Slaton Teachers Badly In Need Of Their Salaries

In order that the people of Slaton School District may know something about the teachers and their problems the writer has agreed to write these few lines.

In conference with several teachers we have found that the teachers have not been paid for the last two months of last years teaching. They have taught two months this year for which they have not received one penny. Merchants are not as able to take warrants as they were last Fall of last year.

Last year at the beginning of school each teacher was able to draw about \$20.00 in cash each month, but this year there is nothing. Some of the teachers are getting in hard shape, some have grocery bills that have been running for two and three months, some are behind with their utility bills, and the City and Gas Company will not take warrants.

While others are not able to pay other bills as house rent, Doctor bills, and what not. Another thing that the Slaton teachers have to do is that they have to pay twenty-five cents to get a warrant issued for less than half of their salary, and then can not get one for less than ten dollars. It is hard enough to have to take a warrant besides having to pay for it.
