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## Voting Precincts 36 & 37 Corrected By Lubbock County Commissioners

Last week the SLATONITE carried a story under this heading about the county commissioners meeting Monday, April 13. Owing to mechanical and other difficulties, that part pertaining to the boundaries was lost.

Last fall, without intending to do, the county commissioners moved the boundary between old precinct 26 (Club house) and 28 (West Ward school). It had been for many years the center line of Lubbock Street from 9th to 20th

Street, but through misunderstanding was moved south to Division Street in renumbering the precincts to 36 and 37, respectively. This put the designated polling place for precinct 37 outside, and the residence of Presiding Election Judge Wayne Liles outside the precinct.

In the April 13 meeting, the commissioners restored the boundary line to its previous location on Lubbock Street. They agreed that all those living between the south side of

Lubbock and the north side of Division Streets and holding poll tax receipts for precinct 36 would be allowed to vote at west ward school in precinct 37.

County Judge Wm. R. Shaver will also try to notify each of these voters by personal letter. This should correct what has been a confusing and sometimes exasperating situation.

Both Democratic and Republican primary elections will be held Saturday May 2 at the designated official polling places.

City residents living east of the center line of 9th Street will vote in precinct 38 at the East Ward school.

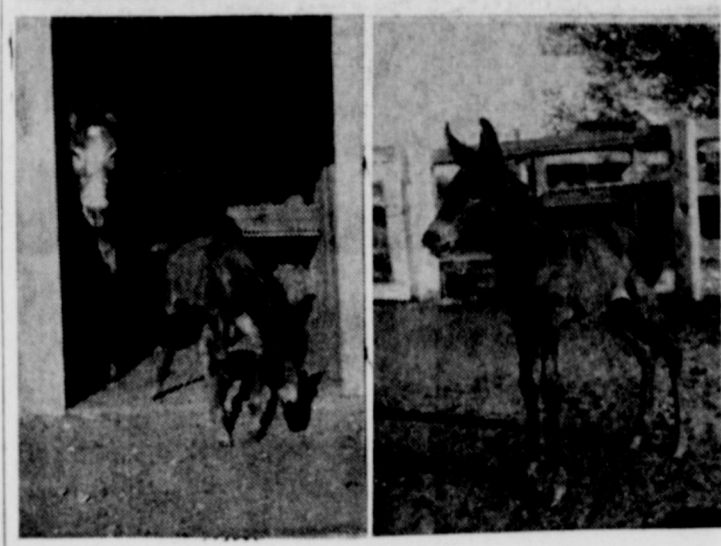
Ramon Magallanes, second, boys persuasive speaking.

The older girl came home from a meeting of Girl Scouts with a candle, and her brother lighted it and stepped into a clothes closet. Nylon or some other flimsy garments flamed instantly. The children tried to put the blaze out with pans of water, and Mrs. Saunders had to force them from the house.

After the Fire Department had the blaze under control, a hose line ruptured, causing some difficulty in replacing it. Then, while the fire fighting equipment was being gathered up, a second alarm came in from the home of Bob Kerns, Jr., 905 West Garza, where an electrical wiring short had started a blaze. Part of the equipment was dispatched from the scene of the first fire, but the Kerns blaze had been extinguished before it arrived.

Meanwhile, the Slaton Police Department had contacted the friends the Biggs were to visit in Lubbock, learned which show they were attending, and had the Sheriff's office notify them there to come home.

Very fortunately, no one was injured.

Another person changed "30" to "80" in a speed limit sign on 20th.

