

## PUBLIC HEARING SET ON ZONING CHANGE

# City Names Judge, Okays Housing

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, appointed a new City Judge, approved a program on low-rent housing to be submitted to the Public Housing Administration, set a public hearing for a proposed zone change, and heard a quarterly report on the budget.

W.H. (Doc) Legate, 69, a retired chiropractor, was named by the commission as the new corporation court judge. Approval came after Mayor Jonas Cain recommended the appointment.

Legate assumed the city judge duties Tuesday morning. He replaces Luther Gregory, who resigned Dec. 31 when the commission reduced his salary. Three other verbal applications had been made for the post.

Legate's salary was officially set at \$75 per month when the commission passed an ordinance on second reading Monday night. The ordinance also set the salary for the assistant coordinator of civil defense at \$25 per month. City Sec. Robert Sokoll has been appointed to this position.

Gregory had previously held both positions and received \$207.50 per month, for the two jobs.

Sokoll presented an outline of the low-income housing project proposed for Slaton and the commission approved the program. It will be submitted to the PHA for consideration.

A public hearing was also set by the commission for Feb. 5. It will concern a zoning change recommendation for a 200-foot strip of land parallel to US -84, on both sides between S. 11th and S. 15th streets. A change from residential to business zone has been requested.

In other action, the commission authorized City Atty. George Lemon to handle all delinquent taxes starting Oct. 1, 1965. Claude Cravens, former city attorney, is presently taking care of the delinquent collections.

The ward leaders also heard an insurance representative submit a group hospitalization program, then decided to continue with the present insurance program.

Early in the session, commissioners took about a 30-minute recess and went to VFW Hall to hear talk by Mrs. Ian Moore, public health nurse. Her topic was "Slaton Today".

## New Official Was Mayor In Oklahoma

Slaton had a new corporation court judge this week with the appointment of W.H. (Doc) Legate, a retired chiropractor, former mayor of Elk City, Okla., and resident of Slaton since 1948.

Legate's first case Tuesday morning served as a good initiation into the judgeship. A juvenile offender was brought to court with 10 traffic citations issued against him--charges including the running of five stop signs, speeding and driving without a license.

The offender drew a stiff fine and a stern lecture. Judge Legate's wife, Lena, is a math teacher at Slaton Junior High School and is beginning her 22nd year here. The couple have one daughter, Mrs. R.G. Webb of Seagraves, and three grandchildren.

The new city judge moved from Lubbock. Prior to that time he had lived in Elk City and Weatherford in the Sooner state. While serving as mayor at Elk City, he had the opportunity to "pinch hit" for the corporation court judge on occasions.

Legate is a member of the Masonic Lodge, American Legion and VFW. He was a doctor of chiropractic for many years, but has been retired since coming to Slaton.

## Lubbock-Amarillo Rail Service At Stake In Hearing Tuesday

A hearing relating to the discontinuance of Santa Fe passenger trains between Amarillo and Lubbock is drawing more than casual interest from a number of Slaton residents.

The Texas Railroad Commission has scheduled the hearing for next Tuesday at the courthouse in Amarillo. The application to discontinue operation of train numbers 93 and 94 have been filed with the commission by Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Co.

The application states in part that operation of these two trains "from Sept. 1, 1963 to Aug. 31, 1964 resulted in a net out-of-pocket of \$14,272."

Slaton Mayor Jonas Cain was in receipt of a letter this week from the Texas Joint Railway Labor Legislative Board urging

that people along the route desiring to retain this passenger service should organize a committee to oppose the application and have witnesses present at the hearing to testify that the service is needed.

## Editorial

We read the glaring headlines much too often, it seems. "Family Wiped Out By Train Crash".

And to the general public--to you and I who cross railway tracks time and time again without incident, the big question is always: Why did this happen?

In defense of the railroads it is always coldly, but accurately, pointed out that the trains never get off their tracks to chase down hapless cars or trucks. In defense of drivers, there are grade crossings where a safety device might have made the difference.

In Slaton--often dubbed "the Railway City"--more citizens might come to the defense of the railroads. In most cases, I think they would be justified.

In my job as a newspaper reporter, I have been at the scene of several wrecks soon after the tragedy. In my experiences, it is difficult to see how anyone but the driver of the vehicle could be blamed.

