

# United Super Market Stages Opening



United Supermarket officials have announced that the twelfth store in the grocery chain in the Lubbock Area opened Tuesday, one block north of the square on the Lubbock Highway, at 9th and Lynn St. in Slaton.

The new building contains approximately 10,000 square feet and is adjoined by a large parking area. Manager of the store is Dean James.

Other key personnel are Morris Tyler, assistant manager; Jack Martin, produce manager; and James Dodson, manager of the meat department.

The store facilities include a delicatessen section with a wide variety of prepared foods. About 24 feet of refrigerated display space has been provided for cured meats.

A vegetable display area is approximately 90 feet in length, with about 48 feet of it being used for refrigerated produce. All staple groceries are displayed on adjustable steel shelving which allows for modifications.

Markers have been suspended from the ceiling to assist patrons in location of items. The store has a dairy products section

with several shelves along with a "three-decker" frozen foods display.

Another feature is a complete health and beauty aids department. Check stands and cash registers which compute change and dispense coins have been installed to speed check-outs. The store has automatic doors to provide easy access for shoppers.

As in other United stores, attendants will be available in the meat department to make special cuts for customers.

Supervisor for the eight Lubbock stores, owned by H. D. Snell

Jr. of Vernon, is Travis B. Lincoln of Lubbock. Vernon is location off the Texas headquarters of the company which started operations in Lubbock in 1956.

Other United stores are located in Brownfield, Levelland, Post, and eight in Lubbock.

#### "HEARTS OF MEN"

Senator Barry Goldwater was asked recently how he could consistently summon the prestige of the Presidency to support the civil rights bill, which he regards as unconstitutional. His non-answer took a variety of rhetorical flights, coming to rest finally at an old point: "This is not a matter for law but for the hearts of men."

That drew the burst of applause it always gets from an audience that does not wish to stop segregation; but most of us recognize it as a dodge.

Of course "human decency cannot be legislated." But the expression of human decency can be legislated against. Obviously we cannot get rid of racial prejudice by legislation alone. Neither can we get rid of rape, murder, or embezzlement by legislation alone, but no one suggests that therefore we do not need laws prohibiting them.

Last and greed and malice are buried in the heart of man, where no law reaches. All that the law can do . . . all it was ever intended to do . . . is protect us from men whose hearts are socially menacing.

The public accommodations provisions will not imbue Atlantic cafe host Lester Maddox with a sense of human dignity. But it can make him lay that pistol down. And only when the pistols (as well as the barriers in church, school, and hash house) go down can the hearts of Americans everywhere go up.

The good Lord gave us 100 years to have the grace to love all mankind (regardless of skin color) . . . we haven't accepted his offer. Now his judgement comes in the form of civil rights law.

#### INFLATION INVITATION

Now that Congress has voted a salary increase for itself, members of the executive branch and most government workers, it appears in the mood to hike military pay as well.

The action may seem justified, notwithstanding the fact that a rather substantial increase for all the armed services was voted just last October. But it is not, nor were many of the civilian pay raises voted recently. Government employment is already more attractive than most private jobs.

Certainly the serviceman — particularly one in the lower ranks — find that Uncle Sam was putting an extra \$500 million a year into the kitty for his civilian hirelings would be inclined to want the same windfall.

That factor was recognized by the Senate Armed Services Committee with the acknowledgment that the military pay boost bill would not have come out except for passage of the raise for federal workers.

## Slaton Philosopher Fears Supreme Court May Redistrict Farm Problem

Editor's note: The Slaton Philosopher on his Slaton grass farm has discovered a new problem to worry about, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: According to an article I read last night, the average farmer is now producing enough to feed 31 other people.

Fifty years ago he was lucky to feed himself and maybe two others, but as the population of the towns and cities increased and the population of the farms decreased, coupled with the masterful production ability of us farmers, the number of non-farmers depending on us to feed

them has continued to mount, and the figure now stands at 31, and it may go still higher.

Now I have been thinking about this and while it's pleasant to admit we're doing such a fine job, still there are dangers involved.

For example, when they say the average farmer, that takes in a lot of different sized operators. Frankly, if there are 31 people in town depending on me to feed them, they're in for a hard winter and a poorer spring. In fact, I don't see how they've made it this far.

What happens of course is that some farmers are producing enough to feed 100 or more, may-

be 500 or more, while others, like me, recognizing a surplus when they see one, figure if they take care of themselves and three or four laying hens they've had a good year.

But here's the thing that worries me. What if the Supreme Court hears about this and comes out with a ruling that's unfair and un-Constitutional for one farmer to have to feed 500 while others feed only one or two?

