Sandy Akin, 16-year-old Slaton student in a South Plains Electric Co-Op contest, Kathy Brown won a \$500 scholarship last August in a statewide historical essay contest. Sandy, and each of the contestants, gave 7-minute talks Monday night on "Rural Electrification, Good For All Americans." She composed her own talk, recalling the birth of rural electric co-ops and predicting the future of the organizations.

BRAINSTORM SESSION SET

Gin Stockholder Meeting Held

The seventh annual stockholders meeting of Union Co-op Gin was held Wednesday of last week in the Slaton Club House.

A total amount of \$56,688.27 was handed out in dividend checks. The net earnings reported by C. L. Boggs and Bobby Raper of Merriman & Co. amounted to \$69,496.49 on 5,930 bales of cotton ginned. This amounted to a net of \$11.72 per bale.

Twenty-one percent of the current year's earnings plus all of the 1960-61 stock was paid to the members of the association.

During the business session, Clarence Kitten was re-elected for a three year term as director. Special guests in attendance were: Otha Key from the Plains Co-op Oil Mill, Cliff Bloodworth Plains Co-op Compress, Jack Thompson of Plains Co-operative Association, Stanley Pace of Texas Planting Seed Association, Bruce Pember of Pember Insurance, and Shirley Green, local seed breeder.

Jesse M. Johnson is manager of the association. Officers are Bobby Jones, president, Willie Bednarz, vice president, and Clarence Kitten, secretary. Other directors are Pat Patterson and Joe Gamble.

Two Hurt In 4-Car Mishap

A four car accident Sunday morning at Lubbock and 19th St. hurt two Slaton residents at Mercy Hospital. Joe Roland Rhoads, 19, driver of a 1964 Mercury was treated and released. Mrs. Jim Hughes, driver of a 1963 Pontiac, was admitted for treatment and observation and released Monday.

Rhoads was heading south on 19th Street and Mrs. Hughes was traveling east on Lubbock Street when the collision occurred. There was no stop sign on either street. When these two cars collided, Mrs. Hughes auto struck a 1964 Oldsmobile owned by Jake Wendel which was unoccupied and parked on the corner of 19th and Lubbock Streets. Wendel's car struck another parked car belonging to Jerry Kitten. Kitten's car received less damage than any involved. Damages on it totaled \$50.

Rhoads' car suffered \$1200 in damages, Hughes' damages were estimated at \$2000, and Wendel's car had an estimated damage of \$400.

BIG VOTE AT WILSON

School Trustee Results Given

A light voter turnout gave approval to unopposed candidates on the Slaton School Board but three incumbents were unseated in a record vote at Wilson.

Incumbents at Roosevelt and Cooper won re-election over challengers.

W. T. (Tommy) Davis Jr. and Don Kendrick were elected to trustee posts on the Slaton board in an uncontested ballot. A total of 94 votes were cast. J. T. Kendrick (Don's father) and R. E. Ayers did not seek re-election.

A record vote of 196 was counted at Wilson where nine candidates filed for three posts. Elected were Reuben Sander 122, Roy L. Kahlich 104, and Weldon Meador, 82.

The incumbents and their vote totals: Walter Ray Steen 58, Lloyd Mears 32, and Cecil Weid 69. Others in the field: E. C. Stabeno 25, Dale Zant 43 and T. A. Stone 19.

A total of 55 ballots were cast in the Roosevelt School District where incumbents Bud Hettler and Bob Parker were re-elected.

Tag Sales Total About 5,000 Here

When the doors closed at Drewry Insurance April 1, there had been approximately 5,000 vehicles registered for 1965 license plates.

Mrs. F. A. Drewry, deputy tax collector, reported there were approximately 3,400 passenger cars registered, nearly 800 commercial trucks, nearly 400 farm trucks, about 25 motor scooters, plus trucks, tractors, and trailers.

Between now and the end of 1965, Mrs. Drewry expects to sell at least 1,000 more tags, plus 1,500 to 2,000 tags for cotton trailers.

Holder Named Wilson Mayor

A. L. Holder, bank vice president, was elected mayor of Wilson by a three-vote margin here Tuesday as 62 ballots--a heavy turnout--were counted in the city election.

Holder received 31 votes for the mayor's post while A. N. Crowson drew 28. Crowson, a councilman, had been acting mayor to finish out an unexpired term.

Named with Holder in the voting were councilmen Clarence Nelson with 30 votes, D. J. Hutcheson with 42, and Alfred Krause with 35. The latter newly elected.

Other votes for council posts: Ira Clary 24, Thad Smith 20, and Oscar Follis, 26.

Incumbent Jonas Cain gained voter approval for a second term as mayor as Slaton voters turned out in large numbers Tuesday to cast ballots in a spirited three-man race.