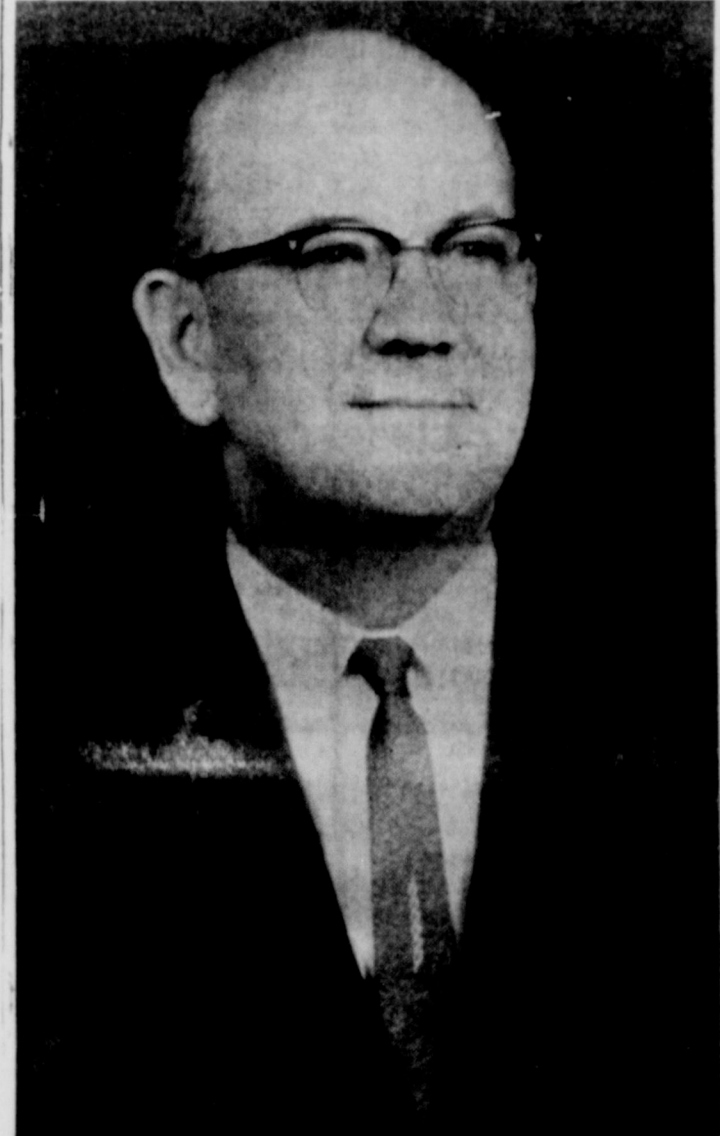
The number of bullet holes in highway signs might have some connection with the persons whose cars go "out of control" and kill them.

## Joe Sparkman To Attend Monitor Course

A Monitor Instructor's Course will be given in Civil Defense at the City of Lubbock fireman's training auditorium at Ash and Municipal Drive all day May 4 to 8.

It is sponsored by the Division of Defense and Disaster Relief of the Department of Public Safety, and will be conducted by the training crews from Texas A&M University, Texas State Department of Health and Department of Public Safety.

There has been no instructor's training course for monitors in this area. Joe Sparkman of Slaton High School has been appointed to take the training. He will be licensed to receive equipment and radiation sources for monitor training. Only one person from Slaton will be given the course at Lubbock. Sparkman will return to Slaton and instruct the required number of monitors needed here.

We are all familiar with the fact that there have been a multitude of changes in the past few years which have altered the course of industry and science - in fact, the course of human history. Naturally, these changes also have called for changes of modifications in the law of the land.

Fortunately the original makers of law knew they couldn't possibly foresee all that the future held, so they provided methods of changing the law. In this way, if a law became outdated it could be modified or even scrapped. A body of inflexible laws could be worse than no law at all.

Some persons feel the law is too rigid even with the changes permitted. However, most will agree that the entire body of law should not be changed overnight or without some thought. For instance, when you make a will you want to be certain that its terms will be carried out after you are gone. When you buy a house you certainly don't want your ownership upset overnight by an abrupt, ill-conceived change in the law.

An example of adaptability concerns a familiar object, the airplane. Years ago, a farmer in one state believed his property rights continued straight up - to outer space. Then came the airplane. It flew through what he considered his property.

The law had to adapt to the airplane and specify just how high was "up" when it came to property rights. Concoctably, if the farmer owned the air, he and other property owners could charge a toll and air travel could become fantastically expensive.

