against the project. Out of some 1,787 cards mailed out, it was reported that about 854 returned "no" answers and 384 were in favor of the proposal.

The Chamber did not take a position on endorsing or opposing the EAS, committee chairman Don Kendrick stated.

You may have talked turkey, danced the turkey trot, sung "Turkey in the Straw"—but do you know how to prepare roast turkey like a pro?

According to the experts, correct roasting is slow cooking by dry heat on a rack in an open pan. It requires no water, little basting, no cover and no searing. Low temperatures assure better flavor and appearance, less shrinkage and less loss of juices. A shallow open pan allows for the heat to circulate around the bird, roasting it evenly.

For best results, follow these simple steps recommended by the makers of Wild Turkey Bourbon:

1. Preheat oven to 325° F. (slow).
2. Rinse bird with cold water, drain and pat dry. Rub cavity of bird lightly with salt, if desired.
3. Insert stuffing, if used, just before the turkey goes in the oven for roasting. Push drumsticks under band of skin at tail, if present; or tie them to tail.
4. Place turkey on rack in shallow roasting pan, breast side up.

Brush skin with fat. If a roast meat thermometer is to be used, insert it so that the bulb is in the center of the inside thigh muscle or in the thickest part of the breast meat.

5. Place in preheated oven. If desired, baste or brush occasionally with pan drippings—especially any dry areas. When turkey is two-thirds done, cut cord of band of skin at drumsticks.

6. When the meat thermometer registers approximately 185° F. the turkey should be done. A bird weighing between 6 to 8 lbs. will take about 2 to 2½ hours before it registers that temperature. An 8 to 12 lb. turkey will have to be kept in the oven anywhere from 2½ to 3 hours, while a bird of from 12 to 20 lbs. will need 3 to 4½ hours for completion.

