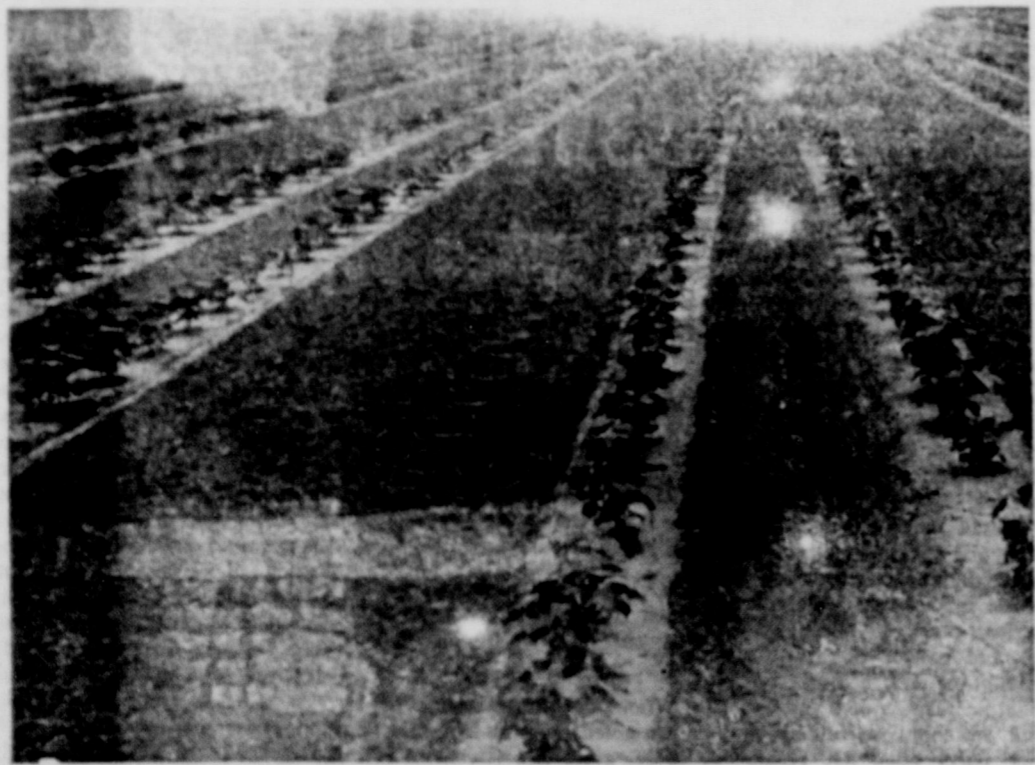

It's certain centralization in Washington is an issue but it's equally true that many one-time state functions have been abdicated for lack of know-how and efficiency on the local level.

In that connection, our system of political subdivisions should be reevaluated with an eye toward merging certain functions now separated by county and city government and even state and county authority.

Doing away with multiple, duplicating functions would result in monetary savings to hard-pressed small unit governments and at the same time would release more funds to help finance projects now threatened by a take-over from Washington.