In this case, not only were existing laws modified, but an entire body of new law was set down to cover air travel, ect. The overall process took much time and research. In fact, the changes are still being made in this area.

The advent of the atomic age has created a new set of laws. Modern maritime navigational methods have called for changes in the admiralty laws to mention only another area where the flexibility of the law has been at work.

With all these changes, new laws, etc., it is little wonder that the attorney's office is jammed with law books, periodicals and special materials. However, if it were not for the flexibility of the law, the world as we know it might not exist.

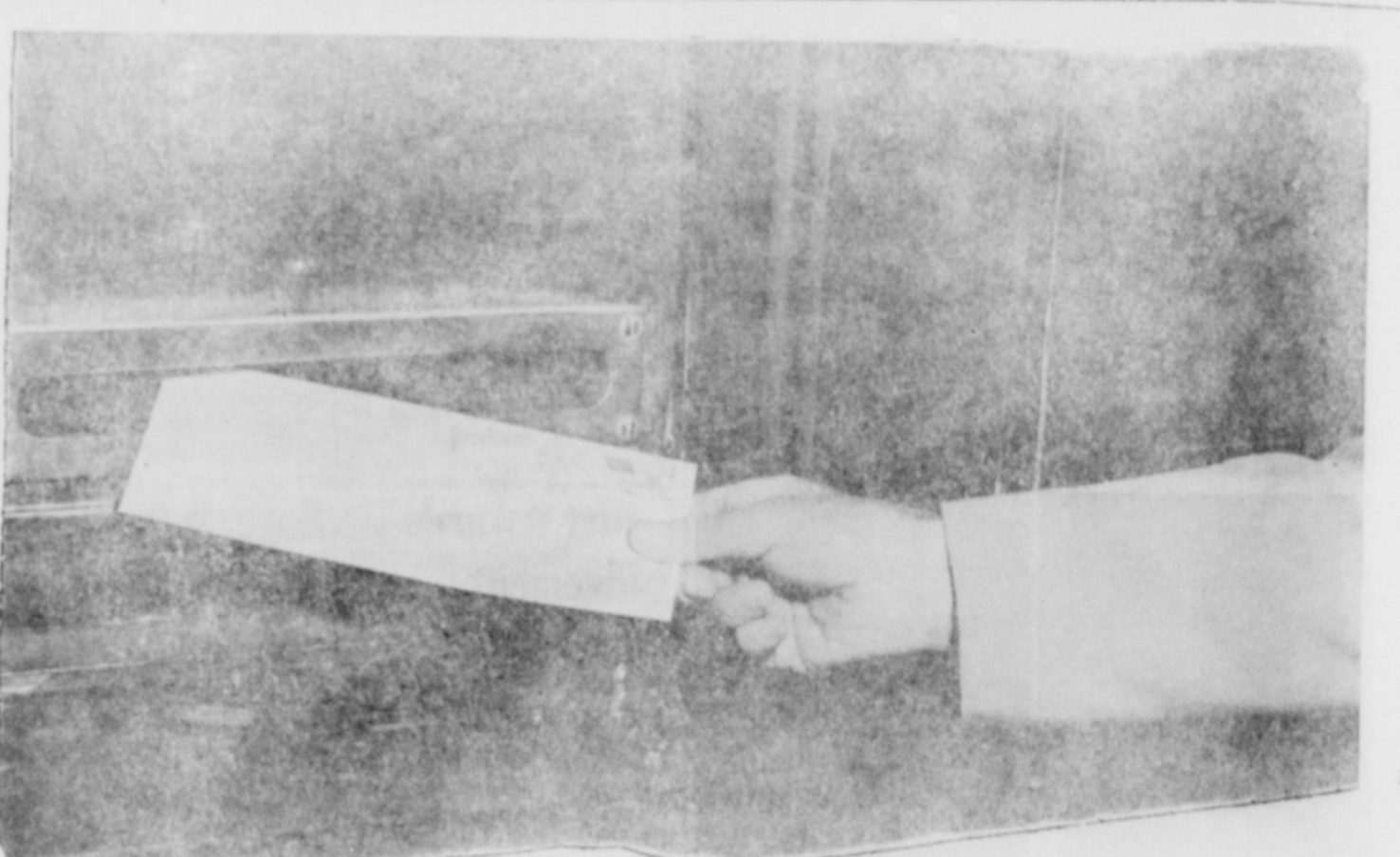

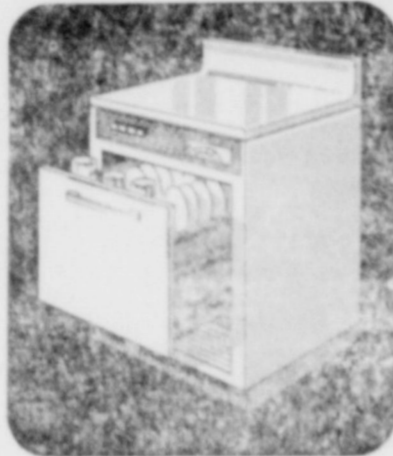

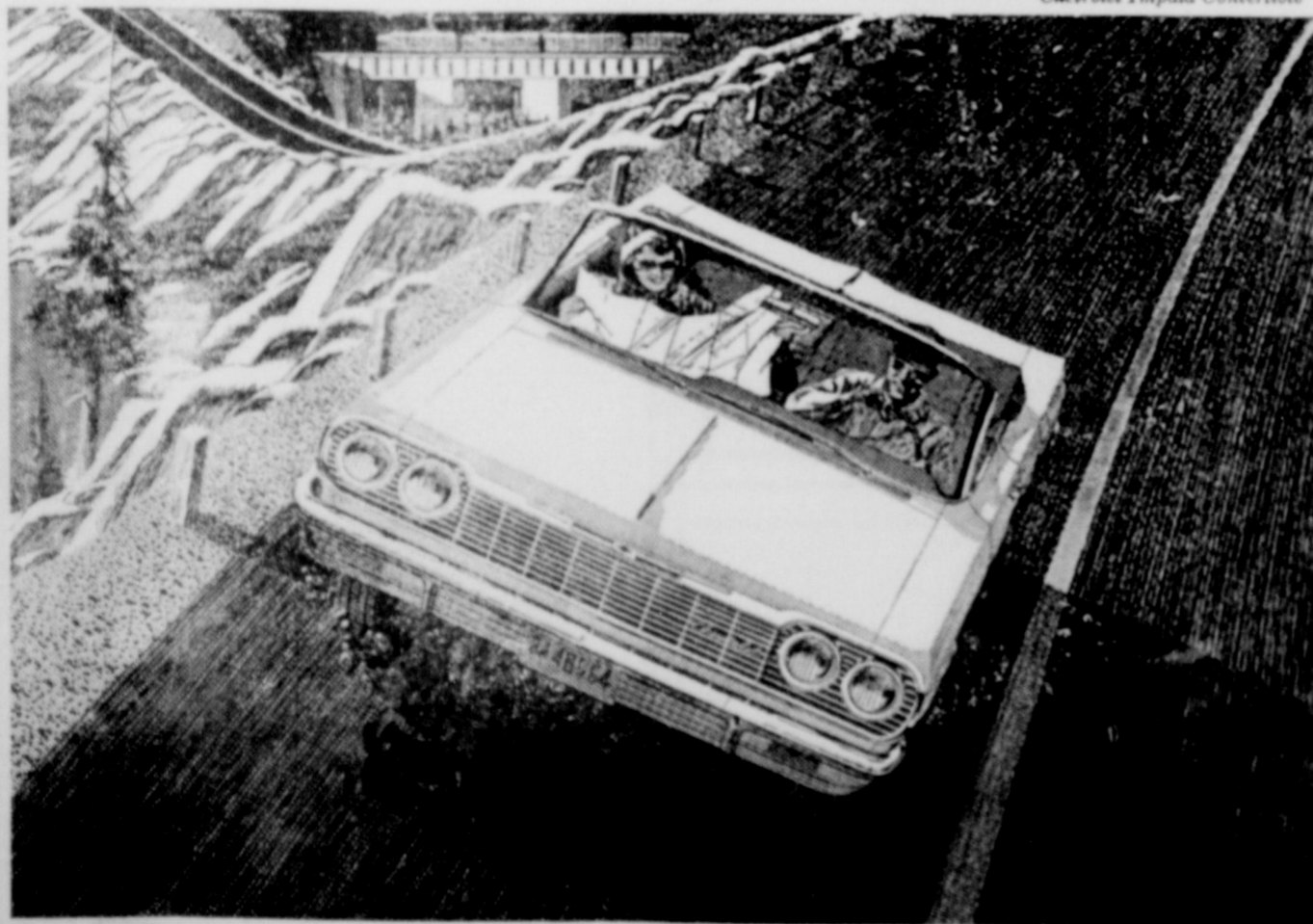

