They are at home at 250 West Lynn in Slaton.

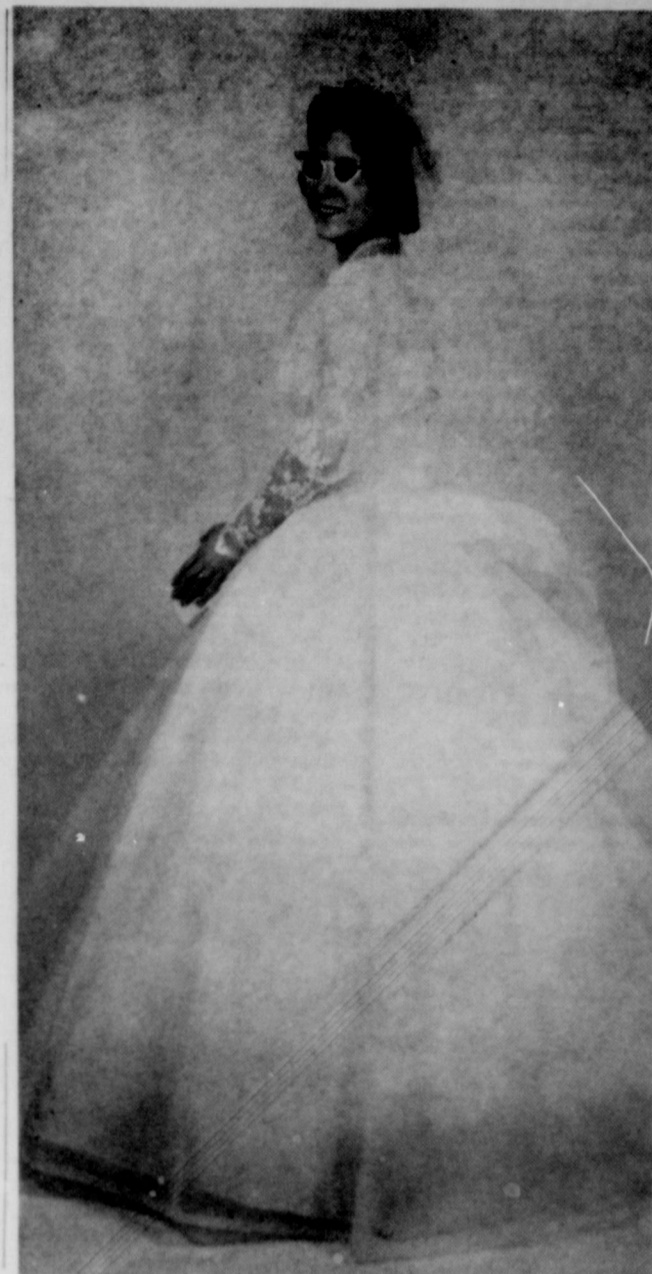
Slaton H. D. Club To Have Window Display
