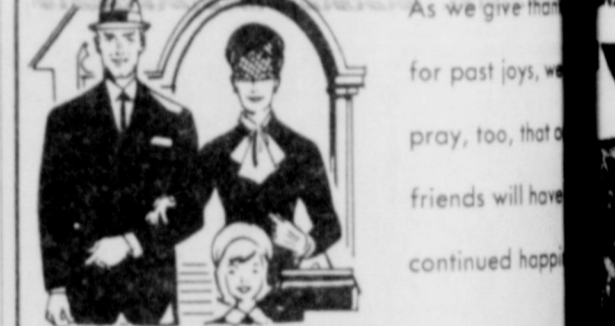



COACH FOR DEBATE TEAM

Jamison Is New Teacher

A new face around Slaton High School this year is Mr. Bill Jamison. He was born in 1908 and reared in Eastland county at Gorman.

While in high school he lettered 2 years each in football, basketball and debating. After graduating in 1927, he entered Hardin-Simmons in Abilene where he earned all his expenses and graduated in 1931 with a major in government and economics and a minor in history. He was on the varsity debate team for two years.

After leaving Hardin-Simmons he continued his graduate studies in government and history at Texas University where he did 33 semester hours of graduate work during summer sessions.

In 1931 he was elected head of the Social Science Department and debate coach of Baird High School. In the fall of 1933 he became head of the Social Studies Department and debate coach of Prairie Lea High School. His teams won a 1st and 2nd in the West Texas tournament in 1932.

Then in 1935 he became coach and teacher of Philip Nolan Elementary school in Sweetwater. During the war he was given the additional duty of principal of this school.

After establishing and operating a farm store for 13 years, he returned to the teaching profession as teacher and coach of South East Elementary in Sweetwater in 1957. He then was moved to Reagan Junior High in 1960 where he taught history, general arithmetic and coached tennis for 4 years. Two of his girls won 2nd place in the 16 year old division at the State Jaycee Tournament in 1963 and one went to the State Inter-scholastic League meet her sophomore year.

He lived in Sweetwater from September 1935, to August 1964, having taught there 17 years. In 1960 he finished his graduate work for a master of Education degree with a minor in Social Studies at McMurry College in Abilene.

Carol of Lights Ceremony Set For Texas Tech Again Dec. 1

LUBBOCK--Texas Tech will again celebrate the opening of the Christmas Season with its spectacular Carol of Lights ceremony, scheduled this year for Dec. 1.

More than 16,500 Christmas lights, outlining campus buildings, will be turned on simultaneously shortly after 7 p.m. that night, followed by a program of Christmas music and group singing with the audience.

The annual ceremony, held at the Science Quadrangle on campus, is enhanced by wreaths and luminarias placed around Tech grounds.

At 7 p.m. all lights on the campus are turned off, then the Christmas lights are turned on as students, faculty and visitors join in the singing.

The idea for the Christmas

lights outlining the buildings of Tech's central campus was begun in 1959 by Harold Hinn of Plainview, a member of Tech's Board of Directors.

Tech's Women's Residence Council sponsors the Carol of Lights program, which has become a Christmas season tradition in Lubbock. Thousands of visitors drive through the campus nightly after Dec. 1 to see the results.

Described as one of the unique college Christmas season displays in the nation, the Christmas scene unfolds on the Tech's campus each night at dusk as photo-electric cells connected to the building's lighting systems automatically turns the lights on.

Tech maintenance crews work about three weeks in advance of the ceremony, uncrating bulbs and electrical system and placing thousands of feet of cord on building facings.