### Joseph Francis Bryan, Jr., Charged With Kidnaping Is Wanted By FBI

Federal charges of kidnaping were lodged against Joseph Francis Bryan, Jr., of Audubon, New Jersey, on April 2, 1964, following the discovery of what is believed to be the body of his victim. The body was located in a wooded area in Hallendale Beach, Florida, on March 31, 1964.

Shoes found near the body have been identified as those of 10 year old John David Robinson, missing from his Mount Pleasant, South Carolina home since February 27, 1964.

The boy's abandoned bicycle was found about 30 yards from a spot where Bryan's yellow and white 1957 Mercury was pulled out of a ditch by two South Carolina farmers on the morning of February 28, 1964, following the alleged kidnaping. The two farmers have identified Bryan as the driver of the car and also state that there was a young person under a blanket in the back seat.

Upon discovery of the boy's body, the Federal warrant charging Bryan with kidnaping was issued and a bond of \$100,000 was recommended.

Bryan has previously been arrested on charges involving sex offenses against young boys and

was committed to a mental institution for approximately seven months following these arrests. He has also served time in the Nevada State Prison for burglary and car theft.

Bryan has worked as a cook and a laborer, and is described as a white male, 26 years of age, 5' 10 1/2", 136 pounds, fair complexion, with blue eyes and light brown hair. He has a 1/2" scar over his left eyebrow; 1/2" scar on the back of his right hand; a scar on his lower left thigh; and a pinhead mole on the left side of his chest and his upper thigh.

Bryan was last known to be driving a yellow and white 1957 Mercury, bearing 1964 New Jersey License HWY 325 and this car is believed to be still in his possession. Bryan has allegedly carried a revolver, has attempted suicide, and should be considered dangerous.

