52,140 BALES GINNED IN AREA Harvest Heads For Peak

After being delayed by damp weather and a late killing frost, the area cotton harvest cranked up the past week and 17 area gins had turned out an estimated 52,140 bales of "High Plains gold" by Tuesday.

Trailers full of cotton were beginning to stack up in some gin yards, and this was expected to become a familiar sight in the coming weeks. Some gins were already running around the clock to handle the fluffy crop being hauled in.

A check by the Slatonite Tuesday showed these estimated bale totals in area gins: Slaton Co-op Gins 7,717; Wilson Co-op Gins 8,000; Farmers Gin of Slaton 2,000; Campbell's Gin 1,480; Hackberry Gin 3,850; Basinger Gin 1,450; Gordon Gin 1,010; Pleasant Valley 862; Posey Gin 1,385; Union Co-op Gin 3,117; Gatzki Gin 1,160; Planters Gin 884; Acuff Co-op 10,794; McClung Gin 3,860; Canyon Gin 2,960; Robertson Gin 2,310.

Cotton grades and micronaire readings were lower after the rains and freeze, but staple length remained about the same, according to a report from W.K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock USDA Classing Office.

Classing officials expect the harvesting tempo to increase

rapidly during the week and that the peak will arrive within the next two weeks. The South Plains classing offices anticipate between 40 and 50 thousand samples daily during the next few days.

The three I.S.D.A. Offices on the South Plains classed 82,500 samples during the week ending Friday, November 27th, bringing the season's total to 399,300. At this date last year the offices had classed 517,800 samples.

During the past week approximately 60 per cent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office was in the White grades with 41 per cent classed Strict Low Middling. During the week a higher percentage of cotton was classed in Strict Low Middling and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, and a smaller percentage in the Middling and Middling Light Spotted grades. The Light Spotted and Spotted grades accounted for approximately 40 per cent of the total with Middling Light Spotted being the most predominant with 23 per cent.

Average staple length remained about the same. Seventy two per cent of all cotton classed was 15/16 of an inch and shorter with 15/16 of an inch accounting for 57 per cent of all cotton classed. The previous week 71 per cent was 15/16 of an inch and shorter.

Micronaire readings declined again but generally were still good. Eighty per cent of all cotton miked in the Lubbock Office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 84 per cent of all cotton miked was in this category.

Trading in new crop cotton in the Lubbock market increased during the past week. Agricultural Marketing Service reports indicate prices paid for White grades ranged from 50 points under CCC loan levels to 50 points over the loan. Demand continued strong for the Light Spotted grades and prices paid ranged from 20 points over the loan for Strict Middling Light Spotted to 125 points over for Strict Low Middling Light Spotted.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities were: Strict Low Middling 15/16-27.65, Strict Low Middling 31/32-28.10, Middling Light Spotted 15/16-28.05, Middling Light Spotted 31/32-28.50, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16-27.05 and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32-27.30.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed remained steady the past week with prices ranging from \$45 to \$53 per ton, averaging \$46.40.

LIONS TO SELL CHRISTMAS TREES

The annual Slaton Lions Club Christmas tree sales project got underway here Wednesday, with club members setting up trees for display on the west side of the City Hall square.

Lion Boss Tommy Davis announced Wednesday that members would be on hand every day from now until Dec. 23 to help customers select trees. A large selection of trees will be available.

The Lions Club uses proceeds from the sales to help crippled children, the blind, and needy children who need eye glasses.

Postmaster Urges Use Of Zip Code

Sectional Center Facilities for the U.S. Post Office are now in operation, making the Zip Code an important part of mail addressing, Slaton Postmaster Rush Wheeler announced this week.

In reminding local patrons to use Zip Code numbers, including the Slaton number of 79364 on return addresses, the postmaster also announced Christmas mail deadlines which would assure delivery on time.

Packages to be mailed to distant states should be placed in the post office between now and Dec. 5. Local and area packages should be mailed by Dec. 15.

Greeting cards to distant states should be on the way on or before Dec. 10, and a card for local and area addresses should be in the post office by Dec. 15.

Wheeler pointed out that the Lubbock Sectional Center is now operating under postal procedures, and that inclusion of Zip Code numbers could mean one or two days earlier delivery in some cases.

The postmaster added that mail to Lubbock addresses will arrive a day earlier if placed in the local post office by 6 p.m. If a letter is mailed after 6 p.m., it will be a day later in arriving at the Lubbock destination.