Norma Clark To Fly To Wedding

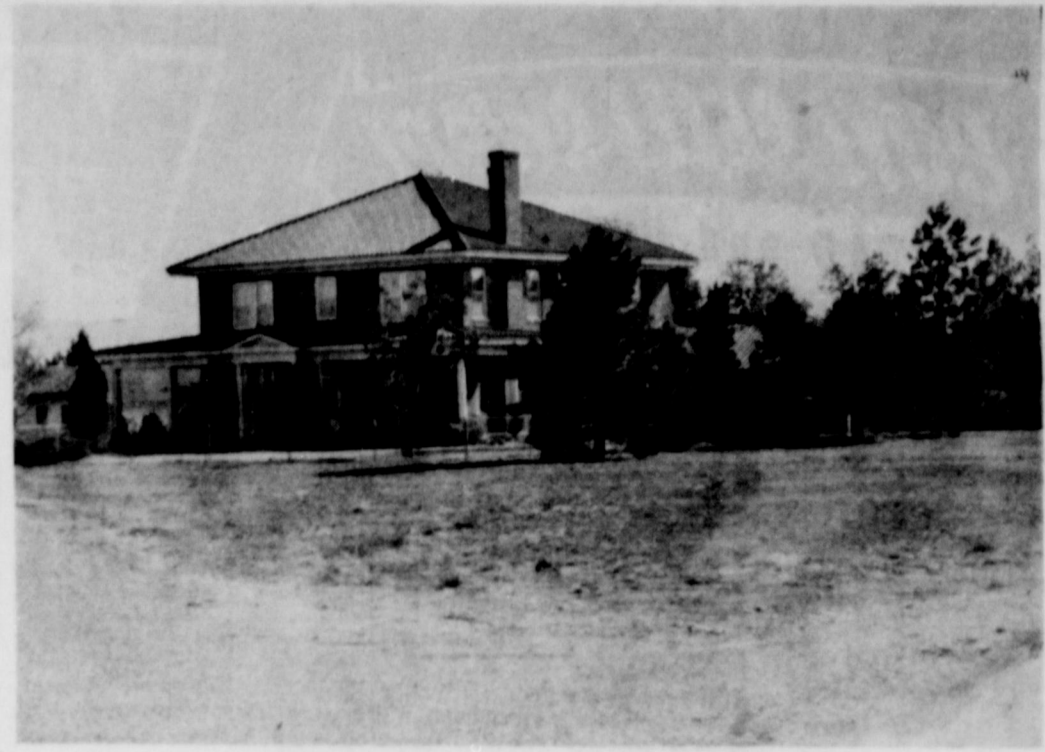

Owner of the huge estate, is a kind, petite, pioneer lady, Mrs. L. Lumsden, who recalls vividly her two-day journey by wagon train from Floyd County.

In the spring of 1907, Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Lumsden, their hired help and a great herd of cattle set forth and became the first settlers on 30 sections of land. Mrs. Lumsden re-lates how their cattle roamed the range and drank water from the windmills-one that was then located in east Slaton.

The Lumsden's first house was of wooden frame and con-sisted of four rooms, which they built on to later when they purchased their land. The rail-road was put down connecting Slaton and Lamesa in 1910, and soon after the present town-site was surveyed and the name "Wilson" was decided upon.

Then parts of the Wilson County School Ranch Land was divided into farming areas and purchased. In 1927, the Lum-sden's moved their original home east of the present location, and brought brick and other supplies in by railway to build their

plantation home. The first home was later destroyed by fire, and many sentiments were lost in flames. Mrs. Lumsden's present home consists of a living-room, din-ing room, kitchen, den, five bed-rooms, three baths, powder rooms, two hallways, lovely stairway, and a built-in glassed porch.

Mr. Lumsden passed away in 1951. Mrs. Lumsden has one son, residing in Wilson with his wife and three daughters, Sharon, Sandra and Sharmyn. Sharon and Sandra both at-tempt Texas Tech in Lubbock and are graduates of Wilson High School. Sharmyn is a sev-enth-grade student of Wilson Junior High.

Mrs. L. Lumsden was hon-ored in September as the only charter member of the Baptist Church in Wilson, and for her many years of faithful service, with a tea and program of "Memories" as the theme. Re-cently, Mrs. L. Lumsden at-tempted the State Baptist Con-vention in Corpus Christi.

