The hundreds who came to pay their last tribute of love and esteem to the fallen man crowded every room of the spacious dwelling and overflowed into the yard and the street beyond.

Both Ministers praised highly the christian spirit, and works, of the deceased. Several scripture quotations were read, but the one forming the base of the funeral oration was: "Know ye not that a great man has fallen among you"?

In speaking of his demise following the funeral Mrs. Adams recalled that their 25th wedding anniversary was October 1st, 1932. "Also," she stated, "just the Sunday before his death we observed his birthday". 