BAND WINS 1ST AWARD

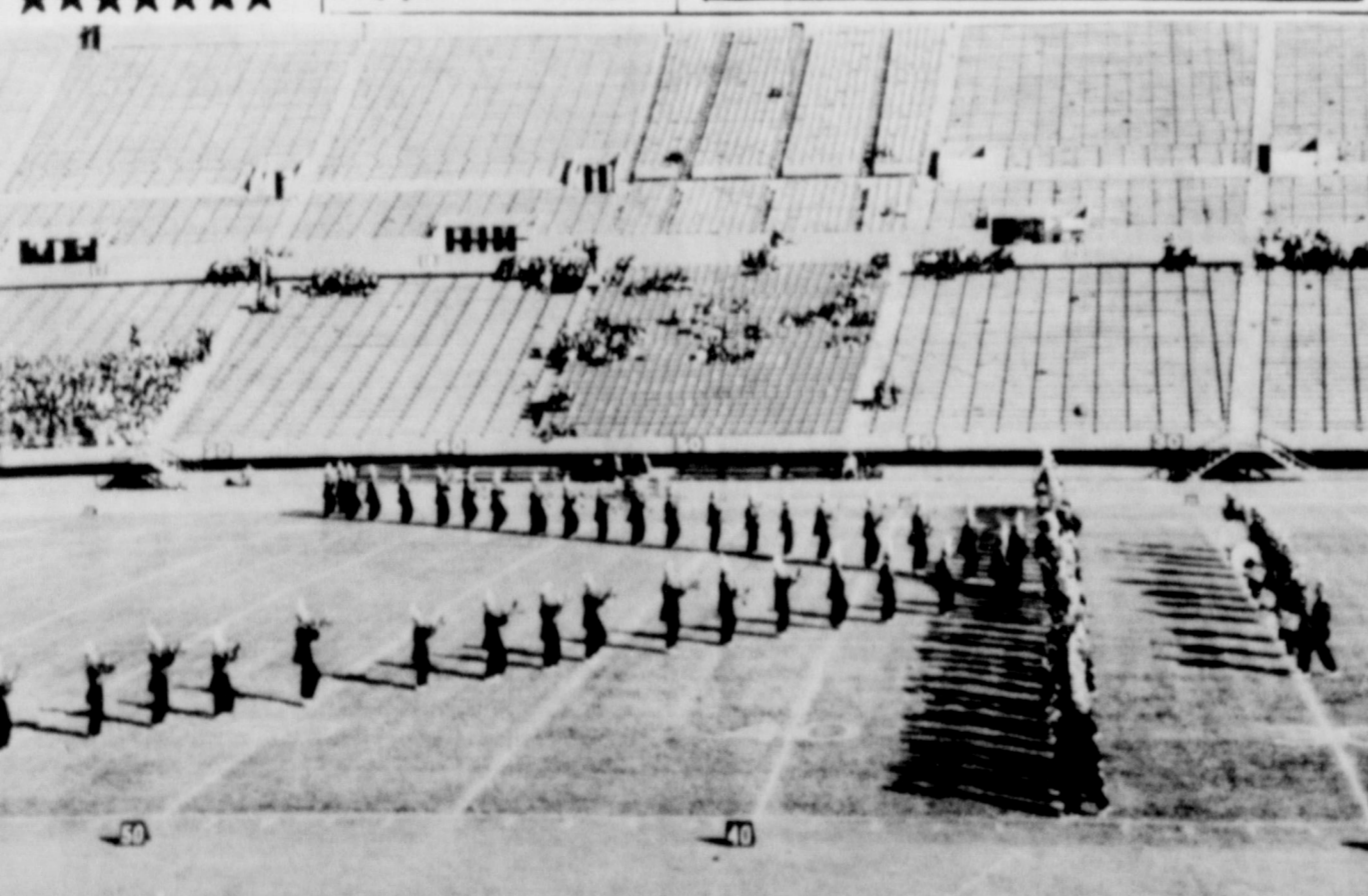
Months of hard work and long drills paid off in full measure for the Slaton Tiger Band Tuesday afternoon last week.

Huffman next became director of the State Economic Development Commission in New Mexico, then in 1957 moved to Alamogordo, N.M., as director of the Industrial Development Corporation.

A native of Grapevine, he served in the Air Force in 1942-46.

