Public Schools To Hold CD Program

Slaton Public Schools will initiate a program of adult education concerning Civil Defense on January 22, 1962, at 7:00 p.m. in the high school building. This program will provide information for the people of Slaton relative to the necessity of a Civil Defense organization, its functions, and its anticipated results. It is essential and pertinent and will include phases of Civil Defense in war-time and in some cases of catastrophes in peacetime. Staff members from Slaton schools attended an orientation meeting sponsored by the Texas Education Agency. These people were given a course for instructors. This, of course, enables Slaton Schools to offer the same course to the people of Slaton through staff members that sacrificed their time to attend this meeting. These staff members were Mr. T. C. Martin principal of West Ward Elementary School; Mr. J. D. Perkins, principal of Slaton Junior High School, and Mr. W. A. Carnes, head of the science department of Slaton High School. The course will be given without charge to the participants, and most of the materials will be furnished free of charge. This course will include such items as the necessity for such a course, the

capabilities of the potential enemy, and destructive power of the weapons, radiation and fallout radiation, construction of shelter, preparedness, and family survival.

Bingham New Coach

B. F. (Bing) Bingham, former coach at Post High School, has been named head coach and athletic director of the Slaton school system, Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent, has announced. Bingham will take over Feb. 12. He was named at a special meeting of the school board Monday night. Bingham has been in the insurance business at Post for about five years, since his retirement after a ten year coaching record there. A graduate of Spur High School, he played football at Texas Tech where he earned his bachelor's degree. Bingham succeeds M. W. Kerr. Kerr is now high school principal.

Marshall Formby To Seek Office Of Governor

Calling for a return of the Government to the people of Texas, Marshall Formby, Wednesday, made his formal announcement for Governor in the Democratic Primary, Formby, made his announcement from McAllen, in the Valley, where he was guest of honor at an appreciation dinner. Recently, the highway through the Valley was named the "Marshall Formby Valley Expressway." Formby is a former County Judge; former State Senator; and a former member and Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission. He is a strong advocate of the State Farm - to Market Road System. "Texans are demanding a more positive, progressive state administration, headed by a Governor who is not obligated to any cliques in either Washington or Austin. People are tired of the bickering and fussing among elected executives in Austin and they want a new leader -- but one who will not be dictated to from Washington," Formby said in his announcement. "Furthermore, the State needs a good solid businessman approach to solve the State's economic problems. I propose to bring sensible and logical leadership to the Governor's office when I am elected." Formby's platform includes favoring a simplified tax system; amending the so-called unfair merit car insurance ruling; increasing the speed limit to 70 miles per hour on 4-lane divided highways in rural areas and then strict enforcement; solving the State's water and soil conservation problems; less red tape for small businessmen and farmers; and, operating Texas on a cash basis. He favors greater consideration for the State's senior citizens. Formby lives at Plainview. He was born in Hopkins County. He is a practicing attorney, farmer and co-owner of four Texas radio stations.

Holiday Deaths Fewer Than Were Predicted

Sergeant O. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol Supervisor for this area stated, "That the Texas Department of Public Safety closed its Operation Death-Watch holiday period of ten days at midnight January 1, 1962, with 77 traffic deaths, 11 fewer than the predicted 88 traffic deaths."

The veteran patrol supervisor said there was "No doubt in my mind but that the massive education campaign undertaken so willingly and wholeheartedly by the new medias of the State, the exceptional cooperation of law-enforcement agencies and the willingness of hundreds of thousands who drove legally and defensively brought about this reduction of lives lost. I am sure this particular campaign and its results are clear and factual evidence of what can be done to save lives and reduce injuries in traffic."

Tigers Take Second Win In District

Meet Denver City Tuesday

Slaton's Tigers roared to a second district victory against no losses Monday night as they dropped Post's Antelopes by 78-42. Coach M. W. Kerr's Cagers had downed Tahoka 51-39 Friday in the district opener. Ronnie Jones hit 27 points against Post to lead the scoring field. Leslie Capps led the losers with 16 points. In the Tahoka game Jones also led the Tigers, netting 17 points. Tuesday night the Tigers travel to Denver City to meet the Mustangs, rated as the tops in the district, for one of the crucial games of the loop. In downing the Antelopes, the Tigers led 13-9 at the end of the first quarter and were in the lead 33-16 at halftime. Going into the final quarter Slaton led 54-25.

