MOSQUITO THREAT IS INCREASED

With recent rains increasing the prospect of a definite encephalitis threat from mosquitoes, local officials are strongly urging Slaton residents to do all they can to help keep down the mosquito population.

Walter Broedlove of the Lubbock City-County Health Unit, has reported that "dusting" for mosquitoes was scheduled last night, and that all lakes in the city have been treated for mosquito larvae since the rains. "Dust" used in the process is Benzene-Hexachloride suspended in a talcum dust.

Local city officials have asked that all residents keep weeds cut and all receptacles for stagnant water covered or destroyed. C. C. "Cliff" Weaver is cutting weeds for those who cannot do the job themselves. He has a shredder and mower for use on vacant lots, etc. His telephone number is VA 8-4797.

An ordinance which would require vacant lots to be cleared of weeds regularly, establish other nuisances which would not be allowed and set a penalty for violations is now before the Slaton City Commission.

The group will hear the second and final reading on the ordinance in next Monday night's meeting. Then, five days after it is published in The Slatonite, Thursday, July 28, it would go into effect, if it is passed on final reading as expected.

The ordinance declares and makes a nuisance of whatever is dangerous to human life or health and whatever renders the ground, water, air or food a hazard or injury to human life or health. Included is anything which is offensive to the senses or anything which tends to become detrimental to the public health.

It forbids the pumping of the contents of cesspools over any premises for fertilizing or other purposes. It provides a penalty for allowing any full or overflowing privy, vault, cesspool or other receptacle for filth, night soil and human excrement upon any premises owned or con-

Local Police Solve Sodomy, Auto Theft Cases; Give 119 Tickets

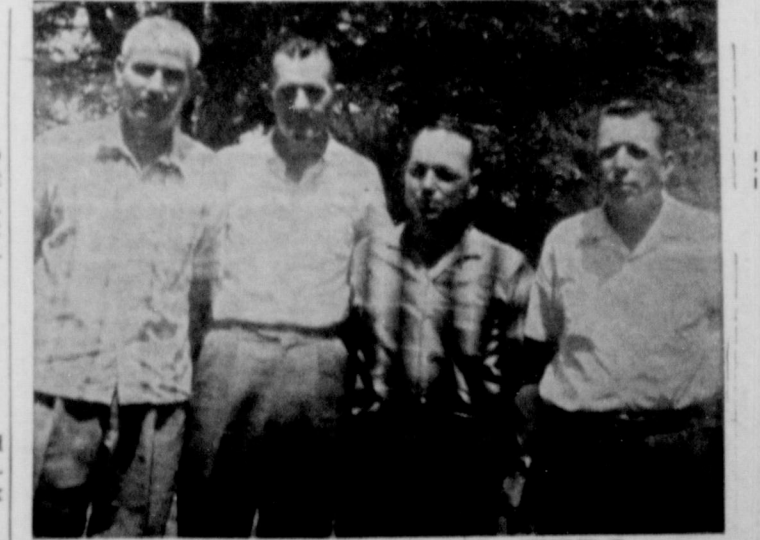
Francis Sparks, 32, of Lubbock, is charged with sodomy in Lubbock's District 10 as the result of work done by the Slaton Police.

Sparks' bond was set in Lubbock Wednesday morning at \$5,000. Several cases of stolen cars have been reported recently, with the cars recovered in each instance. Those losing cars included Dwayne Barker, Joe Martin, a Lubbock resident and a Hobbs, N.M., resident. Local police arrested Manuel Pequeno of Slaton and Pablo Barron of Hobbs in connection

with the stolen car from that New Mexico city. Lynn County Deputy Sheriff Doyle Wilson gave first chase when he recognized the car as one he reported stolen. His car bogged down, the stolen car bogged down, and other officers' cars bogged down in the chase between here and Tahoka in the rains of week before last. Slaton officers arrested the two after they had walked and hitched rides to this community. In another case, the Department of Public Safety notified local police that a car was approaching Slaton from Lubbock at a high rate of speed. The car was stopped by Officer Douglas, who noticed that a vent window was broken and there were no keys in the car. Investigation cleared this and several other auto thefts and several bur-

glaries in Lubbock. Arrested were Billy Woods, 19, and Harold High, 20, both Lubbock Negroes.