Cycle Deaths Listed In State

During 1963 in Texas there were 43 deaths and 10 injuries resulting from motorcycle, moped, scooter, and go-cart accidents.

Motorcycle accidents resulted in 24 deaths and 10 injuries. Motor scooter accidents resulted in 15 deaths and no injuries. Go-Cart accidents resulted in only one death and no injuries. The greatest number of these deaths, five, occurred in Harris County, Bexar and Tarrant Counties had four deaths each. Brown, Dallas, Hidalgo, Jefferson, and Wichita Counties had two deaths each. Seventeen counties had one death each.

Hutchinson and Swisher Counties of the Panhandle area had one death each. Lubbock County of the South Plains area had one death.

Lubbock Christian College officially launched a campaign Sunday, Nov. 15, for a new campus center, including cafeteria-kitchen, student center and bookstore.

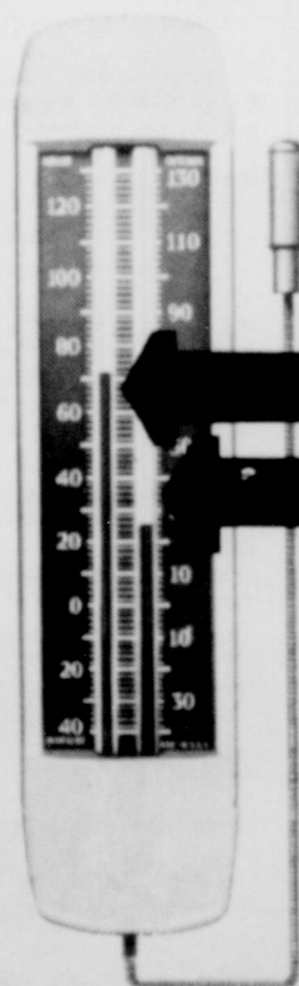
College officials have named the project "Operation Bread on the Waters" to emphasize the importance of the drive to the college.

Bulletin Urges Caution In Handling Of Firearms

ALSTON—The Texas Safety Association this week issued

Raiders Drill For Sun Bowl

Lubbock—Texas Tech's footballing Red Raiders don't pad next week getting ready for their Sun Bowl date with University of Georgia at El Paso Dec. 26.

This week the Red Raiders are going through conditioning drills under the direction of their co-captains, linebacker C.C. Willis and end Jerry Don Balch. Next week Coach J.T. a special bulletin urging caution in the handling of firearms and cited the increase in the number of hunters as an additional hazard.

"Whether in the field or at home, extreme care should be taken when handling firearms," J.O. Masick, TSA General Manager, said. "Each year more than 2,000 lives are lost in firearm accidents due primarily to carelessness."

During the past three years, 6,500 persons in the United States died as a result of firearm accidents. Of this number, 495 were Texans.

Each year, more and more persons are taking up the sport of hunting. With more hunters in the field and more firearms being brought into the home, the danger of firearm accidents is increasing.

The safety director said it is important to note that more than 50 percent of all firearm accidents in the nation occur in the home.

"Of the 165 firearm deaths in Texas last year, 88 fatalities occurred in the home," Masick said.

He suggests all hunters make it a firm rule to unload firearms before carrying them indoors.

"The accidental firing of guns around the home often happens

when someone assumes a gun is empty and handles it carelessly," he said.

"Always treat a gun as though it were loaded, and if there are children in the home, store guns and ammunition separately—under lock and key."

The safety director emphasized that while many firearm accidents occur "while hunting," records show that many hunters are killed while transporting or removing guns from cars, and while crossing over or going through a fence.

"Never carry loaded firearms in a car. Many hunters have been seriously injured getting in or out of a car with a loaded gun. Before returning to your home or camp, unload not only the chamber of your gun, but the magazine as well," he explained.

"Never climb or jump with a loaded gun. And never pull

a gun toward you muzzle first. When you come to an obstruction, push your gun on ahead. And don't set your gun against a tree or fence, or leave it lying on the ground. A playful dog, for example, might cause it to be discharged."

He also advised hunters to check the barrel of guns to make certain they are free of any dirt or obstruction.

"When you are carrying your gun, try to keep it clear of sand, mud, even twigs that could fall down the barrel. Before you shoot, check the gun to make sure no dirt has clogged the barrel," Masick added.

Among other safety tips for hunting, he suggests:

Keep the muzzle of your gun pointed in a safe direction, away from your companions, so that even if you stumble you won't accidentally fire at someone.