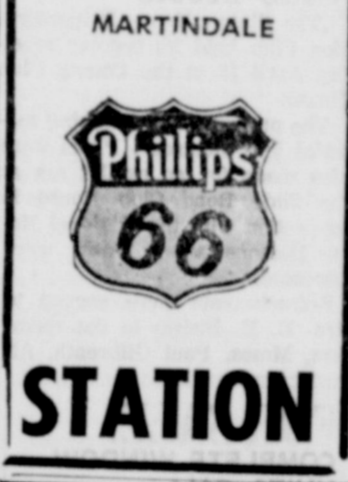

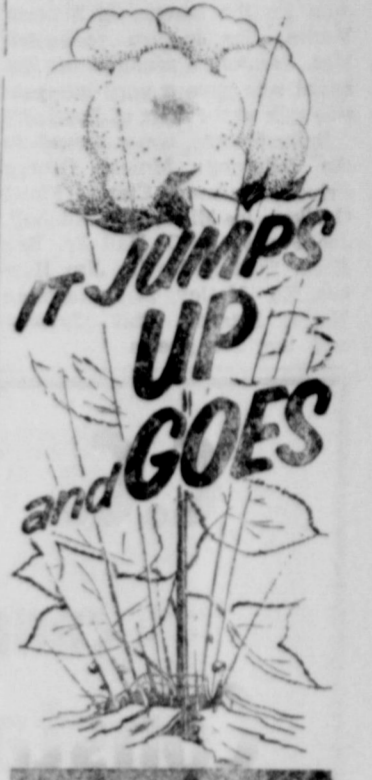


It is vital to our state and nation that as many persons as possible participate in these essential functions of representative government.

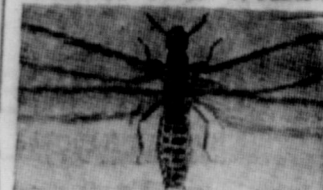

The Slaton Volunteer Fire Department met Monday night in its bi-monthly practice session. The first part of the meeting was taken up with helping Civil Defense authorities with a practice alert which was staged at 7:30 p. m. Various firemen were placed at points throughout town to test the audibility of the existing fire sirens which are, at present, the only warning devices available. Upon reporting back, it was learned that the northwest part of town and the south east part of town

were the least well covered by the alarm system. Apparently the alert was noticed by several people as a deluge of telephone calls to the fire station were received. At present, the alert consists of a continuous blast lasting for some 5 minutes followed at an interval of a few minutes by short blasts lasting for some 3 minutes in duration. This signal means to take cover.

The last part of the meeting was conducted by Assistant Fire Chief Pete Williams, department training officer, in further familiarizing members of the department with proper wearing and maintenance of the Scott Air Pack breathing apparatus which is used to enter smoke filled structures.

One fire for the past week was reported, it being the lake area due west of the Compress. Firemen then supervised the burning of the remainder of the area which has constituted a fire menace since last fall.

**LETTER RECEIVED**  
Letter from Macon, Georgia marked "not to be opened except at regular meeting" was read. It was an application from a 34-year old man for the job of Police Chief at Slaton. His experience with the FBI, the CIA, Burns Detective Agency and other law enforcement offices must have totaled more than 34 years, and he said he was not interested in salary, as he had an adequate inherited income. Police Chief Martin would not agree to work for free, but it was decided not to replace him with the gentlemen from Georgia at present.

**SHOOTING AT FARM**  
Martin and Baker complained about unregulated shooting on the sewer farm having damaged pumps and machinery recently. Being outside city limits, they cannot legally control it, nor can they get help from the Sheriff's office in time to prevent damage. Moved by Reasoner, seconded by Bollinger a carried, that the city limits be extended to include 20 feet each side of the road from the center line of the road from the east end of Division Street to the city and enclosing it. City Attorney instructed draw up necessary ordinances. Prohibiting use of firearms in this area.

**CITY FINANCE**  
The balance of the evening was given to discussion of city finances. Present charter limits tax rate to \$1.50 per hundred, which is maximum for cities under 5,000 population. Slaton, now about 7,000, would be allowed tax rate of \$2.50 if charter were amended. It is possible to call more bonds or issue time warrants with present limit. City Attorney Cravens was instructed to present at the next regular

meeting an ordinance calling for an election to amend the charter accordingly, election to be held sometime in June. It is not proposed to raise the tax rate more than ten to twenty cents at present, but it is hoped to be able to finance \$16,000 for improving Division Street, and \$10,000 to \$12,000 for badly needed extensions of water and sewer lines in Southeast Slaton. Cravens and Cain were also asked to investigate terms which could be had for sale of \$16,000, \$28,000 or \$40,000 time warrants if the charter amendment passed. Certainly no bonds or time warrants can be issued unless provision is made for increased taxes to pay them off.