In the other stolen car cases, the cars were found abandoned a few hours after being reported as stolen. In Police Department activity during the month of June, there were 119 traffic arrests, 63 jail arrests and 22 other offenses. See Local Police Page 4

TIME FOR ACTION

How much damage and danger can be caused by mosquitoes and other pests, that breed in wet and damp places, can hardly be estimated but even the most skeptical will admit that people in Slaton should use precaution and do everything in their power to guard against the results that carelessness can cause.

"Of Course individual efforts of the home owners and those who live on rented property are the most effective," said Mayor Clark Self, when interviewed, "but the problem is so serious now that all out efforts must be made to reduce the hazards. I would like to call attention to the people in Slaton that the city owns a mower that is in operation on the city property and is available to any one who would like to have lots cleaned. The charges are \$3.00 for each 50 foot lot. The price includes the operating of the machine by a city employee and is close to actual cost, far less than to have the work done any other way. Those who wish to avail themselves of the service should call City Secretary J. J. Maxey."

There are many people who are anxious and willing to get their property free of weeds and stagnant pools of water but are unable to do so because there is not enough help available and because of the lack of tools to do the work satisfactorily. The Mayor hopes the offers mentioned above will be taken advantage of by property owners.

Health authorities report mosquitoes do not breed in deep or running water but thick vegetation, empty bottles partially filled with water and discarded cans and old tires where water has been allowed to stand, are favorite places for the mosquitoes to set up housekeeping. It is the duty of everyone in this area to prevent outbreaks of diseases caused by stagnant water. If you have regard for yourself, your family or for the welfare of the community, it is time to act.

STREETS NEED ATTENTION

Most every time the rains come the North ends of both Garza and Lubbock streets are left covered with silt and mud and becomes nearly as difficult to drive upon as streets that have never been paved. Of course they are sooner or later cleaned, after a lot of hard scraping and sweeping by the street department employees, but why wait to get the proper drainage. The work is going to have to be done and the longer it is put off the more it will cost.

Unfinished Business

Members of Congress have been taking a vacation during the political conventions, but there is no vacation for the U. S. taxpayer. Government expenses and taxes go on without a break.

Most people realize there will never be an end to paying taxes. What many do not realize—including some Congressmen—is that the federal government is charging heavier income taxes than necessary. Hanging fire in Congress during the current recess are bills which would reform the income tax rates and ease the load on everybody. These bills, sponsored by Democrat A. S. Herlong of Florida and Republican Howard Baker of Tennessee, would reduce federal income tax rates in every bracket.

The government could be expected to benefit as well as the taxpayers. Economists predict that much of the money released from taxes would be invested to start or expand businesses. This would mean new jobs, new products—and new tax sources.

Now is the time for all good Congressmen to remind themselves that the Herlong-Baker tax rate reform bills 3000 and 3001 need their attention when Congress goes back to work.

The Reader's Angle

Dear Editor,

As a favor to Slatonites and perhaps to some of the other smaller cities... would your column be kind enough to undertake an investigation into the eventual cost of water to the householder before we get irrevocably committed to the Canadian River Dam project?

Briefly, it is understood that water revenue now pays most of the operating cost of the City government. Water from wells costs not more than 3 cents per thousand gallons at the well head. The difference between this cost and the present rate to the consumer of 25c cents per thousand represents a minimum mark-up required to cover these operating costs. Thus, to the 25 cents price for Canadian River water... at the City limits... will have to be added the mark-up of about 22 cents in one form or another.

Is it intended that some of these operating costs show up in different guise, such as the present monthly sanitation charge?

In addition to the 25 cents cost of water from the dam, what incidental expenditures will be necessary for receiving, treating, pumping and distributing facilities in connection

secretary-treasurer. They were elected in a meeting of the board of directors Wednesday morning at Boyd's office.

