Chairman Walker Seeks Assistance

Drive around Muleshoe . . . take a trip down a few alleys . . . look into a few yards here and there . . . check the paint on several houses . . . What do you see? Do you see a well-kept town and yards; nicely painted houses and clean alleys; empty lots mowed and free of weeds; abandoned cars towed away?

The Businessmen Activities Committee of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce is launching a spring Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up campaign which will begin tomorrow, Monday, May 19.

Curtis Walker, who is also president of the Muleshoe Jaycees has been named chairman of the drive which will conclude Wednesday, June 18. Thursday morning, Muleshoe Mayor W.B. LeVeque signed a proclamation designating a cleanup campaign to begin at once, not only from a health standpoint, but also from an industrial standpoint and as an inducement for people to come to Muleshoe to live.

Of the proposed clean-up campaign, City Health Officer, Dr. B.O. McDaniel said, "it is very important from a health standpoint that clean-up activities begin at once. Trash and garbage breed rats, insects and disease.

"We urge everyone, property owners and individuals, to do their part to make our town safe from disease through weeds, trash and garbage," concluded the health officer.

President of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation Harmon Elliott took a tour through Muleshoe Thursday morning and after looking over the town, he said, that the garbage and weeds are not a pretty

Wild Weather Wallops Area

To make it unanimous for the week, wild weather again assaulted the south Plains area as hail, wind, rain and roaring tornados belted a wide area. Thursday night, sky watchers saw billowing thunderheads for the fourth straight day as the area especially east and northeast of Bailey County was assailed with the wild weather.

Clouds that hovered all Friday, with only an occasional glimpse of the sun finally gathered speed and began to move in the county Friday afternoon and Maple reported the first tornado southwest of that community. The Maple report was followed quickly by a report of a tornado on the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, 20 miles south of Muleshoe and two near Bula. Also at the same time, the first weather watch for the evening from 4:30 to 6:30 went into effect.

A vicious red sandstorm struck the area late Friday afternoon around 7:15 and on the heels of the sandstorm, which split just before moving in on Muleshoe, a tornado hit in Lazbuddie at 7:30 p.m. The

worst of the storm veered to the northeast where the tornado struck a trailer house just across the road from the Lazbuddie Post Office. It picked up the trailer house, dumped it upside down on a pickup demolishing both the trailer house and the pickup. No injuries were reported as the owners, Mr. and Mrs. S.W. Moore, had just left the trailer house and sought shelter.

The heavy rain and hail that was right behind the sandstorm dumped up to eight inches of hail in the area, along with a rain that temporarily closed roads in the area. The Texas State Highway Department was working at a late hour to blade off the heavy, deep accumulation of hail that had Highway 214 closed near Clay's Corner.

For a time Friday night, several area towns were under immediate alert and tornado signals were blown at Sudan, Amherst, Littlefield, Earth and Dimmitt as the vicious storms roamed over the area.

Mobile X-Ray Unit To be Here Thursday

The Christmas Seal X-ray Unit of the West Texas Tuberculosis Association will be in Muleshoe on May 22, under the auspices of the Rotary Club, Lions Club and Jaycees. The unit will be located at Crow Chevrolet during the day.

Everyone over the age of twelve years should take advantage of this facility. In past months, the Unit has been responsible for locating case after case of possible tuberculosis, both active and inactive, as well as many other lung disorders.

Tuberculosis is not a thing of the past. It continues to be the most infectious of infectious diseases, causing more deaths than any other communicable disease.

The Unit helps to locate many other conditions, such as emphysema, a disease which causes the air sacs in the lungs to become greatly enlarged.

The incidence of emphysema, along with chronic bronchitis, has increased over 900 percent since 1960. The major cause of these diseases is cigarette smoking. The US Public Health Service estimates that cigarette smoking will be responsible for 300,000 deaths this year - one Cont. on Page 3, Col. 3

Classroom Teachers Association; Muleshoe C.T.A.; Texas State Teachers Association; Muleshoe Local Unit of T.S.T.A.; National Education Association; American Association of University Women; National Council of Teachers of English; National Council of Teachers of Math; International Reading Association (IRA); and Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading.

Mrs. Sanders has served in many positions of leadership in these organizations. She is past president of the Muleshoe C.T.A.; has been a building representative in T.S.T.A. and C.T.A.; and has participated in programs on many occasions. She is a member of the Order of Eastern Star and The First Baptist Church of Muleshoe. "Twelve years ago," commented Mrs. Obenhaus, "Mrs. Sanders saw the need of teaching the non-English speaking child in a specific way. Because of his language barrier, the Spanish speaking child must be involved in numerous oral

language activities in order to catch up with his peers," Mrs. Sanders relates.

"She was almost a 'pioneer' in this field," continued Mrs. Obenhaus, "before the state initiated the special programs to aid these children. In searching for ways to break the language barrier, she has piloted on her own many techniques and used many materials. She is a great resource person and many new teachers have benefited from her 'research projects.'"

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sanders reside at 515 West Fifth, but Sanders farms in the Goodland area.

They have three married children. Robert Sanders, Jr., and Karen, his wife, live in Amarillo. He is associated with Employers Insurance Company, Mrs. Norman Brantley lives in Houston and her husband is a systems analyst for R.C.A.; Mrs. Bill Buell teaches Special Education in Arlington, Tex., and her husband is a student at North Texas State College, Denton.

Walker has designated area chairmen to help with the campaign. Mrs. John Young will be in charge of the richland Hills area; Mrs. Eugene Howard, will also assist with Richland Hills; Mrs. Kenneth Henry will be chairman of the Lenau and Morrison and Country Club Additions and Mrs. J. Pat Wagon will be in charge of improvements in downtown Muleshoe and the Highways.
Walker said other committees will be appointed at a later date.
The Muleshoe Area Women's Service Organization has designated the first of June to begin "Lawn of the Month" awards for 1969. This presentation was instituted late in 1968 and the yard of Justice of the Peace Joe D. Vaughn was the first winner.

CITY MANAGER SAYS CITY TO COOPERATE
