Heavy Rains Sink Graves

Heavy rains in Slaton last week caused the fill over 94 graves in Englewood Cemetery to sink below ground level. In most cases, the depression was small, but enough so the plots cannot be maintained properly. Dirt removed when the graves were opened was wasted, as it was mostly caliche which would not support grass, and arrangements are being made to renew the grave levels with top soil, some of which will be brought from the city farm.

Education Committee Seeks Support In Higher Levels

A call for support of "a giant step" in 1965 to upgrade higher education in Texas has been issued by the Committee of the Governing Boards of State Colleges and Universities.

Police Chief Robert Breedlove announced today, that Mayor Cain, in cooperation with the Texas Police Association statewide program, has proclaimed the week of June 21st through June 27th as Burglarly Prevention Week.

1. Use good locks. Don't rely on cheap door locks to protect your home and valuables. Pin tumbler cylinder locks or locks with a dead-bolt mechanism are most effective.

2. Have one or two lamps burning during the evening hours. This can be easily done by using the automatic timer on lamps or making arrangements with a neighbor to turn them on and off each evening.

3. Be sure to discontinue deliveries during your absence. A call to the dairy is safer than a note left for the milkman. The post office will hold your mail, too. Have your newspaper forwarded to your vacation spot.

4. Tell one neighbor you are leaving, ask him if he'll look after things for you in your absence — sweeping up, cutting the lawn, picking up circulars, etc.

5. Use safety latches on all windows. They'll allow the windows to be opened far enough for proper ventilation, but not enough for some one to enter.

6. Notify the police department when you're leaving, where you can be reached in an emergency and when you expect to return.

The Sergeant expressed serious concern over the increase in fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents and deaths throughout the state.

"For the first five months of 1964, 1025 persons have died in traffic, compared to 871 for the same period of 1963," the Sergeant stated. "This 18 per cent increase is very alarming and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture. There is an increase in all types of accidents throughout the state and it is something that merits our great concern," he said.

"The driving public must assist in the reduction of this trend if we are to turn it downward. Otherwise our death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 2,729 deaths in Texas traffic during 1963. If you are driving, your life literally is in your own hands, so won't you help yourself and others by resolving not to become one of our statistics?" the Sergeant asked.

Mrs. Espinosa was thrown from the car in which three other men were riding. All three men were injured.

She was pronounced dead on the scene by Slaton Justice of the Peace Mrs. Frank Lawrence.

Driver of one of the cars said he was attempting to pass the other car when "something happened" and the car swerved and turned over on the right side of the road.

Attempting to Pass The car attempting to pass was forced off the road and plunged into the canyon.

Two persons were injured in the first vehicle. Survivors include the husband, Reynaldo Espinosa; two children, Mary, 2, and Reynaldo, Jr., 8 months; her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Juan Perez; 5 brothers and 3 sisters. Mrs. Espinosa was born July

IDEA FROM A READER

Dear Helen Alpert: I'm a small town doctor's wife. My husband and I often discuss older people's biggest problems: health, and money. Many elderly have to go into costly hospital care because nobody is at home to "nurse" them. Widows tell us it isn't the big expenses that floor them, it's the steady drain of unexpected little breakdowns in the house.

We suggest a solution, not a perfect cure — all, but a great help. Let's form a Retirement League. Absolutely no dues. Each member would receive a "bank" book. He would list with the League all services he can

perform: cooking, home nursing, sitting, reading, carpentry, repairs, taxi - service for other members. The League would place a monetary value on each item.

Then, when Mrs. X needed a faucet repaired she would call the League. The proper volunteer would be sent, then credited with this sum in the "bank" book. He is then free to "spend his money" on services he needs from other members.

The Secretary would be "paid in the same way. All this allows retirees to help one another, never feel "obligated" or reluctant to expose their needs, saves their pride, has the advantage of comradeship, and actually gives people what they need. LIGHT IMPORTANT TO LAYING FLOCK

Poultrymen should mark June 22 as a day to "light by." On that date, there will be more daylight hours available to layers than on any other day of the year.

It is important that birds never receive any less light than on June 22, says Bill Cawley, associate Extension poultry husbandman at Texas A&M University. The minimum amount of light birds should continue to receive throughout the rest of the laying year can be determined by adding together the number of hours of sunlight and artificial light they receive on this date.

Research shows that decreasing light has a much more dramatic effect on reducing egg production than increasing light has on improving egg production. As June draws to a close, poultrymen must begin to adjust their time clocks to compensate for the decrease in natural light, Cawley adds.