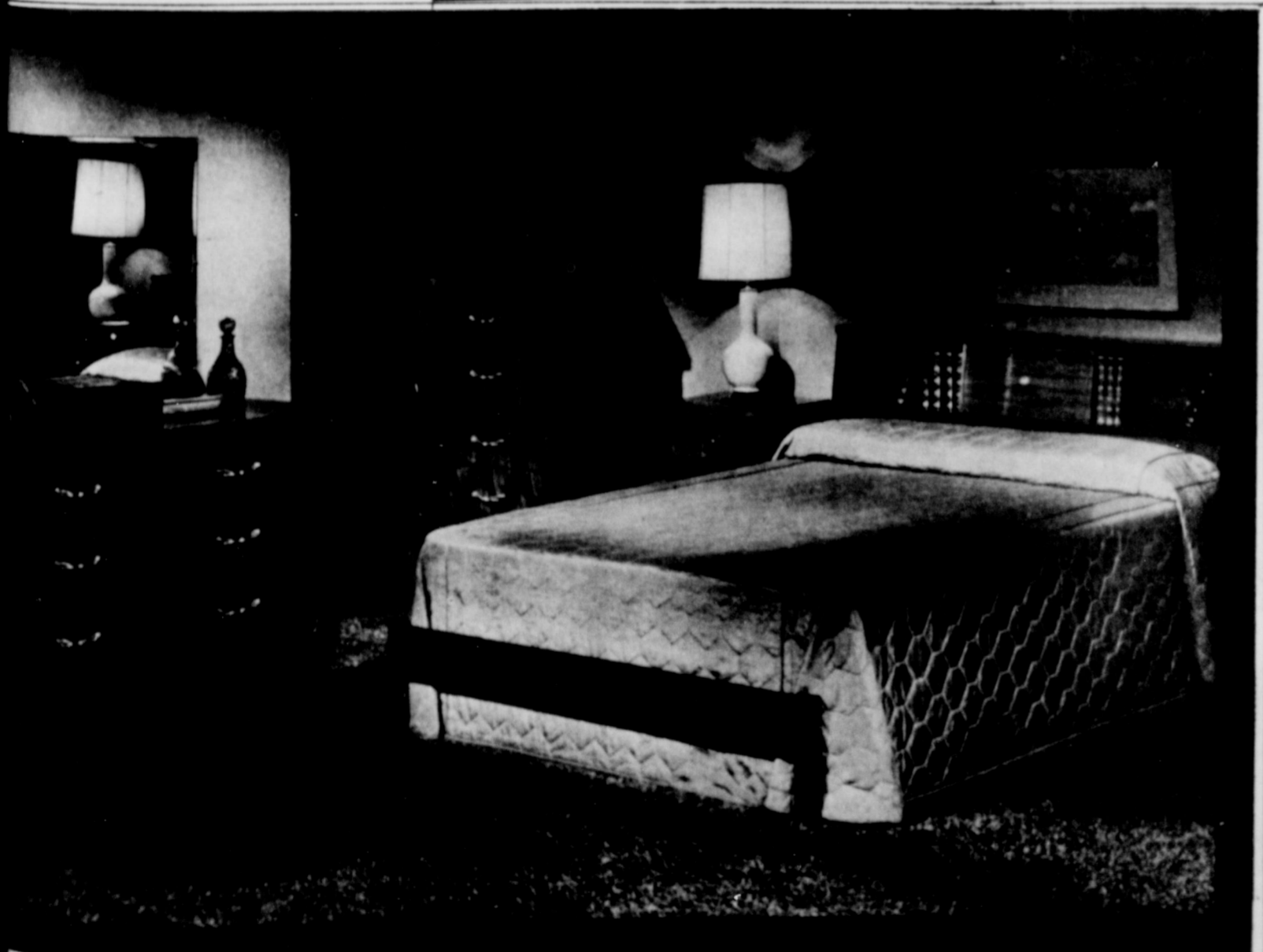

**This Dog Is Really Trained**

Ever see a dog climb a tall tree on command...or stand up, roll over and heel at mere hand signals?

"Rebel", a 3-year-old pedigree German Shepard, is that type of dog, and it goes without saying, owner Don Carpenter of 1560 W. Garza, is mighty proud of his animal.

Carpenter, who now raises and sells AKC registered Ger-

man Shepherds, became interested in this field after attending a Lubbock Police Department K-9 Training School.

A former member of the Slaton Police Department, Carpenter attended the school four months, learning all about the training of dogs—police dogs in particular. Although Slaton officials decided not to use a K-9 dog on its force, Carpenter was happy that he was sent to the school and picked up the useful knowledge.

Rebel, his pride and joy, is a "one-man" or one-family dog. He has nothing to do with persons outside of the family and, in fact, it's dan-

gerous for strangers to approach him. And as long as Don is around, he has little to do with other members of the family.

By voice command, Carpenter can command Rebel to climb a tree, and the 85-pound black beauty will gracefully leap up into the fork of a tree about 10 to 15 feet off the ground.

The dog will stand on his hind legs, lay down, roll over and go to his master's heels by voice command or by hand signal. Carpenter tries to give the dog a "workout" at least once a week...this way he always remains very attentive to commands.

One of the big secrets in

training a dog, says Carpenter, is to never hit or spank him. "This will ruin a dog's obedience factor quicker than anything," he adds.

Carpenter, who is employed with Pioneer Natural Gas Co. in Lubbock, is very particular about the care of his dogs. He watches their food closely and keeps his kennels clean at all times.

He says it takes about four months to really train a dog well. But Carpenter thinks the time is well spent—both for the owner and for the pet.

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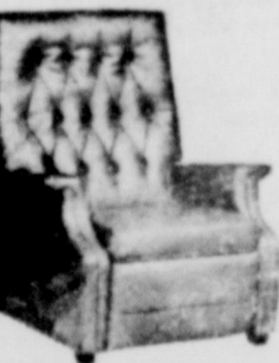

## Recipe Of The Week

As we well know German women are some of the best cooks. This certainly holds true with Mrs. Joe Moeller of Posey. Mrs. Moeller has lived in the vicinity of Slaton at different intervals since 1919. Mr. and Mrs. Moeller, who have been engaged in farming up until now at which time Mr. Moeller is retired, moved to other farms only to return to Slaton.

Mr. and Mrs. Moeller have three children, Linus of Fairbanks, Alaska, Kathrine of Amarillo, and Bernie of Slaton. Mrs. Moeller recently received a broken foot and is recovering nicely. Consequently, she is unable to do some of her usual household duties but busies herself by enjoying some of her favorite pastimes such as crocheting and tating. Mrs. Moeller enjoys baking, working in the garden and yard, growing pretty flowers, and canning by the way, she canned 100 quarts of peaches this year which she and Mr. Moeller raised themselves.

Two of Mrs. Moellers favorite recipes out of her many are listed below. Try them, and you too may add them to your list of favorite recipes.