Slaton's Tigers halved their action during the week, falling to Tahoka 34-23, and then downing Post by 46-42. Glenda Bownds led the Slaton cagers with 24 points in the Post encounter, and Elaine Barnes had 12. Against Tahoka Elaine Barnes tied with Jane Thompson with eight points each in the scoring. Next game is with McAdoo Friday night at home.

Otis Gunter Funeral Sunday

Funeral services for Otis Gunter, 64, a resident of Slaton 30 years, were at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Church of Christ, with Bob Hoover and Ralph Bumpas officiating. Gunter died Saturday, Jan. 13 in the Church of Christ Home at Gunter, Texas. He was born May 24, 1897, at Hillsboro, Texas.

A member of the Church of Christ, Gunter was a professional baseball umpire and cotton weigher. He helped organize the Babe Ruth, Pony, and Little Leagues on the South Plains, and was a charter member of the Slaton Lions Club.

During the past 1961 season, Gunter was honored with a special night, paying tribute to him for the vast amount of time and effort he put in to organize youth baseball in Slaton and the area.

GRASS LEGUME RESEARCH

An observation program on sixty-six grasses and one-hundred and fourteen legumes conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation will be continued for 1962. The source of the seed were both native and from foreign countries. Some varieties showed promise of adaptation to the needs of the area. A search will be continued for a high protein grass that can be easily eradicated. This will be used to help restore humus to the soil and at the same time be used for profitable grazing. Such grasses can be used in rotation to improve the ability of the soil to hold air and absorb water more readily.

Lubbock County Traffic Toll Rises During 1961

At the stroke of twelve midnight December 31, 1961, "Old Father Time" quietly slipped away. But the resounding echoes and visions of his destruction of grinding metal bodies, crashing glass, torn and broken limbs and smashed lives will live long in our memories. His record in Lubbock County has been an expensive one. For the entire year of 1961 in this county there were 324 crashes resulting in 31 persons killed, 222 injured and an estimated property damage of \$183,041.00. In comparison of the year 1960 there were 279 crashes resulting in 22 persons killed, 161 injured and an estimated property damage of \$212,150.00.

For the month of December the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 40 rural traffic accidents in this county according to Sergeant O. C. Guthrie Highway Patrol Supervisor for this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, thirty persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$22,227.00.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor cautions all motorists not to be guilty of negligence in permitting their windshields and window glasses to be covered with any form of frozen precipitation while driving. This enhances your chances of an accident many times.

EDITORIALS

STATE OF THE NATION

During the 1962 fiscal year, Budget Director David Bell informs us, the federal government's revenues will come to an estimated \$82,100,000,000 and its expenditures to \$88,985,000,000. The result will be a deficit of \$6,885,000,000.

A common defense of this huge deficit is that increased spending for national defense, in this time of an increasingly grave and clouded world picture, makes it inevitable. And it is true that the last Congress increased the military budget by several hundred millions of dollars. But the biggest single increase of all was for something that had nothing whatsoever to do with military force, or with the missile program, or with space exploration, or anything of any kind. It was an increase of \$981 million in price support payments to farmers.

Every American will willingly pay whatever is necessary to assure the national security, and no one can now say how large that bill will become in the future. But he has the right, and the obligation, to demand that his government save every possible dollar in the non-military phases of its operations.

RAILROADING ILLEGAL?

"Is Railroading Illegal"? That is the provocative title of an address delivered a short time ago by J. Handy Wright, vice president of the Association of American Railroads. And it makes a great deal more sense than some people, who are unaware of the situation the vital railroad industry finds itself in, might think.

In his words, "It isn't exactly illegal yet to run a railroad, but sometimes you'd think it was when you look at the mountains of restrictions placed in the way of the railroads. In fact, if the government doesn't do us in with its conflicting rules and regulations, policies and procedures, it will probably be a great surprise to many."

