Charter Amendment Election Ordered

City Commissioner Election Is Tuesday; Six Vie In Ward Four

With one election on tap for next Tuesday, the Slaton City Commission set a date for another at its meeting Monday night.

The second election, to be held on May 10, will be to submit a proposed charter amendment to the voters. The amendment has to do with city elections, how commissioners are nominated and elected and who shall elect them.

Next Tuesday's election will be for commissioners in two wards, ward two and ward four. H. G. Stokes is unopposed for the post in ward two, but it's a different story in ward four, where six candidates are vying for the voters' favor.

Albert Grigsby, A. A. Gartman, Key Ely, John C. Champion, L. L. Dixon and Roy Martinez seek the ward four post. High man will be elected as there is no runoff and a simple plurality is all that is required.

The election has held special interest to Slatonites, for the first time in the history of the community, a Negro and a Latin-American are in the race. L. L. Dixon, a local Baptist minister, and Roy Martinez, local Latin-American, have both waged strong campaigns for election, with Dixon backed by a group of Negroes and Latin-Americans supposedly united for the election and Martinez getting good support from a group among his race.

Coffe-cup philosophers, though, think any of the four Anglos in the race will have a good chance to win, as reported "splits" exist among the Negro and Latin-American voters, plus evidence that good support for some of the Anglos has been reported from both minority groups.

Balloting will start at 8 a.m. Tuesday and close at 7 p.m. The Slatonite will have a black-board located in a prominent place downtown to give election tabulations.

Five ballots had been cast in absentees voting Wednesday. Deadline is Saturday.

The May 10th election, according to the city's legal notice published in this week's Slatonite, will be held in the four voting wards in City Hall. The amendment, if passed, would alter Section 3 of Article Six of the Charter to read: "Section 3: City Commissioners How Nominated and Elected: Candidates for place on the City Commission will be nominated as provided in the Texas Election Code. Any City Commissioner hereinafter elected shall be elected by the qualified voters of the City of Slaton, Texas."

It would also amend Section 4 of Article Six. Commissioners, their qualifications, they must be residents of the city, property tax payers, be qualified voters, must have been residents for not less than two years unless they reside in an area annexed less than two years from the time of the election and must not be indebted

EDITORIALS

SLATON AND THE TIMES

The demise this year of the Lubbock County Hog, Lamb and Calf Show, that had been sponsored by Slaton Chamber of Commerce and the business men of Slaton for the past sixteen or seventeen years, was in many ways a worthwhile activity. However, it seems to be a pattern of the times to do away with such promotions.

Last week it was announced that the Post Stampede, an activity that was many years older than the Lubbock County Hog, Lamb and Calf Show, has been cancelled and the only celebration of this kind will be the Junior Rodeo for that area.

With the discontinuance of the Slaton Live Stock Show there will be no public entertainment in this area at all unless some activity is brought in to operation that has never been here before.

It would be hard to prove that civic activities such as Frontier Days, Annual Fairs and Rodeoes are of benefit to any town or city regardless of size. A survey of most of the merchants of Lubbock would probably show that the merchants do less business during the South Plains Fair period than they do any other time of the year. The visitors who come to Lubbock do not come to shop and quite often those who would be shoppers spend their time at the fair grounds and do not come to the business district at all. Some of the houses do additional business but the business districts as a whole are probably hurt more than they are helped at Fair time.

Times are changing and the old time community celebrations are going out of style. Whether this is for the best is as much a question now as whether one would be better off moving to Mars or Venus in 1980 probably will be.

If you want to remember the good old days, go the Fair and see a circus if it should come to this section, or if you want to remember what a Rodeo is like or even remember a horse, better attend one this year, in another five years there will not be such things. A.M.J.

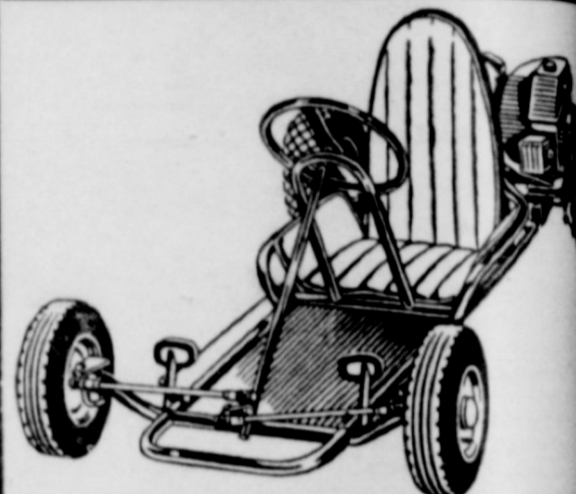
Dear Editor:

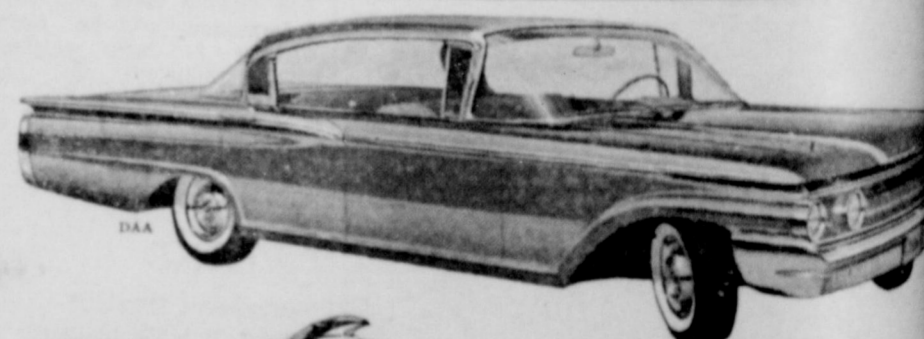

Rest Home For Aged To Be Constructed Soon In Post

Construction was to begin this week on a new rest home for the aged, according to an announcement made by Mr. and Mrs. Dewitt Caylor, builders.