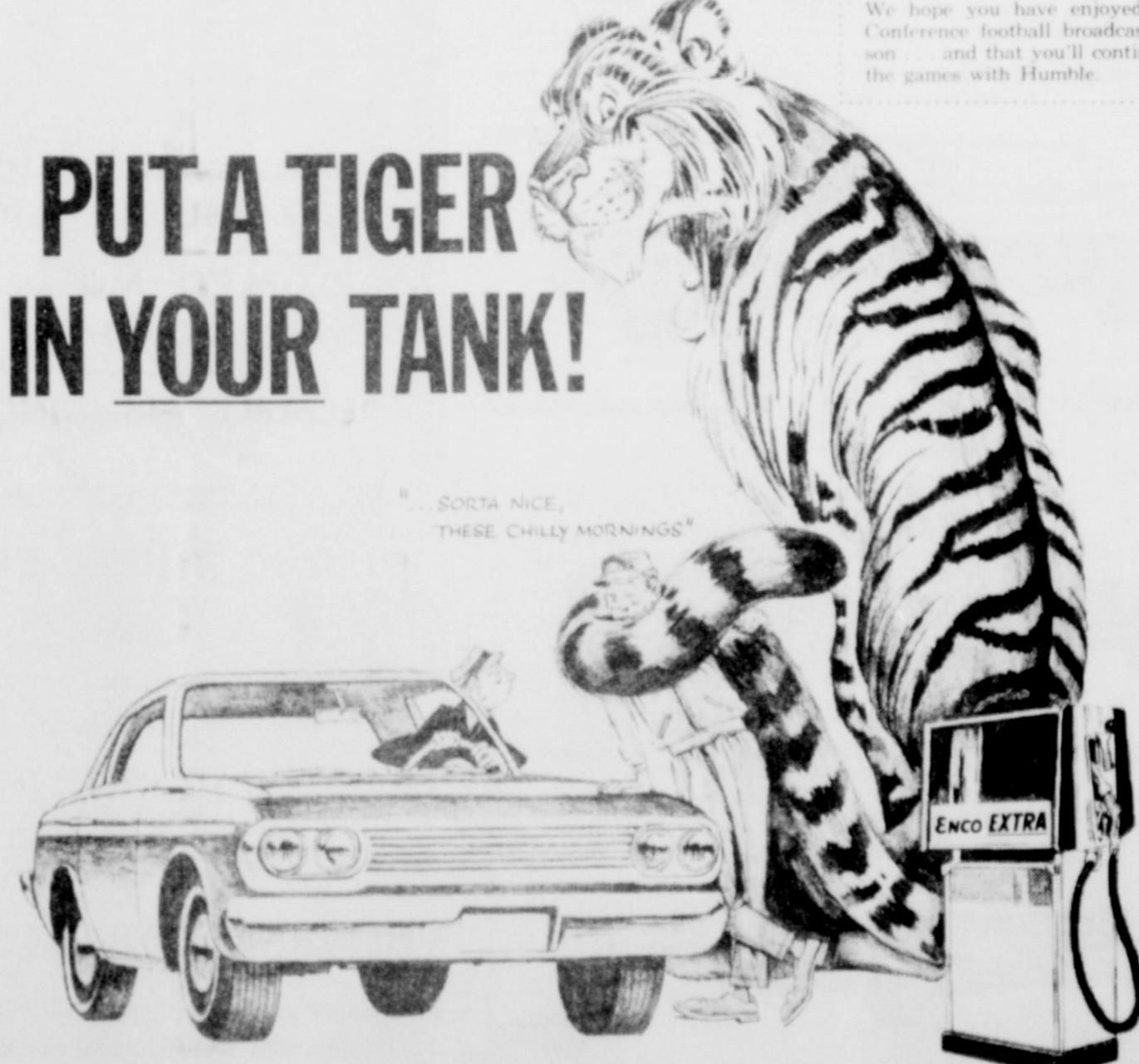
