Frost Finally Shows, Harvest On Way

was expected to shift into high gear around the Slaton area in bout 10 days following the area's long-awated first plantkilling freeze of the season last

Cotton started rolling into gin yards Monday as favorable weather prevailed, but the echanical harvesting peak is t expected for about two weeks. Cotton observers said farmers should be able to begin stripper harvesting quicker than normal following a first freeze because of the mature

In some cases, however, it probably will take another two weeks for plants to become dry and brittle enough for stripper harvesting.

Wet weather and the late freeze have delayed the big harvest on the South Plains. Average time for the first killing freeze has been around Nov. 4 in this area. The freeze is one of the latest on record for the South Plains, moving in with a frigid cold front last Friday.

Virtually no cotton was harvested on the South Plains during the past week but volume received was still high because of the backlog of cotton at the gins and warehouses.

The three U.S.D.A. offices on the South Plains classed 94,000 samples during the week ending Friday, Nov. 20th bringing the season's total to 317, 400. At this date last year the three offices had classed

During the past week, approximately 60 per cent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office was in the White grades with 14 per cent of all cotton classed being Middling

Strict Low Middling was the predominant grade, making up 36 per cent of the total, Light Spotted grades accounted for approximately 40 per cent of the total with Middling Light Spotted being the most predominant with 27 per cent.

Average staple length declined slightly. During the week was 15/0 of an inch and shorter with 15/16 of an inch accounting week 66 per cent was 15/16 of an inch and shorter.

Micronaire readings continued to decline slightly but were still very good, Eightyfour per cent of all cotton "miked" in the Lubbock Office the past week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 87 per cent of all cotton "miked was in this category.

The U.S.D.A.'s Agricultural Marketing Service reported continued increased trading in new crop cotton. Prices for White grades ranged from 50 points under CCC loan levels to 50 points over the loan, Light Spotted grades were still in best demand, bringing from 20 to 140 points over CCC loan

Average prices in the Lubbock market for the most predominant qualities were: Middling 15/16-28.75, Middling 31/32 29.35. Strict Low Middling 15/ 16-27,65, Strict Low Middling 31/32-28.10 , Middling Light Spotted 15/16-2805, Middling Light Spotted 31/32-28,50, Strict Low Middling Light Spott-

ed 15/16-27.05, Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$45 to \$53 per ton, averaging \$46,50.



Bennett Reeves, Slaton's consultant engineer, reviewed circumstances of the paving problem, and pointed out that existing pavement had been torn up and the city was faced with a safety hazard.

Lemon, city attorney, pointed out that the street could be made an exception because the court would be deciding on an action after fact.

"We thought there was a contract. Slaton has already expended \$14,500. Every day the street remains torn up, store owners along it are damaged. If it remains as it is someone will have to pay for the damage."