"A community is like a child—it has to be nurtured to grow" Duncan said in his informal talk Tuesday night in the school cafeteria before sixteen men from the Idalou area. "A Chamber of Commerce," Duncan explained, "is an effective business organization for the purpose of developing agriculture, trade and industry... for promoting the live-ability of a community and a better business climate there."

Duncan pointed out that to be successful, a Chamber of Commerce needs officers to furnish leadership, objectives to work toward, a budget... "enough dollars to do the job" and a membership willing to undertake specific assignments.

"I belong to the Chamber of Commerce in my home town, Abilene, as a private citizen," Duncan said. "My dues are \$40 a year. The way I figure it, the dues I pay—which are deductible from income tax as a legitimate business expense—hire the combined talents of 1,700 people who work for me, trying to make my town a better place to live, and I hire them for only \$40 a year."

Duncan also pointed out that in the next 20 years, 80 percent of the state's population will be living in only 11 counties. One of those 11 counties, he said, will be Lubbock County, which in turn means that Idalou is situated in an area due for tremendous expansion.

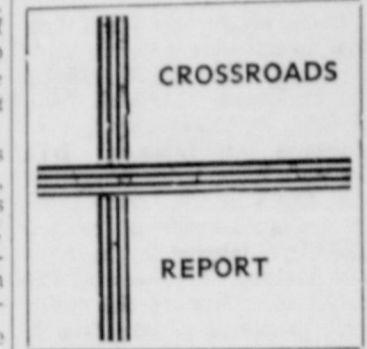

SHAMROCK

Postmaster Barry Ford has answered a question commonly asked post office employees. The question, Ford said, is what can be done to prevent receipt of unsolicited and unwanted third class matter, especially advertising circulars.

Ford said patrons may refuse unwanted circular matter by endorsing it "refused" and handing it back to the carrier or placing it in a collection box if the sender has placed a guarantee on the mail stating that return postage will be paid.

If this guarantee is not shown on the envelope, then it would be useless to refuse this type of mail as the post office destroys all undeliverable third-class matter which does not carry assurance of return postage.

Those who wish to refuse third-class matter should note whether the sender has agreed to pay return postage. This agreement is indicated by one of the following endorsements on the left side of the piece: "Return postage guaranteed," "Forwarding Postage Guaranteed,"

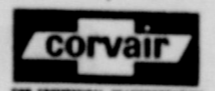

Food Sense — Not Nonsense



It's Bigger Than Both of Us

When one and one add up to more than two, it perplexes chick, child, or chief. Unlike the hen hatching twins from one egg, nutrition scientists recognize a bonus when they see one. They have looked to protein from animal sources as the ideal for growth and tissue building. Now, as they experiment in adding foods together to find the best diet for man, they come up with this plus value: Animals grow better when their food contains protein from both animal and plant sources. Animals do not grow as well when the protein is from one source alone.

At a recent nutrition conference, Dr. Leo Friedman, Nutrition Division of the Food and Drug Administration, told the why of this. Nutritionists are concerned not so much with the quality of one particular food as with the quality of the whole meal. And, he added, the total value of the whole meal may be much greater when protein comes from both animal and plant sources . . . greater than the sum of the individual parts. It may be bigger than both of them.

"It must be remembered," said Dr. Friedman, "that the protein contribution from cereal and other plant sources in a mixed diet is much greater than would be indicated by their protein quality when determined individually."

His reminder directs us in selecting our food each day. In nutrition, he tells us, one and one add up to more than two. If we over-emphasize any one food—no matter how valuable—we may be subtracting from the nutritive value of the whole. A good foodway to follow each day includes: Two servings of meat or an alternate, two servings of milk or cheese, four servings of fruits or vegetables, four servings of enriched or whole grain bread or cereal.