Keep the safety on until you bring the gun to your shoulder to fire. And check the safety often; don't depend on it blindly. Don't play with the trigger let it alone until you are ready to shoot.

Always be certain of the target before you fire. Don't shoot at objects seen only indistinctly among trees or bushes. Before you shoot, make sure no house, barn or other building is in the line of fire.

Be sure of your backstop. Even a light .22 bullet can carry a mile. Today's high-speed rifles with hard-jacketed bullets increase the danger of ricochet.

Know your companions. Watch out for the partner who seems careless, excited or over eager. Stay away from this type hunter.

Know your gun. If possible never borrow another hunter's firearm. No two persons aim the same way. One hunter may place his sights on the target higher or lower than you would when sighting in. As a result he may be square on the target, but you won't.

Know yourself. Some hunters drop dead from unusual exertion of climbing through brush, up steep hills, in severe cold. Also extremely important is your eyesight. Before going hunting, have a complete physical check-up.

To avoid being hit by stray shots keep out of the brush in heavily hunted country. A hill-top can be especially dangerous. On high ground, stand in front of a tree or rock so that your silhouette won't invite another hunter's bullet.

To call for help in case of an accident, fire three shots

at evenly spaced intervals, repeating several minutes apart. If you fail to get a response, wait until the sun sets. Your shots after sundown will attract the nearest game warden. Light a small fire and stay put until

he arrives. In closing, Masick, reminded hunters that "gunpowder and alcohol don't mix." "Don't drink when hunting or when driving to or from the hunting area. Hunting or

driving while under influence of alcoholic drinks is extremely dangerous. Two drinks can reduce visual acuity as much as wearing dark glasses at night. "Remember also, that it

takes at least three drinks to eliminate the alcohol in two cocktails, been drinking, wait time before you get or before you get wheel."







Ten Commandments Hunting Listed By VFW

Slaton's Aaron Luman VFW Post 6721 this week appealed to area hunters to observe the "Ten Commandments of Hunting Safety."

Bo Becker, post commander, released the 10 safety rules and urged all hunters to consider the points before going on a hunting trip. Here they are:

- (1) Treat every gun with every respect due a loaded gun. This
- (2) Guns that are carried into camp or the home must be taken down or have the action open. A gun should always be encased until reaching the shooting area.
- (3) Always be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
- (4) Always carry gun so that you can control reaction of the muzzle even if you stumble; keep safety on until ready to shoot.
- (5) Be sure of target before

the cardinal rule of gun safety.

(6) Never pull trigger, anything you do shoot.

(7) Unattended gun should be beyond the reach and careless about.

(8) Never clean fence with a loaded.

(9) Never shoot surfaces or the target.

(10) Do not drink and alcohol.

Lubbock Peace Corps Tests

For the first time in history the Peace Corps is giving its nationwide Placement Test on a week day—Monday, Dec. 7. The usual second Saturday in the month isn't possible because of the Christmas rush at the post offices where most Peace Corps tests are held.

The next best available date happens to fall on Pearl Harbor Day. That infamous day 23 years ago which sent Americans off to war, this year be commemorated by thousands of Americans offering two years of their life in the cause of peace.

In this area the Peace Corps Test will be given at Room 16 A, Post Office building in Lubbock. It will begin at 3 P.M.

The non-competitive test will take about one and a half hours, from the time you walk in the door. (You should bring a completed Peace Corps Questionnaire along if you haven't yet filed one).

You can't fail the test. The Peace Corps evaluates your test scores, your questionnaire and your character references all together. If the results qualify you to complete the intensive training program and to be an effective Volunteer overseas, you will be invited.

The next cycle of Peace Corps training starts in February—and there is still time if you take the Dec. 7 test. The major training for 1965 will take place in the summer—and it is not too soon to apply for that. Questionnaires are available at most post offices and college placement offices, or by writing the Peace Corps, Washington,

Facts Given On Last Census Of Agriculture

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce, in Lubbock County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this county:

There were 1,736 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 2,081 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 376.3 acres in 1959, compared with 289.9 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the county's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$62,193,584. The value of all crops sold was \$40,160,289. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$22,033,295.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken.

They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

They are among a half million girls in more than 14,000 of the nation's high schools who are participating in the 1965 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

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COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.

Not so favorable to prospects for cotton legislation, from the producer's standpoint, is the well known preference of Vice President Hubert Humphrey for direct compensatory payments in farm programs. Growers, fearing the imposition of limitations, have consistently voiced strong opposition to such a feature in cotton legislation.