### CARROT CAKE

1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup Wesson oil  
1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 cup grated carrots  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
Heat oven to 350 degrees (moderate) Mix sugar and Wesson oil; add sifted dry ingredients and carrots, add eggs, one at a time, beat well after each addition. Add nuts and blend well. Bake in 8x8 inch cake pan or 8 1/2 X 4 1/2 X 2 1/2 loaf pan. Bake 55 to 60 minutes. Cover cake with aluminum foil for first 20 minutes, of baking to reduce cracking. One loaf, Mrs. Moeller bakes hers in 2 layers. Frosting for two layer cake:

**FROSTING**  
1 cup sweet milk  
1 cup sugar  
Boil together till thicken, take off stove to cool, add 1 tablespoon margarine, 3/4 cup nuts, 1 teaspoon vanilla, then spread between layers and on top.  
Mrs. Moeller says the following recipe, "really is a good cake."

**RAW SWEET POTATO SURPRISE CAKE**

1 1/2 cups cooking oil  
2 cups sugar  
4 eggs separated, beat egg whites first  
4 tablespoons hot water  
2 1/2 cups sifted flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon, and  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 1/2 cups grated raw sweet potatoes  
1 cup chopped nuts,  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine oil, sugar and beat till smooth, add egg yolks one at a time beat well, add hot water, then dry ingredients, flour and with baking powder, salt, cinnamon, and nutmeg. Mix in raw sweet potatoes, nuts and vanilla, then fold in egg whites last. Bake in 3 greased cake pans 8X8, round or square, heat oven to 350 degrees, bake 45 to 50 minutes. Heat oven before mixing cake.

**FROSTING**  
1 large can evaporated milk  
1 cup sugar  
1 stick margarine  
3 egg yolks  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/3 bakers' coconut,  
1 cup chopped nuts  
Cook milk, sugar, egg yolks, till it forms a soft ball in cold water. Cook on low heat about 12 to 15 minutes stirring constantly. Remove from stove and add vanilla, margarine, nuts, and (coconut if you wish) frost between layers, sides, and top.

These cakes will be ideal for the holidays.