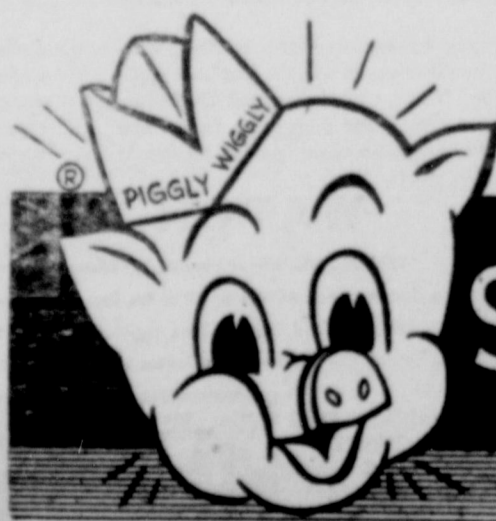

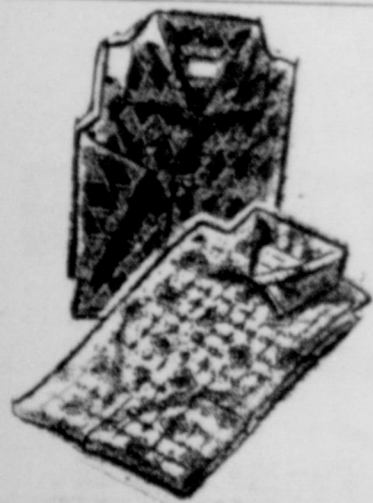

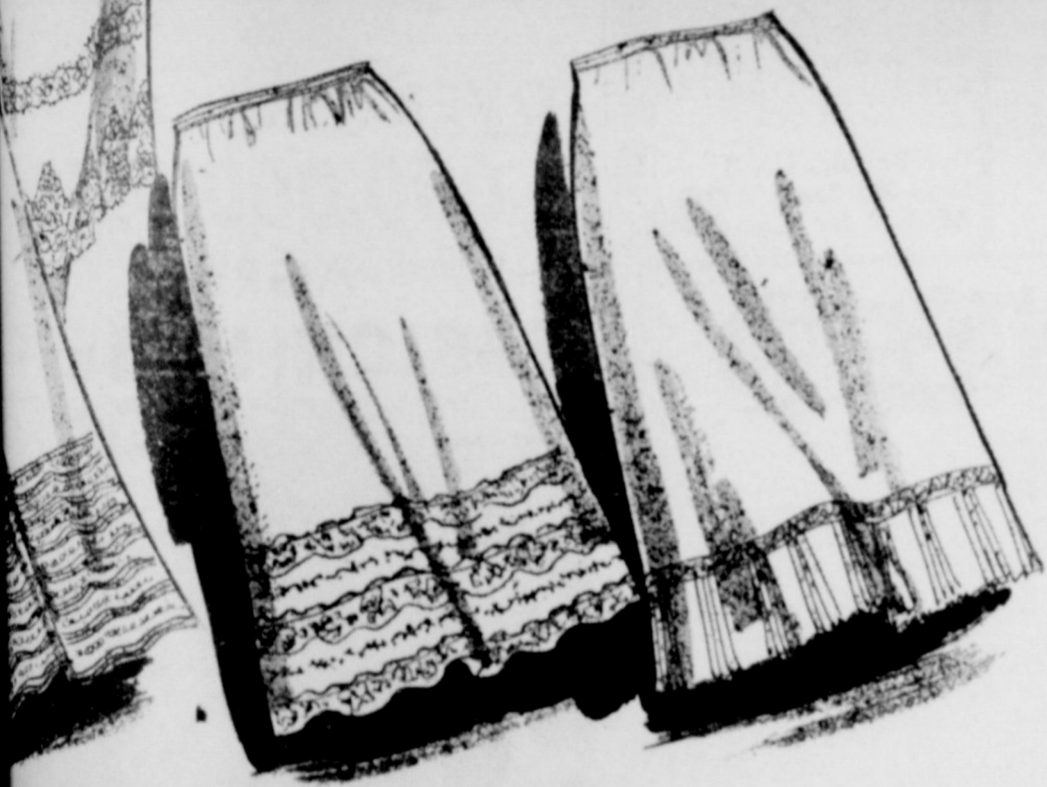
