to install or erect traffic-control devices, signs, signals or markings;  
 (b) to alter existing traffic-control devices, signs, signals or markings;  
 (c) to establish right-of-ways at intersections, streets, alleys or highways;  
 (d) or for the removal or cancellation of existing traffic-control devices, signs, signals, markings or right-of-ways.

SECTION 2. The Chief-of-Police shall cause to be placed and maintained all official traffic-control devices, markings and signs, and it shall be unlawful for any person to violate the regulation imposed thereby.  
 SECTION 3. Whenever any special regulation of traffic becomes expressly not applicable to a specific location in the City, the record of such location shall remain in the traffic register, but shall be prominently marked "DELETED" by the City Secretary who shall also note the date of such deletion and the authority therefor.  
 SECTION 4. The following words and phrases as used in this article, shall for the purpose of this article be construed to have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:  
 (1) Official Traffic-Control Devices, Signs, Signals or Markings: All signs, signals, markings, and devices not inconsistent with the Manual on Uniform Traffic-Control Devices for streets and highways as provided by Section 29 of Article 6701d, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.  
 (2) Traffic-Control Signal: Any device, whether manually, electrically, or mechanically operated, by which traffic is alternately directed to stop and to proceed.  
 (3) Street: The entire width of every way or place of whatever nature when any part thereof is open to the use of the public as a matter of right for the purpose of traffic.  
 (4) Highway: A street designated by the Texas Highway Department by Number as a part of the State and/or Federal highway system.  
 (5) Alley: Any street having no legal or official name other than alley of twenty (20) feet or less in width.  
 (6) Traffic: Pedestrians, riders of animals and drivers of vehicles while using any street or alley for the purpose of travel.  
 (7) Vehicle: Every device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street, except devices moved by human power.  
 (8) Intersection: The area embraced within the prolongation or connection of the lateral curb lines, or if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the roadways of two (2) streets, alleys or highways which join one another at, or approximately at, right angles, or the area within which vehicles traveling upon different streets, alleys or highways joining at any other angle may come in conflict.

SECTION 5. A Traffic Register shall be continuously maintained by the City Secretary as a public record and shall contain a record of every specific location in the City where any traffic-control device, sign, signal, marking, right-of-way or special regulation is made applicable. The City Commission has heretofore found that the conditions prerequisite to the establishment of all special traffic regulations herein prescribed and the installation of all traffic-control devices, signs, signals and markings evidenced by the record thereof in the traffic register existed and such findings are hereby confirmed and such regulations shall continue in operation until modified.

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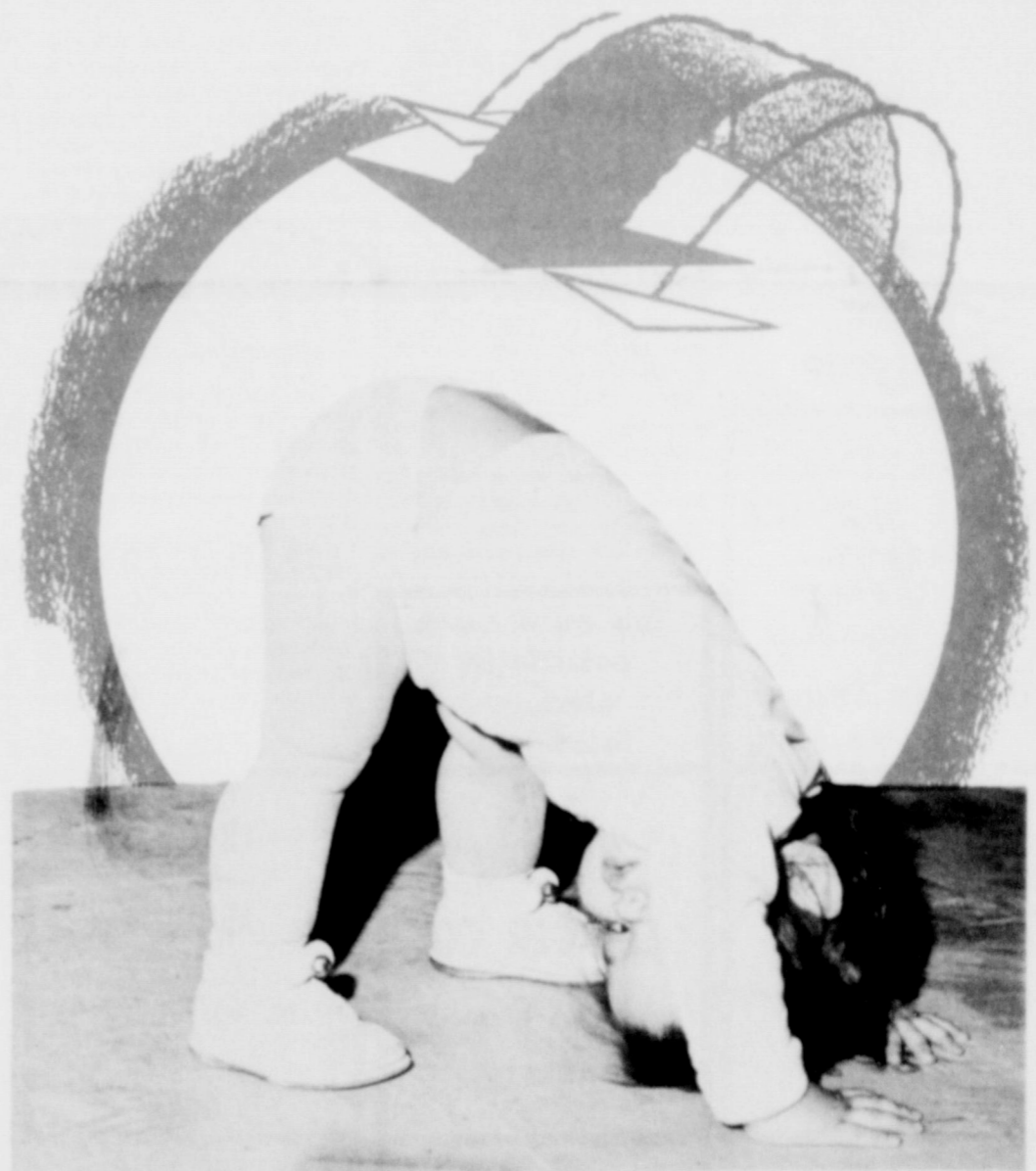