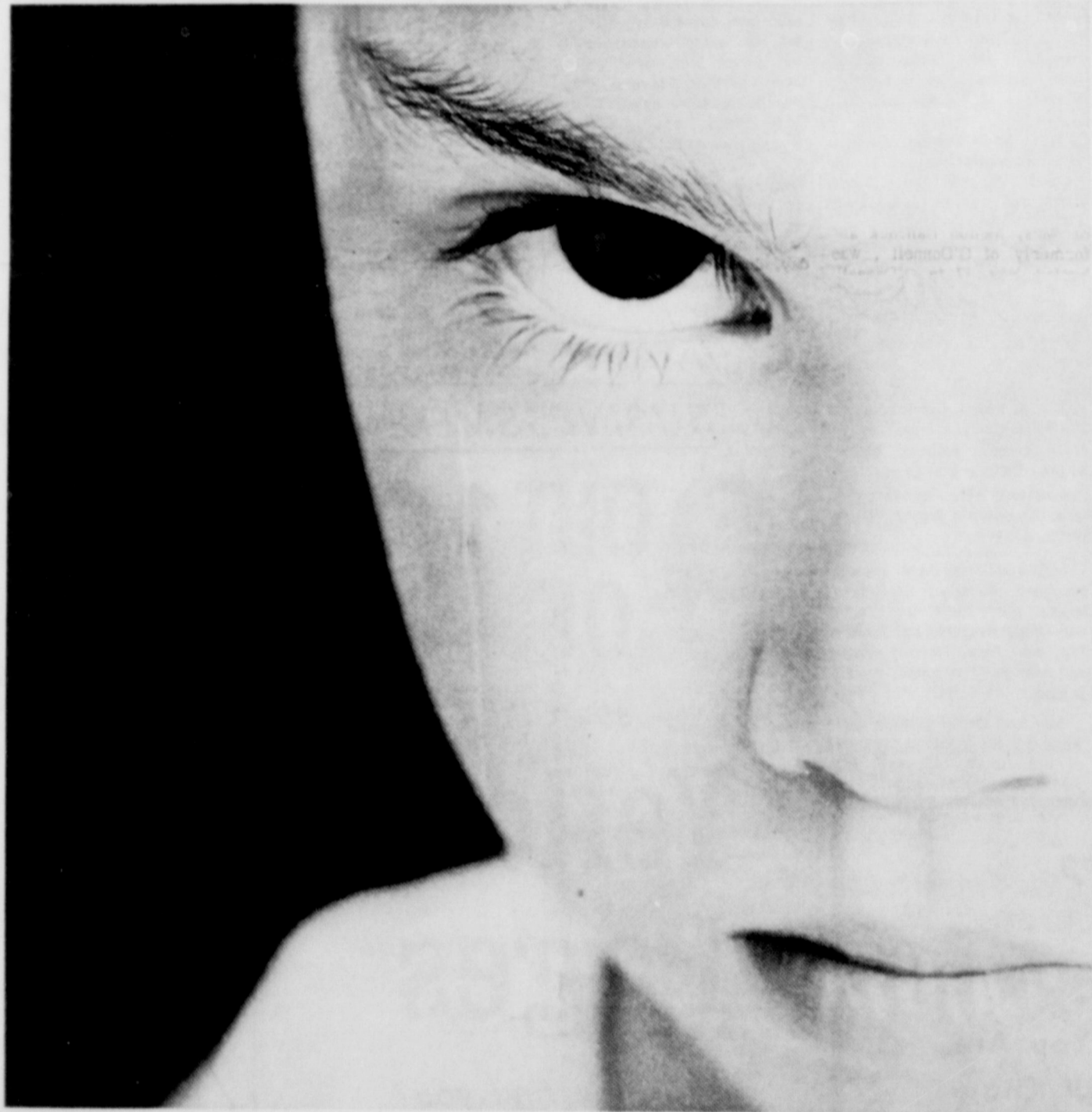

ments of Farm to Market Road 41, between 9th Street and 22nd Street within the City of Slaton.

Last April County Commissioner George Green requested authorization from the City to make improvements on county roads within the City of Slaton. On May 25, 1964, the County Commissioners Court approved and executed a Farm to Market Highway Construction Contract in which, as a portion of that contract, the improvements to County Road 77 (Farm to Market Road 41) was included.

Based upon the contractual commitment made by the County to the Contractor, the City Commissioners called a bond issue election, and if approved, a portion of such funds would be used for additional improvements on Farm to Market Road 41 (Division Street) between (9th Street and (21st Street) within the City. The bond issue was approved by the taxpayers and a contract was let for curb and guttering between 9th Street and 12st Street and that contract has been completed.

The Contractor for the County, in pursuance of his contractual agreement with the County had begun the initial phase of work on the surfacing of Farm to Market Road 41 when he received an order from the County Commissioners to cease construction. The state of repair of Farm to Market Road 41 (Division Street) is such that it is not a mere inconvenience to the City but endangers the health and the safety to all citizens of Slaton and others using the thoroughfare.

In the light of the contractual agreement made and entered into by the County and the extent of improvements for which the Citizens have obligated themselves, the City Commission, acting in the best interests of all its citizens, is using every effort to see that the County Commissioners Court fulfill its commitments to the Citizens of Slaton, Precinct 2, Lubbock County, Texas.

