

#### VIEWING

#### Your City Government by J. J. Maxey, City Secretary

My subject for this week is probably the most important and the least talked about of any phase of city business. One takes for granted the things that come under the heading of public health until the flies or mosquitoes get bad or some obnoxious odor begins to come in through your air conditioner.

For many years before his death Dr. W. E. Payne served this community as city health officer and you can take it from any of the city officials or city employees that served with him that he did a remarkable job. Dr. Payne was a strict sanitarian and had no scruples about alleviating any health hazard that came to his attention.

The city health officer checks to see that all purveyors of food or drink have a health certificate. He also keeps a constant watch on the city water supply and is notified immediately when coloform organisms are found in the water. He works with the water and sewer superintendent in seeing that people connect to the sanitary sewer when the sewer is available to them. He works with the sanitation superintendent when premises are found to be in unsanitary condition and the owner refuses to clean them up. He advises with the city and county regarding the control of harmful insects such as flies and mosquitoes. The city health officer does all of these things and many more as a civic duty. His pay is the same as a city commissioner or the mayor and he feels public responsibility in the same degree.

At the death of Dr. W. E. Payne the city commission, knowing that the job of city health officer was continually getting bigger and taking more time, met with the medical group here in Slaton and discussed with them the possibility of passing this job around to the various doctors on a two year basis, Since that time Dr. Talbert, Dr. Glen Payne, and Dr. E. L. Schmidt have served as city health officer. At the present time Dr. M. Jay McSween, Jr. is serving in that

The citizens of Slaton have been very fortunate in that there has not been any epidemic of any kind for as long as I can remember. This is due in part to the efforts of our health officer, our sanitation superintendent and the city commission. For the past three or four years the Lubbock City-County Health unit has been working very closely with the city of