In the Bryan - College Station area, daylength will have decreased 1 hour, eight minutes per day by August 25 and 1 hour, 20 minutes per day by September 1. Further north, the decrease in daylength will be greater.

Remember, in order to maintain constant daylength, time clocks must be set to provide both morning and evening lights.

New Home For Houston Show

HOUSTON (SP) — Plans for the new home of the Houston Livestock Show were presented at the annual meeting of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Association.

The new home will be built adjacent to the famed Harris County Domes Stadium, which will house the rodeo held as a feature of the livestock show.

Construction is set tentatively to begin Nov. 1, 1964. The show will be held in the new facilities beginning in 1966.

The new home, a giant Y-shaped building, will be the world's largest air - conditioned livestock exhibition hall under one roof. It will cover 12 acres and will accommodate 1,700 head of halter cattle, 600 horses, 1,000 commercial cattle, 1,200 swine, 1,200 sheep and goats.

The new building will offer a 200 feet by 80 feet judging arena separate sheep and swine arenas, an auction arena for breed sales and commercial cattle, facilities, and level ramp loading facilities.

Contracts for the exhibition hall have been signed with the Houston Sports Association, and approved by the Harris County Commissioners Court. Plans and specifications are being drawn by Lloyd, Morgan & Jones, and the Wilson, Morris, Crain & Anderson architectural firms.

Guest speakers were Clint Ward of Pasadena, one of the Livestock Show's 1963 scholarship winners, elected outstanding freshman at Texas A&M University; Benny Mays, Sulphur Springs, state president of Future Farmers of America; Barry Tabola, Wharton, state 4-H Council member.

Among the new marks reported by President Lang: A new attendance record; \$20,500 for the grand champion steer; \$3,500 for the grand champion lamb; \$4,000 for the grand champion rabbit; the commercial steer auction set a record; while the souvenir program was the largest ever published by the show, and sold out at the last date.



Methodist Conference Scheduled

Two major items of business will be before the 8-state South Central Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church when it meets June 29 in Dallas at the First Methodist Church and the Sheraton - Dallas Hotel.

The conference will elect a bishop to fill the vacancy to be created by the retirement of Bishop Wm. C. Martin who has served the North and Central Texas Conferences of The Methodist Church for 18 years. Bishop Martin also headed the Northwest Texas Conference for 12 years.

Also before the conference will be the General Conference Recommendations for integration of the geographical or "white" jurisdiction with the Central of "Negro" jurisdiction. The knotty problem before the delegates will center around the degree of integration to be recommended to the annual conferences.

Some favor transferring the Negro conferences as conferences into the South Central Jurisdiction. Others favor transferring the Negro congregations into the White annual conferences within the jurisdiction. A few whites and negroes may push for integration at the congregational level, but since Negroes may now join white congregations if they choose, a strong effort to merge existing white and negro congregations is not likely to develop.

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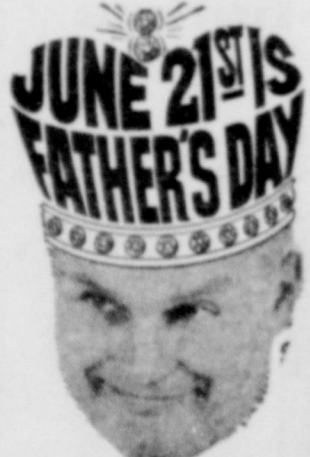

Suit was filed in 72d District Court at Lubbock by Mrs. Ricardo Rodriguez, in behalf of herself and five children, against Santa Fe Railway for \$25,000

which will be presided over by each of the bishops of the 8-state area, is under a mandate to develop a plan of voluntary integration of the Central Jurisdiction into the geographical jurisdictions by 1968. If integration has not been achieved by that date, the General Conference has asked a committee of 36 to bring a report to its 1968 session outlining mandatory abolition of the Central Jurisdiction. Acceptance of the report, however, would depend upon the action of the General Conference, and the acceptance of a constitutional amendment by the several annual conferences.

According to rules adopted by the General Conference which met in Pittsburgh in April, the newly elected bishop cannot serve for at least four years in the area from which he was elected. A minister now serving in the North or Central Texas Conferences, if elected to the episcopacy, could not be assigned to the Dallas - Fort Worth Area to succeed Bishop Wm. C. Martin. Assignment of bishops to the Episcopal Areas is made by the Committee on Episcopacy composed of laymen and ministers.