Mr. and Mrs. Caylor, who own and operate Caylor's Service Station and Butane Company on South Broadway in Post, have spent considerable time during the past few weeks inquiring into state requirements for a home such as this, they reported to The Slatonite recently.

They have visited homes in several towns including those in Sweetwater and Rotan. The home will be built at 107 West 7th in Post and will be called Rest Haven. The building will be enlarged from a house now at that address.

The present house will be remodeled into a recreation room for TV and church services. The new rest home will accommodate 12 people, to start. Elbert Davies is the contractor. The building will be of tile blocks construction, fire proof and have control heating, the Caylors said. It is estimated it will be completed within six weeks to three months, depending on the weather.

Mrs. Iva (Sam) Sanders, a licensed vocational nurse, will be in charge of the operation. She will have a registered nurse and 24 hour nursing care.

The appointment is equivalent to a \$1,000 grant for summer study and limited to teachers of superior initiative and ability, according to J. G. Bradshaw, director of summer institutes at Princeton.

McPherson earned a bachelor of chemical engineering degree at Tech in 1947 and a M. Ed. in science teaching in 1952. He received his D. Ed. in educational psychology in 1959 at Tech.

From 1950 to 1955 he taught math and science at Slaton High School.

Major Crime In Texas Increases

Major crime in Texas during 1959 showed a marked increase according to figures released today by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

In a report from Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas DPS, aggravated assault gained the most with a 22 per cent increase over the year 1958. Crime in all categories increased 3.9 per cent over the previous year.

Of the remaining six major crimes, murder, rape, robbery, burglary, theft and auto-robbery showed a decline. According to the estimates, there were 45,827 burglaries in 1959 as compared with 44,822 in 1958, an increase of 2.2 per cent. Offenses in the automobile theft category totaled 15,830 as compared with 15,402 in 1958.

The crime report showed that on each day of the year 1959 there were 125 burglaries, 43 automobiles stolen, 266 thefts other than automobile 32 aggravated assaults, 7 robberies, 3 rapes and 3 murders.

On a ten year basis crime in Texas percentage wise by far outgained population. During the last decade the population of our state increased 24.4 per cent while crime increased 73.2 per cent.

Of other information in the report, the department's Identification and Criminal Records Section received 72,434 sets of criminal fingerprints in 1959, compared with 110,531 last year an increase of 52.59 per cent. In the year 1959 identifications were made on 35,649 fingerprints, while 66,961 were identified in 1959; this was an increase of 87.83 per cent.

As was true in all phases of law enforcement work, activities in the department's chemical laboratory showed tremendous gains. In 1959, 2,500 chemical examinations were completed last year there were 10,179.

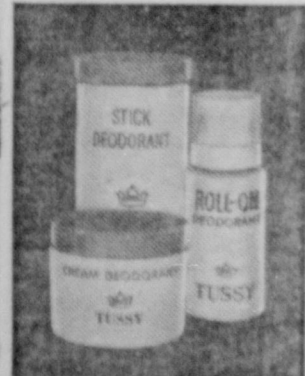

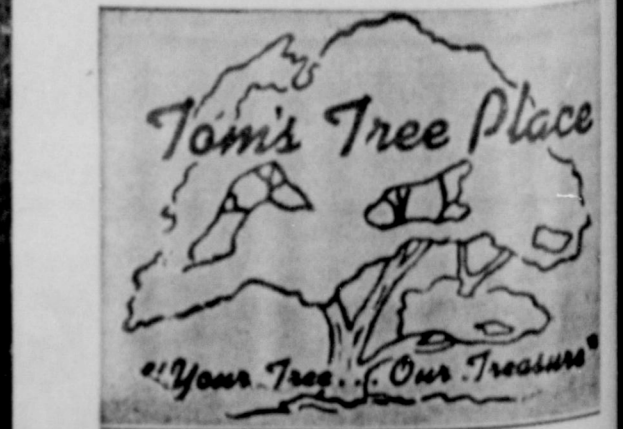

"An ordinance ordering an election in the City of Slaton, to be held on the 10th day of May, 1960, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Slaton for adoption or rejection, proposed amendments to the existing charter of the City of Slaton, designating the places in which said election is to be held, appointing presiding officers thereof, and declaring an emergency."

WHEREAS, On the 26th day of February, 1960 a resolution was duly passed by the City Commission giving notice of its intention to pass an ordinance providing for the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Slaton, Texas, of a proposed amendment to the existing charter of said City, and WHEREAS, Notice of intention to submit such charter amendment was given by publication in the Slaton Slatonite, the official newspaper published in said City, and which notice was published for ten days, the date of the first publication thereof being not less than twenty days next preceding the date of this ordinance, and

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Slaton deem it proper to submit the proposed amendment of the present City Charter to the qualified voters of said City; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:

 SECTION 9: The fact that the present Charter of said City is inadequate and the importance of the proposed charter amendments create an emergency and an imperative suspension of the rules requiring candidates to be read upon more than one day, and for the immediate taking effect of this ordinance, and such rules hereby suspended and it is declared that this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.