**IMPROVEMENTS**  
City Engineer Reaves was asked for an estimate of requirements for minimum improvements in next two or three years. He guessed \$75,000 for water supply, \$50,000 for mains, distribution system, fire protection; \$16,000 for widening Division, and \$68,000 for repairs to existing streets, making a total of \$209,000; sewer extensions needed in three or four years would take about \$76,000 more. It was felt that time warrants could be issued to provide \$28,000 for Division Street and water and sewer lines to Southeast Slaton, and this would have to suffice for the present. The entire matter is quite complex and will be discussed in detail and at length so that all citizens will understand it before it comes to an election.

Present city tax valuation is 35 percent of estimated market value, much less than some neighboring cities. Legal limit of ten percent bonded indebtedness on this valuation would permit issuance of bonds necessary, but they would not be saleable unless revenue is provided to pay interest and principal as due.

There is also the possibility of issuing revenue bonds, payable out of water receipts; but present water rates would not make such bonds attractive to investors except at high interest rate.

Present were Mayor Jonas Cain, Commissioners Robert Banks, Jr. Henry Bollinger, and Earl Reasoner. Commissioner Truett Bownds did not attend.

Also on hand for consultation were City Attorney Claud S Cravens Jr., City Engineer Bennett Reaves, Director of Public Works G. Wayne Baker, City Secretary Robert W. Sokoll, Certified Public Accountant John Haggard who is auditing the city books, and Joe Smith representing First Southwest Corporation of Dallas.

This firm acts as financial consultant to several cities in the area, and assists in preparation and marketing of municipal bonds.

Under the present General Law Governing cities of under 5,000 population and under which the Slaton charter was adopted, tax levy may not exceed \$1.50. The population is now near the 7,000 mark, which would permit amendment of the charter to allow a tax rate of \$2.50. Tax roll valuation in 1963 was \$7,556,000, and pre-

sent bonded debt is \$478,000.

Question of funds to permit widening of Division Street immediately, while county and is available, was brought up. It did not appear money could be made available without a bond issue.

It was decided to defer until the regular meeting Monday, April 27, decision on holding elections to amend charter and issue bonds. Commissioners wanted more time to analyze the situation and consider action.

**TRANSFER FUNDS**  
Moved by Bollinger, seconded by Reasoner, City Secretary be instructed to transfer \$15,000 from the Water Improvement Fund to the General Fund in Citizens State Bank, to meet current expenses.

Carried unanimously. This will leave about \$22,000 in the savings account.