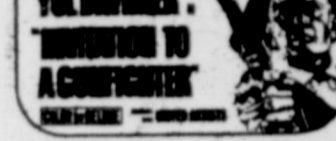

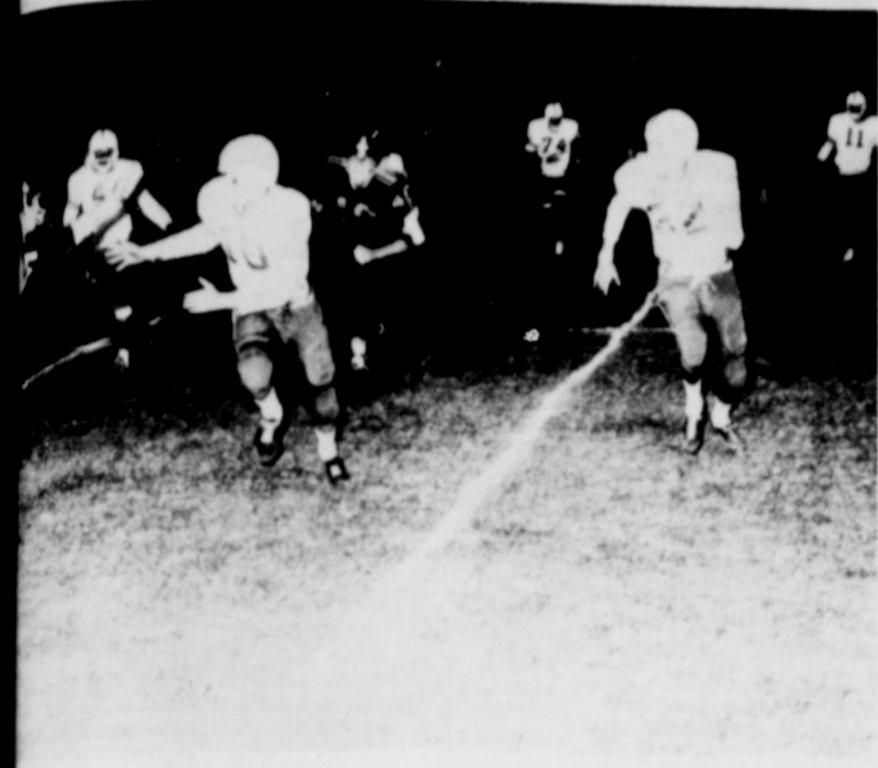

Slaton's Tigers ran into a fired-up group of Antelope gridgers at Post last Friday night, and what was billed as a close battle between old rivals turned out to be more of a warmup for Post's track team. The Post gridgers pleased a Homecoming crowd by rolling to a 40-0 victory over Slaton, the most one-sided loss absorbed by the Tigers since the series began in 1924.

An open date before the Post game apparently left the Tigers flat, since they could never mount an offensive drive and their usually strong defense

leaked to the tune of 484 yards. It was a disappointing end to an otherwise fine season for Slaton--the Tigers winding up even at 5-5 for their best mark in a number of years. Slaton was only 1-3 in the district race, however, and wound up in fourth place.

Except for the third period when Post failed to score, the big Antelope team moved up and down the field almost at will--slowed only by fumbles and penalties. Only bright spots for the Tigers were when they held the Antelopes after losing the opening kickoff on a fumble, and when they got to the Post 27 in the second period before giving up the ball on downs.

Quarterback Butch Cross, who missed part of the season with injuries, fired four touchdown passes for the Antelopes, helping the Post team clinch second place in District 4-AA.

After fumbling the opening kickoff, Slaton held Post for downs and took over at their own 29. However, the Tigers gambled and lost on a first-down try near the 39, and the Antelopes needed only four plays to move to paydirt. Benny Owen lugged the leather 4 yards for the tally and Cross passed to Sammy Simms for two points with 6:57 still left in the initial quarter.

Slaton couldn't produce a first down after the ensuing kickoff, and Post started goalward again from its own 45. Cross hit two passes in the drive, then connected with Luis Ayala on a 24-yard scoring play. The conversion attempt failed and it was 14-0 at the end of the first stanza.

Bobby Brake almost broke loose in the second period, going 22 yards before being hauled down, but the drive stalled near midfield. Post then marched for a quick touchdown as the first half ended, with Cross passing to Sims on a 5-yard scoring play. Ronald Simpson ran for 2 bonus points and it was 22-0 for Post at

## Tech Hosts Undefeated Arkansas

LUBBOCK - Texas Tech brings to a close one of its most successful seasons with possibly the toughest competition in college football at this stage of the 1964 season--the University of Arkansas Razorbacks--in Jones Stadium at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Arkansas' Razorbacks, already in the Cotton Bowl, will be seeking a possible No. 1 national ranking, a perfect season, and an undisputed Southwestern Conference championship.

All the incentive will not be that of the invaders.

Texas Tech is also definitely in the running for a major bowl invitation. Furthermore, a Red Raider victory would tie the mark of Tech's last winning team, the 1955 squad that posted a 7-2-1 mark, and would please alumni assembled for homecoming.

More than the impetus of homecoming will be needed. Tech's homecoming record hardly is formidable, since the Red Raiders have won on 19 such occasions while losing on 14, tying one.

Not since a 28-7 win over Southern Methodist in 1960 has Tech won at reunion. The law of averages may be working for Tech, however, Arkansas has taken all seven games played.

Still, the Razorbacks are hardly to be lulled by previous meetings with Tech. Only last year the Red Raiders, behind 20-0 in the first half, rallied to tie the game before losing 27-20.

