Phone Co. Replacing Cable

Southwestern Bell Telephone is replacing the pole line cable between 21st Street and the section line on Union Road with an underground cable which will have several times the capacity of the one being retired. The Phone Company expects building in the additions west of the new highway bypass will require more telephones than the old cable could handle.

Slaton Firemen Win All

Hale Center was the site of the 60th Semi-Annual Convention of the Panhandle Fireman Association Saturday, May 16, 1964.

An attendance of nearly 200 watched as Slaton carried away the honors in the pumper races, the water polo and the most in attendance from a single town. Other member towns participating in the festivities included Hale Center, Friona, Memphis, Dalhart, Childress, Floydada, Dumas, Hereford, Boy's Ranch, Channing and Canadian.

The results of the pumper races looked like this: Slaton 21 seconds flat; Dalhart, 22 seconds flat; Boys Ranch, 24 seconds flat; Floydada, 26.4 seconds; Dumas, 27 seconds flat; and Hereford 30.0 flat. Teams disqualified for failure to make the hook up were Friona, Memphis and Childress. In the Water Polo event, Slaton beat Dumas, Friona, Hereford and Channing to take the first place honors.

They also beat host Hale Center in a "friendly" challenge. Coy Biggs and Lee Ham were the Slaton delegates in this event while in the pumper race, Pete Williams, Lee Ham, Jerry Jones, Bobby Moore, Richard Becker and Coy Biggs were the contestants.

The business meeting saw several of the State Officials of the Volunteer Fireman Association present and addresses were given by all. C. B. Shoemaker,

association vice-president, urged towns of all sizes to make an all out effort to organize and become members of the association. Of the 79 towns in the Panhandle Association, 43 are members in good standing.

Don Kendrick, Slaton Fire Chief, made the nominating address for the September Convention requesting that the site be named as Hereford. Memphis was also in contention as a prospective site. Hereford won the vote.

He will be remembered in Slaton as a friendly, rather carefree old gentleman who was always interested in the things that were going on around him and in the town.

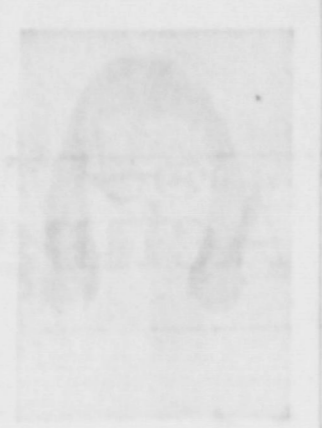
Pioneer Study Club Meets In Nowlin Home

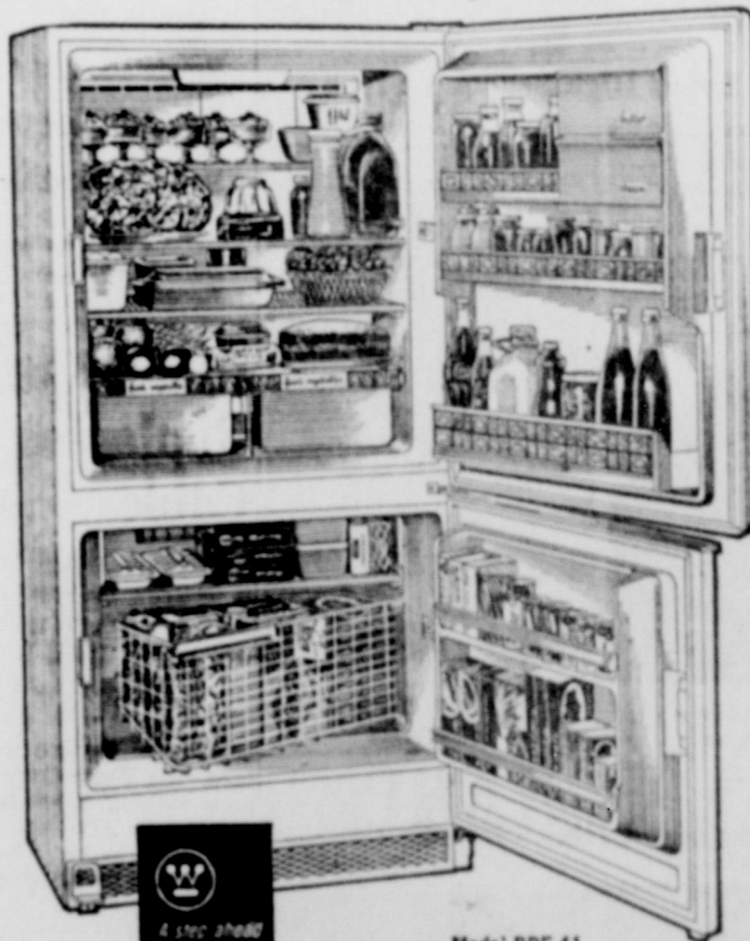

Robert Tilery, 56, of Slaton, was fined \$50 in County Court-at-Law No. 2 at Lubbock Monday on charges of check law violation.