This may well be the year of decision so far as railroads are concerned--and only Congress can make that decision. It has no lack of guideposts to go by--study after study has been made, many of them at high official level, and their proposals are, in general, the same. They can be summed up in a Magna Carta for Transportation which, in principle, would simply create equality of treatment for all carriers, with favoritism and discrimination toward none. To quote Mr. Wright once more, "Stifling and unequal regulation, top-heavy taxation, government subsidy to our competitors and outmoded restrictions on the railroads' ability to diversify or render a complete transportation service have resulted in the public and the shipper being denied the full benefits--in the way of fast, low-cost transportation--which the railroads are able to provide." It is this sorry situation that the Magna Carta is designed to correct. And it must be corrected--if we are to strengthen not only the economy but the military security of this nation.

FIRE FREQUENCY

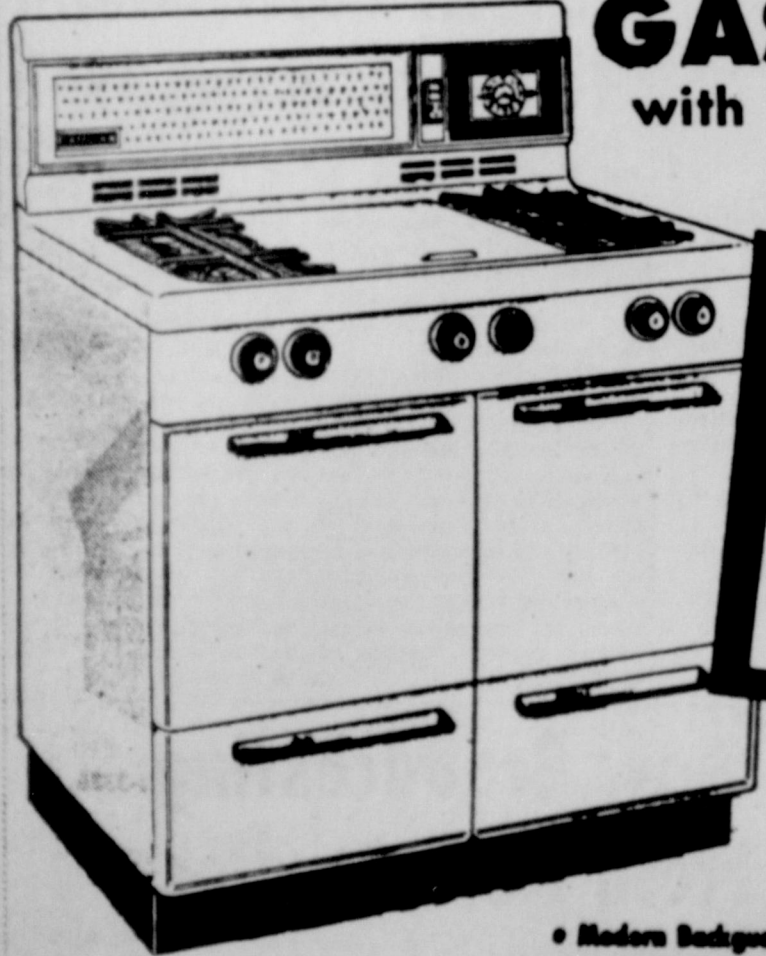

TELEPHONE TALK

Almost everyone these days talks about something "jet-age". With that in mind--I'm going to talk about "jet-age" telephoning. You get jet-age speed in telephoning in Slaton when you dial a local call and the number within a few seconds. You can get faster service on distance calls too. Just give the operator the "area number" for the place you are calling--instead of the name of the town. If you place calls to Lubbock, Amarillo or most of the nearby towns in this area the call is 806. If you are not sure of the area code for the place you are calling, ask the operator. Then jot it down. Next time you place a call to that number give the area code instead of the name of the town, and see how fast jet-age telephoning works.

HOT ITEM.

The Princess phone is a hot item. This fact is evidenced by its popularity all over Texas. But recently there's been a little hot for a Princess phone in one of our neighboring towns.

