There are four steps that we have noted as successfully followed by progresive communities:

(1) Desire for progress, (2) analysis of both the needs and facilities at hand, (3) anticipation of future situations, and finally (4) singleness of purpose in meeting these needs one by one.

Some towns that you and ourselves know have made overnight spectaculars. Others have slept and failed to awaken the interest of anyone, resident or passer-by.

But the town that we like best of all is neither of these; it is the one wherein the citizens have practiced the four above steps so conscientiously that the very front page of their newspaper, any day or week, reflects-even shouts-that "here is a community where the inevitable challenges are explored and tackled day after day, maybe a bit slowly, but surely nd soundly.

An out-of-town reader remarked this week upon the front page of the Slatonite, commenting on the many civic enterprises heralded or alluded to. He also told of hearing the talk up and down the street about desire for a new city hall, and of the forthcoming time when Slaton would no doubt be drawing water from the vast resources being provided by the Canadian Dam.

FORT STOCKTON - According to an engineering survey, Fort Stockton has only four buildings which qualify as public fallout shelters, it was revealed this week by County Judge Walter

Buenger listed the buildings as the old senior high school, the court house, the Pecos County State Bank and the junior high school. He said the engineering firm of Davis, Foster, Thorpe and Associates, Inc., of El Paso, made the survey under a contract from the federal government.

In order to qualify as a designated shelter, Buenger said the building basement must accommodate at least 50 persons. He pointed out that there are other basements in Fort Stockton which will accommodate the minimum number of persons, but the basements have wooden ceilings and are therefore automatically disqualified.

The court house basement will be fixed into a fall out shelter, Buenger said. The government will stock the basement with water, food survival kits, first aid supplies and the like. Buenger said work on the basement will begin immediately.



The committee should have recommendations ready for legislative action in the January session. Outcome may rest on voter pressure between now and the November general election.