The conference, which is expected to draw more than 1000 delegates and visitors (338 are elected delegates) begins registration at 9 a.m. June 29. The first session will be held at First Methodist Church, Dallas, at 4 p.m. The sessions are open to the public.

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

VERNON SANFORD Press Association
 A study of the party primaries and elections reveals that the Republican candidate for the upcoming General election, in the grass-roots, will strengthen the growing trend toward a two-party state. For example, 18 Democratic candidates for sheriff will face Republican opponents in November. The Republican party is led in one county judge (Lubbock County) Seven county attorneys; two county clerks; 12 for county commissioner; two for county independent of schools; and county commissioner. Carr also has candidates for state posts and board of the 150 House representative posts. In addition George Bush will carry the Republican banner in the U. S. Senate race against incumbent Democrat Ralph W. Yarborough.

Water Pollution — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's opinion committee on the oil-field waste disposal question may postpone its decision indefinitely now that Superior Oil Company has filed suit against the Texas Water Pollution Control Board, asking for a declaratory judgment against the agency. A decision by former Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled that the board has jurisdiction over disposal of oilfield wastes under the Water Pollution Control Act passed by the 1961 Legislature. Railroad Commission asked Carr to issue a new opinion after a group of oil companies raised strong objections to the board's regulatory actions. Superior's filing of the suit may



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change the picture entirely on any new opinion.

Connally Honored — Gov. John Connally returned from the National Governor's Conference in Cleveland, Ohio, with an important new appointment. His selection as first chairman of the Democratic Governors Caucus was a unanimous one by the 50 Democratic state chief executives.

Reportedly, Connally also was given some consideration for chairman of the 1965 Governors Conference, although he is in his first term. The governors will hold their first major caucus before the National Democratic Convention in Atlantic City, N. J., during August.

National Guard Concerned — Texas National Guard Association expressed concern over reports that U.S. Department of Defense would stop logistical support to the so-called "reinforcing reserve."

These units, said NGAT, would provide a mobilization base on which the country would build its force in event of large-scale war.

Texas' 49th Armored and 36th Infantry divisions are both part of this "reinforcing reserve," as is the 90th Reserve Division.

Manufacturing Plants Totaled Texas had a total of 10,325 manufacturing plants which added \$6,400,000,000 of value by processing raw materials into finished goods in 1962, according to the "Annual Survey of Manufacturers," recently released by the Bureau of Census.

Figures represent an addition of \$589,000,000 capital expenditure for new plants during a single year. Some 500,000 plant workers earned a total of \$2,700,000,000 for the year, while 350,000 production workers earned \$1,600,000,000.

Food processing was the largest employer with 80,239 employees. Biggest investment was made by the chemical industry with \$167,000,000 in new capital expenditures. The petroleum refining industry spent \$155,000,000 for plant construction and improvement.

RAILWAY AUTHORITY — U. S. Representative Henry B. Gonzales has asked support from Governor Connally, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell on his recently introduced bill which aims at creating a multi-state railway authority for Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Gonzales told them, "This is truly a states' rights program. States involved would jointly investigate and determine their own needs in the area of passenger rail transportation. He further stated that "In my judgment, passenger rail transportation has not been adequately developed and is not presently competitive with other modes of transportation — particularly in the Southwest."

FIRE INSURANCE — After July 1, it will be illegal for an insurance company to charge less than 6 percent interest per year on delayed premium payments for fire insurance, a new State Board of Insurance ruling decrees.

TRIAL PUBLICITY EXPLORED — Representatives of Texas' four major press associations met here with State Bar officials for the first of a series of discussions about news coverage of trials.

Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Texas Associated Press Managing Editors Association, and United Press International Managing Editors Association participated.

Talbot Rain of Dallas served as chairman of the panel. Future conferences on the subject will be conducted for radio and television broadcasters and law enforcement officials.

Court Case Argued — The State of Texas has asked the Texas Supreme Court to reconsider its decision that the Sunday closing law does not prevent customers buying any article of merchandise on Sunday if they sign emergency certificates.

Employment Picture — Texas Employment Commission reports that in April total unemployment declined for the third straight month some 39,300 jobholders increased the employment total to 3,590,700.

Farm employment rose 17,800 to reach 300,700 by mid-April as seasonal workers were hired to plant a variety of row crops. This brought the total of seasonal workers to 105,800, or 3,500 more than at this time in 1963.

SHORT SNORTS — The State Board of Education voted to extend to one year the State's six-month program to combat school dropouts.