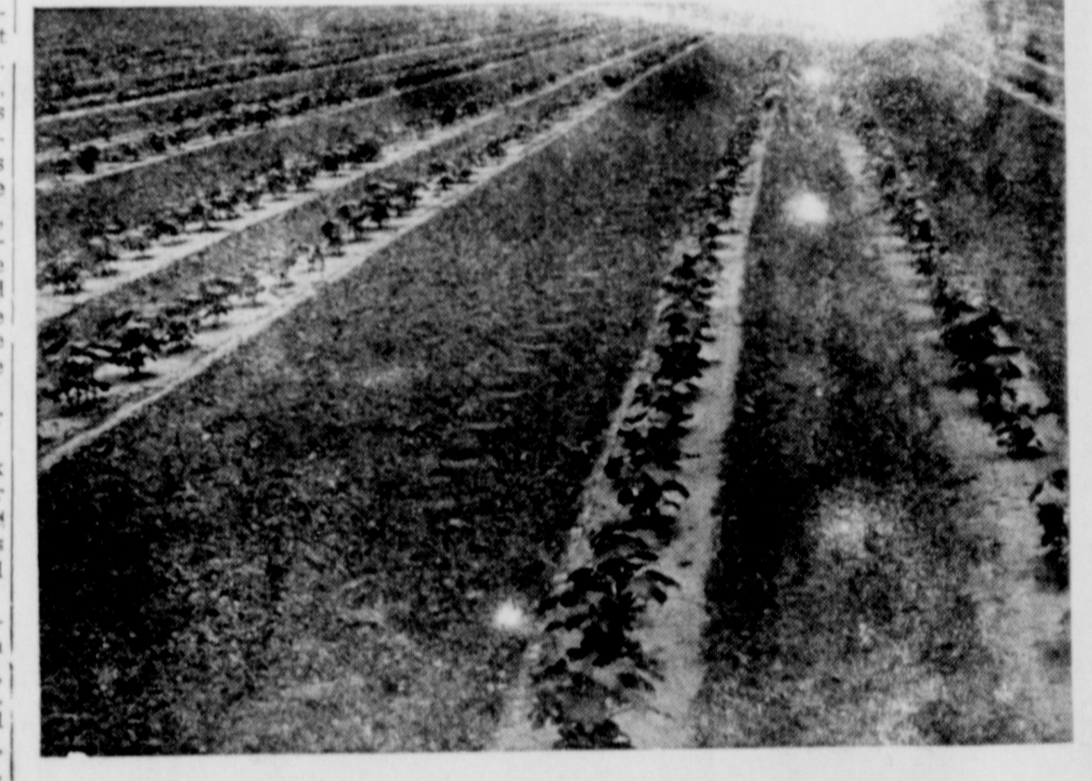

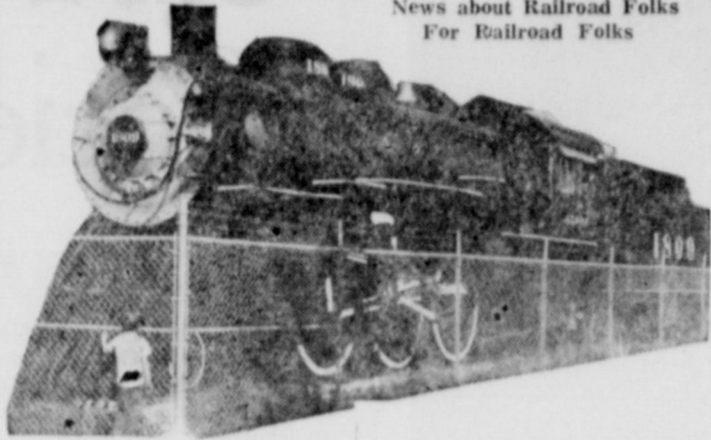

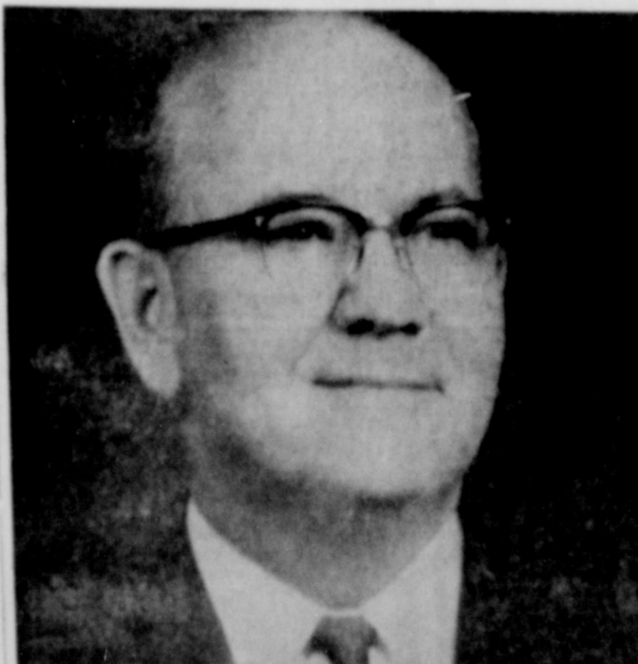