Ward 3 Commissioner Henry Bollinger was unsuccessful in his bid for re-election, however, as J. A. (Jack) Smith won a two-year term by a 122-75 vote decision. Ward 1 Commissioner Clark Self Jr., unopposed, won his first full term after being elected in a special election last year.

Cain polled 414 votes while Luther Gregory, former city judge, trailed by 90 votes in receiving 324 votes for the runner-up position. J. W. (Curly) Martindale received 206 votes. The vote total was 944.

The ballot total was not a record, but it was more than most towns tabulated around the area. An even 1,000 votes were cast in the mayor's election here two years ago. There are approximately 2,000 eligible voters in the city.

Cain and Gregory each carried two wards in the at-large mayor's race. Cain's margin in Wards 3 and 4, however, were larger than Gregory could muster in Wards 1 and 2. Martindale ran second in Ward 4, and he was still 85 votes behind Cain.

The two challengers polled 530 votes together, compared to the 414 for Mayor Cain. Ward 1 reported the most ballots--287, and Ward 2 was close with 280. Ward 3 had 199 votes and Ward 4 had 178.

Of the 287 ballots cast in Ward 1, Self drew 271 and there was one write-in for R. N. McMinn. All but two votes from Ward 3 were accounted for in the 122 to 75 victory for Smith.

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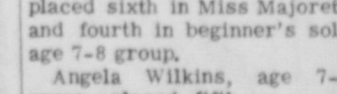
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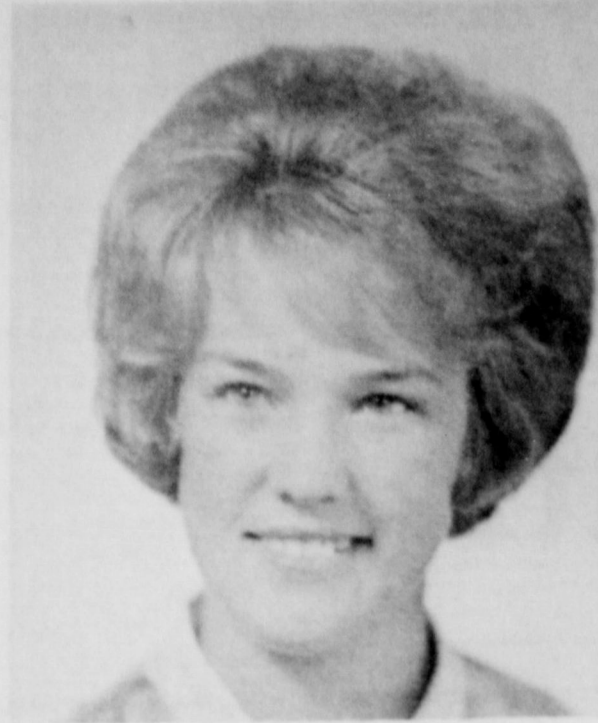

ed in the chamber and cooled by steam, then nitrogen dioxide gas is formed.

The ion molecules rise into the air carrying a negative electrical charge which is supposed to be strong enough to allow them to reach the moisture-laden atmosphere. This is also supposed to cause a chain reaction among the nuclei which increase the density of the vapor, causing it to fall as rain.

An interesting part of the story is how this rain-making project was initiated in the first place. It all started at Bruner's breakfast table one morning as he sat watching tumbleweeds roll across his yard.

A radio news report interrupted to inform that Dawson County had been declared a drought area and Federal aid was available. The thought entered Bruner's mind that aid was needed in the form of rainfall more than anything else.

Lamesa had experimented with a cloud-seeding project back in the drought days of 1953-54. "I thought to myself", relates Bruner, "that if there is anything to cloud-seeding, why doesn't the government do something about it?"

Bruner thought of all the air bases around the area with pilots going on practice runs day after day. Why not provide many of the planes with cloud-seeding equipment and let them try to help with the moisture problem while they're flying around?

Bruner followed up immediately, writing Congressman George Mahon about his idea. Rep. Mahon replied that it was an interesting idea and he would explore the possibilities.

Next, Bruner went to the Chamber of Commerce with his idea and the letter from Mahon. A meeting was called when the interested men learned that Uncle Sam couldn't do anything this year, if at all. At first the men talked about forming their own corporation and hiring someone to seed the clouds, then along came Bruner with his proposition.

Bruner claims the cloud-seeding method is outdated, and he quoted some statistics of his experiments around Arizona which were impressive, to say the least.

"I've never seen a more confident inventor," says Bruner. Dawson County farmers and those all around the area hope his confidence is well founded.

