



Lubbock County during 1962 showed an increase of 54 percent, according to figures just released by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation Distrirt. New wells drilled in '62 totaled 241 as against 156 in 1961. Number of replacement wells drilled decreased, only seven of these in '62 compared to nine the previous year. Eighteen dry holes within the county were tallied during the year.

Actually, with the passing of time, the number of acres of cropland irrigated in the Water District area decreases slightly, whereas the number of wells continues to increase. This situation is a result of individual well capacities as water levels decline, leaving a thinner zone from which the well obtains its water supply, engineers explain. overall well-drilling picture include moisture and crop price conditions.

Lubbock County drilling permits totaled 344 last year, an increase from 192 of the previous year: 4,182 permits have been issued in the past 10 years. Actual wells drilled were 266 in '62, 178 in '61, and 3,459 in the 10-year span.

We can think of a lot of corrective measures, but without doubt the teaching of all beginning drivers (and we mean THOROUGH, PLANNED, INTENSIVE teaching) how to drive today's vehicles in today's traffic is a big step in making our tomorrows safer. This is done in large part by the high school Driver Education Course, presently financed in Texas locally or paid for by students themselves.

Driver Education not only reduces teen-age acgcidents, but it prepares our young drivers for a lifetime of safe, lawabiding, accident-free driving.

We hope a state-wide system will be worked out for every school—where financing will be assured and qualified teachers provided. It would be a big step toward traffic safety. In support of our thinking on this subject, we call to your attention the following statements from judges of local traffic courts:

"Far less Driver-Education-trained drivers ever appear in
my court. There is no doubt as to the beneficial effects of

It should be quite interesting to the reading public to sit back and watch happenings of the forthcoming lawsuit between Coach George Butts of Georgia, Coach Bear Bryant of Alabama and the Saturday Evening Post, As most sports fans know by now, the Post ran an article in last week's issue concerning a sellout of the Alabama-Georgia game last year. For many years the Post was considered one of the nation's leading conservative, reliable reading source of information. 

Helen Medloc was kind enough to lend me a copy of the newly translated New Testament, published by the Oxford and Cambridge presses.