Last week the Red Raiders captured their sixth victory of the season by rallying to a 28-10 win over Washington State University. As a result of 119 rushing yards, Donny Anderson of Stinnett sent his season total to 877, six more than the Tech record of 871 established by another Panhan-

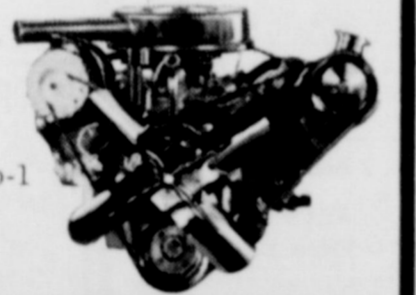

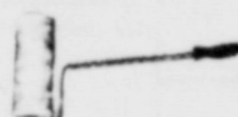

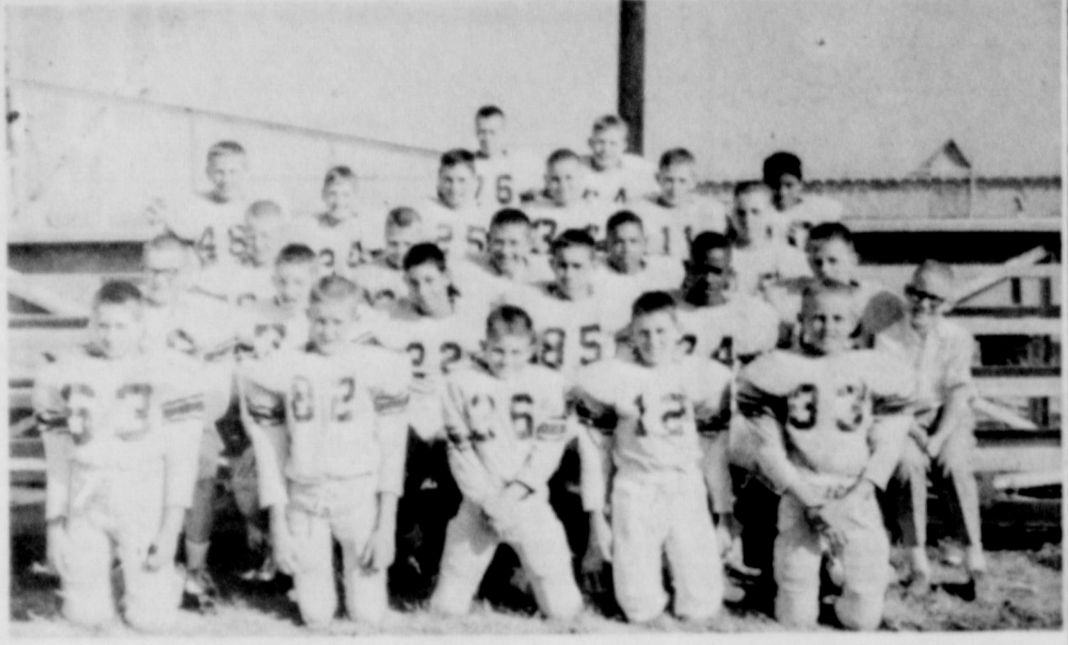

## Mechanical Harvesting Can Lower Cotton Grade

The late cotton crop soon to be ginned on the South Plains will cause some problems because of the method of harvesting. Mechanical harvesting of cotton has increased during recent years.

Cotton that is napped or harvested mechanically tends to be lower in grade and may contain more irregularities than hand-picked cotton. Most of the cotton in this section of the state will be machine-stripped. This method of harvesting strips the cotton plant from bottom to top.

In addition to open cotton, immature bolls, limbs, foliage, bark and grass gathered with the cotton are often quite difficult to remove at gins even with the best equipment.

The most difficult of the foreign matter to remove by gins is grass and bark, both of which also cause problems in the cotton classing laboratory. Samples that contain grass and bark are reduced in grade, resulting in a lower value of the cotton. When a bale containing grass or bark is used by a cotton mill, this foreign matter must be removed, and therefore means more waste, additional spinning costs, and in many instances, a lower grade of finished product.

Causes for bark in a bale of cotton are usually attributed to maladjusted machinery or stripping when the field is wet from rain or dew, or too soon after the plant is killed. If the stalk is dry, and the machinery adjusted and operating properly, cotton with bark in it is rare.

Farmers should watch their machines closely when harvesting. It should be remembered that the grade of cotton is only as good as the quality of harvested cotton delivered to the gin.

## SS Available To Ministers

Congress recently made changes in the Social Security Act which vitally affect ministers of the gospel according to John C. Hutton, district manager of the Social Security Office at Lubbock.

The changes make it possible for any clergyman, whose time for electing social security coverage had expired, another opportunity to obtain coverage. The time during which coverage may be elected is relatively brief, Hutton emphasized. For most clergymen involved, the deadline date is April 15, 1965.

Any minister, who failed to apply for social security coverage before the time for election expired, should contact the Social Security District Office Lubbock, if he is now interested in being covered by the program. Contact should be made in person, by mail, or by telephone. Those living outside Lubbock should consult their postmaster to get the date the Social Security representative will be in their town.