You think there's any possibility of the Court's redistricting the farming problem and requiring me to feed 31 others?

I need to know this, as I am making my 1965 farming plans now. Also, the 31 others counting on me need to know even worse, so they can get their garden plots plowed and their belts tightened.

### Firmness in Viet Nam Deserves Our Support

Lyndon B. Johnson, more often than not, has done things I haven't agreed with.

I've always thought of him more as a politician than a statesman.

Somewhere I've come to think more of him since he became president.

I'm not certain of all the reasons why.

One of them is probably the fact that the President of the United States is due the respect of every American, regardless of whether we agree wholeheartedly with him or not.

Maybe the fact that Lyndon is a Texan who has made good has something to do with my regard for him.

The first reason I cited is a valid one. Everyone should respect the office of the president of the United States.

The second reason shouldn't make any difference.

We shouldn't think more-or-less-of a person because he is

a Texan—or a Democrat—or a Republican—or a cowboy—or a movie star—or anything you want to name.

These are simply labels, or names which sometimes hide the real man.

I still think of Lyndon B. Johnson as a politician, however, because that's what he is.

I've worried at times whether "politicians" are good for the country.

The connotation of the word, it seems to me, is that such people look out for themselves, sometimes at the expense of people they represent.

I wouldn't have put this past Lyndon—before he became president. I think, in fact, it is part of the reason he has risen to the high office he now holds.

Regardless of what I think, however, about Lyndon B. Johnson of pre-president days, it is a fact that he now is making the country a strong president.

His action this week in the firm stand he took in the Viet Nam situation is an example.

I think the entire country is behind him in this stand even Barry Goldwater — and the entire country should be.

### John Tower Newsletter

Senator John Tower today charged that the Supreme Court "has vastly exceeded its authority" in ruling that both houses of all state legislatures be apportioned on the basis of population alone. In his weekly radio report to Texas constituents, Tower said that "the order files in the face of American tradition and would upset the constitutions of at least 44 states."

Tower is cosponsor of a bill to amend the Constitution, which would reverse the Court's decision. He said that he believes that "the apportionment of legislatures is matter reserved by the Federal Constitution of the states alone. I don't think it is either wise or legal for the U.S. Supreme Court to dictate to the States in this manner . . . I believe the Supreme Court decision wrecks those checks and balances" which were so "painstakingly set up" by our founding fathers.

In an attempt to correct the situation, Tower said that he was "following the legal, constitution amending process" so that the states might be assured of the right to elect one legislative house on a basis other than population. The full text of Senator Tower's report follows.

Many things are being considered here in Congress this week, in the end-of-session rush, but it is likely none of them will have a greater long-run effect upon our state than the Supreme Court decision forcing redistricting of our Legislature.

As you may know, that decision required that both houses of all state legislatures be apportioned on the basis of population alone. Of course, that Supreme Court order files in the face of American tradition and would upset the constitutions of at least 44 states including ours.

I have joined this week with Senator Dirksen of Illinois in sponsoring a Constitutional Amendment which would reverse this decision. The amendment would allow states with two-house legislatures to continue present practice and to base membership of one of the houses on something other than population. I also support legislation which would delay implementation of that decision.

Now, this does not mean that I agree with the present over-representation for rural areas in the legislatures of some states. I believe with equal certainty that the apportionment of those legislatures is a matter reserved by the Federal Constitution to the states alone. I don't think it is either wise or legal for the U. S. Supreme Court to dictate to the States in this manner.

It has been 175 years since the adoption of the Constitution of the United States. That document never has been equalled in its profound concern for the protection of all the people's rights and interests—whether they are ma-

jority or minority, great or small, rich or poor.

Our constitution exercised its genius in government by establishing a Federal system of carefully limited powers, with all other authority residing in the states and their people. One of the most wonderful features of the Constitution is a legislative branch divided into two houses; one based on population and the other on geography, or actually on what we call the federal plan.

In addition, the Federal Constitution carefully provided that the legislative and judicial branches of the government were separated, and a method for amending the Constitution is carefully provided.

But, in its June decision on legislative reapportionment, the Supreme Court chose to bypass the legal amending process and by judicial decree, ordered a basic change in our political system. The Court's remarkable new theory is based upon the contention that state legislatures were meant to represent only people; not trees, or cattle or oil wells. Those judges, who are elected by nobody and who serve for life—or for good behavior which means for life—say that population can be the only basis for a legislature.

In my view, the Supreme Court's position bluntly negates the American system of checks and balances which has preserved minority rights and made our nation a successful republic.