Sure, we have a heavier volume of auto traffic all the time; but this does not excuse the driver from practicing simple rules of safety. The public needs to be cautioned against charging across a track like there wasn't a train within 10 miles.

Certainly, trains should not be given unlimited right-of-way, and the public can and should demand protection where it is needed.

Whether a grade crossing has a protective device or not, however, take a few seconds to look both ways. If there is a train approaching, don't gamble if you're in doubt about the distance.

# Junior Stock Show Planned

Plans for the 6th annual Slaton Junior Livestock Show, scheduled Feb. 27 at Tiger Stadium, are fast taking shape with the Slaton Young Farmers taking charge of the sponsorship this year.

FFA members have been selling membership cards to local merchants, and the Young Farmer chapter is setting up the organization required to conduct the annual show.

The junior stock show is open to all Future Farmers and 4-H Club members in the Slaton School District. The local show comes a week before the county show and two weeks prior to the huge show in Lubbock.

Prize money and ribbons will be awarded in all classes, the number of places depending on

entries. A cash showmanship award is also to be presented. Don Mitchell, vocational ag instructor at Slaton High, says he expects about 50 boys to show animals here.

Mitchell and Ed Gilliam, both ag instructors, and Larry Gamble, FFA student president, were guests at the Lions Club meeting Tuesday and outlined plans for the big show.

Mitchell explained that stock shows serve as project programs for the FFA boys, and the program gives many city boys an opportunity to raise and feed animals. He pointed out the importance of ag training, in that 65 percent of the job openings in Texas have requirements relating to agriculture.

The ag instructor added that vocational ag training teaches responsibility in the wide range of subjects covered. Stock shows, he explained, add incentive for the boys who feed out an animal as a project.

Merchants and individuals who purchase memberships are helping the boys to sponsor their animals, since it would be a losing proposition in many cases, Mitchell told the Lions.

Gamble, who is active in athletics and other school organizations, expressed the appreciation of the FFA members for the support given the chapter in the annual show.

# City Pioneer Observes 90th Birthday, 54 Here

When there was nothing in Slaton except "prairie dogs, mesquites and tents," a young man, his wife and four children came to this town from Plainview in a covered wagon which was to serve as their home for several months.

The year was 1911, and the young man was J.V. Howell of 1305 S. 13th St., who celebrated his birthday Wednesday, Jan. 27.

Present for his birthday dinner were his sons, Roy, of Mesa, Ariz., and L.M. of Slaton; a daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Swanson of Newton, Kans.; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Catherine Howell of Amarillo; and the daughter of Slaton with whom he makes his home, Mrs. Cleat Wright. Another son, J. D. Howell of Phoenix, Ariz., was unable to attend. His wife passed away in March, 1961, at the age of 82, and his eldest son died July 3, 1964.

The spry and energetic Mr. Howell has been in a hospital only once in his life, that being in Sept., 1961. Still in perfect health, he enjoys gardening

and recently helped paint woodwork in his home, the same home into which he moved his family on Jan. 1, 1912. At that time, the only well in Slaton was located directly west of this lot.

Soon after his arrival in Slaton, Mr. Howell started working for the Santa Fe Railway and helped build the "round house" which was torn down several years ago. He worked for the Santa Fe until 1922, when he took a position with the Union Compress, a job which he held until he was 73. He then worked six more years as a bookkeeper before he retired at 79.

Mr. Howell was born at Granger, Tex., in Williamson County, Jan. 27, 1875. He has 14 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Looking much younger than his 90 years, Mr. Howell quipped, "If I get plenty to eat, I hope to make a 100!"

# Tigers Fight for Title Shot

Slaton's Tigers kept alive their chances for a district title Tuesday at Wolforth with a conquest of the Freshmen.

The Tigerettes maintained their unbeaten record in district play, capturing an exciting 45-42 victory over the Freshren girls. Slaton's girls have won both league contests played to date.

Larry Gamble led the scoring attack for Coach Tommy Lacewell's crew as he tossed in 16 points. Oran Smith had his best point out put of the season with 12, and Deante Hatchett followed with 11 points.

The Tigers displayed a balanced attack with Larry Smith and Bobby Brake each chipping in 9 points and Jacky Mason adding 8.