Twenty-one of the 2,500 elderly persons who have signed up for "Texas 65" health insurance coverage so far this month are over age 90.

AFL-CIO Committee on Job Safety, Compensation and Liability has held its first meeting. The committee will conduct a series of sessions to recommend changes in the state workmen's compensation and job safety laws.

Accusations In County Court

Following the appeal of County Treasurer Mrs. Jane Rieger to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert for an investigation into the handling of county monies at Lubbock, an "active investigation" of charges made by State Representative J. Collier Adams that things are "in a sorry state" at the courthouse is getting underway.

Adams charged that \$2,000 was missing, or at least not accounted for, from a certain county fund. District Attorney Alton Griffin and County Auditor Royal Ferguson said Thursday a thorough investigation would be made, but that no comment would be forthcoming about the specific fund until the investigation was completed at some future date.

Adams had claimed that Mrs. Rieger had been forced to call on the State Comptroller, to do something about county officials refusing to deliver county funds to the county treasurer instead of other county officials.

Another charge made by Adams was that a "private attorney" was paid \$12,800 in 1963 for work which he said state laws required to be done by the county attorney.

Adams did not name the attorney, but it was said around the courthouse, "Lubbock County Democratic Chairman Ralph Brock had received some remuneration from the county for work done on condemnation and tax proceedings last year. It was also remarked that county commissioners can legally 'farm out' court suits to private attorneys instead of having the salaried county attorneys handle them. It was said this is being done 'all over Texas.' Adams also mentioned coun-

ty employees being allowed to put personal checks into the cash drawers in exchange for cash. It was said this might be a bad practice, but was not illegal. He claimed each county of-

Lubbock Administrator Announces Loans Made Easier For Small Business Concerns

The very small businessmen — chiefly operators of retail shops or service establishments — many of whom have had a hard time obtaining financing in the past — will now find it much easier to qualify for a Government loan, Jack Teddlie, Lubbock Branch Manager of the Small Business Administration, said today.

The new, liberalized loan program was announced by President Johnson at White House ceremonies in Washington, May 8, which Mr. Teddlie attended, along with SBA Administrator Eugene P. Foley, Cortland J. Silver, Chairman of SBA's National Advisory Council, and other businessmen and Government officials.

The White House ceremonies, in connection with National Small Business Week, were the climax of a trip to Washington by Teddlie along with other SBA regional directors and branch managers to review the Agency's activities.

"President Johnson's Administration is very definitely concerned with the welfare of small business," Teddlie said. "He assured us that he has small

businessmen very much in mind every day and his interest was clearly demonstrated by his willingness to take time out from a very busy schedule personally to greet the SBA representatives."

The SBA's new small loan program reflects a new emphasis on helping the very small businesses, Teddlie said.

SBA Administrator Foley has frequently expressed the view that the Agency in the past has not done as much as it should to help the businessman at the lower end of the small business scale, he said. Yet they are often the businessmen most in need of financial help, and those who have the most difficulty in obtaining it.

The new small loan program was designed to meet this need, Teddlie said. Under this program SBA will make loans to small firms up to a maximum of \$15,000 for as long as 6 years under greatly liberalized terms.

Primary emphasis will be on the character of the applicant and his past record of meeting obligations, and no application will be turned away merely because he lacks collateral to pledge as security for the loan.

Teddlie said, "and we will take a calculated risk in cases where we believe the applicant has a favorable earnings potential sufficient to repay the loan."

"We have simplified our procedures and requirements for these loans. We believe it is important to help the many thousands of struggling small firms, as a means of creating new jobs, and stimulating the Nation's economy."

"It is clear," Teddlie said, "that the SBA will have an important role in President Johnson's war against poverty. More and more it is becoming apparent that a thriving small business community can do much toward taking up the slack in unemployment."

He said that top SBA officials in Washington are also concerned with the large number of business mergers which may be a threat to small businesses and the problem of industrial conversion from defense to commercial production.

Teddlie added that SBA officials are giving serious thought to the effects on small business in the future as the Government cuts back on defense production and the economy converts primarily to provide for civilian needs.

FARM NEWS

Extension Names Specialist In Civil Defense Engineering—W. M. Lyle on July 1 will become a civil defense specialist on the headquarters staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In making the announcement, Extension Director John E. Hutchinson said, this is a new position and the specialist's responsibilities will be primarily in the field of agricultural engineering as applied to civil defense.