In fact, our system has, since 1789, functioned and prospered upon a theory quite contrary to the Court's view that people are just numbers. American democracy always has understood that people are not merely ciphers to be counted. People are a complex amalgam of their hopes and fears and interests and concerns.

Legislators cannot represent their constituents merely because there are 20,000 constituents. Legislators must speak for all the interests of their constituents; for their interests in cattle, and oil, and cotton, and highways, and homes—many of which interests are reflected by the place where voters live.

No one would argue that the interests of Dallas County are identical with those of Starr County, for example. And yet, under American democracy's Checks and balances the interests of Starr County cannot be submerged and swept aside simply because there are more people in Dallas County.

Our founding fathers painstakingly set up the checks and balances of our system to protect all Americans. I believe the Supreme Court decision wrecks those checks and balances. Therefore, I am following the legal constitutional amending process in an attempt to assure that our state, and all states, may continue to choose one legislative house on the basis of population and the other on a check-and-balance basis such as geography, or such as number of registered voters or political subdivisions—however a state chooses to make that selection. I think that the Supreme

Court has vastly exceeded its authority: I think it's high time the Congress paid attention to its mandate in Article III, Section 2 of the Constitution, which holds that the Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction subject to such exceptions and regulations as the Congress shall make.

### Yarborough Newsletter

Dear Fellow Texan:

The Senate has passed the bill to sharply reduce the 11 percent rate of meat imports by as much as one-half. This is the single most important bill, in so far as the Texas agricultural economy is concerned, to come before Congress this year. I worked and voted for this bill, testifying for its passage before the Senate Finance Committee and advocating it in Senate debate.

The Senate has also passed the Economic Opportunity Act to help with the employment, education and training of those who do not share in the benefits of our strong economy. This is the most significant bill of its kind since the National Defense Education Act of 1958, and I am proud to have co-sponsored both.

OTHER BILLS PASSED — WATER RESEARCH, MILITARY PAY RAISE

S. 2, the bill authorizing establishment of water resources research centers at land-grant colleges and state universities, was

signed into law July 17. I was a co-sponsor of the bill.

We have also passed the military pay raise bill, which I supported, and which will be meaningful not only to the five percent of the Texas population who are either servicemen or in military families, but also to the many areas in Texas economically dependent on military payrolls.

This pay raise excluded some 800,000 young servicemen with less than 2 years in uniform in grades E-1 to E-5 — grades in which the pay has not been raised in 12 years. I introduced an amendment, which was defeated, to include this group in the pay raise as an act of justice, and I regret that the troops who do the hard work were discriminated against.

Many warrant officers and others faced with loss of their civil service jobs through new interpretations of archaic laws will be pleased by Senate passage of the Dual Compensation Bill, relieving them from the threatened obligation to repay salaries they have earned in their jobs. It was my pleasure to manage this bill through Senate passage as Chairman of the Civil Service Subcommittee.

SCREWWORM ERADICATION I have asked the chairman of the Subcommittee on Agricultural Appropriations to assist in the appropriation of \$5,500,000 to continue the highly effective screwworm eradication program in the Southwest. Screwworms enter Texas from Mexico and are fatal

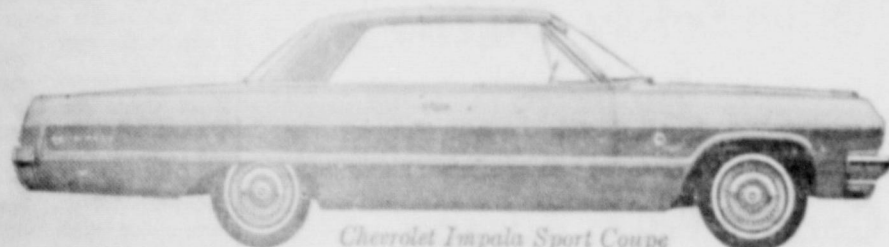

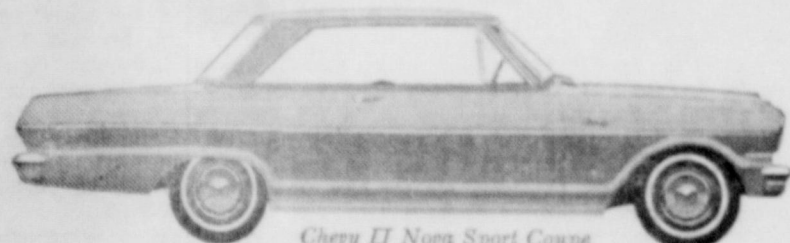

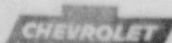

## Seat Belts Can Reduce Injuries, And Save Lives

COLLEGE STATION — For safety, install and buckle your seat belt each time you use your automobile, says Mrs. Elsie P. Short, home management specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

Research has shown that a buckled seat belt means one is 50 to 60 percent safer than someone without a seat belt. Findings at Cornell University's Automotive Crash Injury Research Center indicate that if everyone had seat belts—and used them—at least 5,000 lives could be saved each year, and serious injuries reduced by one-third.