A 33-year-old Lubbock woman was sentenced to 90 days in jail and fined \$500 for passing a worthless \$3 check for groceries last October. She had a previous conviction on a similar charge.

Lubbock County Drivers Lose Right To Drive

The Department of Public Safety reports that driver licenses of 379 Lubbock county residents were suspended during 1963. There were 2004 for habitual violators (four separate moving violations in one year or seven in two years); 181 driving while intoxicated; 29 violation of restrictions (such as those requiring glasses); 44 driving while license suspended; 6 aggravated assault with motor car; 1 negligent homicide, and 1 driving while under the influence of a drug.

In the state 25,022 licenses were suspended, and 8,632 applications for licenses were denied.

Twenty-one year olds had 1,307 licenses suspended, and nineteen-year olds 1,305. The oldest driver whose license was suspended was 96.

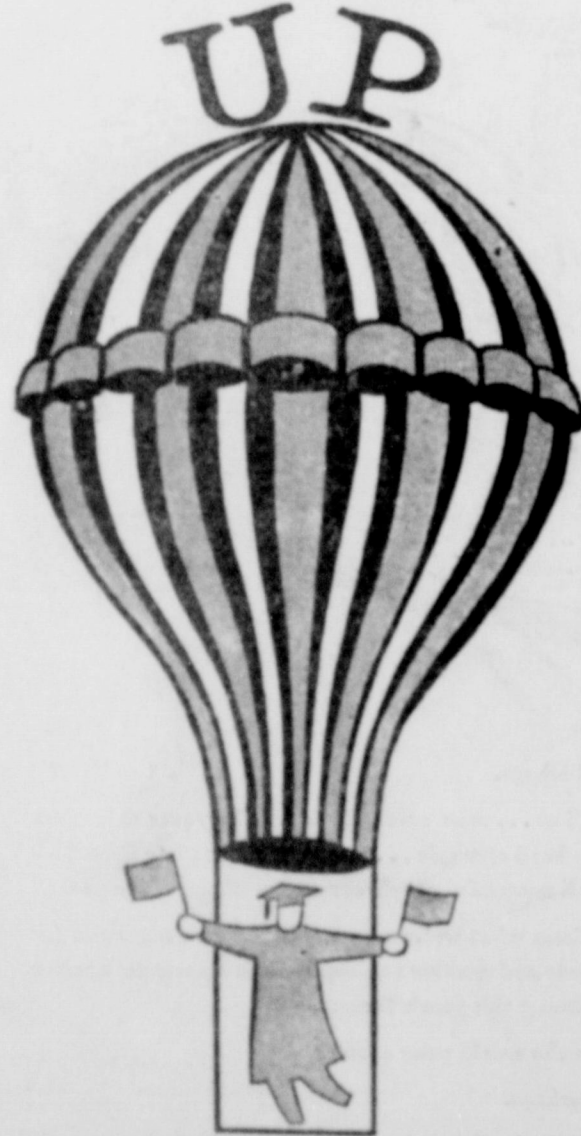

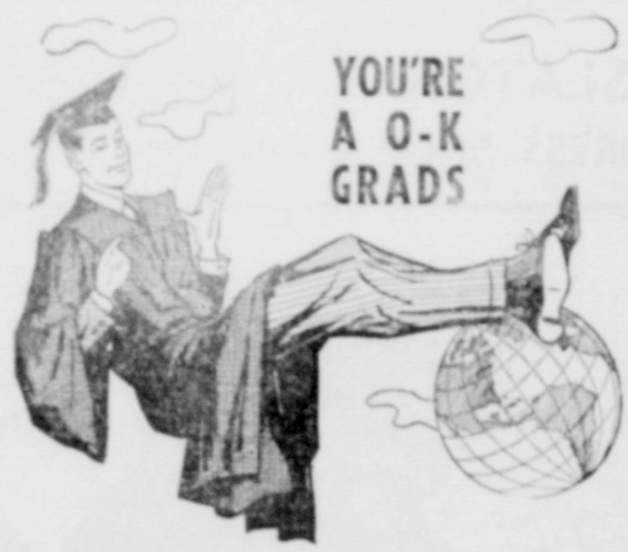
