

Mayor Jonas Cain said Wednesday that he would attempt to secure a hearing for Slaton officials "as soon as possible" with the commissioners court. George Green, Slaton's commissioner from Precinct 2, and Les Derrick of Precinct 3 returned early this week from

Division Street is an extension of F-M Road 41, and the portion in question lies between 9th Street and 21st Street. The city commission also pointed out that the state of repair on the street is such "that it is not a mere inconvenience to the City but endangers the health and the safety to all citizens of Slaton and others using the throughfare.

F-M 41 (Division Street within the city limits) is a main artery in the city's traffic system. Mercy Hospital is located just off Division and draws a heavy load of traffic from both the east and west ends of the street. The Church of Christ is also located on Division.

The changes make it possible for any clergyman, whose time for electing social security coverage had expired, another opportunity to obtain coverage. The time during which coverage may be elected is relatively brief, Hutton emphasized. For most clergymen involved, the deadline date s April 15, 1965.

Any minister, who failed to apply for social security coverage before the time for election expired, should contact the Soial Security District Office ubbock, if he is now interested in being covered by the program. Contact should be made in person, by mail, or by telene. Those living outside ubbock should consult their postmaster to get the date the Social Security representative will be in their town.