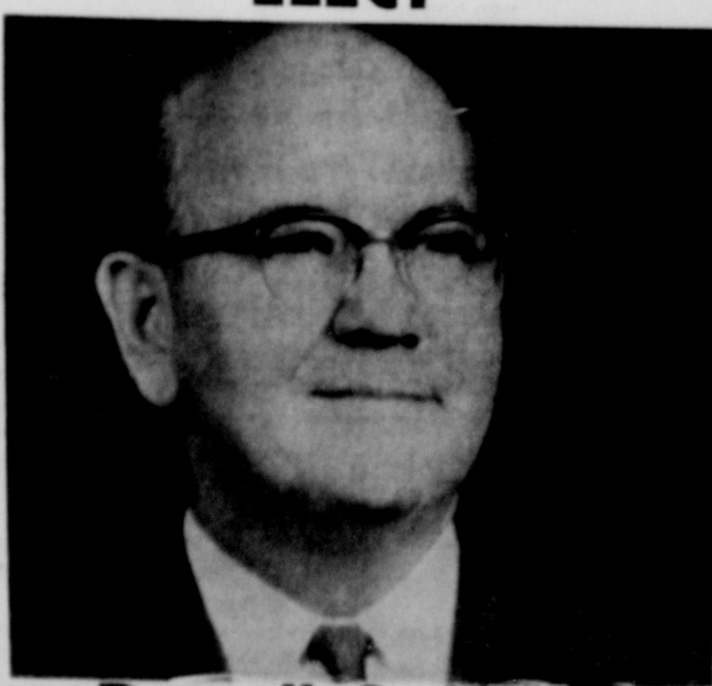

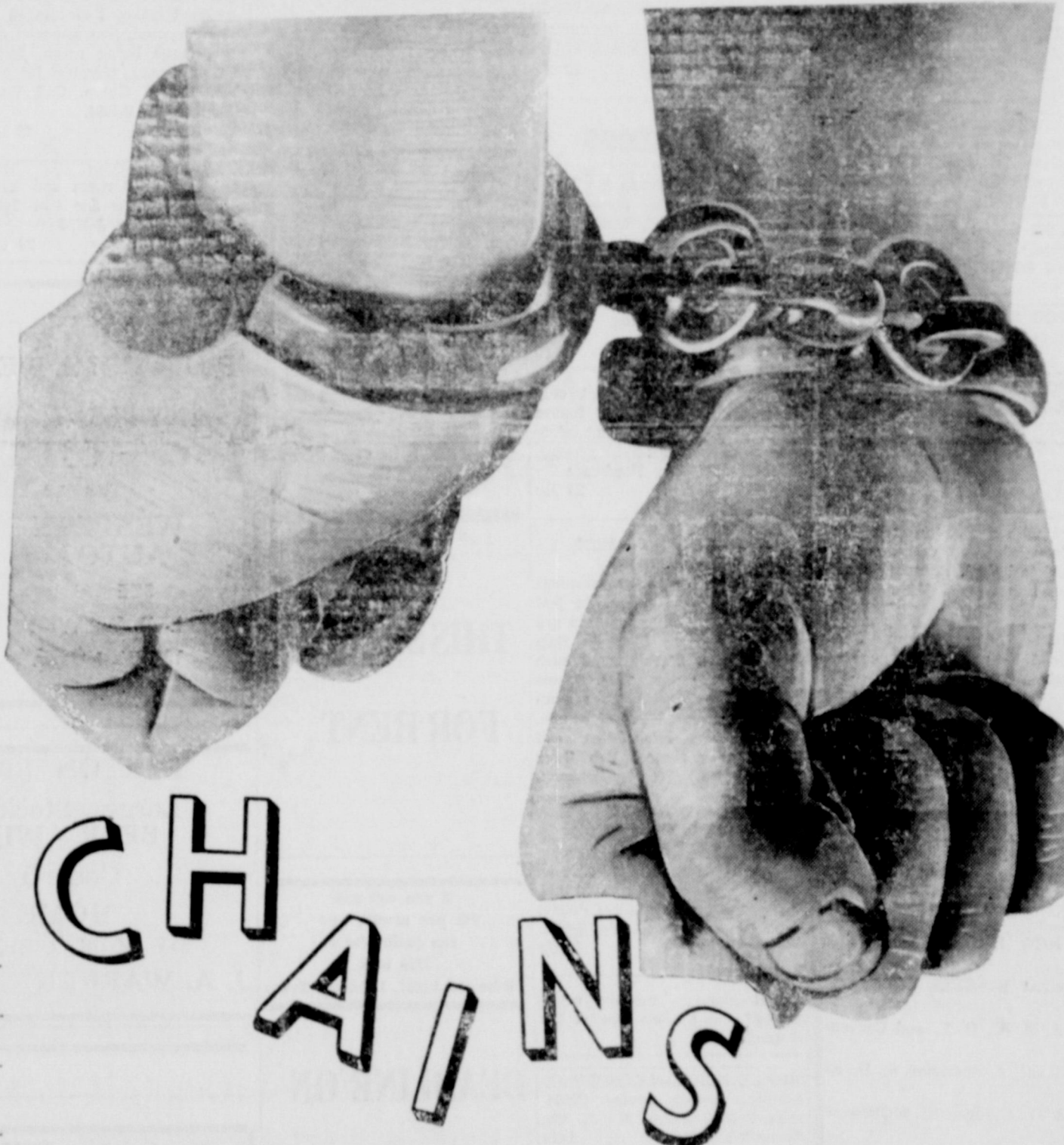