The director added that Lyle would provide engineering assistance to livestock and crop specialists including educational materials on shelter facilities design and construction, protection of water and feed supplies, decontamination procedures, stand-by power equipment and maintenance and rehabilitation procedures.

He will also establish guidelines for a shelter survey service for rural counties and work with other groups including county civil defense directors as well as Extension personnel on the county, district and state levels. He is one of six in the nation named under a pilot program and the only one in the southwest, the director said.

Lyle is a native of Lubbock but grew up on a Crosby County farm. He is a graduate of Ballis High School and attended Ranger Junior College and Arlington State College before receiving a B.S. degree in agricultural engineering from Texas Technological College. He was awarded an M.S. degree at Texas A&M University in January 1964 in the same field with minors in civil engineering and math.

The new specialist had conducted research work for the City - County Health Department at Lubbock; Water Resource Institute at A&M and has done survey work in Dallas.

Director Hutchinson added that Lyle would work closely with W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer and on July 20 would go to University of Colorado for special 5 weeks training covering the responsibilities he has been given under the pilot program.

A Cotton Insect meeting will be held June 22, 10:00 a.m. at South Plains Electric Co-op, Inc. 110 N. Amarillo Road in Lubbock.

Everyone with Chemical Com-

panies, Gins, Vo-Ag Teachers, Applicators, or anyone who will be checking cotton insects this season should attend this Cotton Insect Meeting.

"Recommended Control Measures on Cotton Insects", will be the topic by Donald P. Rummel, Area Entomologist, Extension Service and "The High Plains Boll Weevil Program," will be presented by a Representative from Plains Cotton Growers.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman says beef and veal imports into the U.S. during 1964 are expected to be at about the 1959-63 5-year average. His statement indicated this is the level of beef and veal imports advocated by many groups in the cattle industry. He noted the reductions in imports was being achieved without legislation, and with the cooperation of major beef suppliers.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has set up a pesticide monitoring system to determine scientifically if significant environmental hazards are resulting from normal agricultural use of pesticides. At the same time, it was noted that recent hearings did not substantiate assumptions that fish kills in the lower Mississippi River resulted from the use of pesticides on farms. Five teams of scientists are already at work. State departments of agriculture are cooperating.

The annual Field Day at the Blackland Experiment Station located near Temple will be held on June 30. Program details will be announced later. All interested are extended a special invitation to attend by Station Superintendent R. W. Baird.

Five years ago the mandatory inspection of all poultry moving in interstate and foreign commerce became effective. The first year, USDA under a voluntary program, inspected one and two-thirds billion pounds of ready-to-cook poultry. Mandatory inspection upped this to four and three-quarters billion. Today, six and a quarter billion pounds are federally inspected, 84 percent of the poultry on the market.

"Safer American Families Everywhere" is the theme for National Farm Safety Week, July 19-25.

Both Texas Senators, Ralph Yarborough, Democrat, and John Tower, Republican, voted against an amendment to the Civil Rights bill to exempt owner-owned and operated boarding houses from the public accommodations title. It passed 51-35.

Both also voted for an amendment to bar a person from being tried twice for an act involving a federal criminal law violation and criminal contempt of court. The amendment was adopted 79-14. It also denies jury trial for contempt if a jail sentence of 30 days or less is imposed by the court.

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Over 2,500 Senior Citizens Enroll For Over 65 Insurance

Over 2,500 senior citizens have signed up for Texas 65 health insurance coverage since the second enrollment period for the program opened June 1, according to H. Lewis Rietz, president of the Texas 65 Health Insurance Association.

Twenty-one of those enrolled have been over the age of 90, he said.

Rietz reminded Texas 65 years of age and past that they had only until midnight Monday June 15, to enroll during this second enrollment period.

The unique health insurance coverage is available to all Texans regardless of their age past 65 and without physical examination or medical questionnaire. Wives and husbands of those enrolled may also purchase the coverage though they may not have yet attained the age of 65.

Relatives may purchase Texas 65 for their kin without the necessity of the insured signing the application form.

Three plans of health insurance are available under Texas 65. The basic plan sells for \$9 per month. The major medical plan costs \$10 per month and the combination of the two plans is \$19 per month.

Any insurance agent licensed to sell health insurance in Texas is authorized to take applications for Texas 65 during the open enrollment.

Sixty-four insurance companies doing business in Texas underwrite and guarantee the benefits of Texas 65, which was authorized by the 1963 Texas Legislature to assist those who could not otherwise purchase health insurance because of age or physical condition.