Chances of survival are much higher if one is held inside the car by the seat belt rather than being thrown out.

Even though traffic isn't especially heavy on many rural roads, accident rates are high. There's a wide range of road types, vehicles and speeds, which combine to result in many accidents. Three of every four traffic fatalities and many of the injuries occur on rural highways.

The seat belt prevents a person being thrown forward toward the dash. Even if the road hits the dash, with a seat belt the blow isn't nearly so hard. This could mean the difference between a minor injury and a major injury, Mrs. Short points out.

One is safest inside the car. The risk of death is five times greater for persons thrown out of the car. Many times, the person lands on the pavement or heavy objects, and there is danger of being run over by the automobile or other vehicles.

Belts should be fastened any time the car is moving. Two-thirds of the drivers in fatal accidents were less than 25 miles from home. Buckling up for





SECTION 2: Unlawful conduct of parents: No parent shall knowingly permit any sub-minor to remain in or upon any public place or any establishment between the hours of 11 o'clock p.m. and 6 o'clock a.m. of the following day, official city time, except that on Saturday nights the hours shall be from 12 o'clock p.m. midnight to 6 o'clock a.m. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any parent who accompanies a sub-minor or to a parent who directs a sub-minor upon an errand or other legitimate business or to any parent of a sub-minor engaged in gainful lawful employment during the curfew hours.

SECTION 3: Unlawful conduct of owners or operators of establishments or public places. No owner or operator of an establishment or public place or their agents or employees shall knowingly permit any sub-minor to remain upon the premises of said establishment between the hours of 11 o'clock p.m. and 6 o'clock a.m. of the following day, official city time, except that Saturday nights the hours shall be from 12 o'clock p.m. midnight to 6 o'clock a.m.

SECTION 4: Penalties: Any parent who shall violate any provision of Section 2 of this Ordinance after having received notice of prior violation shall be fined not exceeding \$300.00.

SECTION 5: Definition: "Public Place" as used in this Ordinance is meant any public road, street, sidewalk, parkway, alley, store building, workshop, restaurant, cafe, public theatre, picture show,

public lobby of a hotel, motel or rooming house, or any place at which people are assembled or to which people commonly resort for the purposes of business, amusement or other lawful purposes, including but no restricted to any room in a private residence where the public generally is invited for purposes of business or amusement.

SECTION 6: SAVINGS CLAUSE: Should any section paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional for any reason, the remainder of said Ordinance shall not be affected thereby and it is intended that every other section, paragraph, sentence, clause and phrase of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

## Liquids From Canned Vegetables Contain Minerals And Vitamins

Pouring the liquid off of canned vegetables is somewhat like removing the desirable additives from your automobile's gas tank. For both points out Sherry Mullin, Home Demonstration Agent, contain elements needed by the human machine and automobile engine for proper functioning.

In the case of liquids from canned vegetables, about a third of the minerals and vitamins in the

can are lost. In order to get the full nutritive and money value from canned products, the agent emphasizes the importance of using the liquid.

Add it to gravy, soup or using it in a cream sauce or stew. Here is why. After vegetables are canned, their water-soluble nutrients distribute themselves evenly throughout the solids and liquids. The drained solids, which

usually make up about two-thirds of the can's total contents, contain about two-thirds of the soluble nutrients. The other third is in the liquid.

Keep in mind, that canned vegetables have already been cooked. To serve them with the most flavor and food value, drain off the liquid and boil down to one-third of its original volume, then heat the vegetables in this concentrated liquid. Minerals and vitamins are saved and you get the full benefits expected from your purchase.

## District Agricultural Agent Retiring Aug. 31

COLLEGE STATION, August 13 (Sp1) . . . W. H. (Bud) Jones, Lubbock based district agricultural agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service since September 1950, is retiring on August 31. He began his Extension career in 1934 as county agricultural agent in Delta County.

In making the announcement, Director John E. Hutchison of the Service, said Jones would be succeeded by Billy C. Gunter, area agronomist and a former associate county agricultural agent in Hale County and area farm management specialist for the Service. His headquarters have been in Lubbock since 1939.

During the 14 years Jones has supervised the Service's educational programs in the South Plains district, change has been the watchword.