Freshmen stayed in the game by hitting 22 of 29 shots at the free-throw line. Slaton connected on 13 of 27 charity tosses. David Burgamy led losers with 20 points.

The Tigers were knotted at 12-12 after one quarter and held only a 27-26 advantage at halftime. A third-quarter outburst of 23 points gave Slaton the impetus needed for the win.

The victory left Slaton with a 3-1 mark in District 4-AA action, while Denver City continued to hold the lead with a victory over Post Tuesday night.

The defending champion Mustangs slapped down Slaton here last Friday night by a 68-49 score to take the driver's seat in the league race. The Tigers had a week shooting percentage from the field and hit only 19 of 31 free shots. The "off" night for Slaton came at a bad time.

Deante Hatchett was about the only bright spot in that game, the lanky forward turning in a outstanding performance as he hit for 26 points and pulled down numerous rebounds.

Denver City used a full court press to slow down the Slaton offense, causing a number of bad passes and stealing the ball on many occasions.

The Tigers go to Petersburg Friday night for a non-district game, then resume league action at Post next Tuesday night.

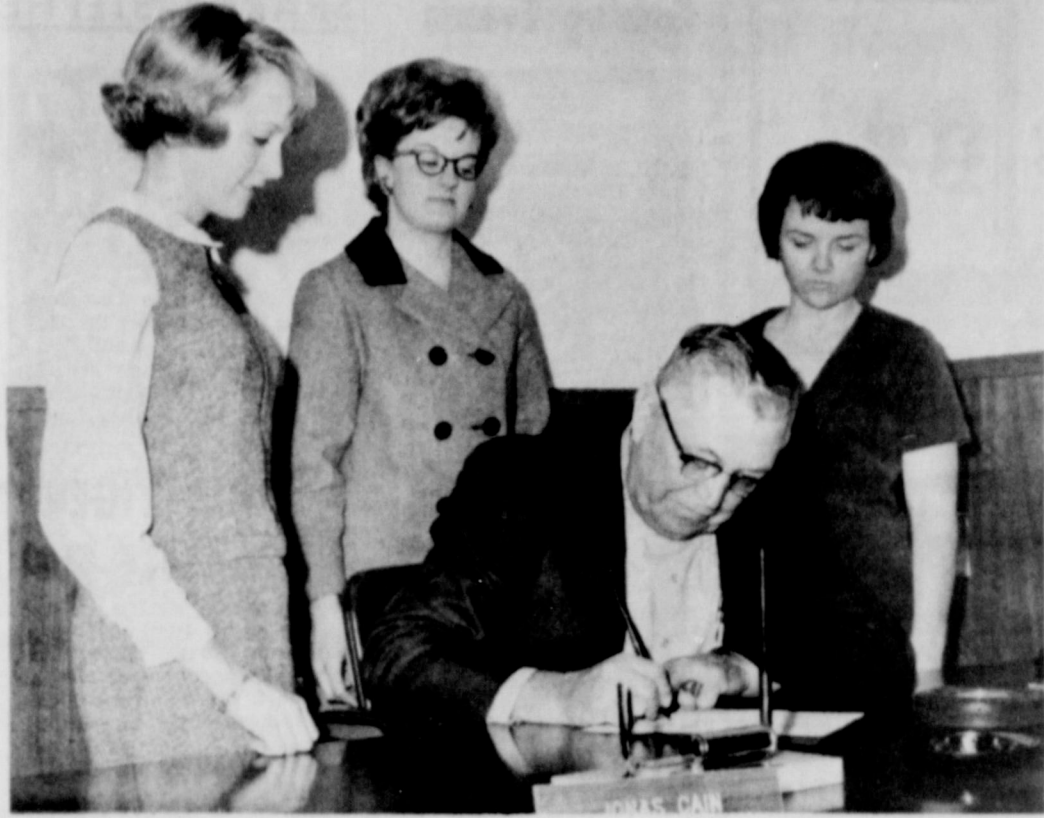

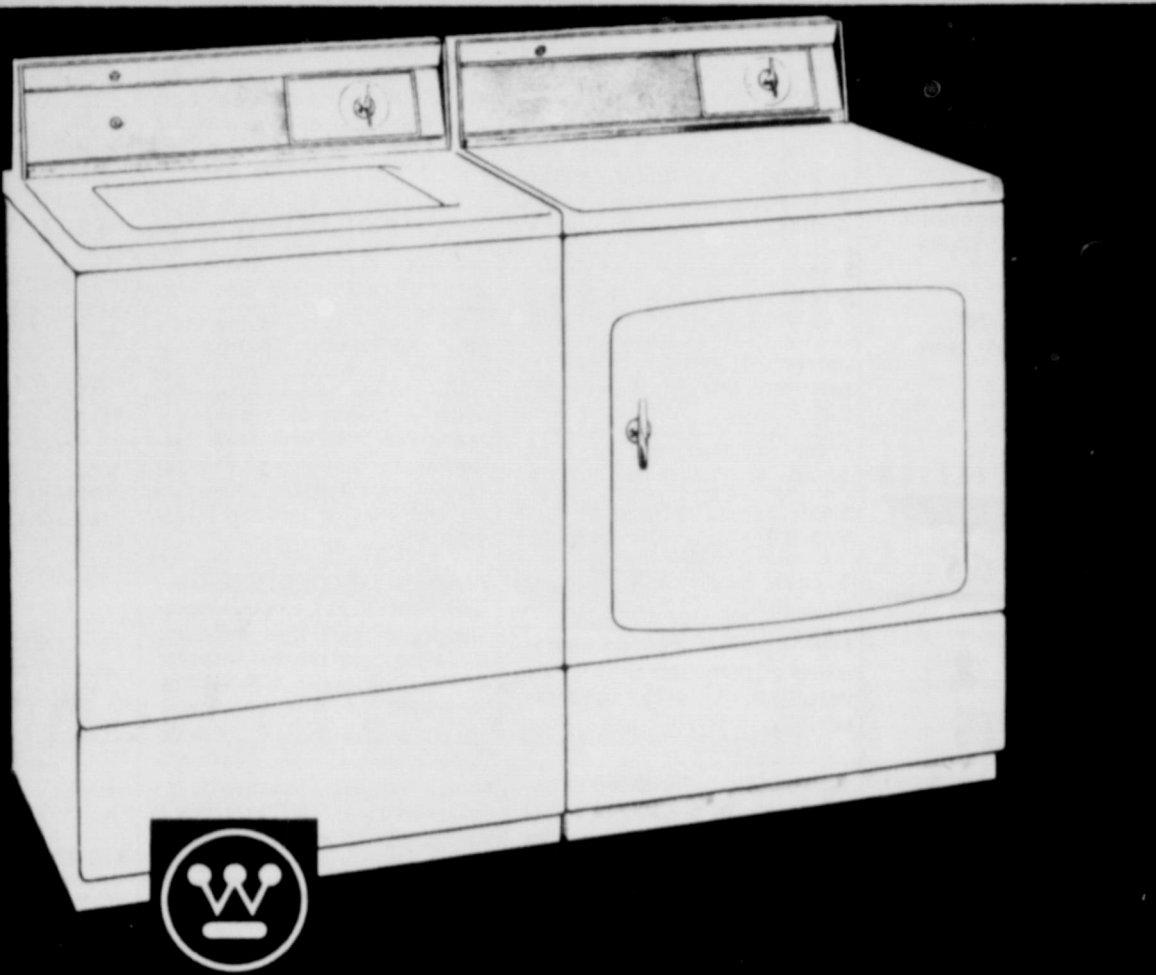

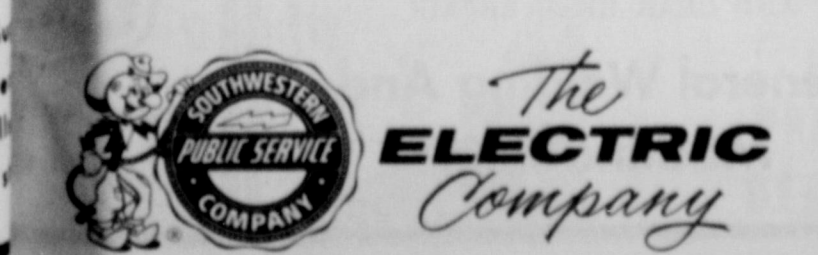