TOGETHERNESS BY TELEPHONE

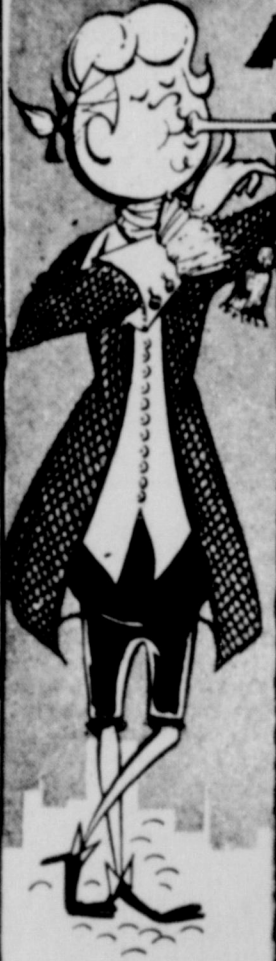
One of the nice things about the telephone business is that you never know when your customers will find new uses for any given telephone service.

- 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups graham cracker, ginger or vanilla cookie crumbs

Pour evaporated milk into refrigerator tray; chill until icy cold and partially frozen. Drain plums. Pit and cut into small pieces. Add nuts. Dissolve gelatin in hot water and chill until partially set. Whip until light and fluffy. Add lemon juice, rind and sugar. Whip chilled milk and fold into gelatin mixture. Line bottom of 13 x 9-inch pan with crumbs, reserving 1/4 cup for top. Pour in half of gelatin mixture. Arrange plum mixture over it. Spoon in remaining gelatin and sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut into squares to serve. Garnish with purple plum half, if desired. Makes 15 servings.

Tomorrow's World---

On Being Gloomy

Mr. Joseph Alsop is one of the nation's great columnists. The President reads him; so do millions of others.

I wonder what some of these people thought, therefore, when they read, in a recent column entitled "On Being Gloomy", the following utterly gloomy statement:

"... what is a sensible modern political attitude? The only possible answer is neither ambitious nor fully satisfying. 'Peg away, face and meet each problem as it comes, and hope for the best while preparing for the worst'--these maxims do not seem quite adequate in a world being rapidly but unforeseeably transformed. But what other sane answer is there?"

Is this the "only possible answer"? I think not. "Meet each problem as it comes"-- isn't this what we have been trying to do, with dismal results, for seventeen years, and, incidentally, not meeting many of them even as they come?

"Hope for the best while preparing for the worst"--- Prepare for the worst, of course, for this is not such a good world in which to be caught defenseless. But merely hope for the best? What is hope without thought and planning and intelligence?

Indeed these are not maxims worthy of free men in the most

complicated, dangerous and unforeseeable world man has ever known.

"What other sane answer is there?" Well, let us explore that a bit.

The basis of any sane answer has to be a master world plan to which this nation will commit itself. The United States has no master world plan. It improvises; it wonders what the other side will

do next and then hopes it can come up with an answer; it relies on alliances and all the other moth-eaten paraphernalia of the dying past.

The Soviet Union has a master world plan. It has been working for it for forty years. It has made giant strides toward its realization. Its world plan is One World dominated by Soviet economic, political, cultural and social dogma.



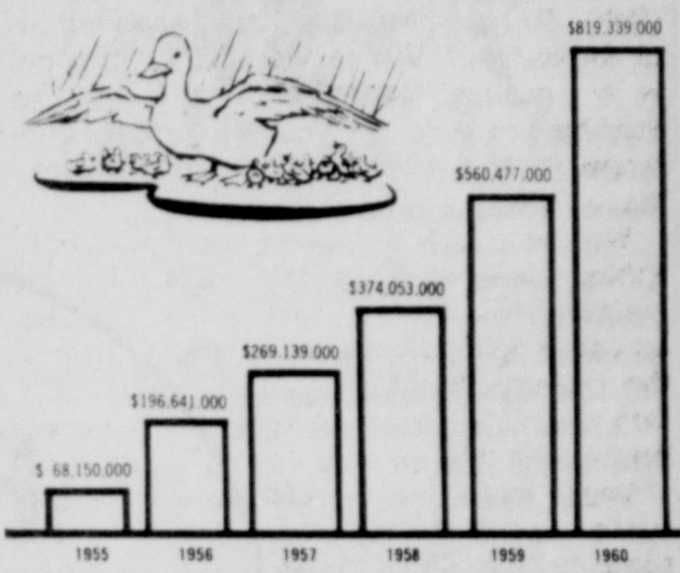

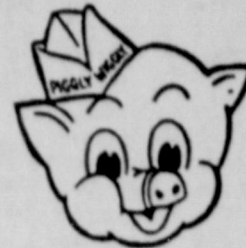