Probably the first inkling of what Secretary Freeman may have had reference to when he spoke of "modifications" will come from the Cotton Advisory Committee meeting scheduled in early December. In the announcement of this meeting the Department of Agriculture said there would be, among other things, a "Discussion of program provisions, ways in which the program may be strengthened, including the need to obtain additional acreage reduction, the support price level, the rate of payment under the domestic allotment program, and aspects."

FARM LABOR
With Public Law 78 (the bracero Law) expiring December 31 of this year, many area farmers have been asking whether they will be able to get any Mexican Nationals at all in 1965, and if so, how. At the moment, no one can give a specific answer to this important question. However, officials of the Department of Labor in Washington have indicated to the National Council of Agricultural Employers that workers from Mexico will be available under Public Law 414 if they are needed and if certain prerequisites are met. No indication was given as to the nature of these prior requirements except that wages and full utilization and recruitment of domestic workers were mentioned.

The National Council of Agricultural Employers is a newly formed national organization through which employers interested in foreign labor are

working with the Department of Labor and the Immigration Service relative to the entrance of such workers.
Public Law 414 is cited as the "Immigration and Nationality Act," which is administered by the Department of State through the Immigration Service. There is a provision in this law under which foreign workers may be admitted for temporary employment provided the Secretary of Labor will certify to the Secretary of State and to the Attorney General that domestic workers who are able, willing and qualified are not available and that the admittance of such workers will not adversely affect the employment of domestic workers.

The Immigration Service has advised that so far as they are concerned plans have already been completed for admitting workers under Public Law 414 after December 31. They emphasize, that however, that under current regulations the approval of the Department of Labor will be necessary before these plans can be carried out.

It's the Law in TEXAS



WHO OWNS WOUNDED GAME?

Suppose you are hunting and shoot a deer or a duck, which falls mortally wounded. Before you can get to it, another hunter beats you there and claims the fallen game as his own. What are your rights?

Jim had been hunting all day without success, and had headed for home when he finally saw

a deer. He took careful aim and hit the deer with his first shot. Although mortally wounded, the deer managed to run a short distance, with Jim in hot pursuit.

Roy was also deer hunting. He heard Jim's shot and saw a deer running toward him. However, before it reached the spot where he was standing, the deer fell to the ground.

Although it was obvious that the deer was about to die, Roy walked to within three feet of it, delivered the finishing shot, and quickly put his tag on it. When Jim ran up and claimed the deer, Roy said that such deer were wild animals, and belonged to no one until killed. Since he was the one that killed the deer,

Roy claimed that it belonged to him.

Which hunter has legal title to the deer?

In this case the deer belongs to Jim. Jim was the first to wound it, and did so before Roy appeared on the scene. He had mortally wounded the deer, and had it in such a situation that its escape was improbable, if not impossible. The prevailing rule is that the instant a wild animal is brought under the control of a person so that actual possession is practically inevitable, a vested property interest in it occurs which cannot be divested by another's intervening and killing it, or reaching it first.

Jim had delivered the shot

which so crippled the animal as to cause him to cease trying to escape, thus permitting Roy to walk up to the animal and deliver the finishing shot. Jim had effectually brought the deer under his control before Roy took a hand in the matter. The deer legally belonged to Jim, and he can enforce his claim in court.

Chop up fruit with rind, add sugar, let stand over night. Dissolve jello in hot water, let cool, then pour over fruit mixture. Add 1 cup nuts. Keep in ice box.
KOSHER DILL PICKLES

Wash pickles, then put grape leaf in bottom of jar, and dill. Then pack cucumbers in jar. Put in a pinch of alum size of a pea and a small hot pepper and clove of garlic. Pour hot brine over them and seal.
Brine for 8 quarts
3 quarts of water
1 quart of vinegar
1 cup plain salt
CHILI SAUCE
30 ripe tomatoes
3 large onions
2 red peppers
3 T. salt
3 green peppers
2-1/2 cups brown sugar
4-1/2 cups vinegar
2 t. each of ground ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, allspice, and mustard.
Scald and peel tomatoes. Then chop or mash them to a pulp with onions and peppers. Put in an enamel or heavy pan with vinegar, sugar and salt. Tie spices in loose bag and add to mixture, bring to boil and stir frequently. Cook until thick, about one hour. Seal hot.