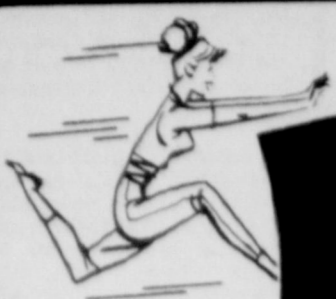

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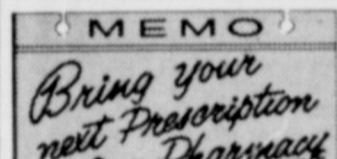
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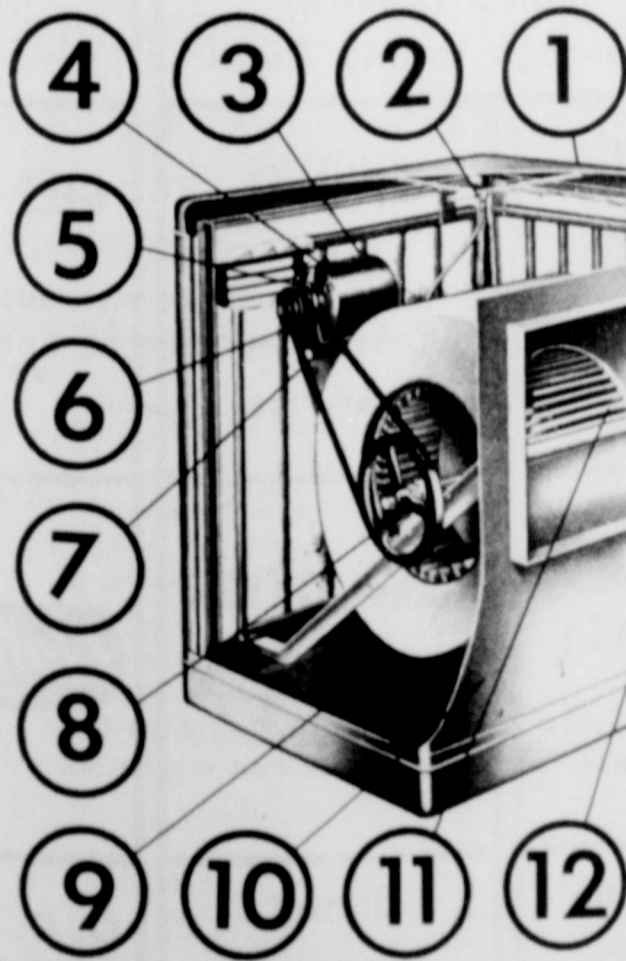
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JIMMY DARRYL DUNCAN

Credits Listed For Graduation

The requirements for high school graduation will soon be posted and in order to graduate requirements for the following subjects must be made:

There must be four credits of English, 2 1/2 credits of history - including American history, 2 credits concerning all mathematics other than general math. Freshman students with a "B" average or better in the eighth grade may take algebra. All others will take general math. There must be two credits in science.

Two credits of vocational agriculture or home economics will substitute for 1 credit of general science.

For any other courses, 9 1/2 credits, excluding physical education, to total 20 credits. Two years of physical education is required for all freshmen and sophomores. Students taking marching band or competitive sports may be excused from P.E.

A student may not accumulate more than 5 1/2 credits per year. No more than 4 credits may be received for band, choral, or a combination of both. No student may enroll in a grammar or literature course until the preceding completed. Students must have 5 credits at the beginning of the year to be in the sophomore class, 10 credits to be in the junior class, and 14 credits to be in the senior class.

Typing, mathematics, bookkeeping and shorthand may receive 1 full credit on the basis of a passing final of the second semester, D.E. with approval of work will receive 2 credits per year and is limited to junior and senior students, and vocational agriculture 111 (2 periods per day will receive 2 credits per year).

Final examinations are given to those students with less than an "A minus" average and to those with more than 5 absences.

The following courses are offered to the High School students:

NINTH GRADE- English I, Algebra 1, or general math, Spanish 1, Homemaking 1, agriculture, general science, general Social Science, Choral, P.E.

TENTH GRADE-English 11, Algebra 1, Geometry, World History (if not taken in 9th grade), Biology, Homemaking, Agriculture, Speech, Spanish 1 or 11, Typing, Band, Choral, P.E.

ELEVENTH GRADE-English 111, American History, Algebra 11, Geometry, Homemaking, Agriculture, Chemistry, Speech Spanish 1 or 11, Typing 1, Journalism, Distributive education, Choral, Band, P.E.

TWELFTH GRADE- English IV, Civics, Texas History, Trigonometry, Applied Math, Algebra 11, Shorthand, Geometry, Typing, Physics, Bookkeeping, World Geography, Chemistry, Agriculture, Homemaking, Journalism, Speech, Spanish 11, Distributive Education, Band, Choral, Annual, Office.
